Student apartments rejected

Commissioners spent nearly four hours listening to public comments from residents near the corner of McCulloch and Old Lockwood roads two weeks ago. They delayed a decision on the Portofino 252-unit complex at that time because attorneys for both sides submitted briefs several inches thick during the meeting.

County Commission denies developer's SANPORD - County commissioners rezoning request for housing complex

> The proposed apartments are in Commissioner Grant Maloy's district and he was the only commissioner to vote in favor of the housing complex. Maloy tried to persuade commissioners to vote for the project, by requiring the developer to reduce the number of bedrooms and making the apartments less intrusive to nearby residents.

> Commissioners balked at Maloy's suggestions and his motion of approval failed. Commissioner Carlton Henley said the pro-

posal leap frogged single family residential to the west of the site.

"I'm going to have to move to Seminole County and vote for Henley," said Larry Rubight who lives across McCulloch Road in

Orange County's University Estates.

The Portofino project is the fifth hotly debated student apartment complex to be heard by the Seminole County commissioners.

Passenger traffic increases at airport

SANFORD — The number of passengers traveling through the Orlando Sanford International Airport increased by 19 percent in

Domestic passengers were responsible for most of the growth. Of OSIA's 57,000 passengers in January, 27,552 arrived or departed for domestic locations, an increase of 103 percent over

"The big news is those domestic numbers," said Larry Dale, president of OSIA. "Our domestic carriers - Pan Am and Vacation Express — are doing very well.
The people at Vacation Express
are very happy. All their flights are well over an 80 percent load

International passengers were down by 1 percent from last year to 26,679, while transit passengers

were down 61.5 percent to 2,906.
"We're pleased with the international numbers, particularly with the economy the way it is," Dale said.

The reason for the dramatic drop in transit passengers is two-fold. Transit flights are those which depart from international locations and land in Sanford to refuel and restock supplies before departing for another international location. Those passengers get off the plane during refueling and wait in a secure transit lounge in the terminal, then reboard the plane to continue their trip.

In previous years, the airport counted transit passengers twice, once when they deplaned and once when they reboarded. The airport recently adopted the

26 named **National** Scholarship Semi-finalists

The more than 20 students who were presented Tuesday to the Seminole School Board look like average high school students. Talk to their parents, teachers and principals, however, and one learns quickly looks can be deceiving.

Twenty-six Seminole County students were honored during Tuesday's meeting as National Merit/ Achievement/Hispanic Scholarship semi-finalists for the 2001-2002 school year. They received the honor from National

Scholarship Corp. after taking the PSAT/NMSQT. Following a reception, the

students and their parents several students were absent due to other obligations were introduced to the Board by the principals of the county's reven high schools.

These students represent the top .8 percent of the top 1 percent of their classes in Seminole County," said David Winter, the school system's coordinator of testing. "They represent the top .5 percent of the top 1 percent in the United States.

As a group, the 26 students averaged 1464 of a possible 1600 on the SAT, and several scored a perfect 800 on either the math or verbal section of the test. They accumulated an average 4.299 GPA and ranked 14 in an average class size of 513.

Along with high test scores, the students have received numerous academic honors during their educational careers, including honor roll, Who's Who in American High Schools and citizenship and leadership awards. Many have fine-tuned their skills in various subjects and have received honors for excellence in music, science and mathematics.

The students don't only excel in their studies. Each participate in three to 10 extracurricular activities, and several work part-time jobs. Many also take time away from school to volunteer within the community.

Although all the acceptance letters haven't arrived in the mail —yet — many of the 26 seniors will be going to prestigious colleges and universities next year, including Duke, Howard, Princeton, Harvard and the University of Florida. Fields of study will include



Sanford should throw a parade for the city's only Olympic silver medalist

Olympic congratulations are in order for one of Sanford's own. The Friendly City has an abundance of diversely talented residents, but never in it's history has Sanford been the home of a medal winner in the Olympic Winter Games. That changed on Feb. 23 when Garrett Hines and his teammates stood on the podium in Salt

Hines literally pushed his way into Sanford and Olympic lore. As a pusher in the four-man bobsled, Hines helped the United States win a silver medal, the nation's first bobsledding medal since 1956. He and teammate Randy Jones are also the first African-American males to win a medal in the Winter Games. As if those accomplishments weren't sweet enough, Hines' historic feat occurred on his daughter Nicole's 12th birthday.

While not as celebrated a Apolo Ohno or Sarah Hughes, Hines knew he had the Olympic mettle needed to win a medal. He came tantalizingly close in the two-man bobsled, missing a bronze by a three one-hundredths of a second. In the blink of an eye, Hines and teammate Todd Hayes were denied—temporarily—a medal. The duo persevered and days later were rewarded for their efforts in the four-man bobsled.

The city should officially recognize Hines for his accomplishment and the honor he has brought to Sanford. Proclamations and a special day named after Hines are no doubt in the works, but this calls for something more—a parade down 1st Street. Hines deserves nothing less, after all, how many Olympic silver medallists live in Sanford.

Honoring Bud

Naming a school for former superintendent Layer is a good idea


Sanford Commissioner Whitey Eckstien and Seminole County Commissioner Carlton Henley share more than an elected position. They are both lifelong educators who have dedicated their lives to teaching and nurturing the youth of Seminole County.

Eckstien and Henley also have a respect for those who share their passion of teaching. While both men modestly turn attention away from their own works, they're quick to promote the efforts of others. Such is the case with Eckstien's suggestion to name a school after Bud Layer, a legendary educator who spent a career as a teacher, administrator and superintendent.

Layer's first assignment was as the biology teacher at Seminole High School in 1955. He was the head baseball coach and served as an assistant on the basketball team. He later moved to Sanford Junior High before Henley recruited him to serve as an assistant principal at Lyman High School. He was a talented administrator and worked at Milwee and Teague middle schools.

During Layer's days, superintendents were elected not appointed. In 1972, Layer took a chance and ran for office. Voters elected him not once, but twice to lead the school system. While he was a savvy politician, Layer was also well respected by the teachers in Seminole County. Time and again, Layer supported teachers in efforts to improve learning conditions and increase salaries. His philosophy was that resources were better spent on the front lines, and he worked to ensure decisions benefited the students, not a centralized school administration.

Eckstien and Henley have persuaded their respective boards to adopt a resolution asking the school board to name a school for Layer. The request is not without precedent. The school board has honored other local educators, a former governor, and even the new millennium with a school renaming. Layer is worthy of the same honor.

The words I quoted were spoken by the deputy governor of Massachusetts, the good Mr. William Bradford. Bradford's words, as fictionalized by Arthur Miller, will ring out over New York and the country next week as "The Crucible," Miller's

play on the Salem witch trials of 1692, is revived 50 years after he wrote it in When it was first pro-

duced, and in conventional wisdom since, it was seen as an attack on the House Un-American Activities Committee's zealous communist hunts of the day. In fact, Miller, who would himself be questioned by Congress three years later, wrote at the time that he

was forced to turn to history to discuss his own time: "The reason I think that I moved in that direction was that it was simply impossible any longer to discuss what was happening to us in contemporary terms. We were all going slightly crazy trying to be honest and trying to see straight and trying to be

It is clear now that the play, which received generally good reviews and ran for 197 performances on Broadway, is better than that. It stands now as an attack on

group - Christians, Muslims, or even Nazis and businessmen - by forcing others to declare total allegiance or be seen and punished as evil. A British scholar, Christopher Bigsby, wrote this of the work in

"What replaces the sense of natural community in 'The Crucible' ... is a sense of participating in a ritual of conformity to a ruling orthodoxy and hence a purity of one's religious principles is confirmed by collaborating, at least by proxy, in the punishment of those who reject

"In fact the play's success now owes little to the political and social context in which it was written. It stands, instead, as the debiliatory power of guilt, the seductions of power. ... It stands as testimony to the case with which we betray those very values essential to our survival, but also the courage with which some men and women can challenge what seems to be a ruling orthodoxy.

The play, which opens on March 7 at the Virginia Theater on West 52nd Street, with Liam Neeson and Laura Linney in starring roles, is

not about religion or ideology; it is about the power and corruptions of ideology, all ideologies. Good and ideas of good do evil on the stage. (I saw the production in preview last Friday night.)

"I note that you are rarely in the church on Sabbath day ... 26 times in 17 months ..." says a preacher to a man who answers that he prays at home.

"Your house is not a church; your theology must tell you that," says the man with the power. "Mister, a Christian on Sabbath day must be in church."

Then the man who prays at home can name only nine of the Ten Commandants — and that leads to his being hanged in the public square. So ends an important piece of American writing. Sound government regulation is about helping, not hindering

Neighbors, friends and even family members of Brent Marsh seem genuinely puzzled by the scandal that engulfs Marsh and his Tri-State Crematory, Marsh and his parents - well-known, churchgoing, civic-minded folks — were considered among the leading families of rural Walker County,

There may never be an adequate explanation for what went awry at the cre-Tucker matorium. There may never be an answer to the questions that tear at those who knew the Marsh family: Who knew about the careless descration of human remains? Who stacked the

corpses like rotted lumber? But this much is clear: A more thorough system of state regulation — as in government regulation would have prevented this scandal and pre-empted the ensuing heartbreak. If the state of Georgia had provided even modest oversight of would not be littering the Marsh

Since the era of Ronald Reagan, who campaigned against the very government he later led, government regulation has been unpopular. Easy to vilify, government bureaucrats have been satirized as tyrants who grow fat making life difficult for hardworking, risk-taking business owners. During the gogo 1990s, when the Wall Street bubble seemed to

promise that private enterprise would provide health and wealth to all, the widespread antiregulatory attitude only hardened.

But now the pendulum has begun to swing back as corporate scandals remind the American public why government regulation is necessary. Enron, of course, is the poster child for the pitfalls of weak government oversight. But Tri-State teaches the same lesson on a local

crematoriums, 20-year-old corpses level. The Marsh family's success in exempting their crematorium from state regulation led directly to the gruesome scandal that engulfs

Walker County now. Georgia laws regulating crematoriums are very weak; nevertheless, in 1994, Tommy Ray Marsh persuaded his state legislator, Rep. Mike Snow, to help him gain a temporary exemption from even those flaccid regulations. (Indeed, Snow tried to push through a permanent exemption for Marsh.) As a consequence, the Tri-State crematorium was never inspected, and it is unclear when the furnace used for cremations was last in service.

Perhaps the North Georgia legislator has learned a valuable lesson. Since the discovery of bodies strewn about the Marshes' property, Snow has introduced a bill to strengthen state oversight of crematoriums and funeral homes. Perhaps in the future, he will become an advocate for wiser government regulation of all business

Of course, Snow is not the only Georgia legislator who needs to learn from the Tri-State scandal. Recently the Georgia House pushed through a bill that would have required state environmental officials to ignore tips from anonymous sources about polluted sites. (The bill now seems dead in the Senate.) Until it was amended, the bill would have discouraged average folks from reporting chemical spills, hazardous runoff and the like.

Officials learned about the scandal at Tri-State Crematory only through an anonymous telephone call to federal environmental officials, who then went out to inspect the property. Without that tipster, the nightmarish doings may have continued for another decade or

Nobody ever dreamed that Brent Marsh or his father might be capable of such violations of human decency. That's why government regulation is important: You ca never be sure.



Mr. Miller was born March 22, 1851 in Anterp, Belgium and came to America in 1872. He first lived in New York, where he was employed in the cabinet making trade. He later moved to Asbury, N.J., where he was engaged in the furniture making business.

and had the distinction of building the first mile of track from the shops to the water-

In 1885, he entered the furniture and undertaking business, a line which he followed until he retired in 1925. Doc Miller, as he was called, also owned a drugstore located on Park and Elm Avenue.

Brisson Funeral Home can Avenue between 1st and 2nd streets.

The first funeral home, T.J. Miller and Son, was located in a building on 2nd Street between Magnolia and Palmetto avenues. The building later became the home of the Salvation Army. The first funeral conducted from there was on July 28, 1885.

Before motorized vehicles, the hearse was a horse-drawn wagon. Almost from the very beginning, an old, gray horse named "Bob" pulled the wagon. He faithfully worked for T.J. Miller for 28 years, dying July 1914 after a year of retirement at Miller's groves southwest of the city. Bob was 37 years old.

Following his death, Bob was buried just outside Lakeview Cemetery near the spot where he had pulled many a deceased resident. The grave marker was moved and thought lost, but it was found a few years ago and donated to the Sanford Museum. Hunt Monument Company donated a replacement marker several years ago.

Frank Miller, T.J. Miller's son, took over the funeral home in 1925. Frank brought in William C. Erickson as a partner and changed the name to Miller and Erickson Funeral Home. This was mainly an investment for Erickson, as her owned and operated Erickson Cannery, which was located at 13th Street

In 1935 the funeral home was moved to its present location on Laurel Avenue. The Ericksons lived upstairs. Soon after they moved, a young man from Daytona Beach, Gordon Brisson, was hired as funeral director.

In 1937, Miller sold the funeral home to Erickson and the Lakeview Cemetery to the city of Sanford. The name of the funeral home was changed to Erickson.

In 1940, Erickson made arrangements for one of the men who was helping him part time to work full time. Thus on Oct. 14, 1940, O.R. "Shorty" Smith worked his first day as a full-time employee. He's still working today. Shorty was born in Waycross, Ga., the youngest of 10 children. He came to DeLand with his family in 1927. His father built machine shops.

Shorty was working as a diesel mechanic at the Sanford waterworks when he made friends with some of the funeral home employees. The business intrigued him so much that he went to work there.

Brisson was the funeral director/manager at the time of Erickson's death in April 1943. Mrs. Erickson tried but was unable to manage the business, so Gordon Brisson purchased it in October. His dad gave him the down payment.

He changed the name to

Luring 'em in: Since Brian Tooley began his tenure as Sanford's top cop, the city has invested some serious resources in the once maligned police department. Pay raises, new cars, more officerajust about anything Tooley has asked for the City Commission has granted.

The commission wants to improve the department, no doubt, but it also hopes to attract and keep officers. Traditionally, Sanford would recruit an officer out of the academy, spend a lot of money to equip him and training him, only to have the officer leave for better pay and benefits in Orlando or Orange County.

In an effort to retain officers the commission has implemented pay raises and approved a program allowing officers who live in Sanford or Seminole County to take their vehicles home. If the officer lives in the city, use of the vehicle is pretty much unregulated.

Now, Mayor Brady Lessard wants to take it a step further. If an officer lives inside the city limits, he wants the city to pay 10 percent of the cop's mortgage or rent. Lessard figures even if every officer in the department lives in Sanford (not likely) and has a sizeable mortgage or rent, the city's looking at less than \$150,000 per year.

Lessard figures it provides an added benefit officers will be hard pressed to find elsewhere. Plus, the mayor figures cops who live in the city are more in tune with their community. Besides, he says, who wouldn't want to live next to a cop?

Expect the commission to discuss the matter at it's March 11 meeting.

Home is where the heart's at: Speaking of living in town, expect Lessard to propose a plan requiring all city department heads to live inside the city lim-

While the city manager, the police chief and the fire chief are all required to live in the city limits, nearly all of the department heads live outside the city. Some live a sizeable distance away. Human Resource Director Joe Denaro, for example commutes to and from Kissimmee every day. Any requirement would apply only to new department heads.

As with his idea to pay cops to live in Sanford, Lessard said demanding department heads live in the city requires them to make a commitment to the community.

"If you have to pass the same run-down building every time you go to the store, you're going to be a lot quicker about taking action," Lessard said.



Brisson Funeral Home in 1948. Brisson continued to operate the funeral home until his health began to fail in 1969. His son, Bobby, purchased the busi-

In 1971, another employee was added, Turner Croft. He worked with Shorty and bobby for about 20 years, serving the needs of the Sanford communi-

On April 1, 1984, Brisson funeral Home became part of the Carey Hand Funeral Homes, and Bill Wellborn joined the staff as general man-

The building was renovated in 1994 and an open house was held on Nov. 13.

The above facts were gleaned from the Sanford Museum files and also from an oral history session with Shorty Smith in November 2000. Shorty shared many of his memories of the funeral home and cemeteries from his 60 years as an associate of the funeral home. He only works part timed now, but can always be found greeting visitors at the door during visitations and funerals. His wife

Minnie died this past year after several years in a nursing home. They had two children" Dr. Rudolph smith of Ft. Worth, Texas, and Patricia (Mrs. Wayne) Epps of Oviedo.

Many of the questions from those participating in the session were about cemeteries, as the museum is working with the city Parks Department in updating these records.

The city cemeteries are Lakeview and Evergreen. Both are located on West 25th Street.

Lakeview Cemetery was probably begun in the 1880s at the same time as the funeral home. It was originally owned by T.J. Miller.

Evergreen Cemetery, just to the west of Lakeview, was opened in 1938. Solon Teston was sexton, and he and his wife lived on the second floor of the building. The equipment was stored downstairs.

Mr. Teston started working with the Municipal Zoo during the 1920s and later transferred to the cemetery, where he remained until the 1980s.

Other cemeteries included Oaklawn, Sylvan Lake, Upsala, All Souls, Restlawn and Page lackson.

Sylvan Lake has a cemetery association that maintains the cemetery, and burials still continue there. Burials are no longer allowed in Upsala.

Ray Slayton began Oaklawn Cemetery and Funeral Home during the mid-1950s. (I recall a couple of young sailors from SNAS selling cemetery lots at that time.)

Since the 1970s, the cemeterles have required each grave to have a vault. A slab is required in the county cemetery so the grave won't cave in.

The county pays for paupers, those who can't pay. They continue to be buried in the county cemetery near the Old Folks Home, which is now the Museum of Seminole County History. Brisson has always had the contract with the city, which now pays \$480. The original payment was \$50.

The cost for opening and closing graves is \$425 in the city-owned Cemetery and \$1085 in Oaklawn, which is privately

At one time, Brisson Funeral Home owned and operated an


ambulance which went all over Sanford and surrounding cities. Bobby Brisson was one of the drivers, as was Mr. Moseley. Moseley late opened a funeral home at 9th Street and Sanford

When asked for the largest funerals, Shorty recalled the recent Loveland funeral and also those of Douglas Jobe and Virginia Thomas. Virginia was 13 years old when she ran into a propeller in 1955.

Shorty also recalled that there were many servicemen killed at the Navy base in training accidents. They had a contract with Brisson, and once there were 18 bodies at one time. Through the years, most were shipped out as their home was elsewhere.

At 116 years old, Brisson is one of the oldest funeral homes in the state of Florida. It is a Sanford institution, with most people of a certain age having had at least one family member buried from there, plus a host of friends. Those of us who have lived here a long time seem to regularly trek to Brisson to say goodbye to a loved one. May its long tradition of good service and friendliness continue.

Airport Council International's guidelines for passenger classification and now only counts transit passengers once.

The other reason is these new planes are just so big, they don't have to stop. They can fly farther without refueling," Dale said. "Either way it's a miniscule portion of our overall passenger totals."

TBI Airport Management manages the day-to-day operations of the airport. The company's president, Larry Gouldthorpe, said OSIA's passenger totals are a positive sign for the airports carriers, especially since most airlines are still struggling to recover from

Sept. 11 and a sluggish economy. We believe that the convenience of secondary airports like Orlando Sanford will continue to be a major benefit to carriers looking to offer their passengers a more relaxed and less-hectic travel experience while serving major markets," Gouldthorpe said.

In other airport news, Airport Authority board members will receive a status report during it's regular meeting Tuesday, March 5 from Seminole County engineers

on the new entrance roadway to the terminal. "We don't have good access—a good, identifiable access to the airport," Dale said. "You come into the airport on a two-lane road, and it's a little difficult to find it if you don't know exactly

where you're going."

Dale said the new entrance is part of the county's overall road master plan. Currently, East Lake Mary Boulevard ends at Red Cleveland Boulevard near the terminal. That will change as the county four-lanes Lake Mary Boulevard and extends the road to the intersection of State Roads

46 and 415. The extension will begin at Ohio Avenue, and Lake Mary Boulevard will be rerouted south of its present location. The road will turn north near Kentucky

Street and serve as the eastern border of airport property. The new airport entrance roadway will extend Red Cleveland Boulevard south to connect with the relocated section of

Lake Mary Boulevard. "I expect construction to start by the summer," Dale said. "It should be finished by sometime after the first of the year. We'll have a better idea once they submit their 60 percent plans."



LAKELAND — Whether it was nerves or the pressure of being the perceived favorites, a slow start and disastrous finish denied Winter Springs its fourth consecutive trip to the state championship game in the semifinals of the FHSAA Class 5A Girls Basketball Florida Finals at The Lakeland Center Wednesday night.


Jen Forst and Sally Johnston would come alive on offense in the middle two quarters for the Bears and a defense that had shut opponents down all season also showed up as Winter Springs outscored Clearwater 24-17 in the second and third quarter, sending the game into the final period tied at 38-38.



community involved in a big clean-up campaign. Group members also were able to receive more information on the governor's Front Porch revitalization program from state representative Yolanda Boronell.





Loquat: The Japanese plum

The loquat is a rapidly growing evergreen tree belonging to the rose family and native to China.

Usually planted as a shade tree in central Florida, it can be used as a residential street tree or median strip tree. The large dark green leaves are a splendid background for the yellow to orange clusters of edible fruits that develop late in the winter.

The Plant

The loquat grows about 15 feet high and 15 to 25 feet wide in sunny locations, but grows a little taller in shaded areas.

The leaves are simple, alternate, wrinkled, oval-shaped and large, about 8 to 12 inches long, with dark green glossy color on top and a hairy, rust-colored beneath.

Leaves have short petioles, with sunken veins running to sharp teeth located at the border of the leaves.
Fragrant clusters of creamy white flowers measuring about 6 inches are produced in the fall, followed by the formation of the pear shaped, about 1 to 2 inches long, yellow to orange fruits in the winter.

The fruits contain one or more seeds and attract birds,

squirrels, and other mammals, including men.

Culture

Ferrer

The tree prefers moist loam soils but grows well in most well drained types of soils, preferably acidic, but can tolerate some alkalinity. It grows well in full sun but can also grow in partial shade, but blooms and bears fruit best in full sun.

Moderately to high drought tolerant after established. Water moderately until established.

Fertilize at least once or twice a year with a complete fertilizer. Fertilize mature trees in February, June and early October. A mulch over the root zone is recommended to control weeds and maintain adequate humidity around the roots. Sprouts along the trunk can be a maintenance problem. Well-tended trees will produce heavy crops with large fruits. To grow big, plump fruits, remove up to one third of the fruit in each cluster after it sets.

Trees begin to produce fruits when they are about 5 years old. Fruit ripens in about 120 days after petal drop. Fruits ripened in the tree taste best, harvest them when they feel slightly soft.

Use

The compact growth of this tree makes it ideal for use as specimen or patio shade tree. It can be used as a residential street tree or median strip tree in areas where overhead space is limited.

It is not suited for planting next to the street if trucks pass close to the tree since adequate clearance is not possible but is successfully in wide median strips. It blends well into informal shrubbery borders and the fruit is attractive to wildlife.

The fruit can be eaten fresh or used in jelly, jam or preserves.

Propagation

Propagation of loquat trees is by seed, cuttings, or grafting of selected varieties. Many seedlings can be found growing under trees in the landscape.

Varieties

Recommended varieties are Oliver, Tanaka, Gold Nugget, MacBeth and Wolf.

Pests and Diseases


Occasional damage by caterpillars and scale insects may occur, but the most troublesome insect pest is the larvae (maggot) of the Caribbean fruit fly that feed on the fruits. Control of this insect pest is difficult because it requires the use of insecticides during the development of the fruit.

A severe winter greatly reduces the damage caused by this insect. Fireblight, a serious bacterial disease, which occurs mostly in pear trees, is also a serious disease of loquat. Symptoms of this disease appear as blackening of leaves and stems from the top downward.

To control this problem, prune back the affected branch one-foot or more into healthy wood. Sterilize shears with a 10 percent bleach solution between cuts.

To reduce fireblight problems provide good air circulation to the tree. Don't over fertilize since this could increase sensitivity to the fire blight disease. Root rot occurs on wet soils.
