

Share-Your-Car Clubs

Most people have noticed that whenever a meeting is held there are spt to be nearly as many cars parked outside as there are people inside. This can mean only one thing, that most people come alone in their own cars. Now that tires are getting so scarce and every conceivable effort is being made to conserve gasoline, why wouldn't it be a good idea to pick up someone else on the way to the meeting and thus enable him to save something on his tires and gasoline? Why not pick up a whole carload of people?

In some cities we notice that plans are being worked out for competing retailers to have joint delivery services. In Jacksonville plans are under way for milk to be delivered every other day instead of every day. Many similar plans might easily be devised to help conserve our vital diminishing rubber and gasoline supplies.

## Forty-Three Strikes

Although considerable progress has been made during the last few months in eliminating labor differences from those obstacles which have been impeding the nation's war effort, the problem has not yet been wholly solved, as a report from the National Association of Manufacturers shows.

As a matter of fact there were 68 strikes during the month of Sanuary alone—68 of them in vital war production industries. In these 48 strikes more than 15,000 workers were involved and more than 860,000 man hours of labor lost. What this means to the Army and Navy in fewer bombers, tanks and ships, is anybody's guess.

As the Association points out, "There is no way to measure the ultimate effect of strikes on the production of war materials by other industries dependent upon the strike-bound plant for supplies and materials."
