Murder suspect shot to death

LITTLETON, Colo. - A 20-year-old man suspected of killing two women and raping another was shot to death Thursday at a townhouse where two sheriff's deputies and a hostage were wounded by gunfire, authorities said.

The suspect, identified as Eugene Thompson, suffered a gunshot wound to the head that he apparently inflicted with the same Uzi submachine gun believed used in the killings of a mother and daughter earlier Thursday. authorities said.

Chocolate bunnies recalled

SUN PRAIRIE, Wis. - Some 13,300 chocolate Easter bunnies distributed to schools and other fund-raising groups were recalled in 15 states because of approximately half a dozen complaints about glass or similar objects found in the candy, company officials said Thursday.

New Jersey authorities said testing confirmed a sliver of glass was embedded in one piece of the candy made by Scott's of Wisconsin that was turned over to state officials for testing.



Longwood employee reinstated

Union, city reach compromise day before scheduled hearing

LONGWOOD - David Torrance, the city public works employee who was fired in November will be reinstated next month, with a portion of his back pay and benefits.

The city reached a settlement with the International Union of Operating Engineers Local 673 (IUOE 673), which is the bargaining agent for 46

workers in Longwood. Attorney Richard Siwica, who represents the union, said that a settlement was reached between the city and the union on the eve of a hearing that had been scheduled on the matter.

David Torrance, maintenance worker, will return to his job April 10 with a "clean and cleared" record and will be paid a portion of his back pay, which Siwica said is a "substantial amount" and all his accrued sick leave and vacation. Fifty percent of insurance expenses incurred during the four months he was off also will be reimbursed, Siwicasaid. No dollar amount was revealed for what the city owes Torrance, but based on his hourly \$6.52 wage, it could mean roughly \$2,000 for back pay alone.

Torrance filed an unfair labor practice suit with the local union against the city after he was terminated on Nov. 29 by then-city administrator Gene DeMarie. The union, in turn, filed a suff through the Florida Public Employees Relations Commitssion (PERC) in Tallahassee.

Don Terry, the city's current acting city ad-ministrator, said be decided to reinstate Torrance after reviewing the circumstances in consultation with the city's labor attorney, Frank Kruppen-bacher. Terry said he will notify the commissioners about the decision.

Hearing Officer Steven Meck, PERC representative, advised that a settlement was reached among the city, the union and Torrance, rendering the Tuesday morning hearing at Longwood City Hall unnecessary, according to Siwiea.

"It wasn't that it (settlement) was reached quickly, just that it was finalized on the eve of the hearing. With the hearing coming up, it put pressure on both sides. It was a mutual agreement. There's no dispute, he (Torrance) was an outstanding employee while he was employed and he will

WINTER PARK - A 20.000-light Christinas display which drew media attention to a rural Winter Park house may have been powered with stolen electricity.

That's the allegation the Seminole County Sheriff's Department and Florida Power Corp., are making against Mark Holmann, 31, of 7507 Betty Ave.

Hofmann surrendered to Seminole County sheriff's deputtes at the jail at about 11 a.m. Thursday to be charged with grand theft. trespass and larceny related to a utility in connection with the alleged theft of electrical power: Hond is \$1,000.

A photo of Hotmann's Christmas display appeared on the front page of the Sanford Herald last Christmas, Hofmann told the Herald that for seven years he lit up his

Ten-cent gas tax increase discussed

TALLAHASSEE - Rep. Mary Figg says it is time to "open a dialogue" with the public in order to pass a \$1 billion tax increase aimed at repairing Florida's crumbling public transportation system.

'The thing I fear most is that five years from now, we're going to have a very angry public coming to us and saying 'Why didn't you do something about this?" " said Figg-D-Lutz, the head of the the House subcommittee on transportation Figg's bill. HB 1263, would raise

gasoline taxes by 10 cents a gallon this year, add a \$100 user fee for new car purchases, a \$1 per day charge for rental car use, establish a flat annual fee of \$32.50 for registration of vehicles and repeal the sales tax exemption for vehicles traded in as part of the purchase of a new vehicle.



Tumpike chief ousted

TALLAHASSEE - The head of the Florida Turnpike has been abruptly forced out of his post by the embattled chief of

the Department of Transportation. The departure of John Cross is the third by a high-ranking official under state Transportation Secretary Kaye Henderson this year.

The ouster Wednesday came after news reports last week that major turnplke construction projects in Dade, Broward and Palm Beach counties had been halted for six months because of budget problems.

A spokesman for the transportation department said Henderson wanted to give the turnpike job to another official,

and Cross refused to take another post in the department. / The job went on a temporary basis to James Ely, a 15-year department veteran who has been the department's inspector general in charge of conducting audits.

Cross had held the post since last summer, moving over from a job as manager of south Florida's Tri-County Commuter Rail project. He made the decision to place a Tri-Rail Station near Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport, which was closed Wednesday after two weeks because of safety considerations.

TALLAHASSEE - With the authorities stumped in the Feb. 9 disappearance of a popular service station owner and his son. family members said Thursday they hope a sister's dream

leads them to the the missing men. The vision came to Dock Thompson Sr.'s sister. Ella, before his disappearance. She was searching for an airport in an unfamiliar wooded area and trying to find her brother to help her find her way, but he was gone. Family members said they believe the dream may have been

a preview of the disappearances and a clue the missing men may be dead or alive somewhere near a small grass air field near Quincy in Northwest Florida, about 30 minutes drive from

the Thompsons' Texaco station. With police acknowledging they were nearing a dead end in the investigation, the family stood in the parking lot of the boarded-up service station and appealed for volunteers to help them comb the woods near the airfield.

Eastern judge appoints examiner

A federal judge Thursday appointed an examiner in the Eastern Airlines bankruptcy case with broader powers than sought by the airline, including the authority to mediate disputes involving the company's creditors, its unions and other parties, an Eastern spokesman said.

Eastern had asked U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Burton Lifland in New York to appoint an examiner to look into business dealings between Eastern and its parent company. Texas Air Corp. of Houston, and affiliates. In order to dispel union criticism of those deals.

Lifland agreed to the company's request during a court hearing, but gave the examiner broader authority than originally sought by the company.

"The judge apparently took it a step further." Eastern spokesman Robin Matell said in Miami. "The examiner will have the authority to mediate between the creditors, unions-arid other parties."

TALLAHASSEE - The Florida Supreme Court ruled Thursday that Gov. Bob Martinez overstepped his constitutional authority when he vetoed \$790,000 in projects spelled out in legislative working papers last

year. "We find an improper exercise of the gubernatorial veto and affirm the trial court's rulings" directing that Martinez' vetoes of the five items must be expunged, Justice Parker Lee McDonald wrote.

House and Senate leaders have described Martinez' use of his line-item veto power over the working papers as a grab for

"It leaves the balance of power where it was before he exceeded his authority." Kevin Crowley, counsel to House Speaker Tom Gustafson, said of the ruling. "The court basically said the governor went too far."

The court also ruled the documents "cannot be binding" because they were never voted into law. But they do carry "directory" weight, meaning they can be used to determine legislative intent in any dispute between the governor and Legislature on a spending item

in the papers. Such disputes are usually handled by the state Ad-

Government changes citrus canker, shipping programs

WASHINGTON - The government toughened its rules on checking citrus groves Thursday but relieved other restrictions on Interstate shipment of citrus fruit from areas in Florida that are under regulation because of

citrus canker. The canker is a bacterial plant disease that attacks leaves, twigs and fruit of many types of citrus. The Agriculture Department has controlled citrus anipments from portions of Florida since a canker outbreak in 1984.

More than 20 million trees were destroyed in the cradication program in 1984. "We believe the new regula-

tion will improve our ability to prevent the interstate spread of citrus canker while removing restrictions that are not war-ranted in achieving this goal," said James Glosser, head of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

Certification of citrus fruit is required before it can be shipped from Florida to citrus-producing states. The new regulation re-quires a tree by tree survey on foot of all groves producing fruit for interstate movement under a certificate and all groves located located within areas where the Asiatic strain of the canker the more virulent strain.

The old rule called for a drive-by and a walking survey of selected trees in a grove.

"With the new requirement, inspectors will conduct only one survey, but it will be more effective than the two previously required. This will significantly increase our detection program for citrus canker," Glosser said.

The new regulation also reduces the area under special restrictions because of the Asiatic strain. The A-strain area now will consist of Manatee county and parts of Hillsborough. Pinelias and Sarasota counties.

In the past, the area was all of Manatee, Pinellas and Sarasota countles and Hillsborough county south of State Road 80.

"We will now be allowing 'dooryard' fruit produced outside the A-strain area to move interstate under a limited permit to non-citrus producing states without treatment," Glosser

Florida wineries lose their tax-exempt status

TALLAHASSEE - A bill sponsored by Senate Presi-dent Bob Crawford that granted Florida alcoholic beverage manufacturers taxexempt status was ruled unconstitutional Thursday by the state Supreme Court.

"This limited state interest is clearly inadequate to outweigh the substantial federal interest in preventing eco-nomic protectionism," the court wrote in a unanimous opinion.

Crawford's bill, passed last year, granted tax-exempt status to alcoholic beverage products manufactured in Florida. Crawford, D-Winter Haven, received considerable criticism for sponsoring the bill because there are two wineries in his district.

Florida collects a tax on imported alcoholic beverages imported, but Crawford's bill granted an exempt status to any Florida-produced alcoholic beverages.

The bill was challenged almost immediately by a number of out-of-state liquor and wine distributors who alleged the bill violated the commerce provisions of the U.S. Constitution that bar restraint of interstate trade.

Crawford's bill was in response to a similar case last year in which the state Supreme Court struck down a 1985 statute that also granted a tax break to Florida beverage manufacturers.

A lower court ruling called the 1988 law "a warmed-over version, dressed up in dif-ferent clothing," of the 1985 statute and the state Supreme Court agreed with that assessment.

The court said it was un-constitutional to tax imported alcoholic beverages and not take state-produced products of the same nature and, because the federal question took precedent over state statutes, state law would not apply.

"The Bahamas, a small black nation of 700 islands, should not be singled out and smeared with leaks, lies and libelous accusations," ahe said. "Our contribution to the international fight against drugs demands that we be accorded better treatment."

included as defendants were five leaders of the notorious and violent Medellin cartel in Colombia and Everette Bannister, a close associate of Pindling's.

It said leaders of the cartel masterminded the slavings of Colombian Justice Minister Lara Bonilla April 29, 1984 and Barry Scal, the top U.S. drug infor-mant, Feb. 19, 1986.

The indictment also said Bannister took bribes from cartel smugglers who wanted to use the Bahamas for drug stops on their way to the United States. McDonald said Bannister was not a public official and the charges against him has no bearing on the Bahamian government.

has been in question and similar reports resurfaced after Wednesday's indictment. Bannister allegedly shared the money with unnamed Bahamian officials, but federal law enforcement authorities said Pindling was among the unnamed officials.

Capital gains tax should be lowered

When you sell your stocks, a farm, or in many cases your home, any profit will be taxed by the government. It is called a capital gains tax, and the levy was 49 percent in 1978 but was slashed by Congress to 20 percent in 1981. As a result of the massive tax reform bill passed by Congress in 1986, the capital gains tax has returned to 32 percent.

President Bush, in what we believe to be one of his most important domestic proposals, has asked Congress to lower the captial gains tax rate to 15 percent. Congress should approve the proposal immediately.

Cutting the capital gains tax, as Mr. Bush has proposed, will generate more tax revenue for the federal government than will the current, higher rate. And, more importantly, a cut will provide an important stimulus to the economy that will help us all.

Congress reduced the capital gains tax from 49 percent to 28 percent in 1978 and the government, with the reduced tax rate, collected an additional \$2.6 billion in capital gains tax revenue in 1979. Revenues from the tax rose by \$3.4 billion in 1980 and zoomed even higher after Congress cut the rate to 20 percent in 1981.

The captial gains tax boost up to 33 percent adopted by Congress in 1986 and effective in 1987 played havoc with federal and state budgets. Revenues dropped dramaticaly.

Why? It is simple. If people feel they are going to pay too much in taxes on their capital gains, they simply will not sell their stocks, homes and other property if they have a choice. That means that no tax will be collected. Missing also will be the billions of dollars generated in the nation when real estate sales are brisk.

A high capital gains tax, as we now have,

furs, no longer exists. But AAFWs are guilty of a selectivity that subverts the consistency of their morality. They walk pickets lines in their leather shoes (for which some animal died), stridently protesting fur-wearers, then go home to a dinner of steak or lamb chops or pork chops or hamburger (for which some animal died). Why do the AAFWs protest the wearing of furs, but not the slaughter of turkeys at Thanksgiving? When President Bush went hunting, animal

rightists bemoaned the killing of animals. But nobody protested when he went fishing.

Animal rightists oppose hunting and the unarguably inhumane method of clubbing baby scals to death for their furs. They also worry about the suffering of animals used in scientific experiments.



DAVID S. BRODER How to handle the bailout

WASHINGTON - Since writing a week ago about the inequity of taxpayers being sent a bill that will top \$100 billion for a sav-ings-and-loan ballout, a flood of disturbing information has come across this desk.

No one challenges the scriouaness of the problems that have put hundreds of thrift institutions on the endangered species list and triggered the Bush administration to press Congress for emergency legislation to press money into the S&L deposit-guarantee fund. But many questions are being raised about the adequacy of this belated effort to cope with

a crisis that presidential candidates deliber-ately avoided seeing last fail, when it was in plain view. And even more fundamental challenges are being pressed to the philosophy behind the bailout. These questions should have been part and parcel of last fail's debate, so voters' views could have been heard before lobbyists and legislators took to the backrooms of Capitol Hill for settlement.

A number of economiats, mainly at con-servative-oriented think tanks hardly hostile to the Bush administration, have raised what appear to be pertinent objections.

They ask if the Bush plan puts the burden of responsibility on those who made the foolhardy, high-risk loans; or whether, with fine impartiality, it is penalizing the prudent, healthy savings institutions for the sins of others.

The Bush rescue plan will pump money into the system, some of it coming from taxpayers and the rest from a levy on healthy S&Ls and banks. While tightening supervision (a classic case of locking the barn door after the horse has escaped), it would delay major reforms in the deposit-insurance system, pending an 18-month study.

Last week, senior officials of five con-servative think tanks — the American En-terprise Institute, the Cato Institute, the Competitive Enterprise Institute, the Heritage Foundation and the National Taxpayers Union Foundation — along with Robert E. Litan, a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution, issued a strongly worded challenge to this strategy. Their joint- action was unusual enough to command attention. And Heritage rushed out a supplementary commentary of its own prepared by Henry N. Butler, director of the law and economics center at George Mason University.

The joint statement says, first, the ad-ministration should stop temporizing, recognize the seriousness of the problem, and seek authority from Congress "to raise at lease \$50 billion during the current flacal year. rather than over the next three years, in order to swiftly shut down insolvent thrifts and stop the hemorrhaging of federal insurance fund losses." Many others have also suggested that

the administration's gradualist approach was ahaped more to meet budget-deficit targets for this year than to deal with the crisis Chairman Dan Rostenkowski (D-III.) of the

House Ways and Means Committee, In an interview with The Washington Post, raised the question whether keeping the costs of the S&L ballout "off-budget" may not raise the eventual bill to American taxpayers by several hundred billion dollars as a way of making the budget deficit smaller and thereby inducing a continued stream of foreign investment to the United States. If so, he said, his Chicago constituents are getting worse treatment than Tokyoand Dusseldorf bunkers.

Second, these critics complain that the Bush plan delays the needed hard look at an insurance scheme which, among other things:

•Guarantees deposits up to \$100,000, even though the average depositor has only \$8,400 in his or her account, and allows wealthy families to get even more protection through multiple accounts under different names.

•Changes the same insurance rates to all institutions, whether they are conservative, prudently managed operations or speculative highfliers. The pervense consequence of this system, they note, is that it encourages risk-taking hotshots, since their deposits are protected to the same generous extent and at the same low cost as the more cautious operators.

Butler, in his Heritage paper, argues for private insurance of the thrifts, on the grounds that market forces then would penalize (through higher premiums) those who make risky loans. That radical a reform is not likely in the midst of the prevailing chaos of collapsing thrifts and nervous depositors.

But the issues belatedly being raised are important ones. Taxpayers who were denied an opportunity to hear this debate before last November's election have to hope their representatives and senators will be more conscientious and attentive - and courageous - than the presidential candidates were in 1988.

the international body will stand up for human rights no matter what politics are involved. The 90th anniversary of the Castro

regime has prompted Congress to get into the act and suggest a pleblacite in which Castro would allow his people to retain or retire him.

The U.N. Human Rights Commission vis-ited Cuba last fall and found that Castro was still stomping all over the rights of his political enemies. The commission learned that people had been arrested and jailed for something as simple as possessing a Bible or reading a book of the wrong political persuasion.

Even more disturbing is what happened because of the commission's visit. Police harrassed and arrested people who tried to give information to the commission. Here is what happened to just a few of those people:

•Lazaro Linares Echevarria was arrested in September when he tried to contact the commission, according to Americas Watch. the independent human rights monitoring group. He is reportedly serving a six-month prison term on a charge of contempt. • Jose Carlos Montero Ocampo was in-

terviewed by the commission. The next day, he returned to the delegation's hotel with some documents. He was arrested a week later and sent to prison. He says that he is being kept from communicating with his family and a lawyer.

•Francisco and Alejandro Benitez Ferrer were believed to be near the delegation's hotel when they were arrested. Francisco is a former prisoner of conscience. He served a prison term for spreading propaganda and had only been free about two weeks before he was arrested again while trying to reach the delegation. He was reportedly sentenced to six months in prison for insulting a police officer and resisting arrest. His brother Alejandro was sentenced to three months for being disorderly.

•Gustavo Venta, who wanted to meet with the delegation, was sentenced to six months in prison for insulting a police officer. The U.N. Human Rights Commission must

use a very narrow definition of abuse if it does not consider those arrests to be a violation of human rights.

The failure of the commisson to schedule Cuba for another human rights evaluation this year proves that Castro can make a mockery of the United Nations and continue to stay in its good graces.

Filipinos crucified in rite

KAPITANGAN, Philippines -At least eight Filipinos, including a woman faith healer, were crucified in bloody Good Friday rites witnessed by thousands of spectators in Asia's only Christian nation.

in the rice farming village of Kapitangan, 25 miles north of Manila, more than 5,000 people watched in scorching midday heat as men dressed in Roman centurion outfits nailed 27-year-old faith healer Lucila Reyes to a wooden cross.

It was the 13th year Reyes has undergone the grisly ritual that some Filipinos believe will bring God's forgiveness, blessings and power.

"My children, you should offer your lives to the Lord," Reyes said as she fell into a trance after three-inch nails were hammered into her palms and feet. "I am here to give you favors and help you."

A weeping woman in the crowd yelled, "Forgive us our sins, oh Lord," while newsmen jostled for a good view atop a makeshift stage set up in the jammed churchyard where hawkers sold balloons and other souvenirs in a carnival at-, mosphere.

Reyes remained natied to the cross for about 20 minutes before she was taken down and treated.

In nearby San Pedro Cutud, adjacent to the U.S. Clark Air Base, seven men were nailed to crosses in a re-enactment of Christ's crucifixion.

The Department of Tourism built viewing decks, refreshment stands and souvenir stalls in San Pedro Cutud, where the spectacle each year draws thousands of tourists.

Throughout the Philippines, penitents Friday dragged heavy wooden crosses, slashed their backs with razors and whipped the wounds with glass-studded bamboo strips in rites that date back to the introduction of Catholicism in the islands by Spanish friars in the 16th centu-





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

Chemists report fusion reaction

SALT LAKE CITY - Chemists reported Thursday the creation of a safe nuclear fusion reaction using common sea water at room temperature rather than a high-radiation nuclear furnace.

Although the applications of this form of nuclear fusion were not immediately evident, the scientists noted that the energy available in one cubic foot of sea water is equivalent to 10 tons of coal

The simple and inexpensive process, ignored by nuclear physicists, was developed over 15 years by Martin Fleischmann, electrochemistry professor at England's University of Southampton, and Stanley Pons, chairman of the University of Utah chemistry department.

"We have successfully created a sustained fusion reaction at room temperature in a chemistry laboratory at the University of Utah," Pons said.

Conventional nuclear fusion research requires temperatures of millions of degrees, similar to temperatures found in the sun's interior, to create a reaction.

Texas prosecutor won't refile charges

DALLAS - The Dallas County district attorney said Thursday his decision not to retry Randall Dale Adams in the 1976 shooting death of a Dallas policeman, the subject of the documentary "The Thin Blue Line," proved the Texas criminal justice system works.

District Attorney John Vance said Thursday his office was unable to find two witnesses in the case and concluded it could not retry Adams, who spent 12 years behind bars for the Nov. 28, 1976, slaying of Officer Robert Wood.

"We found after, 1 believe, a very thorough investigation there was not sufficient, credible evidence for a retrial in this case," Vance said. "A dismissal has already been filed with Criminal District Court No. 2, requesting a dismissal in this case.

State District Judge Larry Baraka, who will sign the order, was not expected to return to his courtroom until next week.

Adams, whose plight drew national attention with the release of the 1988 film, was released from the Dallas County Jail Tuesday. A state appeals court on March 1 threw out his conviction and death sentence, citing perjured testimony and prosecutorial misconduct.

Police arrest anti-abortion protesters

LOS ANGELES - The leader of an anti-abortion group and as many as 350 of his followers were arrested Thursday for blockading an abortion clinic in the first day of a planned three-day protest in Southern California coinciding with Easter week.

Some 300 members of the Operation Rescue group descended on the Family Planning Associates Medical Group in the Orange County city of Cypress, blocking its doors while pro-abortion activists tried to keep the clinic open.

The action began shortly after daybreak, with the protesters claiming a victory for managing to drive off at least one woman who left after they pleaded with her to miss her appointment.

The arrests began shortly before 9 a.m. as 60 officers waded in to carry the protesters off one by one. As they had been instructed by their leaders to do, other Operation Rescue members stepped or crawled in to fill spaces, as others sang hymns

House votes on minimum wage

President's proposal rejected as too low

WASHINGTON - The House rejected President Bush's \$4.25-an-hour minimum wage plan Thursday and prepared to approve a \$4.55 compromise that Speaker Jim Wright urged Bush to accept because it offered a "training wage" provision.

Bush's plan was spurned on a 218-198 vote, and the House later was expected to accept the bipartisan compromise, which would boost the hourly minimum wage for the first time since it hit \$3.35 in 1981 and which would offer a 60-day lower rate for new employees in an effort to make it more palatable to Bush.

The president's plan similarly contained a six-month "sub-minimum" wage for new employees, but he has threatened to veto any bill going beyond his \$4.25 proposal - even with the lower training wage.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater reiterated Bush's opposition to any compromise Thursday, saying his plan was his "first and last" offer. "We've got a firm position and we're hanging tough." Fitzwater said.

"I hope the president doesn't veto the bill," warned House Education and Labor

Committee Chairman Augustus Hawkins, D-Calif., "because he'll be perceived as being against working people."

Hawkins told colleagues on the House floor they would be "traveling backward" with Bush's measure, which he called "inadequate, misleading, defective" and a move that "would keep individuals perpetually at starvation, poverty levels."

Rep. Tom Campbell, R-Calif., countered that an even higher wage would amount to "putting a tax on precisely the person who offers the job. ... In economic terms, to lift the minimum wage is a head tax per employee, directed precisely at the engine of

employment in this country." Bush's package called for a six-month training rate at 80 percent of the new minimum. Opponents, however, maintained that mercly would let businesses fire workers after a little more than five months to keep labor costs down.

The \$4.55 compromise, with a 60-day training rate at 85 percent of the new minimum, was offered as middle ground between Bush's plan and a Democratic proposal for a \$4.65 rate with no subminimum. The compromise also provides for a board to advise Congress about minimum wage inflation adjustments.

Under the compromise, the hourly rate would rise to \$3.85 Oct. 1, to \$4.25 the next Oct. 1 and to \$4.55 a year later. The basic

Democratic plan would raise the wage by \$1.30 an hour, or 39 percent, in steps during three years - to \$3.85 Jan. 1, to \$4.25 at the start of 1991 and to \$4.65 in 1992.

Wright, D-Texas, termed \$4.65 "a modest increase," noting the minimum wage has not been raised since 1981 and its buying power has croded by more than 30 percent.

The speaker said Democrats were offering a reasonable compromise to the White House, though he emphasized it "would have to be a training wage and not a subterfuge" for paying lower v ages. He said Bush should accept the package "if there is any sense of cooperation and conciliation."

We decided we would try to be reasonable," he said, and from the start of the year Democrats have tried "to find ways to work with our new president."

He noted, however, the Senate has yet to act on the bill and a House-Senate conference committee probably will have to craft the final version. Bush has enough Senate GOP votes to sustain a veto of any plan with no sub-minimum.

In opening debate, Rep. Jim Kolbe, R-Ariz., argued that a \$4.65 rate would "tragically result in a loss of jobs, and more tragically, in a loss of job opportunities for people just coming into the job market."

WASHINGTON — Budget ne-gotiators reported bipartisan progress Thursday as they began a nearly two-week Easter break, leaving their staffs to continue scrambling to find a compromise on a fiscal 1990 spending plan.

Bush administration negotiators - Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady and budget director Richard Darman - and their five congressional negotiating counterparts 'sent a

letter to President Bush and released a joint statement saying "considerable progress" has been made on technical issues and that talks have been "cordial and constructive."

"What is most important is the clear understanding of every member of the negotiating group of the need for an effective budget agreement," the statement said.

The report by the National ichool Boards Association also ound signs of crosion in the ntegregation of black students n the South, but said the region still remains the most deregregated in the country.

"The march to school integregation is certainly not over. and school systems are finding there are no quick and easy solutions," said James Oglesby, president-elect of the association.

Overall, the study found white enrollment decreased by 16.5 percent from 1968 to 1986 while the number of blacks and Hispanies in public schools in-treased by 5.4 percent and 02.9 percent, respectively.

If current trends continue, the study said, U.S. public schools will become a minority system where Hispanics encounter more Intense segregation and isolation than blacks.

The study attributed the growing segregation of Hispanics to the failure of government and civil rights groups to push for greater integration and the large concentration of Hispanics in a imited number of states. articularly California and Tex-

Peres denies independence proposal

JERUSALEM - Labor Party leader Shimon Peres denied Thursday he had proposed an independent Palestinian state as part of a new peace plan and said he would not discuss his ideas on peace until Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir returns from a trip to Washington.

Peres' comment was in response to a front-page article in the respected Ha'aretz newspa-per Thursday that ran under the headline, "Peres suggests establishment of demilitarized Palestinian state with its own government and institutions."

Peres denied he or his aides had proposed an independent Palestinian state and told Israel Television he would wait to discuss his own ideas on peace until Shamir returns from the United States after an early April visit.

Shamir plans to outline his views on the issue of the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip when he meets with President Bush and U.S. administration officials.

"I will present it to Shamir and not to the government ... because if it is published now it could interfere with his trip to the United States," said Peres, Israel's finance minister. "I would like to allow Mr. Shamir to travel to the United States under the most comfortable conditions possible."

The Ha'aretz article said Peres. with the aid of a former head of the West Bank's Civil Ad-ministration, had drawn up a peace plan to include a one-year cease-fire between Israel and Palestinians, peace negotiations



Mexican youth mix musical cultures

SANFORD - In Mexico, "Amigo" means "friend," but for 10 months in the United States it means a new concept in group performances.

The Mexican musical group Amigo will perform in the Seminole Community College gymnasium on Tuesday, March 28, at 7:30 p.m.

Gary Diller, student activities advisor at SCC, described the group as a Latin "Up With People."

"This is something really dif-ferent," said Diller, whose **Campus Governance Association** is sponsoring the 112-hour musical review.

Although most of the productions arranged by the SCC Campus Governance are free, the campus group is charging \$5 at the door for Amigo tickets. Previous big acts appearing at SCC, such as the Tampa Ballet and the Chinese Golden Dragon Acrobats, also have necessitated a fee to offset performance costs. "We usually get a turnout of 1,200 to 2,000 people," Diller

said.

Amigo is composed of 12 singer-dancers, and 10 musiclans, Singing in both English and Spanish, the troupe will perform blends of pop music, salsa, rock 'n' roll, Broadway and current Latin American hits. Diller has seen the group on video and describes it as "fast moving."

"It should be an excellent show," Diller said.

Founded in 1987. Amigo is the first group produced by a non-



nization was created to provide opportunities for Mexican youth in the performing arts.

The organization's founder, Minnesota native Jody Kauckick, has said the group has several objectives.

"First and foremost, we want to provide great entertainment for our audiences." Kauckick said. "But we also want to present a positive image of Mexico and its youth through our performances. It's a way of building bridges between culture and people."

According to the group's producer, Amigo tries to create an upbeat, appealing pertrait of Mexico through music and dance. The group generates funds through performance fees and contracts, by soliciting contributions, and by seeking corporate or organizational sponsorships.

Amigo kicked off its first North American tour in August, and for 10 months will be performing at state fairs, theme parks, college campuses, major conventions and trade association meetings throughout the United States.

Amigo was featured during the recent nationally televised Mexican Theatre Awards Program. Mexico's equivalent of the Tony Awards. In addition, the group was seen on Mexico City's version of "Good Morning. America," a program beamed via satellite to Hispanic stations throughout Latin America and the United States. In August-1987. Amigo

performed at a birthday party for American theatre actress Helen Hayes, who described the group as "wonderful."

In fact, Amigo was performing at the International Convention Center, Acapulco, when it caught the attention of the Jose Massieu, governor of the Mex-Ican state of Guerrero.

The Governor has said he was "impressed with the professionalism of these young people...they're good people and they present an outstanding show.

The members are from 18 to 22 years old, yet audiences of all ages can enjoy their production.

'They're a dynamic group that everybody can enjoy. They've got something for everyone," Diller said.

Amigo members possess a wide variety of backgrounds. Some hope to build careers in show business, while others intend to enter the business, world upon college graduation.

Has Christianity gone pagan?

Both secular luturists and religious evangelists are taking a hard look at the state of the church in Europe and North America and what they see they don't always like.

One futurist. Samuel Dunn of Seattle Pacific University, for example, finds the power center of Christianity moving from the First World of Europe and North America to the Third World of developing nations in Africa, Latin America and Asia.

While that is not all bad, Dunn argues in the current issue of The Futurist, that "the demise of Christianity as a strong cultural force in the countries that have supported and been so strongly affected by Christianity - the First World countries - must be viewed with alarm."

Looking toward the year 2025,

Europe and North America must learn to "accept the role of a minor player in shaping societies and cultures.

He said the trend toward separating church and state that began with the Protestant Reformation of the 16th century will accelerate increasingly, and in First World countries "the church will be viewed by governments as a social service institution similar to most other social institutions."

Dunn predicted that the already fragile connection between churches and goverment some European nations continue to have a nominal state church and receive public funding, for example - will be eliminated.

"Most (First World) citizens believe the state should not prefer one religion over another," he said. "The special

Dunn said the churches in favors given to churches are gradually being eliminated so that, to many Christians, the state appears to be moving from a stance of neutrality to a stance of benign opposition

"All indications are that these trends will continue," he added. "While a significant minority of Christians will attempt to impose religious and moral ideas on society ... these efforts will not bear fruit."

Some evangelists, while sharing what in their point of view is Dunn's pessimistic predictions, aren't ready to let go without a fight.

"Europe and its churches are in need of a Christian revivial," according to Joseph Sindorf of the Lausanne Committee for World Evangelization. such labels are no longer true and, in fact, "Europe can be described today as a post-Christian pagan society.

Sindorf, writing in the committee's magazine, World Evangelization, took note of a major meeting of Christian mission leaders in Stuttgart, West Germany, last fall aimed at developing a plan for the "re-evangelization of Europe."

"The motivation for reevangelization is not to gain new members for the shrinking churches." according to Rolf Scheffbuch, who chaired the session. Instead, the mission effort is aimed much more at being a "repentance movement" within the Protestant churches, calling people to "take their faith perceive the gospel of Jesus Christ as mere socio-political

Churches respond to border refugee crisis

Attorney General Dick Thornburgh says the refugee crisis that brought thousands of Central American Immigrants across the border into Texas is over.

But church officials - both Catholic and Protestant - who have been involved with the refugees aren't so sure.

The problem began last June, when the flow of asylum-seekers from Central America Jumped from about 400 a month to 5,000 a month. In the last days of January, 8 000 refugees crossed the border into the United States.

To cope with the surge, the Immigration and Naturalization Service instituted special detainment and processing procedures.

Churches with refugee and resettlement ministries were critical of both the INS procedures and with what they believed were problems with the nation's overall immigration policies.

The Rev. Nicholas DiMarzio, executive director of the U.S. Catholic Conference's Migration and Refugee Services, said he found the INS policy "extremely disturbing" and a potential violation of asylum-seekers rights. "The concern that procedural fairness be guaranteed is paramount," DiMarzio sald. "The INS's announced policy to detain individuals first and then to

process them quickly could erode the applicants' due process rights."

In Texas, where the refugees are being detained, the state's Protestant Conference of Churches said it was "appalled" by the INS's creation of a "tent city" within which the refugees would be "penned up."

"Enforced incarceration of people looking for freedom and food for their families does not solve anything: it merely postpones the obvious need we have to revise our Central American policies." the Texas conference said.

Texas Catholic bishops issued a similar strongly worded statement, charging the INS with "the creation of the largest concentration camp on U.S. soil since the incarceration of Japanese-Americans during World War IL'

It is, however, the problem of "people looking for ... food for their families" that is at the heart of the problem.

Under U.S. law, asylum-seekers must show a "wellfounded fear of persecution on account of race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular

Court: Donations were given under undue influence

BOSTON - A federal appeals court, rejecting a fundamentalist church's First Amendment claims, said Thursday the church must refund \$5.5 million of the \$6.6 million donated by an heiress due to "undue influence" by the pastor.

'Those who run TBS (The Bible Speaks church) may freely exercise their religion but they cannot use the cloak of religion to exert undue influence of a non-religious nature with impunity." the 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled unanimously.

The court upheld most of a lower-court ruling in favor of Elizabeth Dayton Dovydenas, of Lenox, who sought to recover money donated to the church

ritzy western Massachusetts town. A U.S. bankruptcy judge in

1987 ruled The Bible Speaks must repay the full \$6.6 million Dovydenas donated to the church because the church's founder and pastor, the Rev. Carl H. Stevens Jr., exerted undue influence to obtain the funds. The ruling was upheld by a federal district judge.

The gifts by Dovydenas were made in several installments: about \$1 million in December 1984, \$5 million in May 1985. \$500,000 in December 1985 and \$80,000 in small donations during the summer and fall of 1985.

Total donations by Dovydenas. heiress to the Dayton-Hudson Bible Speaks pastor from

that was formerly based in the Corp. department store chain of Minneapolis, totaled \$6,581,356.25.

In a 51-page decision, the three-judge appeals court said there was no showing of undue influence in the \$1 million donation or the small gifts totaling \$80,000. "General statements by Stevens ... that such gifts would do great works are too amorphous to show undue influence," the court said.

But the court said the \$5 million and \$500,000 gifts are "the result of undue influence" due to misrepresentations by Stevens and others.

For example, Dovydenas told Stevens in 1985 that she wanted to donate \$5 million immediately to help speed the release of a

Rumania. "Stevens encouraged this and did not tell that the pastor) had already been released and was in no danger," the court said.

Dovydenas bought the 69-acre church site at auction last year for \$3.2 million and now plans to sell much of it. A handful of the estate's 26 buildings are being converted by Dovydenas and her husband, Jonas, into the Berkshire Center for the Performing Arts. which will include a Shakespearean theater.

The Massachusetts Civil Liberties Union and the National Council of Churches filed briefs in support of The Bible Speaks, but the appeals court rejected their free-exercise-of-religion arguments.

Many strange and curious legends surround the life of Jesus

Only part of the Greatest Story Ever Told is in the Bible - if we can believe some of the seemingly improbable tales about Jesus that an unwritten tradition has preserved.

In a previous column 1 wrote about a legend that Jesus visited England as a boy, traveling in the company of Joseph of Aramathea, who in this version is the uncle of Jesus' mother. Another story says Jesus spent several years in England during his 20s.

One of the many letters I have received as a result of that column comes from a reader in Williamsburg, Va.

"As a schoolboy in England," he writes, "I enjoyed singing the William Blake anthem: 'And did those feet in ancient time/Walk upon England's mountain green?/And was the holy Lamb of God/On England's pleasant pastures seen?"

But this reader has still another story about Jesus' "hidden years" - as the period in his life between the ages of 12 and 30 is known. The Bible says



nothing about those 18 years.

"Some fairly good documentation exists," says this writer, "that Christ left home at age 13 to avoid becoming engaged to be married (which was a custom for males that age in that region). He went to the Indian subcontinent where he spent time studying and teaching in India. Tibet. Nepal, Pakistan, Afghanistan and Iran before returning home at age 29."

This reader says he can supply me with the documentation and I have asked him to do so.

Another column about the search for the Holy Grail, the cup Jesus and his disciples

drank from on the night of the Last Supper, also brought much mail including a letter from a reader in Deer Park, Md., who in 1978 went looking for the Holy Grail in Britain.

His search took him to Nanteos, a manor house south of Aberystwyth in Wales. The Holy Grail had been taken there by some monks in whose keeping it had been placed. They were fleeing the troops of Henry VIII who had ordered one of their abbeys, then another, destroyed after the Reformation.

When the last monk was on his deathbed, he gave the cup to the owner of the Nanteos manor.

"It took me the better part of the day to find the manor." my correspondent writes. "At the house is an exact replica of the original cup, complete with the broken side which had been repaired centuries ago."

He asked about the original and was told it was in the keeping of one Major Mirylee. owner of the manor at Ross-on-Wye in England. He drove there.

"The major received me very graciously but told me the cup was now in a vault in the National Library at Aberystwyth In Wales."

When he arrived al Aberystwyth six weeks later, he went to the library where he was allowed to hold and photograph the cup.



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Soviet elections Sunday

Dull campaign shows party still in control

MOSCOW - The campaign for Sunday's first contested general elections in the Soviet Union demonstrates how much the Communist Party still controls Soviet life, even under President Mikhail Gorbachev's social reforms.

With few exceptions, the campaign has proved to be unexciting, presenting dull, party-approved candidates in meaningless debates. Those who dare to criticize the system simply parrot Gorbachev's complaints about the party bureaucracy and food shortages.

About 85 percent of the 2,901 candidates contesting seats in the 1,500 territorial election districts for the Congress of People's Deputies are Communist Party members. In the Supreme Soviet, which the Congress is replacing, only 71 percent of the members belonged to the party.

There is only a single Communist candidate for 385 of those 1,500 seats, a throwback to previous elections where voters cast a "yes" or "no" ballot for the sole candidate.

The major heated race, between Boris Yeltsin, the dismissed Moscow party boss, and Yevgeny Brakov, the party's candidate, seems to be the exception that proves the rule.

The contest has sparked great interest in both the Soviet Union and the West, but it cleary shows the party has little stomach for public criticism.

With Monday's results, Soviet citizens technically will have a new parliament, but it will look strikingly similiar to the old one.

Gorbachev had hoped that the multi-candidate elections would generate renewed interest in politics and give citizens a greater say in who governs them and how.

He has urged the party to lessen domination over everyday life, yet the control seems as smothering as ever.

Afghan rebels block convoy

MOSCOW -- Moslem rebels have gained control of most roads connecting Kabul to the rest of Afghanistan and have blocked a military convoy sent from the capital to relieve a besieged eastern city, Pravda newspaper said Thursday.

Pravda, the official publication of the Soviet Communist Party, reported the guerrillas' success as Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze accused Pakistan of violating the Geneva peace accords by continuing to aid the U.S.-backed rebels.

In a dispatch from Kabul, Pravda reported that the guerrillas severed all land links between the capital and the country's main provincial centers. The newspaper said airlifts were the only means of contact and supply between the Soviet-backed central government of President Najibullah and outlying regions.

Afghan government soldiers defending the eastern city of Jalalabad were being supplied by airlift, but a convoy of relief troops was stymied near the village of Sarobi about halfway between Kabul and Jalalabad because rebels have blown up bridges and roads, Pravda said.

Jalabad has been the site of heavy fighting since completion Feb. 15 of a nine-month withdrawal of more than 100,000 Soviet troops from Afghanistan under a U.N.-mediated peace pact.

The rebel forces began an offensive earlier this month to try to capture Jalalabad.

In an interview carried by Tass, Shevardnadze said Pakistan has ignored provisions in the Geneva peace accords ordering an end to outside interference in Afghanistan's internal affairs, even though "not a single (Soviet) soldier" remains in the country.

Pakistan has funneled U.S. weapons to the guerrillas and has continued to allow the rebels to maintain bases in its territory for training and to launch attacks into Afghanistan.

"The main reasons why the Afghan situation still causes concern are not some weak points in the Geneva accords but the fact that they are not observed in full," Shevardnadze said.

Shevardnadze said the Soviets are less likely to consider ending their arms supplies to the Afghan government as long as Pakistan aids the rebels.

The foreign minister said the Kremlin hopes that moderate forces in Pakistan will prevail over the "current recklessness."

Shevardnadze noted that Moscow maintains a large embassy staff in Kabul and still has numerous..."Soviet specialists" in the Afghan

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




