### Former Star Athlete To Leave Job At Duke University

WINTER PARK, July 30.—Again Rollins College has reached into the Carolinas to find a football coach. This time the selection is Alex Waite who is leaving a job under Wallace Wade at Duke University to join the Rollins Staff in the Fall as an assistant to Coach Jack McDowell and to teach in the Department of Psychology.

Waite, who made a name for himself as an all-around athlete in football, basketball, track and swimming at the University of South Carolina between 1919 and 1922, being captain of the football, track and swimming teams in his senior year, has been an assistant to Wallace Wade at Duke for the past six years. Formerly he coached at Asheville High School, first in 1923, and later from 1926 to 1931. He has also coached at the University of Texas from 1924 to 1925, and at Brockenside High in San Antonio, Texas, in the year 1925-26.

## Russians To Build Tallest Skyscraper

MOSCOW, July 31.—(AP)—Construction of what is intended to be the world's tallest skyscraper was under way yesterday in the heart of Moscow.  
Designed to rise more than 1300 feet above the city, the building would surpass New York's Empire State building, 102 stories and 1248 feet tall, highest in the world. It is supposed to be crowned by a huge statue of Lenin.

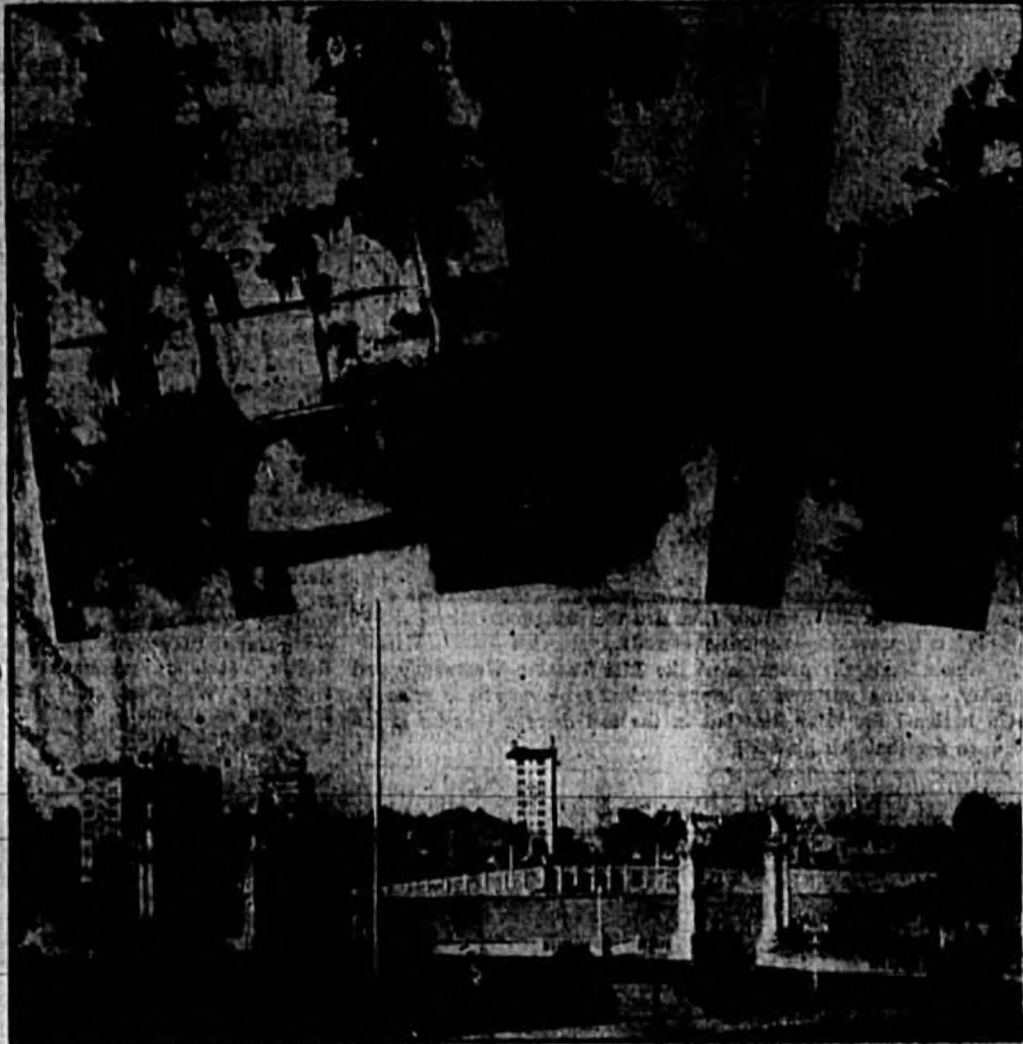

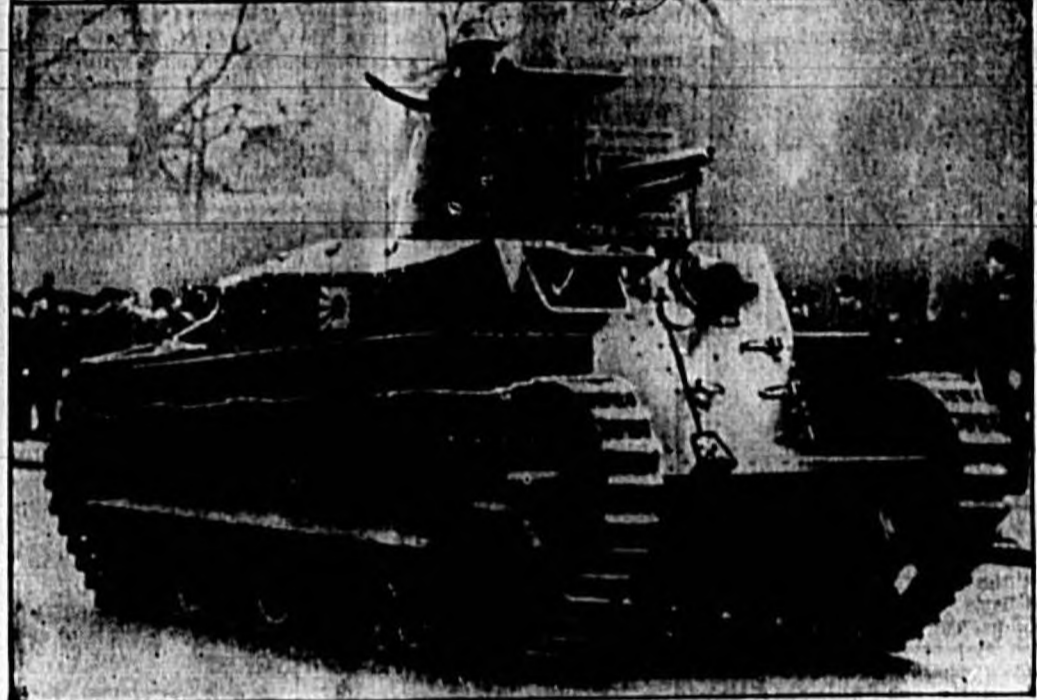
## New Hundred Lakes Highway to Connect Three Famous Attractions

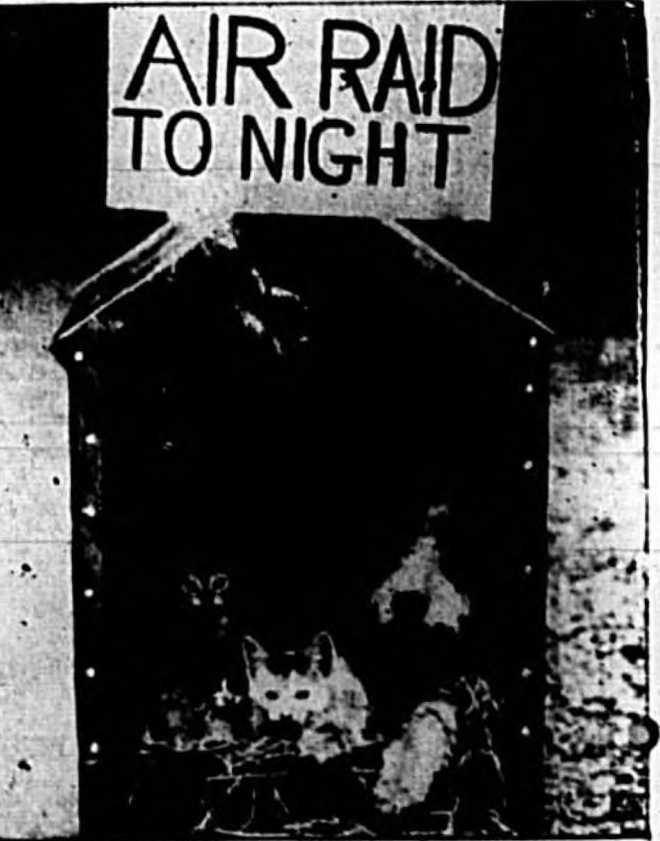

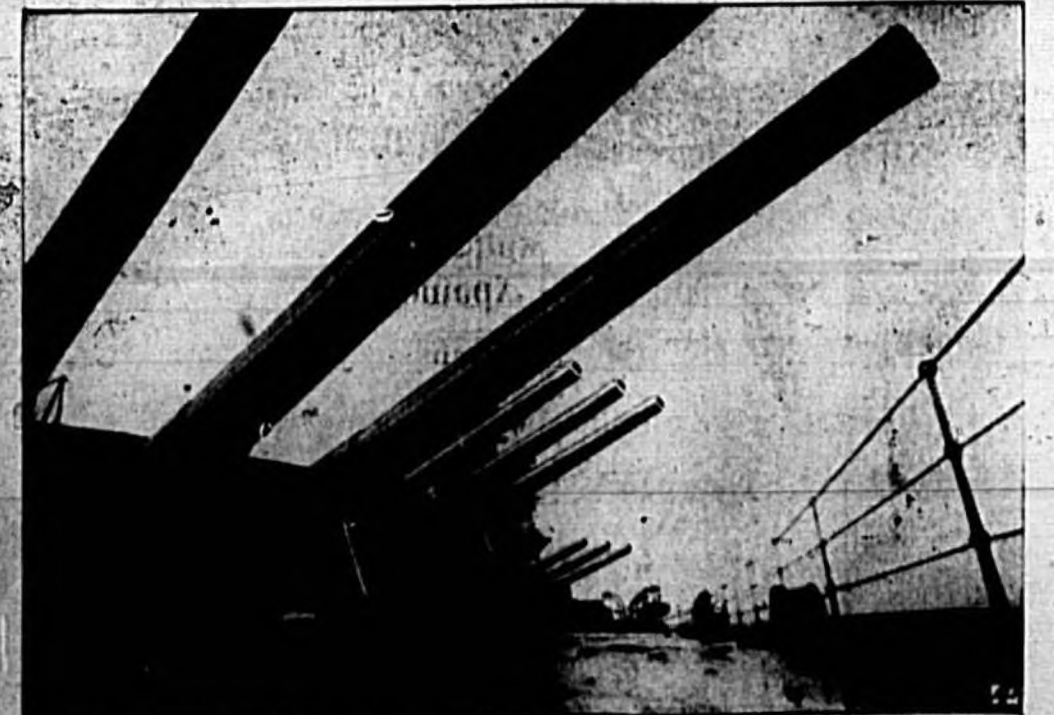

## Flow Of Gold To United States Is Showing Let-up

Increased Confidence In French France Is Given As 1 Reason

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The huge, three-year inflow of foreign gold is slowing down. With the world's biggest hoard resting securely in government vaults, treasury reports showed yesterday that imports have averaged only \$4,100,000 a day since July 1, compared with \$6,400,000 daily during the first half of this year.

Some authorities said that reviving confidence in France, plus operation of monetary agreements providing for the sale of gold to China and Brazil, may cause gold outflows in the next few months.

As passed by the senate Saturday, the Wagner-Connelly measure to regulate wages and hours would create a labor standards board empowered to set minimum wages up to 40 cents an hour and maximum work weeks down to 40 hours per week.

These house changes were written into the bill by a one-vote margin in the labor committee when about half the membership was absent, over the protests of Representative Ramspeck, of Georgia.

There are 102 southern democrats in the house. If joined by the republicans they could muster enough strength to make the vote close, but would still lack a bare majority.

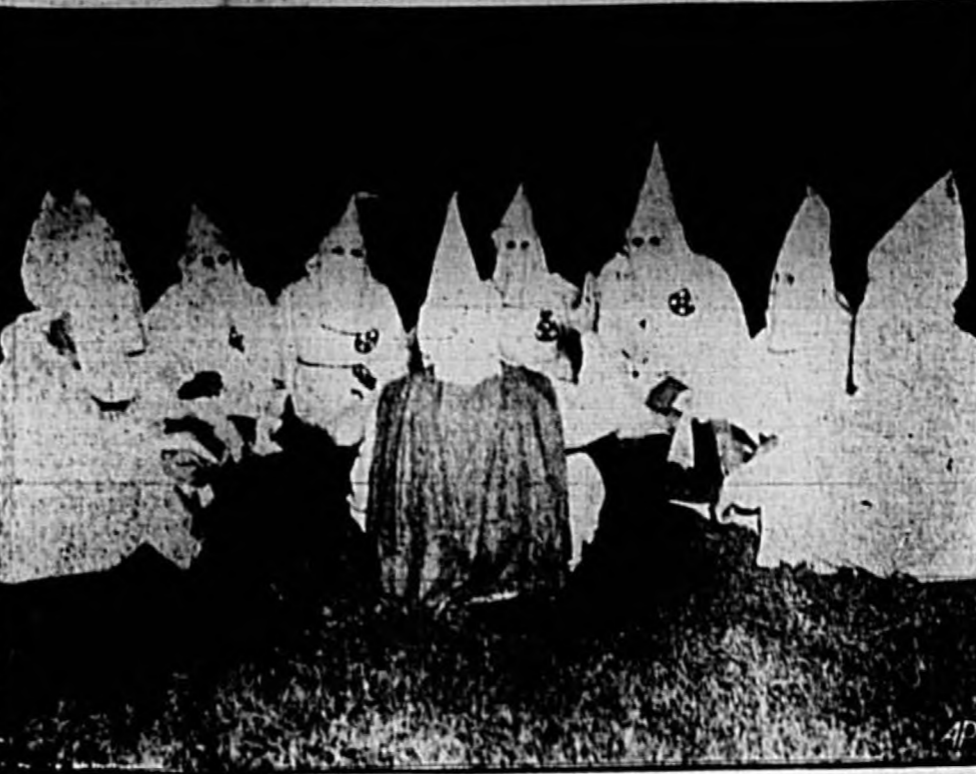

## Peiping Gates Shut By Japs To Foreigners

Japanese War Planes Blast Path In Preparation For Thrust In China Territory

## Chinese Massing Men In War Zone

Sweeping Changes Made In Nipponese Army's Command

PEIPING, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The Japanese, now completely in control of China's ancient dragon capital, closed the gates of Peiping today virtually imprisoning Americans and other foreigners within its walls as squadrons of Japanese war planes blasted a path for a thrust deep into China.

Japanese authorities said their planes had been bombing Chinese army concentrations at Peiping, capital of Hopeh province 88 miles to the southwest, for the past 24 hours.

Japanese scouting planes were ranging as far south as Tainan in Shantung province some 175 miles below Tientsin. (Authoritative reports to Nanking from northern Shantung province corroborated the belief that the Chinese central government was massing men on the southern edge of the hostilities zone. They said troops were moving north by railroad evident ly toward the Hopeh border.)

Native newspapers in Shanghai also reported the central government increasingly preparing for war contingencies at Hangchow, important railroad junction in Kiangsu province bordering the Hopeh-Chahar province on the south.

Although the Japanese asserted the area around Peiping was quiet, they erected heavy fortifications at both the east and south gates of the city.

A United States army officer and a missionary were halted at the east gate and refused permission to set out on a mission of mercy to Tungchow. They wanted to investigate the damage done to the American mission school at Tungchow. The city was heavily bombed last Friday.
