Ike Rejects Congress Demand To Fire Adams

Negro, Mother Are Suspects In Murder For Insurance Plot

MIAMI (UPI) — Authorities checked the story today of a young Negro man and his mother, suspected of teaming up in a slay murder — for insurance plot in which at least three persons allegedly were killed.

Officers said Thursday George W. Milton, 25, admitted that he drowned his 22-year-old sweetheart, Minnie Claybourne, after taking out a \$10,000 insurance policy on her life.

They said Milton also told them he shot his father in 1946 at Trail Lake, Miss.

Milton's mother, Lena Jifon, 40, operator of a night club in Haines City, is free under \$50,000 bond on charge of attempt to murder and conspiracy to murder.

Miss Claybourne drowned when the car she was in plunged into the Miami River June 1. Detectives said Milton told them he left her unconscious, started the car, then headed the car toward the water.

He was also quoted as saying he killed his father after his mother told him the father was planning to kill all of the children.

At the time, the woman was reported to have a \$500 insurance policy on her husband.

Mrs. Milton was arrested several weeks ago in Bartow in connection with the death of Walter Henderson, 45, of Haines City.

She also was arrested in connection with the death of Walter Henderson and Brown were Negroes.

Mrs. Milton held a \$2,500 insurance policy on Henderson, found bound to death in Vicksburg, Miss., Oct. 12, 1957, officers said. They added she also held a \$13,000 life insurance policy on Brown, who narrowly missed death when he was dragged and hit on a railroad track.

The engineer of an approaching train spotted Brown's car on the track and stopped in time to prevent a collision.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower today rejected a congressional demand that he fire Sherman Adams, his top aide.

White House Press Secretary James G. Hagerly made the President's position clear in answer to a reporter's question.

The reporter noted that Rev. Peter F. Mack (D-Ill.) had said Eisenhower should demand Adams' resignation because of the presidential assistant's action in behalf of millionaires' industrialist Bernard Goldfine, from whom he accepted favors.

He then asked Hagerly could say whether the President had any intention of firing Adams.

"Sure I can," he said. "The answer is of course not."

Hagerly declined to answer further questions concerning Adams.

Story On Former SNAS Officer Seen In Magazine

The list of planes destroyed, transport ships and barges sunk, and combat hours, becomes an account of huge proportions as Angelopoulos tells it in the magazine article.

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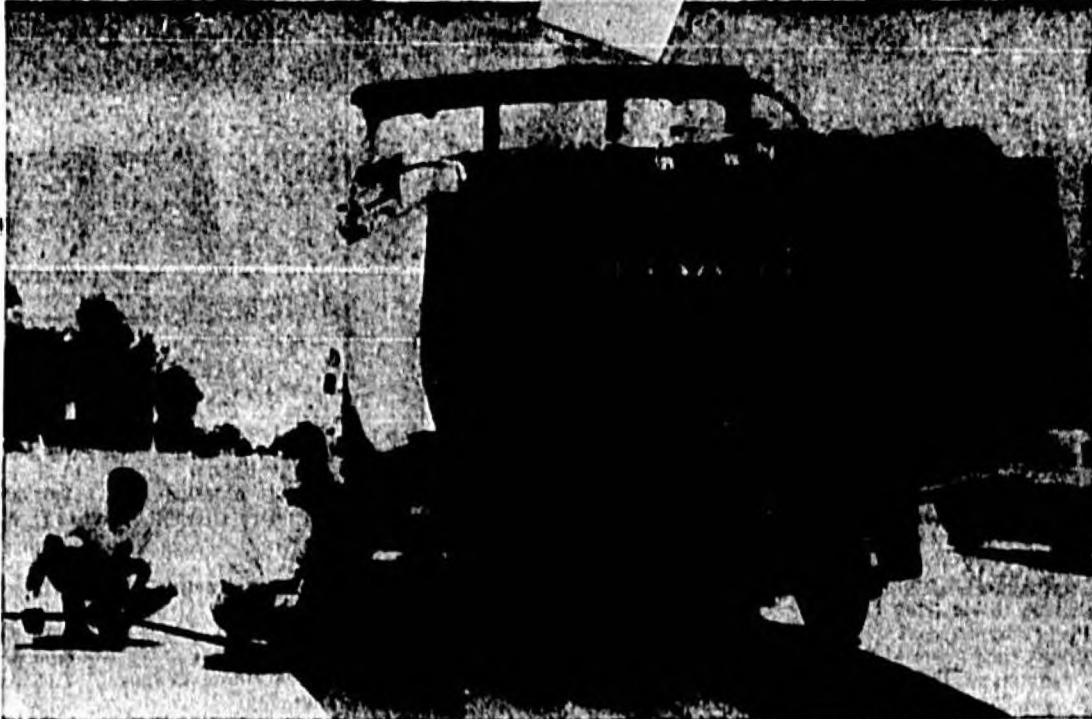

President Proposes New Aviation Agency

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower proposed today creation of a new federal aviation agency to make air travel safer.

The new agency would absorb the Civil Aeronautics Administration and the Airways Modernization Board which have been taking emergency measures to stop collisions of planes in flight.

In a special message to Congress, the President asked that legislation setting up the new agency be passed "at the earliest practicable date."

"Recent mid-air collisions of aircraft, occasioning tragic losses of human life have emphasized the need for a system of air traffic management which will prevent, within the limit of human ingenuity, a recurrence of such accidents," Eisenhower said.

The "Federal Aviation Agency" would be a part of the executive branch in contrast to the Civil Aeronautics Board, which is an independent agency.

The FAA would take over the CAB's function of issuing safety regulations but would report to the CAB all facts about civil aviation accidents.

The CAB would review FAA reports and would continue to be responsible for determining the probable causes of accidents.

Under the President's proposal the CAB also would continue to exercise its present economic functions, such as allocation of air routes and control of rates.

Survivor Benefit Payments Increase
Many widows of veterans who died of service-connected causes will receive increased survivor benefit payments from the Veterans Administration as a result of the new military pay bill which becomes effective June 1.

In most cases, such a widow's benefit payments are related to the basic pay of a serviceman whose rank and years of service are the same as those of the deceased veteran, Benjamin S. Beach, Officer in Charge of the Central Florida VA Office said. However, Beach pointed out, the new military pay bill does not increase basic pay of all servicemen; thus it will not affect survivor benefit payments to all widows whose veteran husbands died of service-connected causes.

Therefore, the agency urged widows should not write to the VA about their cases. Widows receiving VA pension for their non-service-connected deaths of their husbands are NOT affected in any way by the new law, Beach added.

Civil Service Workers Will Get Pay Raise

WASHINGTON (UPI)—House and Senate conferees have agreed on a 10 per cent pay raise for an estimated 1,021,000 federal civil service workers.

The pay hike will cost an estimated \$42 million dollars a year after 1958. It is retroactive to early January and will cost an estimated \$60 million dollars this year.

Both the House and Senate earlier approved the basic 10 per cent pay raise for the so-called classified workers and most other civil servants. However, they had not agreed on some lesser provisions in the bill, including special raises for scientists and engineers and creation of additional top level government jobs.

The compromise goes to both houses for final approval, with the Senate scheduled to act first. Under the compromise, about 67,000 scientists and engineers will have received raises of varying sizes over the past two years also would get the 10 per cent hike.

The House had voted to create 30 new "super-grade" jobs, but the Senate raised these to 100. The conferees agreed on 500 new jobs are for top level professional administrators and for some scientists and engineers.

The newly created jobs will pay between \$13,000 and \$19,000 a year.

"Lionel," Jay yelled in consternation, "put down that club and stop me another bucket."

Conquer, nine-year-old Lionel didn't even stop swinging.

"LIONEL with you," he granted as he cranked the clubhouse into a spin. "Can't you see I'm practicing?"

"If you don't put down that club, I'll whack you one," Jay seemed to be come off the milking stand and took out after his little brother.

Master Good Sir Throat
Lionel scrambled over to the corner of the barn and poked the club menacingly.

"Take one more step," he threatened, "and I'll bust this old club against the barn."

Jay took one more step — and Lionel busted the club against the barn.

Now, 21 years later, they're both golf professionals, fulfilling the dreams founded in their Cane boyhood. Jay is one of the favorites to win the U. S. Open golf championship which started at Southern Hills country club yesterday.

And Lionel, the PGA champion, at 50, still is as stubborn as he was back there on the farm.

"That's the reason my earnings were so low for a long time," he explains. "But I knew I had to alter my game to have a chance in the big tournaments, the important ones, so I stuck to it."

So Lionel grimly settled for less money while he was remaking his game and then last summer at Dayton surprised the golf world by winning the PGA championship — the first of those "big ones" he was aiming at.

Americans Have Huge Payground

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Americans have what probably is the largest playground in the world—84 million acres.

The National Park System's director, Conrad L. Wirth, expects 60 million people to visit the parks this year. Writing in the National Geographic magazine, he urges Americans to "come, use, and enjoy" the parks, monuments and battlefields which belong to them.

There are 29 actual "national parks" in the system which has 185 units in all. They range in size from the 2,097-500-acre Katmai National Monument in Alaska, to the House Where Lincoln Died here in the nation's capital.

The newest—and only—addition this year is a gift of the National Geographic Society. It is the Russell Cave in Alabama where prehistoric man lived 90 centuries ago.

According to Wirth, the parks are becoming more popular each year. In 1965 they were visited by 2,064,000 people. Last year there were 20 million visitors, and by 1968 he estimates 30 to 100 million will view the geysers, monuments, battlefields, flowers and ever-popular bears.

Sand Dunes
Speaking of geysers, the most famous—Old Faithful—had an important part in the creation of the park system. On Sept. 19, 1870 a group of 15 campers who saw the magnificent geysers decided the Yellowstone area should be preserved as a national park. With Congress in accord, the system came into being in 1872.

One of the parks in the group is the Virgin Islands National Park. The society says it is a "playground of white beaches and blue water." A gift of Laurence Rockefeller, who is a trustee of the National Geographic Society, it was dedicated two years ago.

A monument of particular interest is the Great Sand Dunes National Monument in Colorado; the crests of some of the dunes are as high as 800 feet—the tallest in inland America.

The world's biggest living things—the giant sequoia trees in California—are rarely matched for grandeur—rather spectacular view is the Paradise Glacier grotto on Mount Ranier in Washington state. When sunlight filters through the ice, the walls of the grotto are tinted a luminous blue.

The deepest lake in the country—Oregon's Crater Lake—was hollowed out by an explosion of Mount Mazama, in 4,000 B. C. It is 1,000 feet deep.

200 Attend Clinic

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—President Robert Strozier of Florida State University yesterday welcomed some 200 college and high school coaches from southeastern states at the opening session of the fifth annual FSU Football Coaching Clinic.

Heading up the guest lecturers, Michigan State's veteran Duffy Daugherty quickly brushed aside formalities to detail the intricate Spartan multiple offense for the coaches on hand for the three-day series of lectures.

Daugherty devoted his remarks to the running game which carried his team to a Big Ten championship and a Rose Bowl victory over Oregon State January 1.

Ed Gillman, coach of the professional Los Angeles Rams of the National Football League, then closed out the morning session, with an explanation of the tricky passing game which forms the basis of most pro offenses.

The afternoon session featured talks by Navy's Eddie Erdelatz, Paul Bryant of Alabama and Minnesota's Murray Warmath.

Also attending were some 25 sports writers from Florida and surrounding states and officials of Miami's Orange Bowl and Jacksonville's Gator Bowl.

Proper Load Distribution Is Said Aid To Boat Performance

Proper load distribution is the most sensible way of getting maximum boat performance, according to Harry Ewald, chief engineer at Evinrude Motors, Milwaukee.

Ewald says it is important that the boat load be balanced by placement of passengers so that it will move over the water in the best planing position, with motor propeller shaft and cavitation plate parallel to the flow of water.

Too much weight in the stern will cause the boat to squat, while excessive load in the bow will cause the boat to pitch through the water and make it difficult to plane.

The action of the cavitation plate is similar to the eleven on a submarine. With the motor tilted toward the boat so the front of the cavitation plate is up, the plate exerts a lifting force which is transmitted to the boat. With the motor tilted so the propeller is further away from the boat, the front of the cavitation plate tilts down and water exerts a downward thrust on the plate, with this thrust in turn transmitted to the boat.

In either of the above cases, excessive stresses are placed on the boat and motor. These stresses disappear and the boat performs at maximum efficiency if the load is properly distributed so the cavitation plate is level in the water.

New Fresh-Water Fishing Licenses Go On Sale Monday

New Florida fresh-water fishing licenses will be on sale at the office of County Judge Wilson Altmeyer, in the court house, starting Monday, June 10. They will be honored from the date of issuance. However, the present licenses will still remain valid until their expiration June 30. Prices remain the same as last year.

All residents between the ages of 15 and 64 are required to purchase licenses to fish outside the county of their legal residence, or to fish with rod and reel in any fresh waters. Licenses are not required of residents fishing non-commercially in the county of their legal residence with not more than three cane poles.

All non-residents over the age of 15 years are required to purchase a license to fish in fresh waters in the state. For the convenience of those citizens who wish to purchase their licenses during the lunch hour, Judge Altmeyer will keep the office open the next two weeks for the sale of licenses only, and if the requests for licenses during that time are sufficient in number to warrant it.

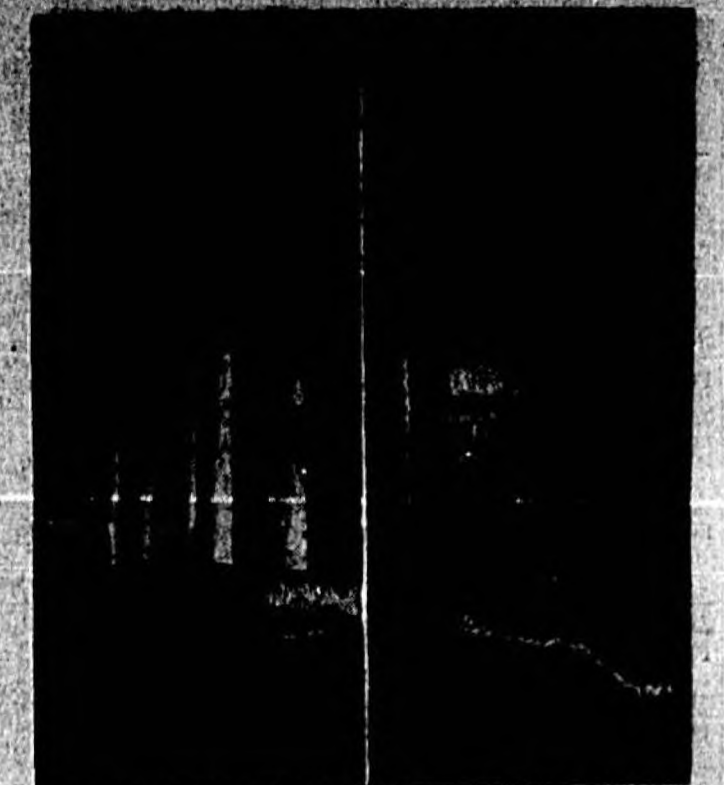

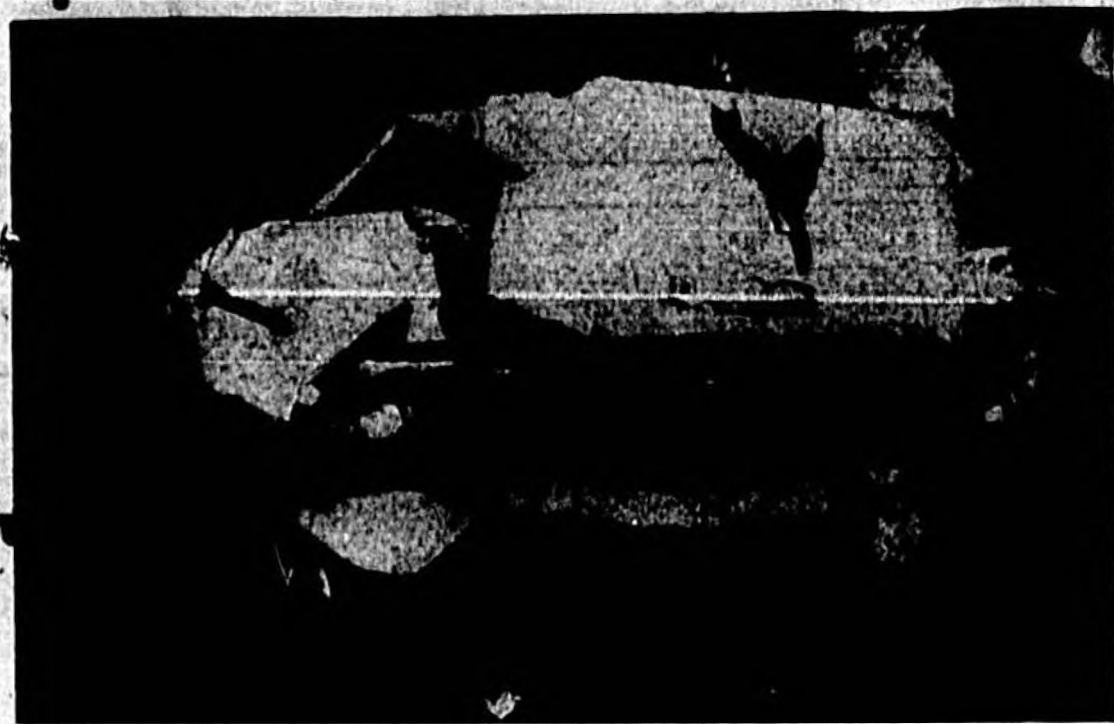

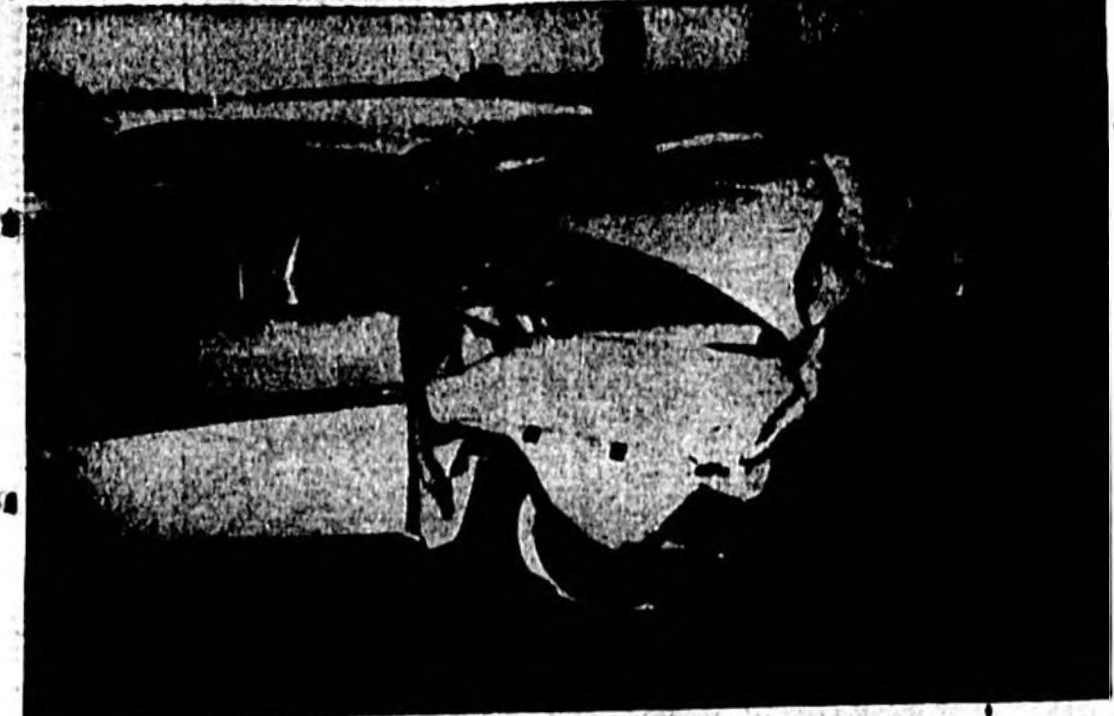

2 Sanford Youths To Attend Science Camp At FSU

TALLAHASSEE—Florida State University opens its science laboratory today to 101 high school youths who will study for two weeks in the 6th annual Science Camp. Under the supervision of faculty members, the youths, carefully chosen for their unusual ability in science, will look around for a field of special interest.

Youths selected for the camp from Seminole High School include Clifford McKibbin Jr. and Henry Schumacher. FFS Reports Two More Wildfires Over Weekend

LONGWOOD—The Florida Forest Service reported two more wildfires over the weekend. Friday afternoon, a fire started at the trash dump just north of State Road 434 near SanLando Springs. High winds blew burning trash into the surrounding woodland. D. E. Cotton and Andy Perri, employed by SanLando Springs, spotted the fire and attempted to douse it. Strong wind caused the fire to burn hot and spread rapidly.

While additional employees of SanLando Springs were called, the Florida Forest Service was notified. F. J. Johnson of Longwood, joined with Clifford Cotton, R. L. McLean and Buddy Bryant, all SanLando Springs employees, in battling the blaze. Ranger Arnold Wetzel was dispatched from Longwood and when he arrived the fire was still burning out of control.

Damage was slight and only two acres of woodland burned. The other weekend fire occurred Sunday, 3/4 of a mile east of Highway 17-92 near the Longwood-Wagner road. Witnesses there said the fire had smoldered all day until the Forest Service was called late in the evening.

Ranger Wetzel said "Although the fire burned in a populated area, it did no damage as it was burning slowly into the oncoming wind. Had the wind shifted at any time the fire would have become a serious problem and might have easily damaged some of the homes. The fire should have been reported to the Forest Service early in the morning and then there would have been no danger." Wetzel went on to say "Although today's rain will, for a time, put a stop to the rash of wildfires, permanent protection will be ours when everyone is alert to prevent fires by being more careful and reporting all fires immediately."

Adams' Hotel Bills Paid By Boston Industrialist

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House investigators disclosed today that Boston industrialist Bernard Goldfine had paid hotel bills for Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York as well as two in New England.

A House submission based on an investigation by Francis X. McLaughlin says that Adams' million-dollar friend paid his bills at the Waldorf twice in 1954, once for \$47.50 and the second time, covering accommodations also for Mrs. Adams, for \$219.02.

Chairman Owen Harris (D-Ark) issued an open invitation to Adams to testify on charges he accepted favors from Goldfine, who at various times was in hot water with the government's regulatory agencies.

Adams has conceded that Goldfine paid \$2,000 in hotel bills for himself and his family at the Sheraton-Plaza Hotel in Boston. He also was Goldfine's guest at the Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth, Mass.

Adams has denied he used his influence to get favored treatment for Goldfine. While in trouble, McLaughlin offered as evidence photostatic copies of Waldorf-Astoria account cards covering the Adams visits in 1954. He was asked if the dates had "any significance."

He replied that they occurred at the same time that Goldfine's company was trying to establish out a dispute with the Federal Trade Commission over its labeling of nylon products.

McLaughlin said the hotel records subpoenaed last Friday show that Adams was a guest at the Waldorf Jan. 23-24, 1954, and that his \$47.50 bill was charged to Goldfine.

The records also show, he said, that Adams, accompanied by his wife, was a guest at the hotel Feb. 12-13 of the same year. The \$219.02 charge in this case also was billed to Goldfine, he said.

The records showed that Goldfine also was a guest at the Waldorf during both visits. Goldfine, whose total stay exceeded Adams', paid a \$514.75 bill for the January visit. For the February visit he paid \$2,002.50. McLaughlin said the Adams bills were included in these totals.

Clifford McKibbin appointed a committee of prominent Sanford business men to study the potential of the county for this project. The Commercial and Business Activities Committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce called the meeting for the first activity of the group since the local Merchants Association was disbanded and merged with the county officials.

Hostetter told the group of merchants and businessmen that the newly created Florida Council of Business and Industry is affiliated with "some 30 state organizations" interested in a "single objective."
