WIN AT BRIDGE

The minor-suit doubling encore

Yesterday, I already recommended not overbidding in your long minor when you hold 4-4-4 distribution and have a distribution in the opponent's suit. Instead, make a balanced double or, if possible, overall no-trump.

True, this doubling plan isn't guaranteed. Lajos of London doesn't wish to invest any money, but it is the percentage approach. You keep all your options open by doubling everything in the minor in balance.

In this deal, if South overcalls two clubs (4-4-4-5), South might win game, and two overcalls give a double advantage out of the window. I guess that South should take a two-overcall defense over two clubs, but the balanced double makes the point clear.

South's trump-suit jump shows 4-1-1

points with four-club spades. Now, a sophisticated partnership would probably have North one-bid three diamonds, which announces game values with, usually, three spades. With four spades, North wouldn't have doubted what very strong South would probably jump to four spades, but if he panicked with three no-trump, he would get into a bad position.

Seeing a chance to establish dummy's suit early, South was the first to bid, then doubled a club to East's green. A double in West's suit was followed by the club bid, that rolling away dummy's ace. With a heart loser to count, that meant one down.

Indeed, one, but it's much easier to finish that one, via the next diamond, and put a diamond with dummy's spade suit. There are 10 tricks in the spades, two hearts, one diamond, one club and one diamond put in the dummy.

ASK DR. GOTT

Teen shouldn't worry about weight

DEAR DR. GOTT: I want to lose 20 pounds. As a 16-year-old girl who weighs 120, I believe I am overweight. All my female classmates weigh about 90 pounds. How can I lose weight safely?

DEAR READER: As a general rule, anyone can lose weight safely by simply reducing fat and increasing muscle mass. This approach is usually balanced and effective.

Having said this, I must caution you. There is an epidemic among today's teenagers to lose inappropriate amounts of weight in order to achieve some unrealistic ideal of thinness. In many instances, the pressure to lose pounds can lead to a state of — an eating disorder.

Because of your age, I urge you to think with your parents and school counselor. They need to be sure you are eating all the nutrients you need to grow and develop. If you are eating a healthy diet, you should be able to lose weight safely.

Dear — oh, not me! I suggest that you pay less attention to your appearance and more to your health. You can get eating a well-balanced diet, get lots of rest, and walk to see how your body develops in the next two to three years.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I want to lose 20 pounds. As a 16-year-old girl who weighs 120, I believe I am overweight. All my female classmates weigh about 90 pounds. How can I lose weight safely?

Adrian, I'm not down to one pill a day, but I still feel depressed and fatigued. My family needs me to stop the medication. What is your opinion?

DEAR READER: Adrian is recommended by the manufacturer for short-term treatment of anxiety disorders, both with and without depression. The drug is not an antidepressant. However, it can cause some side effects, including palpitations, dizziness, and dry mouth.

I believe that you would be better served by taking an antidepressant, such as Prozac or Wellbutrin. These drugs are specifically designed to treat depression. If, on a therapeutic dose, you still feel anxious, you could use an occasional Adrian to reduce your anxiety level. I suggest that you return to your psychiatrist, explain your feelings of depression and ask if the doctor wouldn't agree that a change in medication is in order.

Magnolias grow best in this region

Magnolias encompass a group of about 80 different species of trees and large shrubs. They are native to southeastern North America and eastern Asia. Magnolias characteristically have showy, fragrant flowers that can be white, pink, purple, green, or yellow. Some species are deciduous (drop their leaves) while others are evergreen. This family of plants is very ancient with fossil remains dating back 50 million years. Magnolias do not produce true nectar but a fragrant, sugary secretion, which attracts a pollinating beetle.

Care and culture: Well adapted to north and central Florida (USDA Zones 8 and 9) Magnolias grow best in moist, rich, well drained soils in full sun to light shade. (Full sun results in more blooms.) Container grown plants can be added to the landscape at any time of the year, though the best time to plant is winter or spring when the tree is dormant. Be sure to enrich the planting site with or-

ganic material. This will help retain moisture and provide nutrients. Water daily for the first few weeks then gradually taper off to watering as needed. Fertilize 4-6 weeks after planting them in March and June for the next two to three years. Magnolias, once established, should not need special fertilization. Be sure to allow a 12-15 foot distance from pavements when planting Magnolias as most will become very large trees whose roots could disrupt driveways and sidewalks.

Pests: Magnolias are less susceptible to pest infestation than most other ornamental trees. Scale (which can be treated with oil sprays) and root borer can occasionally damage plants. Stem canker, powdery mildew, and leaf spots are sometimes observed but are readily treatable with sprays you can buy at your local nursery or garden shop.

Species Selection: There are several species available at local nurseries that do well in Central Florida. The Southern (Bull) Magnolia is a large evergreen tree that can reach heights up to 90 feet and produces 8-inch fragrant white flowers. It prefers moist rich soils but adapts well to our sandy soils if amended with organic materials. It is also very drought tolerant once established. Good cultivars for our area are: "Bracken's Brown Beauty", "Little Gem," "Saint Mary," and "Samuel Sommer." Sweet Bays are a particularly good choice for wetland, pond

and lake edge plantings. These evergreen trees reach a height of about 50 feet and produce fragrant 2 inches cream colored blossoms. The deciduous Magnolias, that bloom with pink or purple blossoms prior to leafing out, are beautiful specimen trees but not as readily available in central Florida. The yellow blossom cultivars are very lovely, but tend to fade to cream in the hot sun of Florida.

Propagation: Magnolias can be grown from seeds which often vary in crown structure, size, vigor, and flower and foliage characteristics. Freshly cleaned seeds may be sown right away, but germination may be improved if seeds are stratified at 40 degrees F for 2 to 4 months. Cuttings from soft to semi-hardwood from juvenile plants should be used to propagate magnolia trees. Cuttings should be treated with a rooting hormone and placed in a moist environment. Treated this way, they usually root within 6 to 12 weeks.

"They need to be able to study comparisons with what has been successful elsewhere."

The commission supported Dale's idea to form a consulting committee. The commission will still have the final approval of any lease agreement the committee approves.

The committee may be appointed next month, City Manager Tony VanDerworp said.

"When you're hammering out a lease worth millions of dollars it's going to take time," Dale said. "This is not just a \$70 lease, we're talking about millions of dollars that need to be carefully negotiated."

The first proposed lease agreement from PRA Development President Joseph Pacitti would have allowed PRA to have first rights for 70 years to build any hotel or similar project on any other city-owned land, including Orlando Sanford Airport.

The company proposed paying Sanford 1 percent of its gross revenue from the hotel beginning in the 13th month until the 31st month of operation. From the 32nd month to the 36th month, the city would receive 5 percent of gross revenues. After the 36th month, the city would receive 3 percent of gross revenues for the remainder of the 70-year agreement.

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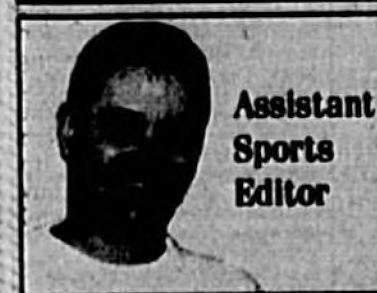

In any given group, I wonder, who decides when the group should take offense, and at what? Take "Mulan," for instance. I would imagine there's a sizable population of perky gals out there, gals with spunk, gals with spirit, with smiles as wide as a Montana sunset. Did they approve of the depiction of Mulan in the Disney motion picture? Somewhere in the world is there a disgruntled perky gal who's tired of the way perky gals are always shown as cartoonish Barbie types in movies, or played by Meg Ryan or Doris Day? They might wonder: Where's the Meryl Streep of perky gals? Femmes fatales get Barbara Stanwyck, or Bette Davis—we get Karen Valentine, and we have to marry Fred McMurray or Steve Guttenberg in the last reel. It seems to me that perky gals would have a legitimate gripe. But if there is a Gals With Spunk Liberation Society, we've never heard from it, even though experience tells us that there are perky women out there in droves. Yet some group can claim offense for a tribe of lean and hungry barbarians defunct for a thousand years. What's the point?

Disney's "Hercules" employed a Greek chorus that consisted of black women doing bad impressions of Motown. Did ancient Greeks object? Did the Vandellas sue? Then there's this: What drove the Republicans to their present state of self-destructive high dudgeon? Who made that choice, or did it make itself? Republicans are upset that the American people aren't as outraged by President Clinton's behavior as they are. They don't quite know what to do about it. They stormed the Clinton castle with firebrands blazing, vowing to kill the monster, only to look behind them and see that the village remained behind, leaving them to face the monster alone. (Democrats, of course, have been cast in the role of mad scientists. They must defend the doings of their creature even as they survey the damage he has wreaked. Who are the media in this mixed metaphor? They're the heartless movie producers who brought this monstrosity to the screen in the first place.)

And the villagers? Well, they'd probably be a lot more upset if the monster had thrown some perky gals off a parapet, or bitten the heads off a few dogs. 'Case of the Month' programs promote understanding of legal system

Already recognized as an international leader in educating through new technology, the Florida Supreme Court in 1997 pioneered an educational program to connect students and teachers with real court cases via satellite and the Internet. It is supplemented with professionally developed curricula ready-made for secondary school classrooms.

The primary goal of this "Case of the Month" program is to promote a better understanding of our legal system. It offers teachers and students a rare opportunity to develop a classroom project based on a real case heard in the Florida Supreme Court. Through this program, students will learn more about the legal system while also seeing government operating in the real world. Class projects will even be considered for inclusion in the Florida Supreme Court's Web site (<http://www.flcourts.org/courts/supct/cyber/> and <http://www.firm.edu/supct/cyber/>).

Sample case: Can criminal trial witnesses testify via satellite?

Cases of the Month are chosen for their educational value and likelihood to interest students. The very first Case of the Month, for example, posed a high-tech problem for students to probe. It was based on a real case: Someone attacked two Argentinean tourists visiting Miami, and David Harrell was arrested for the crime. The couple would not return to the United States for trial, so

the prosecuting attorney persuaded the trial judge to let them testify via live satellite from Argentina.

Harrell believed this violated the right to confront witnesses guaranteed by the federal Constitution. His case was argued at the Florida Supreme Court November 3, 1997. Materials are available on the Web (<http://www.flcourts.org/courts/supct/cyber/novtoc.html>) or <http://www.firm.edu/supct/cyber/novtoc.html>).

Through this case, students and teachers explored some of the most basic principles underlying the American government and legal system. The Confrontation Clause is included in the Bill of Rights, which was adopted in 1791 long before anyone knew satellites would be invented. At the time, Americans were concerned with abuses committed by the British legal system when it had ruled the American colonies.

British courts frequently let witnesses testify in secret behind closed doors. Persons accused of a crime might not even know the identity of the witness, much less what the witness had said. So, when Americans gained independence, they outlawed secret testimony by adding a section to the Constitution saying that persons accused of crimes have a right to confront witnesses who testify against them.

The Harrell case and the curriculum built around it give students a chance to face the same legal dilemma judges face every day. No one in 1791 dreamed witnesses in

faraway places one day could testify live via satellite in a criminal trial taking place in Miami.

The dilemma students and judges face is this: In 1791 if people had known about satellites, how would they have felt about using them in a criminal trial? Is remote testimony via satellite the same kind of problem the Americans tried to prevent in 1791: Harrell believed it was. Or is satellite testimony different?

Lawyers for the State of Florida believe it is the people who drafted the Constitution would have had no problems with satellite testimony. The curriculum lets students decide how they feel about this issue.

How do students watch the real arguments?

Each month, Florida Supreme Court arguments are broadcast live via satellite statewide. Many Florida cable companies have picked up the transmissions and showed them on local cable systems. Schools with satellite dishes also have tuned in directly to the satellite—Telstar 4, KU band, 89 degrees west, transponder 13 lower, downlink frequency 12078 vertical polarity.

Schools with satellite dishes can downlink the live feed directly from the same coordinates. Both live video and audio also are available over the World-Wide Web from a site set up by the Florida Supreme Court in partnership

with Florida State University (<http://wfsu.org/gavel2gavel/>), and Internet videos also are archived (<http://wfsu.org/gavel2gavel/archmain.htm>) for access at any hour of the day.

Videotapes for use in classrooms are also available from the Department of Education at no cost to public schools.

What's available to help teachers?

For teachers, lesson plans are available from the Florida Supreme Court Web site. The Court also encourages teachers to develop their own lesson plans based on a Case of the Month. If they meet Court guidelines, they may be posted on the Florida Su-

preme Court Web site.

The Florida Supreme Court also has supplemented its educational projects with a training program for teachers called the Justice Teaching Institute. Each year twenty-five Florida secondary teachers are awarded fellowships to attend the training program in the state capital. The Institute has drawn wide-ranging praise and already is serving as a model for similar programs in other states. 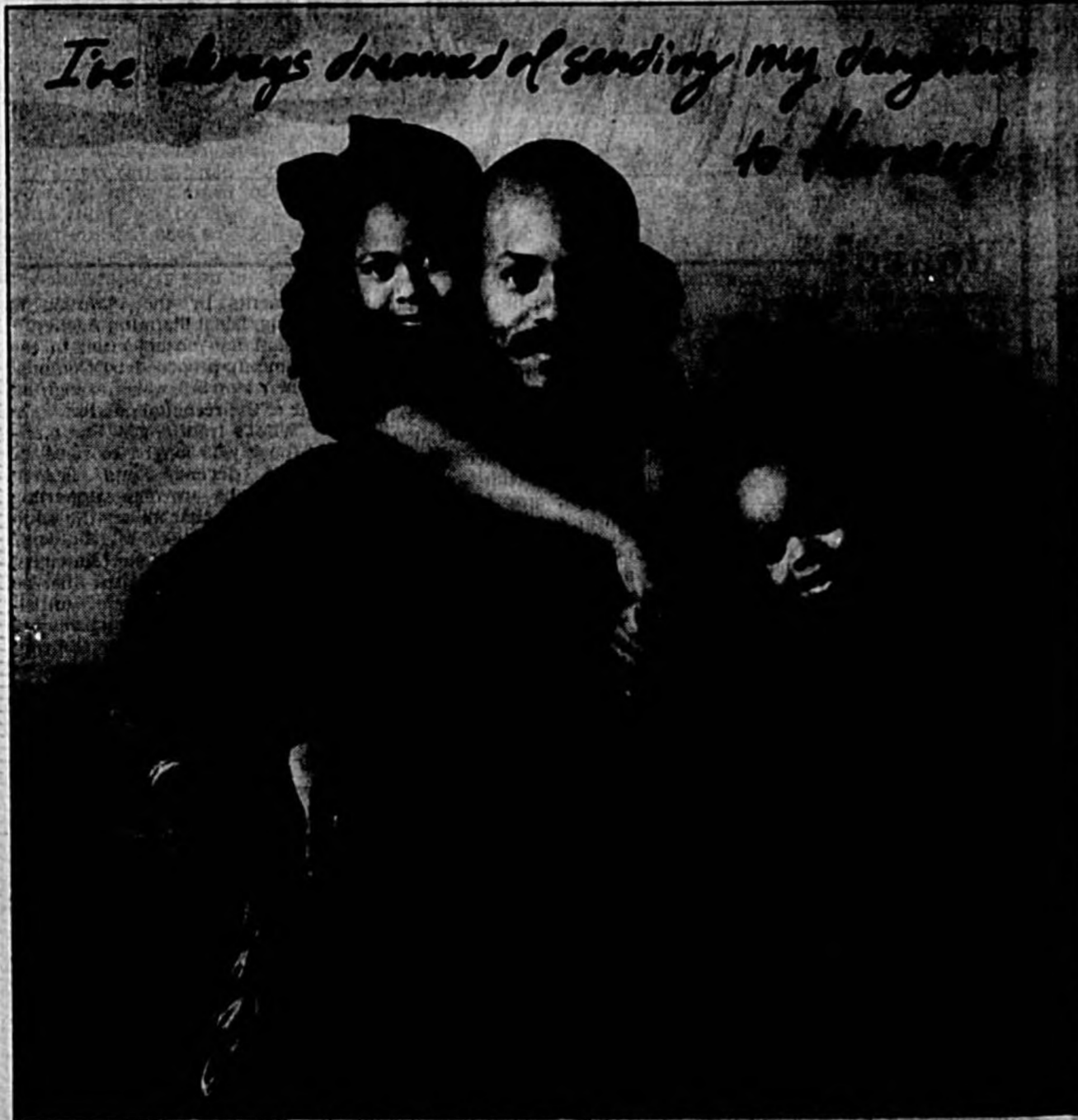
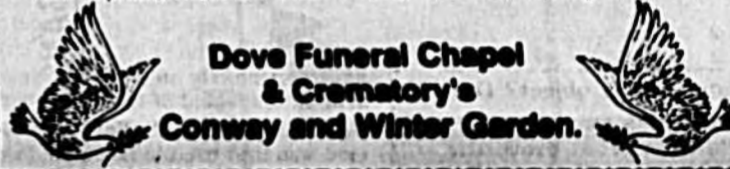

Commissioner Randy Morris, who two weeks ago sought a number of itemized provisions to be added to a proposed Outdoor Advertising Ordinance and Commissioner Daryl McLain, who strongly supports the changes, can not attend. Morris is currently on a business and trade mission to Spain. McLain is working tonight with

Board of Elections Supervisor Sandra Goard. He isn't expected to be finished at the polls until 8 or 9 p.m.

Commission Chairman Carlton Henley said today that a decision would be made at this morning's agenda review by the commission about delaying a billboard vote until March. Tonight's hearing on billboards also may be scrapped. If so county staff would be busy trying to notify interested parties.

"This is a hotly debated issue," Henley said. "We'll decide how to proceed in the morning," he said. "If the decision is to defer, staff will make the calls to those involved. We would make the official announcement at the start of the 7 p.m. public hearing."

Lease terms for Ft. Mellon unacceptable, mayor says

SANFORD - Sanford officials could take "weeks or months" to negotiate an acceptable lease with PRA Development and Management for the hotel-conference center at Fort Mellon Park, according to Mayor Larry Dale.

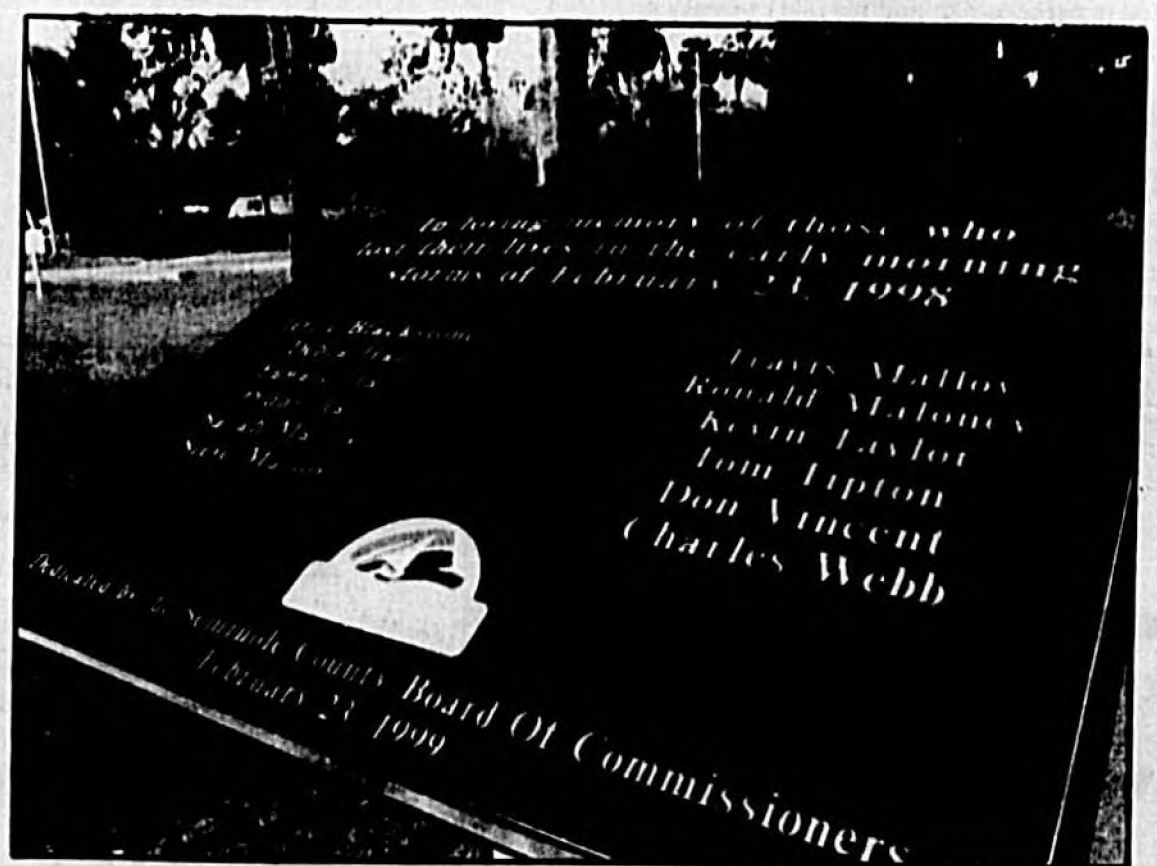
Dale, calling the terms of PRA's first proposed lease "not acceptable," said the City Commis-

sion should consider authorizing a consulting committee with the expertise to help the city negotiate the lease agreement.

The company proposed leasing the land for the 300-room hotel from the city for \$1 a year for 70 years. Under the proposal, the company would have the right to renew the lease for two additional terms of 20 years apiece.
