**Tower Shooting Recalled**

NEW YORK (AP) — In the midst of all the controversy regarding excessive violence in the entertainment media comes a new film about a young man who goes inexplicably berserk and becomes a mass-murdering sniper.

The film, appropriately titled "Targets," is reminiscent of the "Targets" of Texas tower shootings in the summer of 1966, which resulted in the deaths of 17 persons.

It is a first film for Peter Bogdanovich, a handsome, clean-shaven New Yorker-gone-West, who has turned to Bogdanovich, a freelance film critic and author "gone bad," went into do-it-yourself movie-making in a big way.

With backing from Roger Corman, independent producer-director of a number of the successful youth market motorcycle gang pictures, Bogdanovich wrote, produced and directed "Targets"—and took an acting part in it, too. And, in keeping it in the family, Polly Pratt—Mrs. Bogdanovich—was the set designer.

Corman provided the money, somewhat less than \$200,000, and that master of the horror film, Boris Karloff, with whom he had a two-day commitment, Bogdanovich did the rest.

But why choose violence as a subject, particularly when both movie and television producers are rethinking the issue in light of the recent furor?

"Violence is not really the subject," Bogdanovich objects. "And this idea that violence in films is dangerous to our morals is inaccurate," he added, cautioning that he was speaking only of movies, not television.

**London Co. Money Maker**

LONDON (AP) — The biggest private money-making company in the world—produces 40 million banknotes a week—started out by making straw hats and paper bonnets.

Now entry dogs, television cameras and high fences guard the Thomas De La Rue and Co. factory where the firm prints currency for 79 countries around the world.

Company engravers work by hand while De La Rue's security men seek space age scientific techniques to combat counterfeiters.

Pick up a piece of paper money anywhere in North America, Western Europe or the Communist world and whether it bears exotic engravings of flowers or elephants, kings or presidents, chances are it was designed and printed in Britain by De La Rue.

A subsidiary company, De La Rue Giori of Switzerland, makes most of the printing presses used in countries that produce their own currency. U. S. dollar bills and Russian rubles come from De La Rue presses. And during the American Civil War, De La Rue printed five-cent stamps for the Confederate states—the only American stamps ever made abroad.

The company dates back to 1818 when printer Thomas De La Rue left the channel island of Guernsey, came to London and started making paper hats which, until money promptly went out of fashion, the drawing teacher of Queen Victoria, then a princess, offered to finance De La Rue and he became a fashionable stationer.

He invented the world's first art paper, then turned to mass producing playing cards. His growing company produced the first envelope machine. In 1855 the firm began making postage stamps and by 1879 it was printing all the stamps in Britain. In 1881, 13 years after De La Rue died, the firm introduced the world's first fountain pen.

When paper money came along, De La Rue began printing that, too. By World War II, the company was operating around the world. It shipped Chinese money over the Burma Road and moved its operations to Burma and India when its plant in Britain was wiped out by German bombs. In an underground depot in England, the company cached a mountain of money printed for the exiled governments of France, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Greece, Belgium and Yugoslavia for post-war use.

In its new factory at Gateshead near Newcastle, more than 1,900 employees work in shifts around the clock. Teams of girls inspect every note printed. To prevent anyone from running off a few extra million for himself, a constant account is kept of every square inch of paper in the plant. Leftover paper is burned, sometimes in front of an embassy representative from the country whose money came off the presses.

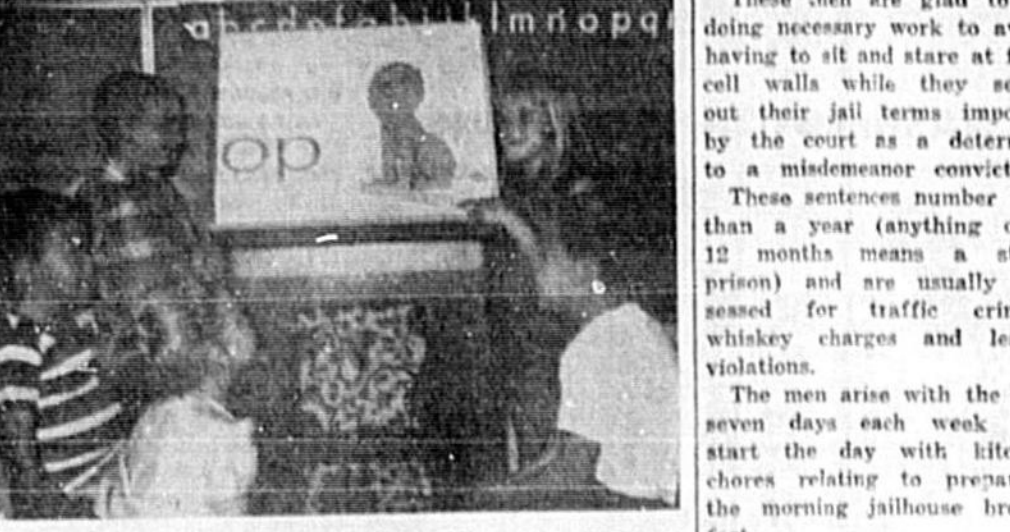

Pesticide Invasion

TALLAHASSEE — Mounting evidence that non-degradable or "hard" pesticides and detergents cause alarming and injurious changes in man's total environment has led the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission to express concern over the potential menace to Florida's wildlife resources.

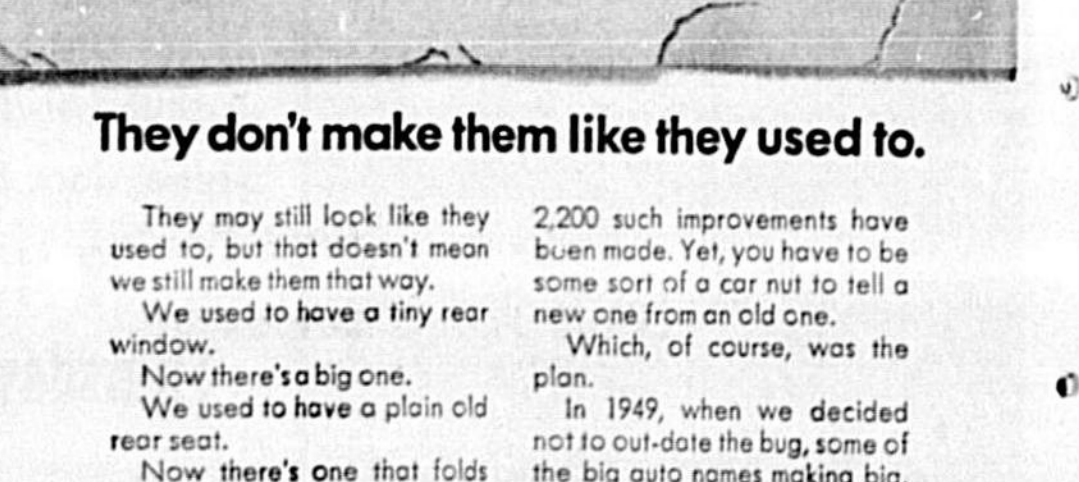
The commission, meeting in Ocala recently, adopted a resolution against the use of "hard" pesticides and detergents and encouraged the use of effective non-persistent substitutes and biological controls in place of persistent chemicals.

Text of the resolution follows: WHEREAS, non-degradable or "hard" pesticides and detergents are now known to be polluting our environment, and these chemicals are dangerous because they are persistent or "hard" and are injurious to many forms of life; and

WHEREAS, there are other pesticides and detergents that may substitute and are known to break down into harmless compounds much more rapidly in the environment.

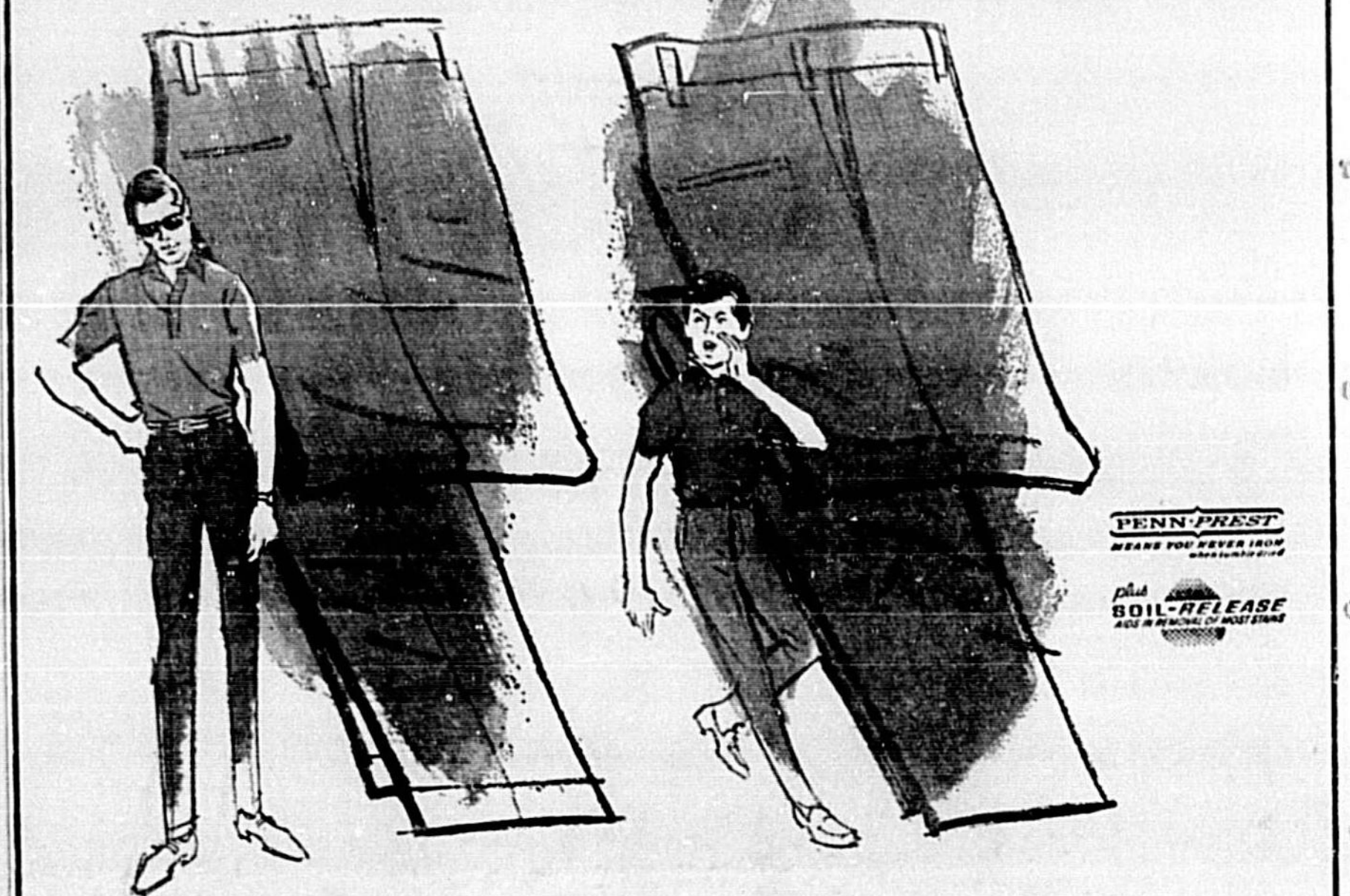

## Romantic Look In Fashions

LONDON (AP) — Boys and girls in the swinging set may be dressing more and more alike, but fashion is unlikely to become sexless, says Joanne Drogden, the new head of London's School of Fashion.

"Ladies' trouser suits are not really very masculine in cut," she says. "Women don't really want to look like men."

She sees the future of fashion as a battle between space-age modeled clothing and a human yearning for romanticism, with frills and furbelows.

The tall, attractive 37-year-old brunette, favors classic Chanel styles personally, but thinks "the romantic look is surely the coming thing, and could be great if it carries over into behavior, manners and social mores."

After all, says Miss Drogden, "that's what fashion ought to do. It's not just concerned with clothes."

The job she steps into when school resumes in the fall is probably the most important in the business. The London School of Fashion, founded in 1948 and a branch of the Royal College of Art, has earned the reputation of turning out England's foremost young designers. It trains only 4 students a year—the pick of talent from art schools—and nearly all of them step straight into top jobs in the rag trade. Many have won international fame, among them Hylan Booker (an American), Maggie Shephard and Osme Clark (Irish), Graham Smith and Peter Shepherd (milliners) and Moya Bowler (shoes).

Miss Brogden, in private life Mrs. Frederick Dubery, wife of a London artist, was named to take over from Janine Ironside, who quit because the School of Fashion was not allowed to award degrees, a privilege granted to the rest of the Royal College of Art this year.

"Of course, I think we ought to award degrees too," the new head explains. "But I'm optimistic. I think they will let us award M.A. degrees soon—as soon as the councils have time to sort it out."

One of the things Miss Brogden is pleased about is the research unit now operating in the school—"although of course our equipment isn't really sufficient yet."

The research emphasis is on plastics and molded clothing. The garment is made in one piece, without seams or sewing, something like the "wax" plastic bucket is stamped out.

A 22-year-old student, Victor Herbert, "is making great progress in the subject," Miss Brogden says.

"But I don't believe everybody will be wearing molded clothing in 10 years," she adds. "Some people say there just won't be enough cotton and wool and natural fibers to clothe everybody as the population grows. Of course, synthetics are important, but I can't see them taking over completely."

"Side by side with this space-age thing there's a great yearning back to the romantic style—ruffles and swishes. I hate straight copies of the 18th century, but the influence can be adapted very nicely into modern clothes. We can do it with rich materials, tucking down the ruffs and what just isn't practical."

"There's nothing more revolting than a ruffled cuff with a gray smear on it. I don't care how short my students wear their skirts as long as they're neat and well-groomed."

Three out of four students at the School of Fashion are girls, and the new head defends their talents as designers.

"Women once preferred to be dressed by men, but I think that's changed," she says. "I've got the impression that most designers are men, that's just because they tend to get more publicity, perhaps because they're usually more flamboyant."

She thinks that the present fashion revolution started with London's Teddy Boys after the war, when the drugstore corner kids revived the high button jackets and other fashions of the King Edward VII's days at the beginning of this century.

"It was the first indication of the reversal of the old rule that fashions seep down from the top of society. Nowadays they can spring up at any interval in the social scale."

Carnaby Street's value was that it was doing all the things none of the big men's wear firms would dare do. It has now degenerated into a terrible free-for-all. My students are certainly not keen on it. It's become a 'thing' and they want to be on to the next thing."

A reader requested a recipe made entirely from wholewheat flour, and here it is:

**Smoked Pork Butt** Yams  
Broccoli All Wholewheat bread  
Fresh Fruit Bowl Beverage  
**ALL WHOLEWHEAT BREAD**  
1/4 cup milk  
2 tablespoons butter  
2 tablespoons honey  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1 1/4 cup warm 105 to 110-degree water  
3 1/2 cups unsifted stone-ground wholewheat flour  
In a small saucepan scald milk. Off heat, add butter, honey and salt. Stir until butter melts; cool to lukewarm. In a large bowl dissolve yeast in water according to package directions. Add lukewarm milk mixture and 1 1/4 cups flour; stir until smooth. Stir in remaining flour to make a soft dough. Knead a little wholewheat flour on board; knead for 10 minutes. Place in buttered bowl. Turn to grease top; cover with towel and let rise at 80 to 85 degrees until doubled—about one hour. Punch down. Shape into a loaf. Place in 8 1/2 by 4 1/2 by 2 1/2 inch metal loaf pan. Let rise as previously until doubled—about 30 minutes—dough will come at least 1/4 way up pan. Bake in preheated 400-degree oven 15 minutes; reduce heat to 250 degrees and bake about 30 minutes longer. If top of loaf begins to brown too much, place a sheet of foil over it. Turn out on wire rack; turn right side up; cool.

The Homey dessert is a cross between a pudding and a cookie. Best served with Hot Wine. Salad Bowl, French Bread, Applesauce Squares, Beverage.

**APPLESAUCE SQUARES**  
1 and 1-3/4 cups sifted regular flour  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/4 teaspoon cloves  
1 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar  
1 egg  
1 and 1-3/4 cups quick-cooking rolled oats

Applesauce Filling—  
See recipe below—  
On wax paper sift together the flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves. In medium bowl cream butter and sugar; thoroughly beat in egg and vanilla. Add sifted dry ingredients; beat well. Stir in oats.

Spread about two-thirds of dough in ungreased nine-inch square baking pan. Spread Applesauce Filling over dough in pan. On wax paper, pat out remaining dough to form a nine-inch square. Invert over filling; peel off paper.

Bake in preheated 350-degree oven until lightly browned—25 minutes. Cool. Cut in squares; remove with wide spatula. This dessert tastes best the day it is baked when the topping is on the crisp side. Serve on dessert plates with forks.

**Applesauce Filling:**  
Mix together 1/2 cup sweetened canned applesauce, 1/2 cup Chopped nuts and 1 cup raisins.

**Four Robbers Hit Fern Park Lounge**

At least four gunmen wearing stocking masks and brandishing .38 caliber pistols tied up a dozen patrons of a Fern Park liquor store-lounge, struck two employees in the head with revolvers and escaped with contents of several cash registers in a daring well-planned robbery last night. Sheriff Peter Millot today reported the robbers entered the ABC liquor store-lounge, Highway 17-92, at 10:15 p.m. and promptly forced 12 customers to lie on the floor after first tying their hands behind them with masking tape. The quartet then proceeded to empty the registers, at all the day's receipts before taking a wrist watch from a male patron. For no explained reason, John Black, manager of the store, was struck across the head with a gun by one of the intruders and shortly thereafter the robber struck another employee, Howard Newman, of Analea Park, also in the head. Both men were later treated at Seminole Hospital and discharged.

Sheriff Millot reported the four apparently had a get-away car parked in the rear and managed to escape unnoticed by passersby.

The sheriff commented that total amount of the loot taken in the robbery was still undetermined.

It was approximately 10 minutes after the robbers left before a customer managed to free himself and give an alarm, Millot added.

The sheriff reported some old clothes apparently used by the men had been recovered in south east of county and he added, "We have some leads and an investigation is underway."

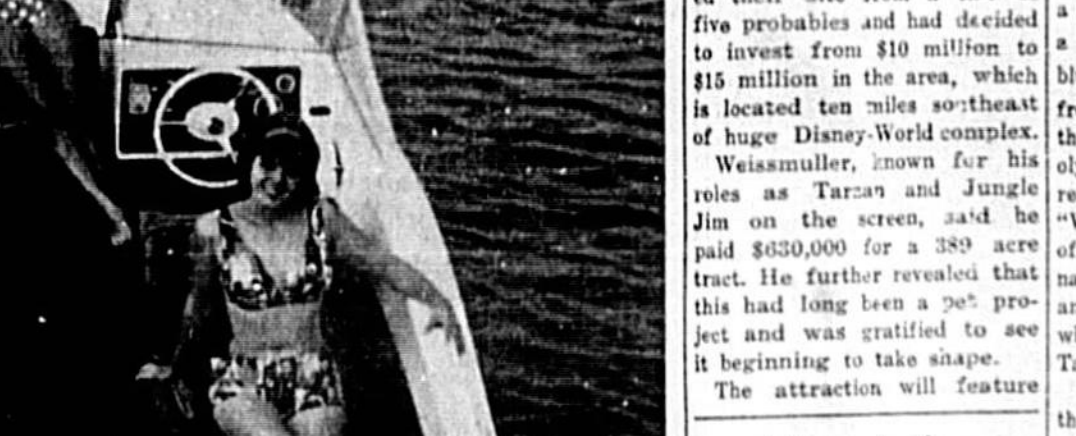

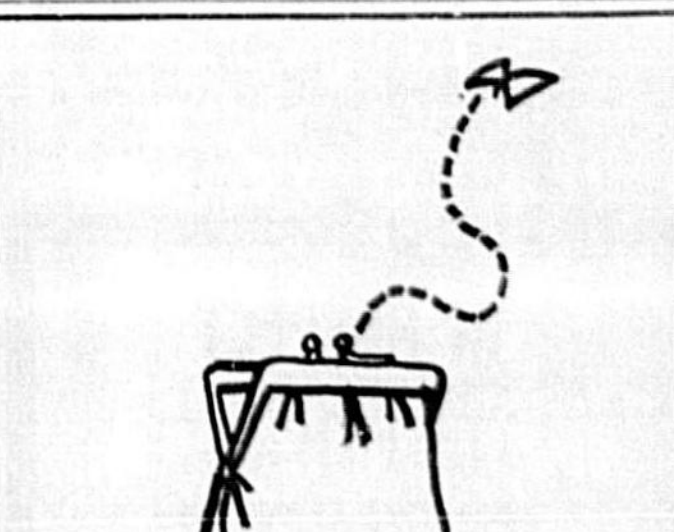
**Shark Attacks**

**Hyacinths Are Costly Blossoms**  
**JACKSONVILLE (AP)**—Army engineers are being asked for emergency spending of about \$210,000 to clear the St. Johns River of water hyacinths.

Rep. Charles E. Bennett (D-Fla.) said he has wired the Chief of Engineers in Washington asking use of the funds to keep the waterway open.

The purple flower plague is at its highest in a decade, Bennett said, and warning water traffic dangerous in the St. Johns and other Florida waterways.

District engineers estimate it will cost \$210,000 for an emergency program.
