**3 Companies Lease Airport Facilities**

Sanford Industrial Commission Director Don Rathel said today he would bring three leases before the Monday meeting of the SIC for approval and total lease amount would bring \$35,000 into the airport's industrial complex. Rathel said the leases to three firms would create employment for 200 Sanford and Seminole County people.

While declining to release names, the SIC director said the insurance firm which recently announced intent to locate here was not included.

Rathel said one of the three firms would employ approximately 100 persons.

The SIC director indicated none of the three would be involved in modular home construction, thus quieting a rumor that has persisted for several weeks that a mobile or modular home manufacturer would soon announce airport plant operations and employ some 200 persons.

Another persistent industry rumor, thus far unconfirmed, is that a new established airport industry will soon move from its present facilities into new quarters which will be constructed on property bought first by an eastern industry which had announced plans to move to Sanford but later changed mind and offered the property for sale.

Still more industrial news is expected within a few days, when announcement of another firm establishing Sanford operations is expected.

**Purchased By Americana Chain**

**Sanford Manor Center Sold**

Negotiations are to be completed today for the lease of a closed Sanford nursing home to a privately operated nursing home chain, which will re-open and operate the 105-bed facility. This was confirmed today by Melvin Pawley, administrator for Americana Nursing Center of Orlando, one of 34 nursing facilities operated by the nursing chain.

Pawley was reluctant to discuss the details of the leasing except to say the acquisition of Sanford Manor is expected to be completed later today. The facility would reopen soon under a new name, Florida Nursing Center, and, according to news sources, the present administrator at Orlando, Florida, would be named Florida's administrator.

Fawley said the Sanford operation would mean two Florida outlets for the firm that now operates facilities in Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and Iowa.

Officials are expected to begin readying the presently closed facility for operation in the near future and are expected to have a maintenance staff here by Monday.

Built and equipped originally at cost of upwards of \$875,000, the facility announced in September intentions to close after losing \$53,000 total since opening a year earlier.

Then administrator John W. Jenkins, in a prepared statement, listed the tightening governmental restrictions associated with Medicare as reasons for closing after only a year of operation.

Another Sanford nursing home, Seminole Lodge, is also expected to be sold within a short time to Seminole Memorial Hospital for operation of a mental patient holding facility and a hospital annex.

**Exemption Requests Are Due**

It's that time of year again to file for homestead exemption, and applications were mailed Jan. 1 to home owners in the county by the office of tax assessor, Guy Allen.

Owners who have purchased homes during 1970 and have not applied for homestead exemption, as well as all others, are required to file between Jan. 1 and April 2 to receive the exemption to be applied in next year's taxes.

New home owners are required to present a deed to the property, which must also be maintained as their legal residence. If a car owner, they must have a Florida tag and driver's license.

Applications which need only to be dated and signed, may be mailed or brought to the assessor's office in the court house or to the Seminole Plaza annex. Intangible personal property, such as stocks, bonds, etc. must also be listed if taxed upon last year. The law imposes a penalty if not returned by April 1. It is no longer necessary to list tangible personal property since changing Florida statutes in this category.

The majority of applications are returned by the end of January. Last year 15,369 forms were mailed and 14,308 were returned. The balance had sold their property. There were 2,800 new applications. A total of 17,109 applications were filed, 11,969 of which were returned in January.

**Sanford's Needs In '70 Cited By Commissioners**

(Editor's note: This is the fourth of a series of five prognostications for 1970 by civic leaders of Seminole County and environs.)

Construction of a secondary sewage treatment plant will be the main issue of 1970 for the Sanford City Commissioners. Rejuvenation or relocation of the zoo, bonding and tax-amount of revenue to work with, and it seems like an almost insurmountable problem.

The idea, generally, is to do as much as is possible without raising taxes. Sanford's tax rate now is 11½ mills, and a new state law has rolled this back to 10 mills. As Crapps said, hopefully, "We can finance the major projects without floating bond issues, and thereby avoid taxing the people more."

Matching funds are available from federal and state sources for the project, as they were for the construction of the primary treatment plant. The plans and specifications have to be formulated in accordance with the regulations of the State Board of Health.

Next on the list, according to importance, for the commissioners, is the zoo. It must be relocated or refurbished by the end of this year, they say.

"The people have demanded that something be done, and it will be done," they agree.

"There should be visible evidence of progress," said Gordon Meyer, the newest addition to the commission. "The money has been appropriated (over \$30,000 and some private money) and this project could get underway right away."

But that good old long green stuff will be THE big problem for 1970, said Moore.

"The money market is against us," he said. "The commission will have a limited amount of money available."

Phase I of this project is essential to provide drainage before construction can be begun in earnest for roads in the Goldboro area, added Meyer. Funds for this must also be acquired this year.

Roads are another area for the consideration of these men for 1970.

"State Road 46 is a major east-west artery for the city, and the city should take a strong interest in having it widened from Interstate 75 to I-95," said the mayor.

The commissioners hit upon several other areas of interest during '70. They are, as projected by Dr. W. Vincent Roberts, briefly:

Industry. "We expect continued progress in employment and industrialization at the airport," said Dr. Roberts. The concentration of talent from the Seminole Chamber of Commerce to the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce will play a part in this, he feels.

Urban renewal. "We will be working on this, as on the zoo, in keeping with the desires of the people."

Character revision. Although not mentioned by the other commissioners, Roberts feels that this will come up in '70. "There will probably be a development of a charter revision committee."

## 2 Sanford Theaters Included In Merger

ATLANTA (UPI) — Fuqua Industries, Inc., an Atlanta-based diversified-services firm, announced today an agreement in principle whereby Martin Theatre Company, a subsidiary, will acquire a Florida chain of motion picture theaters, including the Sanford Plaza Rocking Chair Theater and the Movieland Drive-In Theatre of Sanford.

Under terms of the proposal, Martin, which operates theaters and two television stations in the southeast, would merge with Floyd Enterprises, Inc., Haines City, Fla. Floyd operates 42 theaters in central Florida, including the two Sanford houses.

The merger would be carried out through the exchange of two shares of Floyd common stock for one of Fuqua. Fuqua was quoted at 30 3/4 on closing last Friday on the New York Stock Exchange while Floyd was 13 1/4 on over the counter trading.

Fuqua said Carl Floyd would remain as chairman of the board of Floyd and Harold Spears would remain as president.

## City, SIC, CofC To Discuss Action Airport Future Decision Due

By BILL SCOTT

The future of Sanford Airport and the future industrial development of the city of Sanford will hinge on what actions are taken as the result of three scheduled meetings this week.

City Manager W. E. Knowles, Mayor Lee Moore, City Attorney W. C. Hutchison and Sanford Industrial Commission Chairman A. K. Shoemaker Jr. are expected to meet this afternoon at city hall to discuss whether to implement an airport authority to operate Sanford Airport and its industrial recruitment, or place the activity under a city department.

This session was arranged after a breakfast meeting of the SIC and City Commission a week ago to discuss the problems coming with the resignation of Don Rathel as SIC director and finding some group or person to operate the industrial part of the city.

Methods discussed were having the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce operate the industrial aspects in conjunction with the SIC under a department of aviation concept with J. S. (Red) Cleveland, airport manager in charge of the airport's leasing and maintenance.

There was opposition to this idea and it was ultimately decided to name four men to a committee to make a decision that would be brought before both city and SIC commissions for approval.

Another meeting at 4:30 p.m. today will involve the SIC board with Rathel expected to bring at least three industrial leases for board approval.

The airport industrial operation is also expected to be discussed in some manner as this could be the last session in which Rathel is scheduled to participate.

In announcing his decision not to seek another six-month employment of his consultant firm, Rathel indicated he would leave the post by Jan. 15.

Today's meeting is expected to be the final session for Rathel unless something unexpected crops up, a source close to the SIC said.

It is expected that some discussion may be forthcoming today over future leasing practices.

A third meeting, involving the city's industrial recruitment, among other business items is expected to be brought before the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce during that body's special executive meeting scheduled for 8 p.m. tomorrow.

Chamber has expressed interest in operating the city's industrial recruitment with SIC participation, but it is believed that some opposition to this is expected to appear before City Commission to seek that body's approval for operating the city's industrial involvement.

Tuesday's meeting may decide the general course the chamber may follow.

W. E. Knowles, city manager, said he believes the running of an air port should be left to the city rather than involved with any industry seeking group.

## McDonald Gets Sanford Seat

A former Sanford mayor and city commissioner is expected to be named the fifth member of the City Commission at that group's 8 p.m. Tuesday organizational meeting.

Thomas S. (Tommy) McDonald received three of four votes cast by city commissioners Saturday afternoon as that body met to appoint a replacement to Mayor Lee P. Moore's unexpired one-year term on the city board.

McDonald's appointment was approved by newly elected Gordon Meyer, who is also to be sworn into a three-year city commission term in the same organizational meeting.

Meyer gave as his reasoning a campaign promise he would not vote for anyone who had previously served on the commission. "I have nothing against Tommy but I made a promise and must stand by it," said Meyer.

Meyer indicated a desire to have only new faces on the board and pushed for the appointment of political unknowns for the opening created when Mayor Moore ran for a three-year mayor seat and was victorious.

Higginbotham along with defeated commissioner A. L. Wilson was considered in a list of approximately 20 persons for the commission's post but was struck out as those under consideration narrowed down to three names late Friday.

These included David Smith, Seaboard Coast Line employee; Bert Hollingworth, an accountant, and McDonald.

The four commissioners received after three hours of Friday deliberations and returned Saturday noon to approve McDonald.

Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts, who had said previously he could not support a defeated candidate, said he voted for McDonald in the best interests of the city and would have to prepare a statement explaining how he could "talk out of both sides of his mouth" in view of his change of mind in supporting McDonald, who was defeated by Higginbotham in a previous election.

McDonald served as commissioner from 1961 through 1963 and was mayor in 1963.



**FOUR HOME FIRES; ONE MAN DIES**

ONE MAN DIED as the result of burns received during a fire that occurred when an oil heater was overturned. L. D. Wooten, 62, of 1501 West 16th Street, died Saturday but his home was not seriously damaged. A \$3,500 house and \$1,000 in estimated furnishings were lost Saturday at intersection of Oregon Street and Orange Boulevard, when a blaze destroyed a house (above) owned by Troy Stuart, of Sanford. Another blaze at 1704 Peach Avenue destroyed the Luke Wooden home and left the five member family homeless. Approximately \$2,000 damages occurred at Mrs. A. F. There will be a lot of construction in Seminole County as the result of recent efforts by the County Commissioners. The year 1970 will see the start of construction of a county court house, an addition to the county jail, a juvenile detention center, a new county agricultural center, and county branch office building in South Seminole. Also a program will be implemented for the temporary retention of mental incompetents.

Bonds for the construction of the county courthouse and the addition of two floors to the county jail already have been validated, said Commissioner Ed Yarborough. Construction should be well underway within the year, he said. Commissioner Greg Drummond is not so optimistic. He foresees hogging down over the bonding. "I doubt if we'll see ground broken this year."
