

Approval Is Given King Will Replace To Dietetic Centre London Tenements By British Doctors With Modern Homes

NOTTINGHAM, Eng., Nov. 4.—The first of dietetics to which the medical profession of Britain has been established in an old world mansion four miles from Nottingham. Here, amid woods, rose gardens, tennis courts and bowling lawns, people who have been worn out by the stress of modern life are to have the cells of their bodies rejuvenated by fasting, by fruit and vegetable juice diet by natural exercise, and by all the natural processes that science has lately discovered to be the chief preventative and cure for disease.

Some score of wealthy people are already established in the mansion, fasting and dieting, and the list includes several persons well known in English Society. Lady Fisher, wife of Sir Warren Fisher, secretary of the British Treasury is one of those chiefly interested in the movement. She herself recently fasted for a month.

LONDON, Nov. 4. (INS)—King George and the Prince of Wales have given an excellent lead to landlords of house properties in great cities.



Principle of Home Government Comes When Ex-Crown Prince Explains His Plans For Returning To Bucharest

PARIS, Nov. 4 (INS)—Principle of Home Government today heately denounced "tyranny and dictatorship" of Bratianu Government in Roumania and declared that "censorship in Roumania is savagely crushing all free expression of political thought."

The denunciation by the exiled prince came in the course of an interview in which he explained his plans for the future and the steps which might lead to his restoration.

Although he stressed the fact that he would never return to Roumania except under constitutional conditions, Prince Carol let it be known that he has hopes at the first step towards his restoration may be taken by the convention of the National Peasants Party in November.

The Party can do nothing towards my restoration to throne will be," said Prince Carol, "and then the Party must have sufficient strength in subsequent elections to overthrow the present government. The next step would be to repeal the law depriving me of the throne and bring me from my country."

Prince Carol's face clouded when reference was made to the arrest of his friend, former Secretary of the Maniulescu on charges of issuing treasonable letters in Roumania.

"When Maniulescu was arrested," said the Prince, "they found his possession only a message those who wish my return. There was nothing treasonable in the confiscated papers which merely outlined the necessary steps for my return in a constitutional and legal way, without resorting to a coup d'etat. My intentions not to return to Roumania except by legal methods have been published everywhere in Roumania, where the censorship is 'savagely crushing all expression of political thought' against the tyranny and dictatorship of the government."

In his opinion the conviction of Maniulescu on false charges of treason would certainly result in the downfall of the dictatorship. Premier Bratianu has been cordially quoted as saying that any attempt by me to return to Roumania would be met with armed force then he is indulged in meaningless bravado."

"Amusing," was Prince Carol's comment on the reported threat of Bratianu to establish a republic in Roumania. "If the Premier seriously believes he could create a republic in Roumania by a simple proclamation abolishing the monarchy he vastly overrates his power," said the Prince.

Power Firms To Stress Importance Of Decentralization Of Industries

CHAPEL HILL, N. C., Nov. 4 (INS)—A great impetus has been given decentralization of industry in the south by the recent Southern Appalachian Power Conference at Chattanooga in the opinion of Col. Joseph Hyde Pratt, executive chairman of the Conference, who has just returned from the meeting.

"It was recognized by the conference," said Col. Pratt, "that the farmer who farms best is the one who has hundred payroll workers in his vicinity, for it is he who can include in his produce certain perishables that are not practicable for the farmer who is far removed from his market. Resolutions were passed at the conference to the effect that the widest and most uniform industrial and agricultural progress in the South is being attained by decentralization of industry and as a result we plan an educational campaign along that line, which should prove of much benefit to the South."

"Another interesting phase of the conference was the thorough airing of whether there exists a national problem and in believing that it urges that congress adopt measures to bring about a truly economic solution, is very gratifying. It is hoped that a comprehensive plan of flood prevention and control in the Mississippi valley can be established."

"The consensus of opinion in the Mississippi valley regarding Muscle Shoals, as expressed by resolutions was that, there are better and cheaper ways of making commercial fertilizer than by the use of hydro-electric power, such as is required by the fertilizer plant at Muscle Shoals, and that therefore the federal government should not consider utilizing the power from the plant.
