

AFL To Campaign For 500,000 New Members In Drive

MIAMI, Feb. 7.—Cognizant of widespread organization campaigns by the rival CIO, the American Federation of Labor yesterday announced a nationwide drive designed to bring 500,000 new members into its ranks by October.

Particular emphasis will be placed on the far west and south, but a statement by the federation's executive council said the campaign in general would be extended to all fields which have "heretofore resisted unionization."

In announcing the federation's organization program, William Green, president, denied it was in any way spurred by rival unionization efforts by the Congress of Industrial Organizations, and said he did not believe it would result in any intensification of CIO membership work.

Among fields upon which the federation plans to concentrate are textiles, retail trade, marine workers, office and white collar workers, government employees, teachers and "miscellaneous industries."

Included in the latter is the newspaper field, where Green said the federation already has a number of local chapters. He said particular emphasis would be placed on organization work among newspaper workers, however, but that "wherever the newspaper unions want to come into our federation, we will take them in."

Green said results of a recent meeting in Salt Lake City, when a "loyalty" membership drive was launched to organize unorganized workers in a number of west coast industries, had been "prompt and encouraging" and that the next major regional conference would be held in Atlanta, March 8.

Declaring that the Atlantic meeting would witness launching of "the wildest organizational campaign ever conducted in the south," Green said, "more than 1000 representatives of our unions in the south will attend."

Both Green and Francis P. Sullivan, national director of the federation's organization work, will address the Atlantic meeting and help launch the southern drive.

"The south has made great industrial progress in recent years, but cheap labor still is stifling its economy," said a statement issued by the federation's executive council. "We believe the time is ripe for teaching the workers of the south the benefits of self-organization."

Discussing the nationwide membership drive in general, Green said the "full strength of our far-flung organization" would be enlisted.

"But," he added, "we realize that each section of the country has its own special problem. Therefore, local union leaders best familiar with these problems will be called upon to direct the drive in each locality with the full assistance of our national organization."

Jap Army Hunts Chinese General Reported Killed

SHANGHAI, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Japan's northern army, pressing deep into Sulyuan province in Inner Mongolia, is engaged in one of the greatest "ghost" hunts in history.

In sub-zero weather, the Japanese were reported pursuing across the desolate snow-covered Ordos plains a Chinese warrior they officially announced they had killed eight years ago.

He is Gen. Ma Chan-Shan, hero of the Momi river battle during the Japanese invasion of Manchuria in 1922.

A thorn in the side of the invaders for more than a year, Ma

officially was reported by the Japanese to have been killed in action in northern Manchuria. So sure were the Japanese of his death that they sent to Emperor Hirohito what they believed to be his medals and uniforms.

According to Japanese belief, anything reported to the emperor becomes "irrevocable." Hence the Japanese army leaders were unable to admit that the general was alive. Recently he has become a very annoying corpse, Chinese say.

Ma's troops, organized as a "date-to-die corps" to oppose the Japanese conquest of Sulyuan province, boldly attempted late in December to recapture Pao-touchen, Sulyuan capital.

Chinese soldiers actually entered the walled city before the Japanese rallied and drove them back.

FBI Assumes Authority In Bank Break

John Vincent, Agent In Charge Of Miami Office, Puts Men On Job Immediately

\$3,000 Scooped Up By Bandits

President Of Williston Bank Hurt When Hit By Butt Of Gun

MIAMI, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Federal Bureau Investigation has taken jurisdiction in \$3,000 Perkins State Bank robbery at Williston yesterday and four agents are already actively engaged on the job. John W. Vincent, agent in charge of the FBI here said today.

Three bandits entered the bank, grabbed up the money and escaped in a car with the aid of another man and woman after striking bank president R. P. Perkins on the head with a pistol when he told one of the men he could not open vaults because time locks were on.

State Road Patrolman Melvin Drane, who arrived at the bank about five minutes after the hold-up, said the bandits apparently fled in a black sedan bearing a 1929 Michigan license.

Drane said one of the three men who entered the bank was described as about 42 years old, six feet tall, weighing from 200 to 250 pounds, and blond. He was wearing glasses and a khaki suit and suit.

Another wore dark clothes. He was about 31 years old, of dark complexion, was about five feet eight inches tall and weighed about 140 pounds. Description of the other two men and the woman were not available.

Drane said Perkins was forced to the floor at gun point, while several patrons were told to line up against the wall.

J. H. Cheely, a bank director who was making a deposit at the time of the holdup, said the bandits impressed him "as being amateurs."

Drane and Patrolman J. D. Dixon chased one car with a Michigan license plate as far as Bronson, but found it was not occupied by the robbers.

Capt. H. N. Kirkman of the highway patrol said at Tallahassee that officers at all stations in North Florida will be notified of the robbery and asked to watch for the bandits.

Eight More Days \$135,056 WPA Remain In Which To Buy Auto Tags

Records Show 2,511 Licenses Have Been Sold In County

Eight days from today all motor vehicles operating in Seminole County will be required to have auto licenses. But to date, less than half of the motorists have purchased them, according to a report today by J. H. Cheely, county clerk.

Records reveal that to date there have been 2,511 tags sold as compared with a total of 5,416 on the year of 1933. Mr. Cheely said that the county clerk's office is in charge of the sale of the tags.

The Tax collector stated that the motorists who have not purchased their tags are still in arrears. He said that the county clerk's office is in charge of the sale of the tags.

The money received from the sale of auto licenses less the expenses of operating the department, is placed in State coffers for distribution to the counties in payment of allotments for school teachers' salaries. The distribution is made on a teacher-unit basis and it was pointed out that this county receives more in its allotment for teachers' salaries than is paid into the State license fees.

In making application for their 1934 tags, truck and car owners were requested to present their 1933 registration cards and title certificates. However, if these papers cannot be located and the 1933 tag was issued in Seminole County, it will be sufficient to present the number of last year's license.

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House Okeys Reciprocal Trade Pacts

Committee Approves Secretary Hull's Treaty Program For 3 More Years

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee, voting along partisan lines, gave approval today to continuation of Secretary Hull's reciprocal trade program for another three years.

The House completed legislative action on the \$251,822,588 emergency national defense appropriation bill and sent it to the White House for the President's signature.

Meanwhile William Dudley Pelley testified that if the Dies Committee continued its investigations of un-American activities, his Silver Shirts Legion would "fold up."

Pelley, whose group was called "Facist" by the committee, told the House investigators that conditions, as far as un-American activities were concerned, had improved in the past two years.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The Dies Committee finally got William Dudley Pelley, the leader of the anti-Semitic Silver Shirts, into its public arena today.

The committee, which has been investigating un-American activities, today approved the committee report on the activities of the Silver Shirts Legion.

The committee report, in fact, is a condemnation of the Silver Shirts Legion, which was founded in 1929.

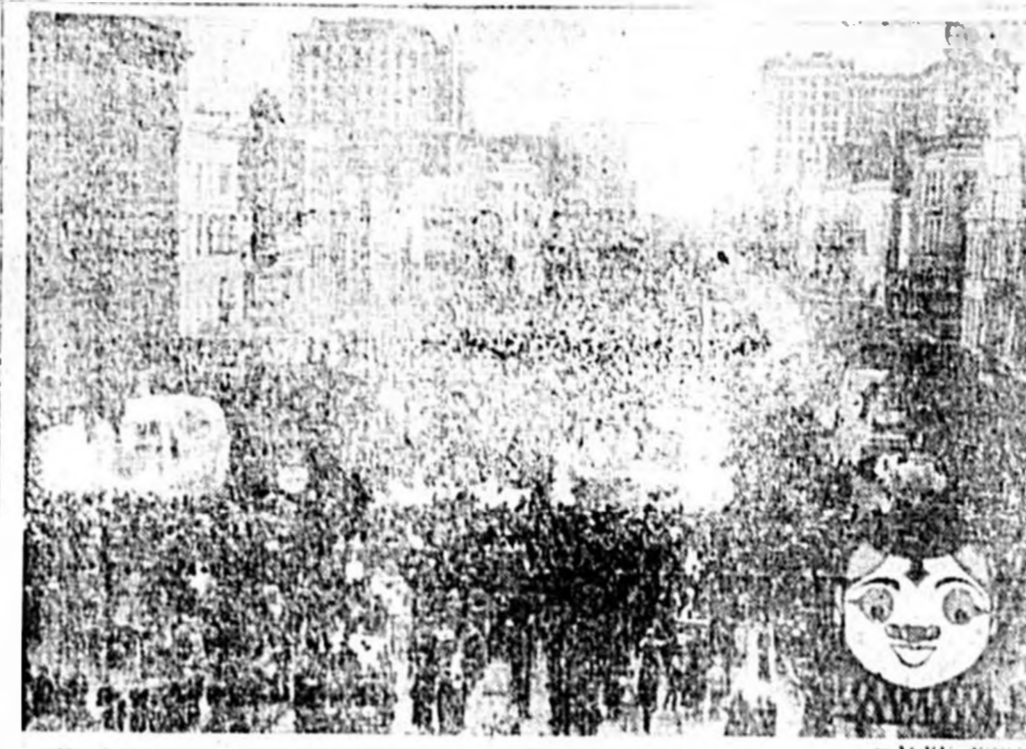
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Hundred Thousand Jam Canal Street To See Carnival

S. Warned Not To Expect Quick Nazi Fall

Counselor Of German Embassy Says Propaganda Helps

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—A former counselor of the German Embassy in Washington, now only in poor standing with the Nazi regime, can give you a few fresh slants on the European scene.

In a three-column letter to the New York Times, the former ambassador, Ernst Wilhelm Meyer, writes against thinking that Germany will collapse easily, and suggests that the Allies may have revised the propaganda if they expect to undermine Hitler.

"Of the need of raw materials and the effectiveness of the blockade," he says:

"Major land battles result in a very large consumption of copper, cotton, rubber, etc., and under the protection of his navy, Hitler refrains from any land battles, his need for raw materials will be greatly limited.

"Of the oft-expressed view that Hitler is a conservative with whom the allies could negotiate peace if Hitler were removed," Meyer says:

"To regard Hitler as a conservative is tantamount to calling him a warmonger or Trotsky capitalist."

"Of the Russian alliance, he says:

"The final attitude of Russia is undetermined; the chances of ever closer cooperation with Hitler's bolshevized Germany are many times greater than the opposite chance."

Hitler's constant propaganda that Germany wants not one inch of French or English soil is bound to have effect, says Meyer, especially when British naval losses begin to increase, as they may do with a sustained air attack. After all, he says, no one knows yet just how hard the fleet may suffer from the German air attack.

However, Meyer voices a view held widely here that a victory for Hitler "would be both a defeat for Germany and a defeat for Europe."

"It would be a defeat for Germany, for no transitory increase of military and political power could out-balance the definite destruction of all the better qualities of the German nation as a result of the National Socialist destruction of law and justice; of political freedom, replaced by political inequality and hypocrisy; of freedom of science, education, art and press; of free labor and free enterprise, of free worship and of all Christian, ethical principles."

So far Meyer has found no bitterness against the German masses, either here or abroad, but wonders whether the bombing of the big cities, so often predicted, would not generate a spirit for another punishing Versailles. That, he said, would bestir in Germany a desperate fear of an Allied victory.

"No help can come from telling the German masses that the war is conducted not against Germany but only against Hitler. Although this might be entirely true, nevertheless they are tragically reminded of 1914-1918, when they were told that the war was conducted only against the Kaiser. Yet after the Kaiser, they got Versailles and Germany was dismembered."

It is true, he said, that opposition to Hitler is developing within Germany into a solid front, but the masses, including the conscript army, will not turn against him without a solid conviction that his presence is Germany's worst liability.

"Nothing would better clarify the situation and promote peace by defeating Hitler," he said, "than the proclamation of about the following principles: (a) No change of frontiers except on the basis of self-determination for all, for the Poles and Czechs, for Germans and Austro-Germans; (b) establishment of international law, enforceable for the first time in human history because of establishment of an international police force, larger than all private armies; (c) consolidation of some major colonies into an international union; (d) establishment of a European union—the United States of Europe."

Resuscitators Put Information In Crypt Until 8113

Archaeologists of 6000 years in the future will have made the most startling discovery in the history of man when they force their way into the Crypt of Civilization in Georgia.

The Rosicrucians, according to L. A. Renard, local commissioner of the philosophical order, have been asked to make an important contribution to a project begun by Oglethorpe University, Georgia, for preserving today's knowledge for the civilization of the year A. D. 8113.

The Rosicrucian Order, AMORC, has sent from its archives at San Jose, Calif., upon the request of Dr. T. K. Peters, architect of Oglethorpe University, manuscripts containing the essence of its philosophical doctrines to be included with other chosen works of music, and the sciences, to be interred in the specially constructed vault and kept inviolate for over 6000 years.

The Crypt of Civilization, begun at Oglethorpe University several years ago, is made of stone in which is set a door of stainless steel 50 inches wide and 150 inches high. The interior walls, floor and ceiling are lined with vitreous porcelain enamel which will have fused on them colored designs depicting today's life much in the manner of the tombs of Egypt.

Every resource of modern science is being employed to insure that mankind of 8113 A. D. will find and be able to know of today's accomplishment. The problem of location was met by taking triangulation from Stone Mountain and from Kennesaw Mountain. This was prepared by the United States Coast Geodetic Survey. Plaques of molded cellulose acetate giving a description of this location are being sent to libraries of the great institutions throughout the world and even to remote and strange monasteries high in the Himalayas.

Mr. Renard says that the Rosicrucian manuscripts are being microfilmed, large pages of the text are being reduced to frames of a 35 millimeter film. By this process each page will be an image of but 1 x 1-2 inches. The rolls of film in large capsules and are shaped differently than in vitreous and asbestos-lined stainless steel capsules which after they have been sealed and evacuated have inert gas pumped into them. Fifty such capsules will be placed in the Time Crypt and they will contain 320,000 pages of knowledge in microfilm which can be projected to the original size or larger.

Cecil A. Pools, supreme secretary of the Rosicrucian Order, said that the request for the Rosicrucian manuscripts was made by a contemporary philosopher whose roots in the systems of thought which began centuries before the present era. The Crypt will be officially sealed in May of 1940, it is announced by Dr. Peters.

Man Brings Suit Against Racetrack

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Richard G. Scott is so sure he can win money on the races that he has brought suit against Santa Anita racetrack for right of access to the betting windows. For reasons not explained, he charges, he was barred from the grounds.

Scott makes his winning claim official by alleging the outer "deprives him of his means of livelihood."

GALLUP, N. M., Feb. 8.—(AP)—A sign of civilization's encroachment upon the vast Navajo Indian reservation of New Mexico and Arizona is the growing pile of tin cans near John Navajo's hogans. Indian traders report the Navajo squaws are an expert with a can opener as many bridge-playing white women.

Aside from meat and corn, the Navajo grows very little that can be used in his diet. He raises some goats but even much of his milk comes from cans.

A typical Navajo meal for a family in modern means consists of coffee, mutton stew, flat bread baked as a sort of "hot cake."

Canned fruit is popular but at the head of the list of good things to eat the Navajo places watermelon and soda-pop.

ian commercial office in Paris, contending that diplomatic immunity was not involved.

On the Western Front France and Germany both reported intensified patrol activity, but there was no indication of any more important military developments.

Germans acknowledged losing 42 ships totaling 236,957 tons since the war started, but said Britain, France and the neutral nations had lost at least 400 ships aggregating 1,493,431 tons.

A British spokesman in London quickly disputed the German figures asserting total merchantmen lost by the Allies and neutrals up to midnight Feb. 4 was 274, and that no British or French ships were among 354 which the Germans said they had taken as prizes.

DUBLIN, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Angry Irish demonstrators last night elevated to martyrdom two young Irish Republicans executed by the British at Brixham prison yesterday morning and the possibility developed that Eamon De Valera might be driven from the Premiership by the mounting indignation.

The hangings of Peter Barnes and James Richards became a vital political issue involving not only Anglo-Irish relations, but the political future and prestige of the New York-born De Valera who has been a consistent foe of the Irish Republican Army and its terrorist methods.

At Montjoy Prison, where De Valera and other Irish patriots of the 1916 rebellion were imprisoned, the demonstrators burned the British Union Jack.

Immediately after word reached Dublin of the execution of Barnes and Richards about 1,000 members of Unemployed Workers' League associated began a protest march, carrying black flags marked with skulls and crossbones through the main streets of the city.

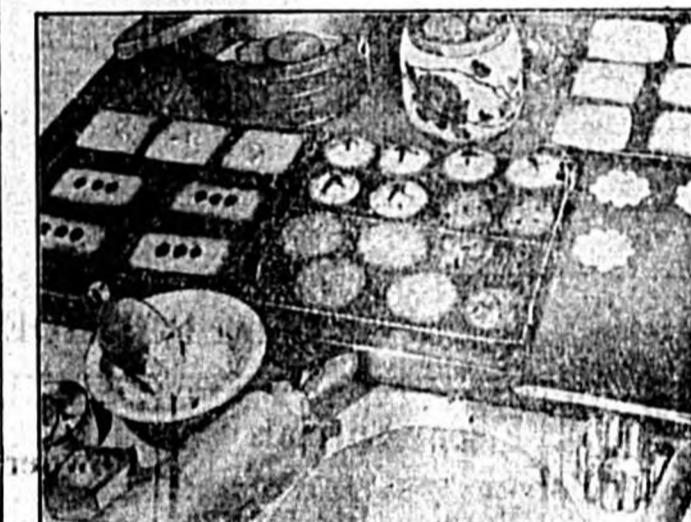

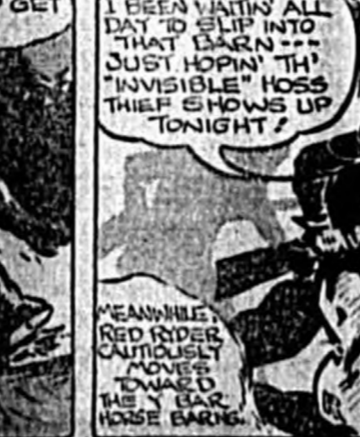

I sidled up and said, "Mrs. Vandenberg, it was you who said, 'What are you doing up here?' I whispered, "She whispered back, "Piloting four constituents around. O-o. How I wish I were in the press box with you." That's the way they both started; behind typewriters. He was an editor in Grand Rapids at 22. She was a reporter in Chicago. His father a harness-maker. They are both of English-Dutch extraction. She is from Fort Wayne, Ind. Her mother hoped she'd be a pianist. He

is from a small Michigan town where the depression of the 90's put his harness-maker father on the skids. When the father died he made the son promise he'd always be a Republican. He read her a short story he'd written, "has said, 'Why that's a novel.' He expanded it. It sold. It was getting a job for someone that made her path cross Arthur Vandenberg's again in 1918. Arms For Nations At Peace Talked

FDR Doubts Finland Will Be Able To Buy Guns In U. S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull announced today that conversations of an "informal character" have been commenced with neutral governments in view of the "urgent desire of all neutral nations" for a general restoration of world peace.

Hull said the conversations involve the plan or plan for the nature of preliminary inquiries relating to a general international economic conference and world-wide reduction of armaments.

He said the conversations were being conducted in accordance with the executive order issued by President Roosevelt in 1937, which authorized the secretary of state to conduct such negotiations.

Hull said he had been instructed to make preliminary inquiries in the name of the United States government.

He said the conversations are being conducted in a confidential manner and that no public statement will be made until the negotiations have reached a certain stage.

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Battle Of Withlacoochee Described By Speaker At Founders Day Lunch

Appropriate Ceremony Marks Planting Of Magnolia Tree In Fort Mellon Park In Honor Of James L. Moughton

An outstanding episode in the Seminole Indian War, "The Battle of Withlacoochee," and one in which Capt. Charles Mellon, founder of Melbourne which later became Sanford, was cited for valor in action, was described by Samuel E. Cobb, of Washington, D. C., director of National Archives, at the Founder's Day luncheon held in the Mayfair Hotel yesterday afternoon.

The occasion commemorating the 103rd anniversary of the establishment of Fort Mellon on the shores of Lake Mellon which is generally regarded as the beginning of Sanford, was under the auspices of the Florida Historical Society and the Sons and Daughters of Territorial Florida.

Following the luncheon a tree was planted in Fort Mellon Park in honor of Superintendent of Parks James L. Moughton with appropriate ceremonies.

Mr. Cobb was introduced by Prof. A. J. Hanna of Winter Park, president of the Florida Historical Society and Hollins College faculty member.

Prior to the beginning of the Seminole Indian War in 1832, the speaker said, Florida was a wilderness and the greatest period of its history. As a result of the war, the territory was divided into two republics, each with its own constitution and laws.

Mr. Cobb related, among the incidents of the war, the capture of the Seminole Indians and the removal of the Seminoles to the West Indies.

The speaker said that the Seminole Indians were a brave and fighting race and that they were not easily defeated.

Blasts Are Felt Twenty Miles Away

Fireworks Plant Explodes In California, Houses Damaged, None Injured

REDONDO BEACH, Calif., Feb. 9.—(AP)—Explosions so violent that people 20 miles away thought they felt the earthquake today shattered a fireworks plant but by some curious chance apparently none were killed.

The blast damaged a house in which people lay sleeping, and debris from one shanty roof partially buried two people. Police said it was almost incredible there was no loss of life.

Three persons were cut by shrapnel, and flying debris, and one man slipped in a pool of 100 feet from the factory lot, all leveled by the blast, were unscathed.

Damage was estimated at \$200,000. The cause was not determined.

The plant was owned by the Redondo Beach Fireworks Co. and was operated by a man named James.

The explosion occurred at about 10:30 p. m. and was heard for miles around.

No one was injured and there was no damage to life or property.

MIAMI, Feb. 9.—(AP)—President Roosevelt was asked by the American Federation of Labor yesterday to reverse what both the AFL and its CIO rival had said they would do toward settlement of their bitter feud.

Fruit Shipping Resumed After Week Embargo

Citrus Men Say Big Scale Traffic To Be Delayed Somewhat

LAKELAND, Feb. 9.—(AP)—The week-long embargo on citrus ended at 6:00 o'clock last night, but fruit men said it would be some time before large-scale shipments could be resumed because of restrictions on packing houses and shippers' control committees.

State citrus inspectors returned to their posts last night, nevertheless, and will resume certification of fruit for shipment out of the state.

The effectiveness of the embargo was shown in statistics on shipments compiled by the federal-state markets news service here. On Friday, the last day of certification and inspection before the embargo, 589 cars of oranges, tangerines and grapefruit left the state.

Shipment of fruit of grades U. S. no. 3 and lower is prohibited and any fruit having as many as six damaged pieces per 100 is graded No. 3.

Because of a large supply of fruit picked and shipped before the effective date of the embargo, the consumer was able to buy citrus during the time the ban was in effect.

British Are Attacked By Air Raiders

English Engage Sky Marauders In Series Of Combats, Down One Enemy Ship

Capture Of Forts Claimed By Reds

Allies Reported To Have Half Million Men In Near East

British fighting planes, rising to meet German bombers along Britain's coast in a new wave of attacks against merchant shipping, engaged the raiders in a series of combats, and shot down one near the Firth of Forth. Raids were the first since last week.

Elsewhere enigmatic Russia, and embattled Finland presented contrary pictures of their conflict, in which the Finns reported smashing renewed Red army attacks on the Mannerheim line with heavy Russian losses, while in restless southeastern Europe there were significant activities.

Unusually informative Leningrad headquarters in a communique claimed the Reds captured 13 steel concrete "artillery forts" on the Mannerheim line, and inflicted "great losses" on the Finns.

Turkey followed yesterday's seizure of the German-occupied Krupp shipyards by dispatching 100 German technicians employed by the war and naval ministries, giving them 48 hours to leave the country.

In Paris the Chamber of Deputies discussed behind closed doors the government's conduct of the war. Daladier announced that raids on German police offices in France had disclosed searching questions on French public opinion.

There were only scanting clashes on the Western Front.

HELSINKI, Feb. 9.—(AP)—The Finnish high command announced last night that "several thousand" Russians were killed when 50,000 enemy troops were hurled back before the Mannerheim line and indicated that the Red army is preparing to smash a new attempt to cut Finland in half at her narrow waistline.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Sixteen prelates of the Catholic Church in America called the AFL committee that he and his associates would be forced to postpone the negotiations because of other business.

They promised to inform the AFL committee when he would be ready to resume negotiations.

Ten months have passed since then. The AFL committee still is waiting to hear from the leader of the CIO.
