League Facing Greatest Test On German Issue

peace or the good understanding between nations upon which peace depends."

As a result of this call, the representatives of 14 nations—forming the council—may be expected to meet at Geneva. These nations are France, Great Britain, Italy, Soviet Russia, Poland, Mexico, Czechoslovakia, Argentina, Denmark, Chile, Australia, Spain, Turkey, and Portugal. Terfik Rovito Aras, foreign minister of Turkey, is president of the council. Germany, herself, is eligible to sit in the council's session as she is a member of it. Although she has given notice of her intention to withdraw from the League and has taken no official part in its deliberations for some time, her resignation does not become effective until Oct. 19 of this year. There is no indication, however,

that she will take advantage of her right to hear the official airing of France's charges since Reichsfuehrer Hitler opposes Germany taking part in League activities until his demands for her treatment as an equal shall have been met.

This is not the first time Article 11 has been invoked by worried nations. China used it, as well as other articles, in calling League attention to Japan's activities in Manchuria leading to the creation of Manchukuo. Japan resigned from the League as the result of the League's subsequent criticism of Japan's action.

Article 11 was among those invoked by Bolivia against Paraguay, but the latter nation replied that calling the war in the Chaco "circumstances which threaten to disturb peace" was something of an understatement, not to mention an inaccuracy, inasmuch as tens of thousands of men already had been killed and wounded. Therefore, said Paraguay, Article 11 could not even be considered. Bolivia invoked Article 15, which calls for League action in the event of "any dispute likely to lead to a rupture," but again Paraguay replied that the rupture was a fact and that Bolivia was responsible. The League punished Paraguay for flouting the League by declaring an embargo against the shipment of munitions of war to Paraguay and Paraguay resigned from the League. The war goes on.

The forthcoming council session cannot properly be regarded as a "test" of Germany, although it is to be "examined" whether Germany has violated the Versailles Treaty. There have been no suggestions that the council would be asked to punish Germany for the claim of treaty violations, as it is established French officials say Germany would be sufficiently punished by adverse world opinion.

Hoover Sounds Call For War On Bank Robbers

WASHINGTON, Apr. 5.—(AP)—A special offensive by the federal government against the nation's 5,000 known bank robbers was disclosed today by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice.

"We are making the same kind of drive on them as we did on the kidnappers," Hoover said. "We have been getting set for months and are now going forward with increased momentum. We are contacting the presidents of 6,000 banks under our protection, asking them to co-operate with us."

Hoover said that Department investigators now are adequately armed and possessed of fast automobiles and are ready to go after the robbers. He said bankers should communicate with the Department immediately after a robbery.

Babson Sees U.S. Rushing Headlong Toward Inflation

Economist Says Busi- ness Will Be Good For Two Or 3 Years

By ROGER BABSON
BABSON PARK, Apr. 5.—I returned from my transcontinental trip optimistic concerning the course of business over the next two or three years, but I am not sure about what will follow. It is quite possible that many of my readers will live to see conditions far worse than those of the past three years.

I have just finished reading the income and expense report of the government for the first eight months of the fiscal year. It is appalling! For a long time, I have wanted to unburden my thoughts on government spending, but I have not dared talk frankly. Today, however, I feel that I must speak without mincing words. This is the most important message I have given you in months.

According to government figures, 89,025,000 people are now on relief, an increase of 77 percent over a year ago, yet business is at the same level as last April. The nations workers in normal times total about 30,000,000. Subtract our present army of 8,000,000 federal, state, and local government employees and the 10,000,000 workers who are now jobless, and we have 34,000,000 working in private industry.

Hence, these 34,000,000 must not only support their own families but also the 10,000,000 unemployed and their dependents and the 6,000,000 government workers and their dependents. In other words, the production burden normally among three workers must be carried by only two workers today!

Needs Must Be Given More

My home is in New England and my ancestors have lived there for three centuries. Throughout my lifetime, I have dealt mostly with conservative people. Hence, the general principle of an individual, a corporation, or a government continuing to pay out money that it has not earned is foreign to my nature.

It seems to me that we are defining new laws—trying to make water run up hill, or trying to prevent the ebb and flow of the tides. Of course, believe that no unfortunate person need be allowed to go hungry or homeless in this land of plenty, but how much of our pre-

reparedness is there?

Austro-Nazi Alliance Is Seen Brewing

Europe Owes U.S. More Than 12 Billions

Re-Unification Of Vienna And Berlin Appears As Possible Outcome Of Conference

By The Associated Press

An alliance between Austria and Germany was rumored last night as both these former allied Central European nations led the way toward re-armament among all nations defeated in the World War.

Austria is sending an envoy to Vienna on April 11 to demand cancellation of the military clauses in the treaty of St. Germain. Officials revealed that Austria is seeking an army of around 85,000 men, of whom 30,000 would be selected conscripts.

Chancellor von Schuschnigg regards permission from the powers as a foregone conclusion.

The next step is believed to be a turning away from Austria's recently found friends—Italy and France—and a re-union of Vienna and Berlin.

The trend, at the moment, is strongly toward a return to the old friendship and co-operation with Germany—natural allies among peoples so closely allied by blood, language and tradition.

The semi-fascist regime under Schuschnigg and the vice-chancellor, Prince von Starhemberg, remains strong, but few doubt that the days of this so-called "clerical-fascist" government are numbered. The government already is on the defensive.

Almost with impunity, the illegal communist-socialist United front as well as the outlawed Austrian Nazi Party, issue floods of propaganda.

Weak police efforts to stop it are futile. The police either cannot or will not attempt to check racial agitation.

The Nazis boldly proclaim that the police dare not work against their "patriotic pan-German educational work."
