





# When Lopez Phones Bullpen, Hitters Go For Butterfly Nets

# Sox Just Might Knuckleball Way To Flag

UPI Sports Writer

The story of the Chicago White Sox so far this season is that when Manager Al Loper reaches for the bullpen telephone it's time for rival, hitters to reach for butterfly

Because butterflies - better known in baseball as knucklebalts - are what the hitters are going to get.



# Welcome To Club

This month marks the fifth anniversary of what for Communist Russia has been a Great Experiment

-installment buying. It was in 1959 that Khrushchev and Co. decided to introduce consumer credit (one Western invention they have not yet claimed as their own). According to Radio Free Europe observers of Soviet society, its growth has been steady, if not phenomenal.

Volume of credit sales tripled between 1960 and 1963. Last year, citizens bought more than \$2.3 billion worth of goods on credit, including some 1.5 million television sets and radio-phonographs, 170,000 radios, 91,000 cameras and 3,000 movie cameras.

Credit terms are lenient: 25 per cent down and up to six months to pay at 2 per cent interest. The money goes to the state and supposedly covers only the cost of the goods and administrative charges, since it is against Marxist philosophy to add interest and carrying charges to the value of goods. (The state gets its profit from a retail sales tax.)

The number of articles available is increasing and there is even talk about letting local authorities, who are closer to regional markets and consumer needs, decide which articles should be sold on credit.

If they keep it up, one of these days the people will be running the country.

### Who Serves Whom?

While the Constitution only requires that a United States senator be an inhabitant of a particular state "when elected," senators have traditionally been long-time residents. if not native sons, of the states they represent.

They usually come up through the political ranks in their home states, know the people and their local leaders and have a familiar knowledge of their state's needs.

Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, who lives in Virginia and votes in Massachusetts, must have had this in mind when he said last May that, "All things being equal, it would be better for a citizen of New York to run for the position (of senator)."

Kennedy obviously had thoughts about this, particularly after President Johnson had cut him out of the running for the vice presidential nomination and since another Kennedy, brother Edward, already holds half the senatorships available in his home state of Massachusetts.

In a small, fairly homogeneous country like England, it is acceptable practice for a Member of Parliament to represent a constituency he does not live in. Possibly this could be true in America as well, for there is no question that Mr. Kennedy is an able, dedicated public servant.

There is cause to ask, however, whether Mr. Kennedy merely wishes to serve New York or whether it might be a case of New York serving him.


