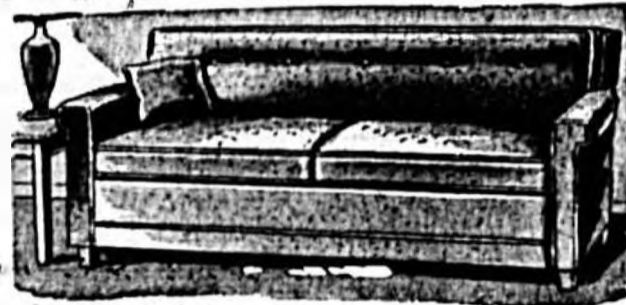

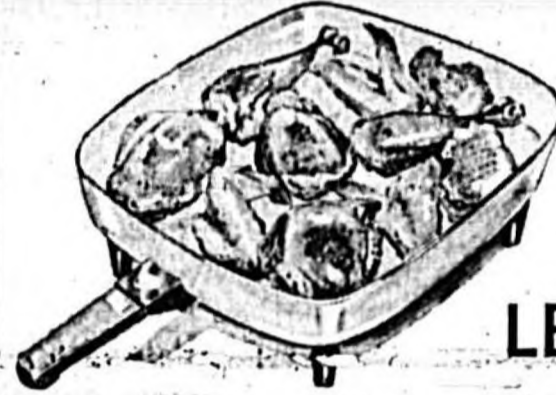

# Allied Bombers Plaster Two Communist Bases

## Air Attacks Biggest Yet

SAIGON (UPI)—More than 160 American and South Vietnamese fighter-bombers and B57 jets hit two targets in North Viet Nam today in the biggest strike yet against the north. Moscow Radio immediately denounced what it calls a barbarous provocation.

An official American spokesman said damage to a North Vietnamese naval base and a supply depot near the border of Laos was "between 70 and 80 per cent."

A U. S. Air Force spokesman, who disclosed today's twin attacks were larger than three previous attacks during February, said at least three of the raiding planes were downed by anti-aircraft fire from Communist positions.

Moscow claimed seven of the planes were shot down and said intense anti-aircraft fire prevented more devastating attacks against military targets in the north.

**MARINES READY**  
The raids were announced as a battalion-sized force of U. S. Marines prepared to land in South Viet Nam to bolster American forces there. It was understood the Marines would take over guard duties at vital U. S. installations such as the airbases where today's strikes were launched.

Informed sources estimated the Marine force at between 800 to 1,000. Saigon Radio reported today's surprise raids and this was followed by a joint American and Vietnamese statement.

A later U. S. Air Force statement said more than 100 planes were involved.

A joint U. S.-Vietnamese statement said American B57s and F100 fighter bombers hit a supply depot at Non Bang, about 10 miles north of the boundary between North and South Viet Nam, and about 15 miles from the Laotian border. It was the first time the twin jet B57s have hit North Viet Nam.

**AIR FORCE SHOW**  
A force of South Vietnamese fighter bombers attacked the naval base at Quang Khe on the coast of South China Sea 60 miles north of the border. U. S. jets supported that mission, concentrating on the Communist anti-aircraft batteries.

All indications were that today's bombing attacks were strictly an Air Force show. It would be the first time that planes from carriers of the U. S. 7th Fleet had not participated in the strikes against North Viet Nam although they may have flown reconnaissance missions.

A statement by the U. S. Embassy and the Saigon government hinted at further air raids "to make clear to Hanoi that North Viet Nam will be held fully accountable for continuing aggression against South Viet Nam."

The statement followed publication of a U. S. white paper last week documenting Communist aggression against South Viet Nam and hinting at further retaliatory acts.

# LBJ's Russia Trip Closer

## Soviets Send Message Of Welcome

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson's proposed trip to the Soviet Union moved a step closer today with word that the Russians sent him a message a month ago saying they would welcome such a visit.

But there was still no indication whether the proposed

visit would be a two-way affair—as Johnson first suggested—with Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin and Communist party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev coming to the United States.

Kosygin broke the news of the message to Johnson Monday in Leipzig, East Germany. He told reporters he had written to the President two months ago that it would be "very pleasant" to receive him in Moscow. Kosygin said he was still waiting for a reply.

But White House Press Secretary George E. Reedy said later that Johnson had replied Reedy said Kosygin apparently had been referring to an "oral message"—not a letter—received a month ago in Washington.

He said it was with this message in mind that Johnson said in a speech before the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith Feb. 3, "I have reason to believe that the Soviet leadership would welcome my visit to their country—as I would be very glad to do."

Presumably, the U. S. and Soviet governments are engaged in delicate diplomatic negotiations to work out the details of any Johnson visit.

"The two governments stand in the same position," Reedy said. "Each has expressed the fact that a visit would be welcome. There have been contacts through diplomatic channels."

## Moon Rocket Explodes On Blast-Off

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)

An Atlas-Centaur moon rocket exploded in a bright orange flame on blast-off today, throwing a new kink into America's plan to put a robot surveyor spacecraft on lunar surface this fall.

The silvery, 112-foot rocket rose a few feet from its launch pad at 8:25 a.m., suffered an apparent engine failure, and crashed back to earth engulfed in flames.

Thousands of pounds of volatile kerosene, liquid oxygen, and hydrogen fed a tremendous orange-red fire on the launch complex for about 10 minutes after the explosion. Great clouds of black smoke billowed into the sky.

A space agency spokesman reported minutes after the thundering crash that all personnel in the nearby block-house were safe.

The 150-ton rocket was designed to shoot its 1,000-pound surveyor mock-up toward an imaginary lunar point 248,000 miles away in space that was representing the moon for flight test purposes. It was the first of two moon shot rehearsals planned before another Atlas-Centaur was scheduled to shoot the 11,514 of seven surveyor probes to the moon this fall.

The United States was counting on Project Surveyor to clear up mysteries of the moon's surface and to find safe landing areas for Project Apollo astronauts that are scheduled to follow by 1970.

It was the fifth test flight for the high-energy Centaur. The first of the troubled plagued Atlas-Centaur rockets blew up 55 seconds after launch on May 8, 1962. Its next test, on Nov. 27, 1963, was a full success and the rocket reached orbit for the first time.

A third Atlas-Centaur failed to achieve orbit last June but most of its test objectives were met. Its last test, in December, was a success.

Wind March winds whipped heavy snow and rain across the Midwest today but spring was just around the corner in the East, where temperatures soared as high as 70 degrees Monday.

Blizzard warnings were posted for parts of Minnesota, Missouri and Kansas. The weather bureau warned of "severe" weather on the heels of 15 mile an hour winds. A band of sleet and road-glazing rain spread eastward across Iowa and Illinois.

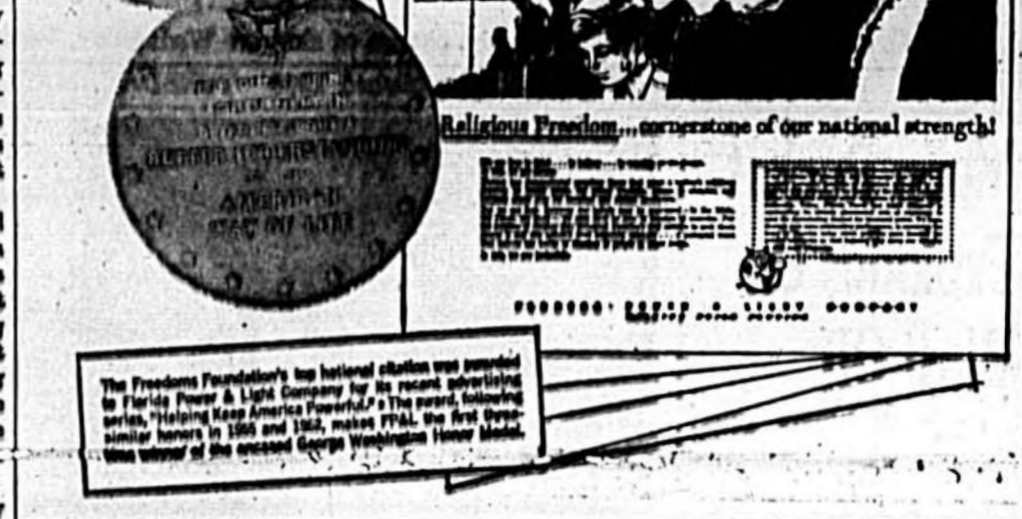

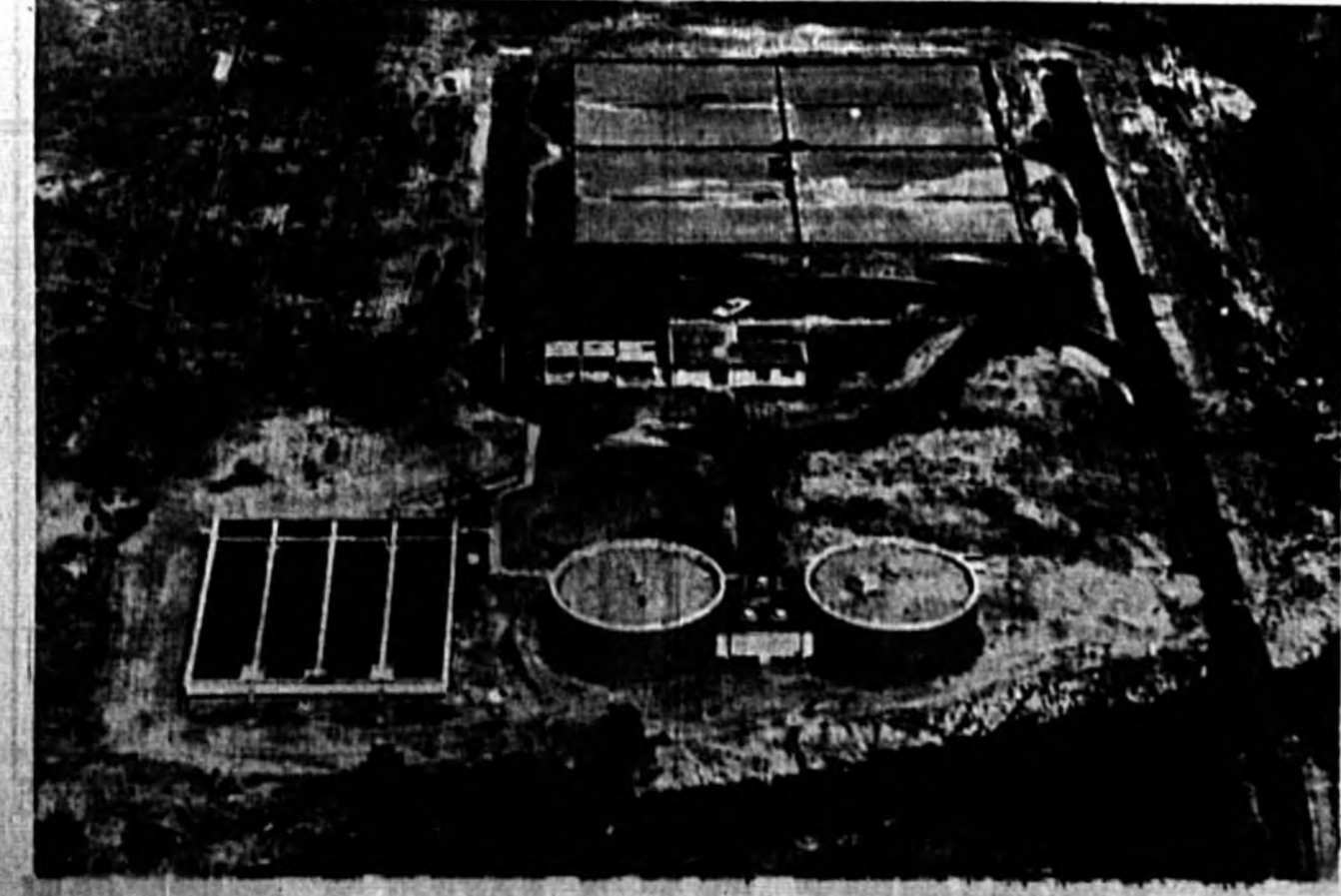

## Go to Church during LENT

The penitential season of Lent begins Wednesday.

Lent is a period of 40 week-days preceding Easter. It has been observed by Christians since the Third Century A.D. as a time for prayer, fasting, self-examination and "amendment of life."

The first day of Lent is called "Ash Wednesday."

In Roman Catholic and Episcopal churches, ashes are placed on the foreheads of worshippers as a reminder of the biblical warning that man is dust and to dust shall return.

Lent gets its name from the old Anglo-Saxon word, "lengthenide," which means, "time when the days grow longer." The season always falls in the spring, when the hours of daylight are visibly lengthening.

The 40 days of the season correspond to the period that Christ fasted in the desert before beginning his ministry. Only week-days are counted as part of Lent.

By ancient Christian tradition every Sunday is a feast day commemorating the Resurrection, and lenten vows of abstinence, therefore, are suspended on the Sundays which fall during the six-week period.

The law of lenten fasting in the Catholic Church binds all Catholics over 21 and under 59 years of age, except those whose health and ability to work would be impaired, and those who have received a dispensation from their bishop.

The Catholic law allows one full meal a day. Two other light meals without meat may be taken, but together they may not amount to a full meal. Meat may be eaten at the main meal except Fridays, Ash Wednesday and Holy Saturday.

The Episcopal church leaves it to the individual to decide how he will fast, but commends to all of its members "such measures of abstinence" as are appropriate to a season of penitence and meditation.

"High" Lutherans also fast during Lent, but for the great majority of Lutherans, the emphasis is on adding things—such as extra services of worship and study in the middle of the week.

Many Presbyterians and Methodists also observe Lent in this way.

Baptist and other Protestant groups of "free church" ancestry customarily do not observe Lent. They take the position that Christians should practice year-round the kind of self-discipline that lenten fasting is supposed to inculcate.

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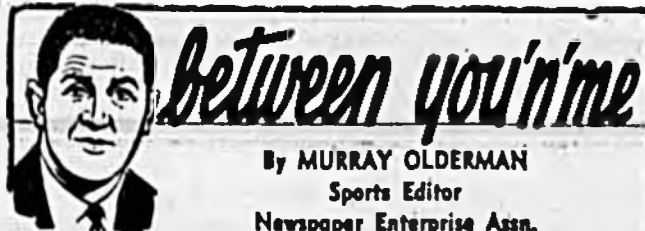

## Topping Owns Last 10% As Webb Sells

FORT LAUDERDALE (UPI) — The Columbia Broadcasting System was within one step of total ownership of the New York Yankees today after buying Del Webb's 10 per cent interest in the club for \$1 million.

Webb ended his 20-year association with the Yankees, explaining he intended to concentrate his efforts on his construction business.

The acquisition of Webb's stock gives CBS 90 per cent control of the Yankees. The other 10 per cent is owned by Dan Topping, the club president.

CBS took over control of the Yankees last Aug. 14 when it bought 80 per cent of the club from Webb and Topping for \$11.2 million. At the time, it was announced that both Webb and Topping were given the option of selling "their remaining interest by March 1, 1965, and CBS had the option to buy out the remaining 20 per cent before May, 1965.

The transaction created a heated wave of controversy both in baseball and legislative circles and was the subject of congressional anti-trust hearings.

Webb, who admitted that he invested in the Yankees "strictly from a business viewpoint," enjoyed a profitable and pleasurable return in the 20 years since he, Topping and Larry MacPhail bought the team and its entire farm system from the Jacob Ruppert estate for \$4 million.

Since that day in 1945, the Yankees won 13 American League pennants and 10 world championships. Webb grossed more than \$6.5 million alone through the sale of his shares to CBS last August and Monday.

Webb and Topping had bought out MacPhail's interests for \$2 million in 1947.

There was some speculation that Webb might seek an interest in another major league club, presumably the Los Angeles Angels for whom his company is building a park at Anaheim, Calif., but Webb said that at the age of 66 he had little desire to start a new venture.

"I have a growing company in construction of hotels and office buildings, and industrial interests all over the country which require considerably more of my attention," Webb said in explaining his reasons for bowing out of the Yankee picture.

"With only a small interest in the club I felt this was the appropriate time to retire from my participation with the Yankees."

"It's a circus—one you get into for free," says 400-meter Olympic gold medalist Mike Larrabee. "It's a lot of fun coming to the meets and seeing all your old friends."

Gays like Larrabee and Ter-Ovanesyan have all the status. It's easy to tell.

Whenever they walk some where, the kids on the high school and college relay teams open wide paths for them as if they were two people crossing the Red Sea.

Only one person can upstage

Larrabee, a Billy Mills or a Ter-Ovanesyan and that's Mary Rand.

Mary is the London model (married) whose hobby is the running broad jump, and she is quite proficient. In fact, she has a gold medalist's job as "top one" really cares about that.

The officials who run the indoor meets are thinking of banning her next year. They

can't get some of their events off on time because the male athletes persist in talking to her when they should be elsewhere.

But not all the confusion is below. No one realizes how in-hand-of-course—next to the high jump pit and watched Valery Brumel clear 7.3.

Not one usher stopped them. By 11:00 on track night at the Garden, it's useless to even try.

# Gov. Burns Reluctant

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Haydon Burns thinks capital punishment is a necessary deterrent for murder but doubts the justice of invoking the death penalty for rape.

The Miami Herald said the Governor will refuse to sign a death warrant for the execution of anyone convicted of rape as long as there is any chance that the U.S. Supreme Court might outlaw the death penalty for rape.

There are 12 men on death row at Raiford now awaiting the carrying out of the death penalty for rape.

But Burns won't set an execution date, the paper said, until the U.S. Court rules or disposes of an appeal in the case of one of them, William Benjamin Craig, of Tallahassee.

His case is pending in the State Supreme Court and his attorney said he'll go to the U.S. Supreme Court. His argument is that the death penalty exceeds the enormity of the crime of rape and amounts to cruel and unusual punishment in violation of the federal Constitution. Craig also contends it is used in a discriminatory way.

Burns was quoted as saying that rape is a heinous crime but he has doubts as to whether it justifies the supreme penalty.

Governor Burns, who has not signed a death warrant since he took office, said his legal staff will study each case to make sure all legal procedures have been carried

out and the individual has had all consideration under the law before he'll sign a death warrant in the cases of 33 men on death row for murder.

He said he does not oppose capital punishment for murder but is "reluctant as any other religious man would be to take a part in taking life."

But as Governor, he said, he will carry out the law.

A legislative committee studying the death penalty recommended at its final meeting Saturday that it be retained for rape as well as murder.

But the committee suggested that punishment should be

separated from the question of guilt and recommended the two-state trial procedure.

It voted 10-3 to retain capital punishment for all crimes for which it is now invoked, including kidnaping for ransom, bombing, machine-gunning in a public place, rape and murder.

## Appalachia OK Likely

WASHINGTON (UPI)—House Democratic leaders confidently expected to send to President Johnson today the first big bill of his "Great Society" program — the \$1.1 billion Appalachian aid measure.

The bill, aimed at rejuvenating the sagging economy of the mountainous 11-state region, already has been approved by the Senate.

Its supporters predicted it would pass the House today unchanged, thus avoiding a time-consuming conference to resolve differences.

Rep. Robert E. Jones Jr. (D-Ala.), who has been shepherding the measure through the House, said he had the votes to turn back any of a number of Republican-sponsored amendments to the bill.

Rep. William C. Cramer (R-Fla.), who sponsored a GOP alternative to the bill which went down to defeat Tuesday, agreed with Jones.

He said the Democrats have the strength to "pound and bulldoze" the bill through without adopting even one of the proposed GOP amendments.

Nevertheless, Cramer said, the Republicans planned to offer amendments to junk some of the agricultural subsidies included in the bill, eliminate the mental health facilities it would provide, and remove 25 of the 360 counties it would cover.

With hardly any effort Tuesday, Democrats first defeated Cramer's substitute to broaden the bill to cover other poverty areas, then quickly rejected four other GOP efforts to limit its scope in Appalachia.

Highlight of the educational exhibits will be the "Garden For the Blind," constructed by Mrs. J. M. Fahy, president of the Sanford Garden Club. Others will include an exhibition of nematodes, the tropical fire ant and the impatiens fire ant. Another will be the display of common poison plants of the area.

The junior exhibits will be sponsored by members of Ivora Circle and will feature displays of work of young gardeners. Members of all the 13 circles of the Garden Club of Sanford are exhibiting, helping prepare equipment, entertaining out of town judges, setting up of stages and exhibits for the two-day show, which annually draws capacity crowds.

Also on display will be commercial exhibits of florists, nurserymen and garden supply stores. We have not asked the local merchants to sponsor our schedule this year, as they have operated an enthusiastically with our building program," said Mrs. Woodruff.

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
