





How are things in Timisoara? Well, to begin with, that happens to be Romania and doesn't rhyme with the town in the well-known song, anyway. But to find out what's going on there or anywhere else behind the Iron Curtain, one of the best sources is Radio Free Europe.

RFE not only beams news from the West into the East and listens to broadcasts from the Soviets and satellites, but monitors their publications as well.

Not all of the information gleaned is weighty; not all of it fits readily into a picture of life behind the Curtain, but all of it is interesting and occasionally amusing.

An instance is a recent poll of high school students conducted by a Romanian newspaper which came to the attention of RFE researchers in Munich. The paper was "shocked" at some of the following revelations:

- Sixty-eight per cent of the stu-dents reported that they take only one bath a week (Saturday).


Many of the youngsters don't go to bed until after midnight. - Asked the type of work they would prefer to do, only 20 per cent said, "Useful to society."

- Asked what they consider the most important things in life, 42 per cent replied, "To have friends;" 20 per cent said, "To have very good qualifications;" only 19 per cent said, "To work for the good of mankind."

- On dances, out of 100 students 60 knew the Twist, 48 the Madison, 42 the waltz and tango and 15 the cha-cha-cha. Only two students knew any Romanian folk dances.

The newspaper rounded out the sorry record by noting that at one morning performance at the Bucuresti movie theater there were nearly 300 schoolboys. The film was "The Seven Year Itch," with Marilyn Mon-

The same day at the nearby Museum of Arts of the Romanian People's Republic there were, alas, but two schoolboys.

Board of directors of the Winter Park Telephone Company has approved a proposal to reduce the par value of the common stock from \$5 to \$2.50 and double the number of authorized shares.

The decision was announced by J. K. Galloway, president and chairman of the board. The stock split will be subject to stockholder's approval at the annual meeting on April 20. The directors also approved, subject to stockholder approval of the stock split, a second quarter cash dividend of \$.13 per share on the \$2.50 par value steck of record May

The \$13 dividend on the proposed \$2.50 par stock would be equivalent to \$1.04 yearly on the present \$5 par stock compared to the present \$.80 dividend per year.

Galloway reported carnings of \$1.41 per common share for 1964 compared to \$1.06 in 1963. "This substantial increase in earnings to a great extent reflects the rapid growth of our area in the past year," Galloway emphasized. "The opening of the Winter Park Mall and other shopping facilities and the high level of construction combined to produce a very favorable year.

Galloway emphasized the need for favorable earnings in view of the continues mound expected in the area. "Our responsibilities in providing better service grow greater each day. To meet these responsibilities we must continue to have a favorable earnings picture. Good earnings will, in the long run, allow the best telephone service pussible at reasonable rates." The company reported total operating revenues of \$3,565,717 for 1964, up 14.8 per cent over 1963. Operating expenses in 1964 totaled \$2,293,700 or 9.9 per Galloway noted that the additions and improvements to
