

### 9 Boys Arrested For Stealing 40 Bikes in City

Nearly 40 bicycles have been stolen in Sanford since July 1. The Sheriff's Dept. has recovered 21, and still has three unclaimed cycles.

Swirl rumors were filed off and parts interchanged to make the bikes unidentifiable, says Deputy Sheriff James Magistry. Eight cycle thefts were at the Municipal Pool, Sanford Police reported.

Juvenile court hearings are scheduled for one group of five boys and another of four who have had bicycle stealing complaints issued against them. Sanford police apprehended the smaller group and Sheriff's deputies the larger.

Boys should not be left at curbs or in driveways where they can be taken, warns Constable J. Q. Galloway, who says he hopes that the rash of cycle stealing has ended with the apprehension of the nine youths.

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# County School Enrollment Hits 10,434 For Increase Of 1,000

Enrollment in Seminole County schools this year will be 10,434. This is about 1,000 more than were enrolled at the end of the 1958-59 term, Walter Teague, administrative assistant, said today. Classes start Aug. 31.

Attendance areas for Sanford schools this year will follow this pattern: First, second and third graders living west of French Ave. between 27th and 34th streets, or west of Park Ave. between 9th St. and Lake Monroe will attend West Side School, along with first through third grade pupils living in Loch Arbor, Little Venice and Ravenna Park. Other pupils in these grades will go to South Side Elementary.

Fourth graders going to Sanford Grammar School will be those living south of the lake-front and north of 9th St. between Palmetto and Park avenues, and north of 14th St. between French and Park, west of Palmetto and east of French Ave.

Fourth graders to attend South Side School will be those living north of 24th St., west of Meltonville, east of Georgia Ave. and north of 24th St. from Georgia Ave. west. Fourth grade pupils on 17-92 from Onora Rd. to Five Points to Ginderville, including Sunland Estates, Loch Arbor, Little Venice, Ravenna Park, Upsala Rd., Wynnewood and W. 1st St. will also go to South Side.

Fourth graders to go to Pinecrest School will be those south of 24th St. between Meltonville on the east and Georgia Ave. on the west, and those south of 25th St. from Georgia Ave. west, not including pupils on 17-92, from Onora Rd. to Five Points to Ginderville, and Sunland Estates.

Estimated enrollments: Seminole High, 1,063; Seminole Jr. High, 748; Sanford Grammar, 290; South Side Elementary, 1,200; West Side Elementary, 426; Pinecrest, 450; Lyman, 1,183; Altamonte, 700; Lake Mary, 194; Oviedo, 580; Geneva, 66; Monroe, 140; Wilson, 75; Boccartown, 70; Rosenwald, 330; Oviedo Elementary, 345; Harper, 250; Midway, 510; Goldsboro, 266; and Croome Academy 206.

Fifth and sixth graders to go to Sanford Grammar School are those who live north of 24th St. between Meltonville Ave. and Georgia Ave. and those living north of 24th St. from Georgia Ave. west, including pupils in Wynnewood, Loch Arbor, Little Venice, Ravenna Park, Upsala Rd. and W. 1st St.

Fifth and sixth grade pupils to attend Pinecrest live south of 24th St. between Georgia Ave. and Meltonville and south of 25th St. from Georgia Ave. west, including students on 17-92, Old Orlando Rd., Ginderville, and Sunland Estates.

Seventh graders will attend Sanford Jr. High School at Pinecrest. Eighth grade students to attend Seminole High are those living south of 12th St. and Celery Ave.,

west of Meltonville, north of 24th St. between Meltonville and Georgia avenues, and north of 25th St. from Georgia Ave. west. Students in Lake Mary, Little Venice, Loch Arbor, Ravenna Park and Country Club Homes will attend Seminole. Other eighth graders will go to Sanford Jr. High at Pinecrest. Croome, Goldsboro, Midway and Harper school attendance areas will be the same as last year.

## Science, Math Facilities To Come To County Through U.S. Funds

Science equipment and facilities for more mathematics and foreign language are to be bought with federal and state funds being given county schools under "Title Three" of the National Defense Education Act. Another \$10,000 is expected from the government before 1960, says Stewart Gatchel, county director of instruction. This will be matched by \$10,000 from local funds. A state and federal \$10,000 was received last year and has been matched.

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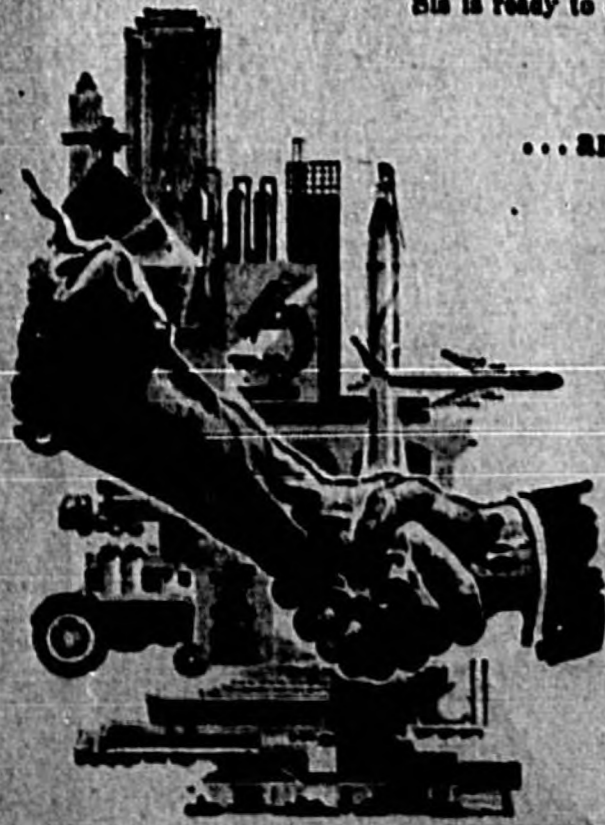

**GED Tests Can Help Land Job, Director Says**

Seminole County residents don't need to lose a job because they don't have a required high school diploma, says E. S. Douglass, county Director of Adult and Vocational Education.

General Educational Development tests given in Sanford can earn a Florida State Equivalency Diploma which is equal to one from any accredited high school.

The five tests are given at the County School Building, 202 E. Commercial Ave. and are titled: "Correctness and Effectiveness of Expression, Interpretation of Reading Materials in the Social Studies, Interpretation of Reading Materials in Natural Science, Interpretation of Literary Materials and General Mathematical Ability". Two hours are allowed for each test.

Candidates for the exams must be at least 20 years old and Florida residents. Civics and history credits are required. These may be obtained at Seminole High School night classes held each Monday and Tuesday from 7-10 p.m.

# Oviedo's Largest Registration Starts Today

Oviedo School's largest registration so far was expected today. Construction on the school to take care of a capacity crowd of students has been going on since May. The auditorium is now divided into classrooms, leaving the plant without an auditorium until the new cafeteria is built. It will go up in the near future on the old home economics building site. The remodelled home economics room has been moved next to the present lunch room. Despite rains which handicap-

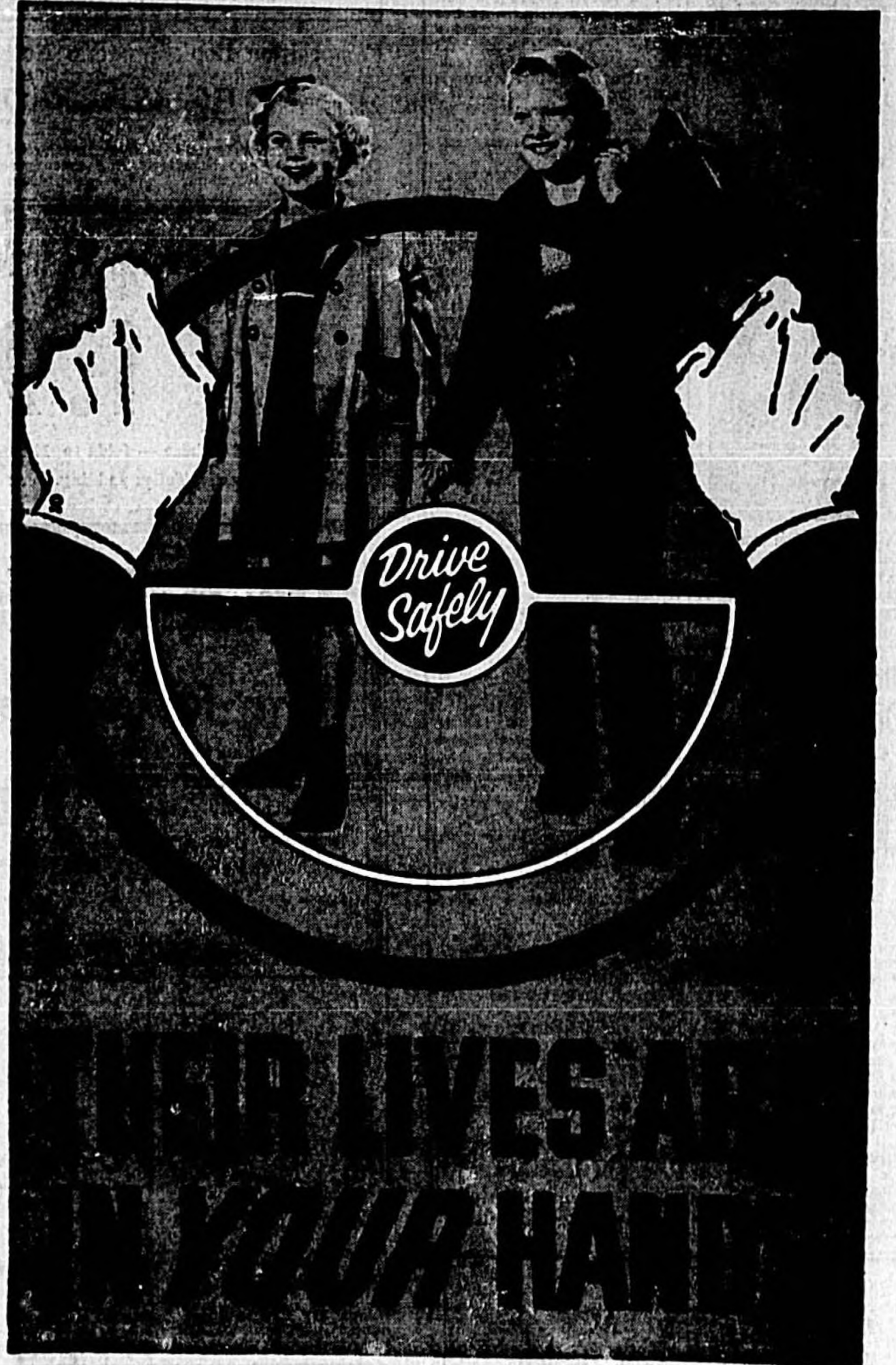

# Rayburn Gets Gas Tax Rebuff

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Ways and Means Committee, in a rebuff for Speaker Sam Rayburn, refused today to accept a compromise highway revenue plan calling for a one-year one-cent increase in the gasoline tax. By a vote of 13 to 12, the Tax Writing Committee turned down the compromise which Rayburn had worked out Monday with Democrats on the Public Works Committee. The Public Works Committee handles highway legislation. The Ways and Means Committee all financing bills. In place of Rayburn's compromise, the committee voted 16 to 2 to reaffirm its support of a program calling for a 23-month gasoline tax increase of one cent. Chairman Wilbur D. Mills said the committee instructed him to introduce a 22-month bill. This would be the first step in bypassing the Public Works Committee, which under normal procedure would clear the legislation for House floor action. A majority of the committee opposed features of the Rayburn compromise which call for dipping into general revenue to help finance the highway trust fund beginning next July 1. The Ways and Means proposal has a similar provision but it would start one year later. Mills insisted today's action was "not at all a slap" at Rayburn. Nevertheless, it was interpreted by observers. Rayburn had personally intervened to get a compromise worked out.

The Sanford-Titusville Canal, long proposed by proponents of water transportation for this area and opposed by sportsmen, will be discussed again here tonight. Dr. E. R. Wilbur of DeLand, president of the Florida Wildlife Federation, will present the federation's arguments against the canal at a meeting of the Seminole County Sportsmen's Assn. at 8 p. m. in the courthouse. Chamber of Commerce Manager John Krider, who has been on the side trying for years to get such a canal, will be present to discuss the points indicating that the area would benefit by it. The sportsmen have invited the public to attend the meeting and hear the presentations. "We hope the public will attend and would like to stress that the meeting is by no means limited to our members," Jack Wilbur, president of the association, said.

# Ike Warns Congress Of 'Repercussions'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower dispatched letters today warning there will be serious repercussions if Congress fails to act on highway financing, government interest rates and housing mortgages. He told his news conference that he was sending the letters to Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who presides over the Senate, and House Speaker Sam Rayburn. Eisenhower did not give a direct answer when asked if he might call a special session of Congress if the lawmakers failed to authorize an increase in the interest rates for government bonds, which he has recommended might offer a solution.

But he said that if Congress should do nothing at all about this issue, he would be confronted with a matter of gravest importance and would have to consult all his advisers before deciding what to do. The House Ways and Means Committee voted last week to placate a bill which would have authorized the President to set higher interest rates on government bond issues. Eisenhower brought out that he was sending the letter to the House and Senate when he was asked about the controversial labor reform bill, now in conference. In pinpointing the interest rate, highway financing and mortgage disputes, the president said each of these three involves existing programs and Congress must act to avoid serious repercussions. Highway financing involves the administration's controversial request for an increase in the federal gasoline tax. The administration request for increased FHA authority to guarantee mortgages is involved in the argument between the president and the Democratic-controlled Congress over general housing legislation.

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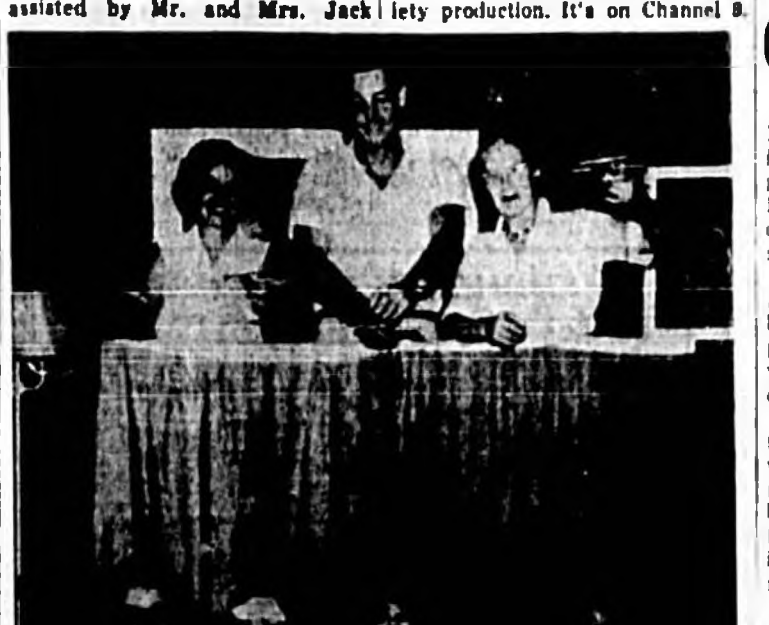
# Allied Unity President's Goal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower on the eve of his departure for Western Europe said today he hoped that he and Allied leaders would join in a mutual statement of readiness to negotiate with Russia, but in firm determination never to retreat from their basic principles.

Eisenhower told a news conference he also would suggest to the heads of West Germany, Great Britain, France and Italy that they cooperate in helping advance the health and living standards of the two billion people of the new or underdeveloped nations. The chief executive, meeting with reporters before taking off by jet plane at 4 a. m. Wednesday for Bonn, Germany, also made these other outstanding points: He said this government has under immediate, urgent study a request for the government of Laos for new funds with which to fight inroads of Communist forces. He said the Russian government notified him Monday night that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev will be coming to the United States next month as chief of the Russian state. Therefore, the president said he planned to welcome Khrushchev personally at the airport on his arrival and entertain him at dinner at the White House. Without calling him by name, Eisenhower struck back forcefully at former President Harry S. Truman who criticized the chief executive's planned trip to Russia this fall. Eisenhower said he was getting weary of people speaking about blows to presidential prestige at a time when he was giving his last atom of energy for the whole human race.

Union and industry negotiators also were to continue their clause-by-clause examination of the expired contract but major issues were not expected to be discussed. McDonald presumably would tell the Executive Board there was no immediate settlement in sight. Neither side apparently has budged from its pre-strike position and no serious steel shortage is expected before the middle of next month at the earliest.

# City Refuses SRD Request On Ditch

The City of Sanford last night asked the State Road Dept. to place a pipeline instead of an open ditch in connecting the S. Sanford Ave. water flow to an existing tile line along Road 46. The road department had asked the city to allow an open ditch for the link between the city's tile line and the drainage line which will need extending at about 25th St. to take care of excess water. P. W. Ekey, district drainage engineer for the SRD, said the ditch would serve the purpose of getting a flow off better than a pipe and would be cheaper. City commissioners took the advice of City Manager Warren Knowles, who said the city already has a drainage problem with a similar installation and recommended the pipe as the better solution. Neither type outlet appears to be the complete answer to the problem of draining a swampy area south of the end of Sanford Ave., commissioners were told. Future development will be a factor in what is done in the next few years, Knowles said. Ekey asked the city to retain responsibility for maintenance of the existing tile drain after the new link is made and the commissioners agreed.

# City Commission To Make Further Effort On Survey

Up to date information on the condition of Lake Monroe waters may be obtained soon in the city commission's efforts to decide whether or not to hold a referendum on installation of a new sewage treatment plant. Commissioners discussed such a survey again last night and continued to stress the need for public information on the subject. City Manager Warren Knowles said he will report "in a few days" on a possible survey. The Ayes Had It

The city last equalization board probably set a record for brevity last night as commissioners found nobody present to complain. The meeting started at 8 p. m. and the regular commission meeting was in session at 10 p. m.
