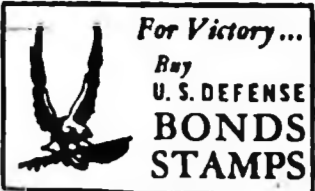

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20. (AP)—Authentic outlays for the war, plus the war funds asked of Congress, was estimated today at \$145,000,000,000 by the War Production Board. This is slightly under the national income for 1939 and 1940 combined.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20. (AP)—The Navy announced today a 4,000-ton Brazilian freighter, *Olanda*, was shelled and sunk by a enemy airplane off the Atlantic coast.

(By Associated Press) The British are maintaining their positions along the Bilin River in Burma, London reported today. The Japanese reported a heavy aerial bombardment of American positions on the Bataan peninsula in the Philippines.

General Douglas MacArthur reported fighting from the fixed Bataan front amid Japanese incendiary bombs dropped behind United States defense lines.

British-Indian defenders counter-attacked repeatedly in the Bilin River in Burma.

Fierce fighting has been under way 24 hours. The British reported successful air action.

Corridor, three miles out in Manila Bay from the tip of the peninsula, was under heavy artillery fire for the fourth successive day along with other American island fortifications commanding the gateway to the bay.

The fire came from batteries concealed on the Cavite shore across the bay from Bataan, but the communiques said the big guns failed to accomplish a great amount of damage.

The U. S. communiques said that the Japanese were stepping up their slow operations against the Manila Bay operations and were concentrating on little Fort Frank.

Churchill Names Stafford Cripps Commons Leader

LONDON, Feb. 20. (AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps, former Ambassador in Moscow and a rising star in British politics, was named Lord Privy Seal and House of Commons leader by Prime Minister Winston Churchill today in a Cabinet reshuffle dictated by Parliamentary criticism over Britain's recent military reverses and by the approach of vital Spring of 1942.

Oliver Lyttelton, known as "Uncle Tom's" bright young man, was made Minister of Production in charge of production to support the Lend-Lease program. He declined to join the new War Cabinet on grounds of health.

Lord Beveridge, who organized Britain's aircraft and tank production, will go to the United States to carry on the task of the Director of Resources of the Defense Production Administration.

Russia Reports Offensive Is Still Unchecked

Armored Forces Of Germans In North Africa Withdraw

(By Associated Press) Russia reported its great offensive is rolling on unchecked today, crushing German counter-attacks with bloody losses. The news admitted the Russians still are on the offensive but claimed the Soviets are entering on the Moscow front.

In North Africa, Axis armored forces withdrew after exchanging fire with the British near Timimi. The people of the Soviet Union, specifically are awaiting next Monday, the 24th anniversary of the founding of the Red army, expecting that a triumphal announcement will be made of a widespread liberation of Soviet territory from German rule.

The government for some time has been silent on specific gains being made by the Soviet forces, reporting only general advances. Noting the deep thrusts the Russians are making both above and below Smolensk, some observers expect this region will figure in the announcement.

Although Red army dispatches reported new penetrations into White Russia, the most westerly point mentioned as captured was Kresty, in the vicinity of Velich, which is 70 miles northwest of Smolensk and 20 miles short of the White Russian frontier.

Last night's Soviet counter-attacks reported the phony use of 19,000 troops, 100 tanks, 100 heavy tanks and 100 heavy tanks, which were repelled with heavy losses to the Germans.

Tokyo Announces Many Gains From Raid On Darwin

Minister Curtin Will Discuss Invasion At Secret Session

(By Associated Press) Tokyo claimed today Japanese planes sank an Australian auxiliary cruiser, two destroyers, a sub chaser and nine transporters in yesterday's raid on the port of Darwin, north Australia.

Australia's Parliament meets today in secret session to hear Prime Minister John Curtin discuss the war and the danger of invasion.

Swarms of Japanese bomber and fighter planes staged their third raid in 24 hours today at the vital Allied stronghold at Darwin, North Australia, jumping off point for American and Australian reinforcements to the Netherlands East Indies.

The third raid followed two savage attacks yesterday in the first of which 72 twin-engine bombers took part while 21 of the same machines took part in the second causing casualties and considerable damage, particularly in the port area.

Precaution Violators Subject To Arrest

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 20. (AP)—Violators of reasonable air raid regulations or other civil defense rules are subject to arrest, Attorney General Tom Watson said Thursday, and civil defense workers may break into buildings if necessary to extinguish lights in time of blackout.

Road Department Budget Includes Sum For Sanford

Dawson Reveals Plan For Raising Stock Feed In Seminole

Revealing that \$25,000 has been designated in the tentative State Road Department budget for the paving and widening of Park Avenue from Tenth Street South to Twenty-Third Street, Senator E. F. Housholder told the Executive Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and other committee members who were present at an executive meeting yesterday noon that this project and two others were set up in the department's 1942 budget.

The possibility that the County may increase its livestock production and the growing of feed was noted when C. R. Dawson, representing the Agricultural and Livestock Committee, told members he was arranging to have W. J. Shovel, who is connected with animal husbandry at the University of Florida, and W. M. Lewis, general livestock agent of the Atlantic Coast Line, come here to confer with the Agricultural Committee and persons interested in the following: increased fertility of the soil, the use of fertilizer, the utilization of locally grown feed, and cattle feeding.

Mr. Dawson reported he has received offers from persons who will furnish land for growing livestock feed. The main purpose of this plan is to increase production of the soil, it was stated.

Mr. Housholder revealed the Road Department has set aside \$25,000 to be used to construct a retaining wall along Seminole Boulevard, which is being damaged by the erosion of the lake. He disclosed that sufficient money was designated in the budget for construction of State Road No. 10 from Titusville bridge to the St. Johns River, and said he expected that funds would be designated to build a grade from Jake Jessup to Geneva.

In an attempt to secure funds for this project, President W. A. Leffer of the Chamber of Commerce appointed the following committee to make a special appeal to the State Road Department to provide funds for the construction of the Lake Jessup-Geneva road: W. R. Kibbe, E. H. Wright, Senator Housholder and Secretary Ed Higgins.

Mr. Higgins said a survey of Seminole County's resources, which was made following his trip to Washington in behalf of the new airport and the obtaining of defense projects for the county, will be presented to the Office of Production Management in Jacksonville sometime next week.

He said while he was in Washington, the CAA assured him that the money for extension and improvement of the airport is recast by the Army would be forthcoming.

He also disclosed that the county will have an exhibit in the Central Florida Exposition, which starts in Orlando next week. E. B. Stone and R. N. Nipper will be in charge of the exhibit, with Mr. Dawson having charge of the vegetable and fruit exhibit.

Dutch Destroy Vital Installations In Path Of Advancing Jap In East Indies

Enemy Loses 10 Planes In Attack

Long-Range Bombers Score Direct Hits On Nippon Ships

(By Associated Press) Allied naval forces today blasted strong Japanese invasion armies carrying out landings on the island of Bali, only one mile from the eastern tip of Java; the Dutch destroyed vital installations in the path of the invaders and reported fierce resistance by Bali's defenders.

The Japanese also landed on Timor, the easternmost island of the Malay Archipelago, Tokyo claimed today.

A Batavia communique reported Allied planes downed 10 Japanese planes during enemy attack on Soerabaya Java naval base on the past two days. Allied aircraft also were credited with destroying four more Japanese planes off Bali.

Far ranging Allied bombers scored three direct hits on one of more Japanese cruisers, two direct hits on transports and lighter land hits on another cruiser and transport, Batavia added.

The presence of Japanese war-craft and troopships off Bali is held to be a possible indication of the expected attempt to invade Java on a bold try to outflank Java for an invasion of southern Australia.

Meanwhile, Yates McDaniel, Associated Press correspondent and the expected news correspondent to leave Singapore, reached Batavia today after his ship had been bombed and sunk.

In Borneo and Celebes the Dutch air guard still is engaged to delay the invaders, while in southern Sumatra action was much heavier than had appeared probable after the abandonment and destruction by the Dutch of the Palembang oil fields.

This time has been gained for a grand marshalling of the forces which will attempt to save Java.

Dutch had two air raid squadrons yesterday, crew members of the struggle ahead, although no bombs were dropped.

Dutch, Indonesian and British troops apparently were fighting side by side in Sumatra.

There were continued reports of fierce resistance put up by Indonesian regulars. They destroyed one Japanese force which attacked a refinery at Palembang, the report said, and one Ambonese soldier was credited with slaying 21 Japanese with his tomahawk sword.

A squadron of American fighters also destroyed six Japanese aircraft in a big battle over the Dutch naval base of Soerabaya, Java, the War Department reported last night.

The battle was fought between 10 American pursuit ships and 27 enemy planes—25 bombers and two fighter planes—and the Japs came out second best.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, Feb. 20.—(AP)—President Roosevelt kicked the lid off again and "met" in some time has he uncovered so much controversy in Washington, D. C., as when he suggested that all the "parasites" get out of town to make way for "war workers."

Insurance salesmen, grocery clerks, society leaders, dollar-a-year-men, and members of a dozen other categories are either defining themselves or asking their best friends, "Am I a Parasite?"

And even their BEST friends will tell them "yes" or "no." Because there's hardly a living soul in the nation's capital that hasn't a definite idea as to whether his best friend is a leech, a politician, a hanger-on, an opportunist, all of these things—or just a conscientious worker trying to get ahead and do his job as he sees it.

I think it is rather amusing that the biggest protest to the President's suggestion came from people who have "lived in Washington all our lives." These people don't have a vote in local or national affairs. Their re-

presentation in government employment is negligible. Yet they thrive as the capital thrives, their business booms as government booms. Their big homes in two generations have been during World War I and World War II. They are the real estate dealers, the store owners, the utility and transportation operators, the other dozen or more entrepreneurs who keep a big city alive. They have been the first to scream that the President was directing his barbs at them.

Old-timers who were here in 1917 say: "A lot of the parasites will leave. They did 22 years ago. They couldn't stand the criticism. Those who could afford it in those days went to Florida. The others went home."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21. (AP)—Acting Secretary of State Sumner Welles said today the question of convoys for inter-American commerce would be considered soon by the Hemisphere Defense Board.

Heavy artillery firing is occurring on the Bataan peninsula in the Philippines and Japanese siege guns resumed fire on the Manila Bay fortifications, concentrating on the exposed island outpost of Fort Frank, the War Department reported today. Enemy planes made frequent flights over the Bataan lines, dropping incendiary bombs.

Meanwhile, Australia today ordered the evacuation of all civilians from Port Darwin and ordered that no lights be shown in any building within 10 miles of the Victoria coast. Australian planes are feared at any moment.

The U. S. Air Force, stating the bombs were dropped on the island of Bataan, noted that the Japs are using white phosphorus as an incendiary filler.

Chemical experts said that phosphorus is employed in setting up a smoke screen for concealing operations. They said this type of bomb is especially effective in raising fire difficult to extinguish.

On the basis of the communication, it appeared the Jap objective is to destroy MacArthur's supplies rather than lay down a smoke screen for a surprise move. The communication reported that Gen. MacArthur, in behalf of his troops, has acknowledged with appreciation the receipt of a message from the War Department by 60,000 civilians homes in Army areas throughout the United States.

Meanwhile, the commander of the U. S. Army's air combat forces said, in the wake of recent American air victories in the Dutch East Indies, that the United States intends to win devastating warfare on the A-7's at every turn.

Mal. Gen. Carl Spaatz, 60-year-old chief of the air fighting arm, asserted in a War message to the "air forces" that the war thus far has proved conclusively that aerial power is essential to the success of either offensive or defensive tactics.

On the strategy front, well informed quarters said President Roosevelt has established a unified tactical command over American land, sea and air forces.

Members of the War Staff headed by the President himself as commander-in-chief of the nation's armed forces, are Army Chief of Staff General Marshall, Admiral King, commander-in-chief of the American fleet; Lieut. Gen. Henry H. Arnold, chief of the Army air force; and Admiral Stark, chief of Naval operations.

Counter-Attacks By British Frustrate Japanese March In Rangoon Vicinity

(By Associated Press) Attempts by the Japanese to penetrate British lines west of the Bilin River in Burma have been frustrated, a Rangoon communique said today. The British are resorting to constant counter-attacks, trying to halt the enemy.

(In London, the Exchange Telegraph heard the radio broadcast of a Tokyo report that Japanese forces had reached the Mandalay-Rangoon railway and that a Chinese division had been annihilated. This account, which had no substantiation even from Tokyo, claimed the Japanese were within 30 miles of Rangoon and still advancing.)

The RAF and American volunteer pilots continued to hold air superiority on the Burma front and were getting in telling blows against the invader.

Rangoon, where civilian evacuation continued, remained populated by only about half of its normal 50,000.

The British command's last communique yesterday thus summed up the urgent situation: "Fierce fighting has continued during the past 24 hours behind the Bilin river. Allied forces made repeated counter-attacks throughout yesterday.

"Successful air action yesterday had a considerably heartening effect on our troops." Japanese shock troops crossed the Bilin at some points two days ago.

"The enemy is reported to be using rubber bridges (probably pylon spans) for conveying motor transport across the river," an army spokesman said. "These are not expected to be of much use in the swiftly flowing current."

The Royal Air Force remained in heavy action, assaulting enemy positions and transport over the Bilin area.

27 Truck Tires Can Be Retreaded Here This Month

Shops In County Will Be Rationed 1500 Pounds Of Rubber

No passenger tires at all and only 27 truck tires may be retreaded in Seminole County during the remainder of this month, according to the February quota received from State headquarters by Coordinator A. B. Peterson of the Defense Council, it was announced today. A recent dispatch from Washington said no passenger tires could be retreaded until March, and probably not until April.

The dispatch, which was from the Office of Price Administration in Washington, also disclosed that no certificates allowing the retreading of truck tires will be issued until Monday.

Seminole County tire retreading shops will be rationed according to the following schedule: 27 truck tires, 750-20 models or larger. Mr. Peterson added, and only two such models are reported to be in the county, he said. No rubber will be awarded for any passenger models. Strict eligibility restrictions on obtaining retreading certificates have been put into effect. It was explained, and it said to be a waste of time for anyone to apply for purchasing slips unless eligibility requirements are met. When purchasing slips are given to retreading shops, the concerns like the "B" part of the certificate and turn in to the Rationing Board the amount of rubber used on each retreading job will be allotted to the firms. In that way, the supplies will be maintained, Mr. Peterson explained.

(By Associated Press) A Stockholm dispatch today said three German warships, the heavy cruiser Admiral Triton, the pocket battleship Admiral Scheer, and the heavy cruiser Admiral Hipper, were seen heading north along the Norwegian coast, presumably bound for tanks in the North Atlantic.

The three warships, which were captured by Nazi Germany in 1941, the Red Army continues its advance in the Crimea. Russia reports the capture of additional settlements.

Red Star, voice of the Russian news, announced yesterday that an ever-increasing flow of war materials is being received from the United States and Britain, and predicted that the gathering forces of the three powers would crush the Nazi war machine this year.

The newspaper said "the help we are receiving from our Allies is growing continuously," and added that "no doubt simultaneously the military efforts of our Allies will grow."

Pointing out that "Germany will be weaker in manpower this spring than she was last summer," Red Star said Adolf Hitler's spring offensive, if any, was doomed to failure.

The army organ said the Germans lost 600,000 men in the first six months of the war with Russia and had proportionately even greater losses since then. This would place the total of German dead, wounded and captured at something over 2,000,000 men.

Red Star said Germany would not replace such a loss from her manpower reserves or those of her satellite nations.

Reserves in manpower and materials will spell victory in the end, and Russia, Britain and the United States have more of those reserves than the Axis, the newspaper declared.

Dispatches from the battlefield continued in much the same tone as all those of recent weeks, reporting Red Army attacks on the west and beating down German counter attacks.

From the southern front, where snow is giving way to rain and winter weather, there was word of new German attacks in one sector were said to have cost the Nazis 1500 men in three days.

(By Associated Press) A dispatch from Singapore today said the Japanese had been battered and repulsed during an air raid on the island of Bali.

Rattlesnake Dens

The increased activity of enemy submarines in the
Caribbean close to the Panama Canal gives rise to the be-
lief that the Germans have established secret bases some-
where on this side of the Atlantic. There are any number
of places where this could have been done during the last
few years while the Germans were preparing for war with
the United States and this country was sleeping soundly
in the belief that it was secure.

It is conceivable of course that submarines could cross
the Atlantic from bases in France or Spain, do their dirty
work and return home. Such long range submarines ex-
isted even during the last war. It is quite possible that
they are operating out of Dakar on the coast of French
West Africa where the distance to the Caribbean is sub-
stantially shorter.

But it seems far more likely to us that the Germans
have established bases, or at least a base, at some more
or less deserted place along the coast of Venezuela, north-
ern Brazil, or on one of the many islands of the Antilles.
From some such secret hideout a score of small submarines
could raid commerce from South America, or the Panama
Canal, and sneak back to their base almost with impunity.

It is also worth considering whether the Germans
might not have made a deal with the Vichy French for
the use of bases at the French island of Martinique or in
French Guiana. Both of these places are ideally located
for just such a purpose as the Germans would want to
put them to, and the Petain government has shown little
disposition to stand up to the Germans on any nefarious
request they cared to make during the past few months.

Apparently an iron-clad agreement was made not long
ago between our State Department and the aged Marshal
with respect to the status of Martinique and it is pre-
sumed that at that time Petain pledged himself not to al-
low the Germans to use it, or to get possession of the
planes or the gold sequestered there, and not to let the Ger-
mans get possession of the island. But this was only an
agreement, and agreements apparently don't count for
much these days.

If there is any chance at all that the submarines sink-
ing our ships and shelling friendly ports in the Caribbean
are based anywhere in this hemisphere, those bases should
be promptly sought out and destroyed; and if it should
develop that the Germans are using French territory in
the New World for such bases the French flag should not
be permitted to protect them.

The Essential Automobile

Facts and figures showing the vital part the automo-
bile has played in the industrial progress and development
of America are revealed by the Tampa Tribune which says
that is inconceivable that this country could long exist
without the automobile. Indicating the marked changes in
our way of life which even the partial elimination of this
important means of transportation may cause, the Tribune
lists the following facts:

"There are in this country 83 million motor vehicles,
upon which the location and characteristics of industry,
as well as the pattern of living, both urban and rural,
have become astonishingly dependent.

"The automobile has made available from scattered
and often distant places a supply of labor without which
newly located and vastly expanded war industries could
not operate. There are numberless examples of the depen-
dence of industrial workers upon the automobile.

"A total of 2420 cities and towns with a combined
population of 12 1/2 millions, are without any form of local
mass transportation, and are entirely dependent for pas-
senger transportation upon the automobile. Another 872
cities which do have mass transportation are served only
by buses.

"In rural areas there are nearly 11 million cars, five
millions on farms, upon which depend to a large degree
the conduct of agriculture and industry, and the essential

"In some sections of the country 60 percent of the
volume of traffic to and from the farm is carried by auto-
mobile, or by trailers drawn by the automobile. The use
to which the farm automobile is put, not the type of chas-
sis, should determine its classification for purposes of ra-
tioning."

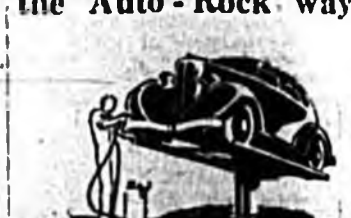

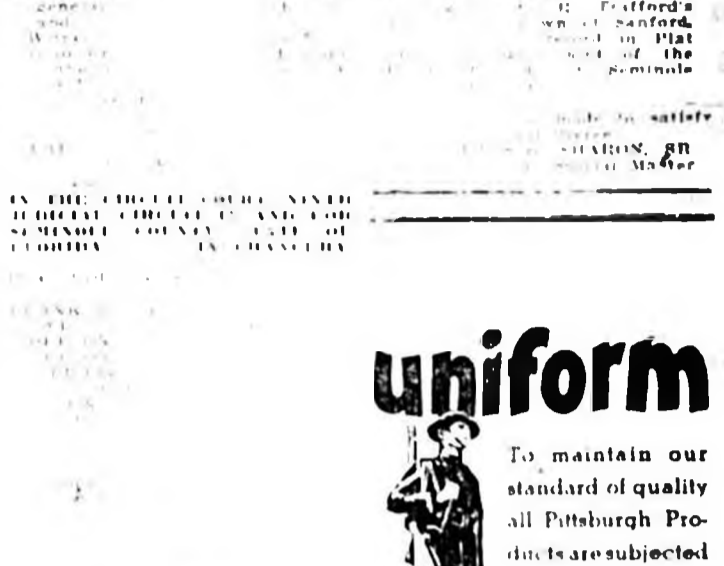

He does not hesitate by telling only of the geographical side of a nation, but he endeavors to explain the social, economic and political status of the nation under observation. Gunther elaborates on how the existing statuses in a Latin-American republic affect the United States as well as the world.

Mr. Gunther, showing his desire for consistency, features in each of his discussions on individual nations a biography of the leading men in that nation. He describes their physical features as well as their mental concepts of life. Much of the information for several of these biographies was obtained through personal visits with the hierarchy of these important nations to the south. Outstanding journalistically and historically is Gunther's work describing Mexico's President Manuel Avila Camacho, Brazil's President Getulio Vargas and Cuba's President Fulgencio Batista.

An enumeration of fifth column activity in each Latin American state is given. Mr. Gunther stresses the need of American counter-action to the Nazi, Fascist and Japanese threat in these nations.

Many things are learned in this indispensable book for today's American people. Here is a brief picture of Gunther's "Latin America"—All Latin American nations speak Spanish with the exception of Haiti, where the people speak Creole and French, and Brazil, where Portuguese is the predominant language. . . . All twenty republics are profoundly different, socially, politically and economically and not geographically. . . . Almost all of the good neighbor countries live on one-crop industries. . . . Dominican Republic, ruled by Rafael Trujillo, and Guatemala, bossed by Jorge Ubico, are unashamed dictatorships. . . . Costa Rica, at present run by President Rafael Calderon Guardia, is the MOST democratic of all the countries south of the Rio Grande. . . . High nationalism is evident in almost every one of these states. . . . President Getulio Vargas of Brazil is the United States' best friend in South America. . . . Economically the United States and Latin America are now more than ever dependent on each other. One needs the other's raw materials—the other the manufactured products of the industrial nations.

Gunther's "Inside Latin America" should be read by every citizen in the United States. Why? Because the future of our nation is greatly dependent upon Latin American solidarity—Latin American progressiveness—Latin American FRIENDLINESS.

189 Men Perish When Warship And Freighter Run Aground In Storm

Cargo Boat Destroyed Lost Off Coast Of Newfoundland; Philippines Quiet

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24. (AP)—The Navy announced today that the destroyer, *Truxton*, and a cargo ship, the *U.S.S. Fuller*, had run aground in a storm off the Newfoundland coast and had been lost with a heavy loss of life. At least 189 officers and men are believed to have perished. The heavy toll of personnel was attributed by the Navy to "extremely difficult sea conditions caused by a rising gale in bitter winter weather."

Tanker Survivors Land In Florida

WEST PALM BEACH, Feb. 24. (AP)—The American-owned tanker, the *5,287-ton Republic of Houston, Tex.*, was torpedoed by an enemy submarine off the Atlantic coast with an apparent loss of five lives. The United States Navy announced 28 survivors, two slightly wounded, were brought ashore.
