#### **Cabinet Okays New Hirings**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) -The cabinet agreed Tuesday to hire 176 new employes in the state public welfare department to meet federal government requirements in two new programs.

The new employes will work in the department's public assistance program, Also approved was the hiring of 10 workers for the department's medical assistance for the aged program.

The new employes will reduce the case load within the state department to 90 to one. The department has until 1967 to lower its case load to a 60 to one ratio to assure continued federal matching

The bulk of the new employes would be social workers and transcriber operators. The salaries ranged from 2,-928 for the operators to a high of \$8,280 for a social

worker supervisor. The cabinet also approved transfer of \$840,691 from the reserve to implement the \$108,165 to implement the

# Sanford Pictured As Booming Port With Canal

This was the prediction of Edgar Johnson, executive secretary of the Florida Waterways Assn., when he spoke to members of the Kiwanis Club Wednesday.

Johnson projected the completion dates to 1972, but said that it could be sooner, or

"The benefits of these canals to the cities along its route is inestimable. These communities will find themselves on the mainstream of Florida's intand waterway system," Johnson said, "A new era in Florida will

begin with the opening of these canals," he emphasized. One of the phases of industry that Johnson noted will come is the impact on the stabilization and development of Florida's mineral resources.

"The mineral mining industry in Florida has hardly been scrutched. There are vast supplies of limerock, delomite, phosphate, zircon, titanium, silica sand and kaolite which cannot now be mined profitably because of shipping costs. Barging will cut these costs by one half or threefourths," he pointed out.

"The cattle and livestock industry will benefit when corn and grains from the Middle West can be shipped by barge for about 30 cents.

a hundredweight, as compared to the present cost of more than one dollar," Johnson not-

On flood control, which will be greatly helped by the canal systems, Johnson said the \$8 million in flood damages caused by Hurricane Donna could have been averted if the canals had then been in operation.

New wildlife and fish refuges, camping and recreational areas will be created in the pooling areas and along the

nearly 250 miles of new waterfront, in seven counties.

On recreational growth and pleasure boating, Johnson noted that there are at the present more than 500,000 registered pleasure craft (over 11 feet long) in Florida, with this number increasing by

leaps and bounds every year. "When these two canals are completed, barges and pleasure craft will be able to travcl ever 29,000 miles in 29 states on protected inland waterways," Johnson noted.

He pointed to the tremendous growth of the marine business, which has helped to make Broward County (Fort Lauderdale) the fastest growing county in the state, with the highest per capita income in the state and a \$62 million pleasure beat husiness slone.

He also pointed out that it is impossible to make an accurate estimate of the phenominal growth of waterways, citing the Houston-New Orleans barge canal as an example of under-estimation. When the canal was opened,

engineers estimated that there would be five million ton miles per year of barge traf-

"Instead, the barge traffic mounted to an unbelievable 62 million tons in 1962 and jump to 70 million ton miles in 1963," Johnson declared. One of the prime uses of the inland waterways barge


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## Let's Meet Responsibility

During a meeting of the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction, held for the purpose of a public hearing on the proposed budget for the forthcoming school system year,

an interesting fact was revealed. Here in Seminole the school system spends an average of \$285 per child per year to educate the coun-

ty's children. It was also pointed out that only two counties in the entire state of Florida spend less per year per child. This means that 64 of Florida's 67

counties spend more per year per child than Seminole County. This could mean one of several

Perhaps our school system is not spending what it should to provide all that our youngsters need to assure them the best possible educa-

Maybe it means that by astute and careful management Seminole County's school authorities are getting more out of the tax dollar carmarked for education than nearly all of the other counties of Florida.

We know of one situation that existed last year where a school in Seminole County operated on a budget of \$X-number per child. This amount was exactly one-half of the \$X-number per child for a school of identical grades and nearly identical size as the Seminole County school. This gives rise to the idea that our administrators are getting the most

out of every dollar. On the other hand, when a county school system ranks 64th in a state of 67 county school systems it seems obvious that something, somewhere must be lacking. Trying to pinpoint the area in need might be like trying to find a needle in a haystack.

So, the chances are that here in Seminole the fact that we are spending an average of \$285 per year per child for education is a result of a combination of both factors.

While we compliment our elected school officials we continue to charge them to display sufficient courage to see to it that enough funds are budgeted each year to assure our children the best possible instruction, supplies, equipment and facili-

There is considerable discussion in these days and times concerning federal aid to education. If federal aid does become a reality we might as well give consideration to the possibility that the federal government stepped in - not to usurp authority - but to walk where school districts feared to tread.

In other words, if we fail to provide sufficient funds in this area the

federal government will. History records many instances in which the central government became involved in various areas of progress because more localized governing hodies did not meet squarely their respective responsibilities.

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





"Who will come here and use these facilities?" asked one City Commissioner concerning the proposed marina project.

Is private enterprise really interested?

A local realtor the other day wrote the president of National Associates. Inc., a firm which constructs and operates a large chain of hotels and motels.

He was told about the proposed marina complex in Sanford. With nothing more than that, the president - not a flunky, but the presidentof this corporation flew to Sanford and met with City Manager Pete Knowles. Following his conference this executive wrote Knowles, and The Herald quotes, in part, as followa:

"... We would be interested in participation in ownership, management, financing and/or obtaining leases for food and motel operation. "We feel that a complete feasibil-

ity report should be run to ascertain the size motel and food operation to start with; also, of course, with plans for the maximum addition. . . Upon receipt of this report we shall then have our architect department make preliminary plans for the approval of all concerned, and at that time will decide as to the ownership and operation of this project."

Please notice: The head of National Associates, Inc., did not say that a report was necessary to determine whether they would build a motel and restaurant here. This executive, we point out, is interested in how big an operation is needed.

The local group that proposed the marina complex, did not do it without a study. They employed a representative who went to the big motel and hotel operators, the big restaurant system owners and the major oil companies. He didn't even have photographs of architectural renderings.

But the response he received was highly favorable. Every single firm indicated an interest. It was upon this basis that the marina proposers decided that this was the answer to Sanford's downtown problems as well as the general economy of the entire area.

Sanford has the greatest opportunity in its long history to utilize its lakefront property. Opportunity, The Herald is confident, is knocking at the door.

An investment of an estimated \$500,000 - just a little more than was required to build the Civic Center - will open that door.

Through that door will come a pleasure craft and marine business that may not ever equal that of Fort Lauderdale but Sanford could become known throughout the country for its major fresh water marina facilities. Sanford itself can become a major attraction to boatmen.

There are nearly 500,000 boatmen in Florida alone, and they need facilities! Did you know that hundreds of pleasure craft are parked right now in Orlando dry storage facilities because of the need for marinas?

If the City of Sanford doesn't answer opportunity's knock, what will happen to the downtown area? The Herald will answer this Monday when it explains why the marina complex was proposed in the first place.

Ranger Gets 'Excellent' Pictures

Before Hitting Moon Bull's-Eye

## Shot Hailed As 'Complete

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)-Ranger 7 payed the way for America to land a man on the moon today by sending back thousands of "excellent" closeup pictures before a bullseye strike on the lunar surface.

"The whole mission was a complete success, it hit right on target," said a jubilant scientist at the flight's control center here. The mission ended years of frustrating failures in the Ranger program to find out what sort of surface would greet man when he reaches earth's satellite, possibly in 1969 or 1970. Ranger 7 "struck only 9 or 10 miles from dead center," said project manager H. M.

Schurmeier. The up to 4,000 pictures transmitted across a quarter million miles of space in the dozen minutes before impact were described as "excellent . . . not interrupted" by the Goldstone fracking station on California's Mojave Desert. At the control center, cluted scientists, technicians and newsmen yelled in glee over the succes of the missic that ollowed nearly 70 hours of flight from Cape Kennedy.

President Johnson personally congratulated laboratory director Dr. William Pickering by telephone.

"We are proud of the tremendous technical achievement which this successful flight represents," Johnson said. "This is a basic step forward in our orderly proman's trip to the moon."

"I recognize that this great success has come only after a number of failures and partial failures in our efforts to send effort in the future."


