### A Movement To Check Crime

The problem of checking crime in the United States has never been one of paramount importance, but with the in-Safered an second class matter creasing disregard for law and order there has been evi-Congress of March 3 1887. effect of restoring respect for law. With the purpose of discussing every phase of the question, a conference is being EARLE ! JONES Managing Editor held at Washington with leaders from every section of the country present. The conference is the result of an invitation sent out recently by the National Crime Association, which has produced statistics to show that the United States 12.06 now leads the entire world in percentage of crime.

The organization responsible for the Washington meeting has compiled a list of subjects for discussion, some of the most important being enumerated as follows:

(1) The abolishment of expert medical testimony in criminal cases and the substitution of a scientific and unbiased mental examination of the accused by qualified experts serving the state.

(2) Sweeping and stringent laws to curb the activities of criminal receivers of stolen goods both by uniform state legislation and by the power of the federal government through the interstate commerce act.

3 Reduction of the large number of second offenders by providing prisoners with practical training which will enable them to abandon illegal ways of livelihood on their lease, in some way which will meet the objections hitherto raised by labor, manufacturers and merchants.

(4) Securing essential criminal statistics by legislation in every state in order that the whole crime problem may be intelligently understood and analyzed.

(5) The immediate extension of the Central Bureau of Criminal Identification now established in the department of justice at Washington, so that the record of a suspected second offender can be ascertained in a few hours from any part of the country.

(6) Renewed efforts to secure proper pistol legislation.

(7) The general establishment of a uniform pardon and parole system designed to eliminate many of the present evils.

• The proposals of the National Crime Association as outlined above are designed to eliminate the various avenues by which criminals have escaped punishment in the past, and with their efforts checked along these lines, law violators are expected to feel more heavily the arm of the law as it is applied to the various offenses against society. A strict application of the suggestions would give the country more convictions and an increased respect for the law.

The matter is deserving of the serious consideration of the public for without the support of the citizens of this country, the changes in criminal procedure cannot be effected. Public favor must be elicited in behalf of this most important movement and sentiment should be aroused as to place into immediate operation such campaigns as may be necessary to bring about legislative action embodying the suggestions of the National Crime Association.

The Admiral's idea seemed to be nothing more not less than that we should get a dollar's worth of Navy for a dollar's worth of taxes.

For this incorrigible offense Secretary Wilber removed him from office and declined to say why. The action of the Navy department as well as the whole Coolidge Administration seems to be that the charges of Admiral MaGruder, instead of being investigated and a remedy found for the situation, should be hushed up and the author, of them punished

The American public in general is not in a position to know whether Admiral MaGruder's remarks as published in the Post are entirely true, but the action of the Secretary of the Navy in refusing to act upon the suggestions offered in any other way except by unprovoked chastisement inclines one to believe that he must think his department above crit lcism or in too perilous a position to stand criticism with any degree of success,




