## Gasoline Explosion Kills 33 Persons In Dance Hall

### By Others Injured Blast Destroys Buildings And Fire Adds To Calamity

### Men Strive To Reach Victims

### Least Sixty People Were Present When Large Tank Let Go

WEST PLAINS, Mo., April 13.—Thirty-three persons were killed and many seriously injured when a terrific gasoline explosion rocked a crowded dance hall.

Rescuers dragged victims from beneath fiery embers as they caved in and mountains of molten lava engulfed tongues of flame.

The weekly dances drew a crowd of many surrounding towns. The fire following the explosion killed many persons in the dance hall and their bodies were burned.

Among those missing are: Robert Mullins, grain dealer, Mrs. Peter McFarland, Undertaker, Mrs. Robert Airby, Levy Reed, and others.

## FEDERAL COURT ISSUES ENJOINER AGAINST I. C. C.

RICHMOND, Va., Apr. 14.—(INS)—The Interstate Commerce Commission today was enjoined from preventing railroads serving southern mines shipping coal to the Great Lakes for trans shipment to the Northwest.

In effect the court held that entering the order complained of, the commission exceeded its powers. It said the injunction will result in a reduction in the freight rates which the railroads are willing to make and will enable the public to obtain the benefit of lower rates.

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## German Flyers Win Battle To Conquer Westward Flight

### GERMANS REJOICE OVER SUCCESS OF ATLANTIC FLYERS

### Country's Leaders, Who Had Been Skeptical Of Under- taking, Extend Congratu- lations To Successful Men

BERLIN, Apr. 14.—(INS)—After being plunged into the depths of gloom and despair Germany was awakened today by the joyous news that Captain Koehl, Baron Von Huenefeld and their Irish companion had safely landed in America.

Newsboys ran through the streets with extras. Thousands of papers were avidly bought up in a few minutes. Promptly celebrations were started everywhere.

Yesterday the flight had been stamped a foolhardy "sporting enterprise." Today it is hailed as a triumph for Germany. All the highest government officials expressed their joy at the successful outcome of the venture and sent congratulatory messages to the relatives of the fliers.

## Washington Police Arrest Picketers Demanding Recall

WASHINGTON, Apr. 14.—(INS)—A handful of police today arrested 107 sympathizers of General Sandino, Nicaraguan liberal leader, as they started to picket the White House carrying placards demanding recall of United States Marines from Nicaragua.

The demonstration had been publicly announced and police reserves were on hand to break it up. The arrests were made under an order which prohibits display of banners or advertising on public park grounds without a permit.

## Trans-Atlantic Bird- men Reach Almost Deserted Island Off Coast Of Labrador

### Shortage Of Gas Terminates Hop

### Plane's Propellor Is Smashed And Land- ing Gear Is Damaged

NEW YORK, April 14.—(INS)—The North Atlantic Ocean has at last been spanned in a westward flight.

The silver-gray monoplane Bremen is at Greenly Island, seven miles off the coast of Labrador, after an epochal 34-hour flight during which it battled grimly against sleet, snow, rain and headwinds.

Captain Herman Koehl, Commandant James E. Fitzmaurice and Baron Ehrenfried Von Huenefeld are safe but they are marooned on an icebound island.

The Bremen was forced to alight because it ran out of fuel in its exhaustive fight against the elements. In landing the plane's propeller was smashed and its landing gear was slightly damaged.

Should the efforts to rescue the Bremen fliers by ice-breaker and plane fail, the fliers may have to resort to dog-sled. In that case they face a journey of many days.

The United Florida Movement

The United Florida Movement, recently launched by the State Chamber of Commerce, is one of the most needed undertakings which this active organization could sponsor. While dangerous propaganda was being circulated about Florida throughout the North during the boom, Florida suffered much from a lack of co-ordination among its civic bodies trying to combat these insidious reports.

As we understand it, this United Florida Movement seeks "to unite within itself various endeavors and diversified interests to present the case for Florida with the full force of the state's appeal." The Jacksonville Journal, which gives this explanation, goes on to say:

"Undoubtedly too much lost motion results from unrelated, although well-intentioned effort. Florida has suffered much from that condition of affairs. It is not to be questioned that the state would be in a better position to push its advantages if it had learned years sooner that the best results are to be achieved by a centralized drive. A football team with a massed well-directed attack, even though it has few all-American players, will score more touchdowns than an all-star team working at cross purposes.

"The state chamber offers a medium for uniting statewide civic enterprise. It merits support and the opportunity to become a more effective vehicle to speak for Florida. There are many movements in which localities of Florida have a common interest, both concerning betterment of conditions at home, and in promoting the state's interests beyond its terrain. In the state chamber it has an organization which can speak for Florida and assume a civic leadership which will marshal the forces that are to be relied upon to promote a better Florida. But in giving it the ball to carry, Floridians must give it unstinted active support.

"The state chamber has presented to the people of Florida a workable program, one that is enlightening and comprehensive. It understands its mission and is prepared to carry it out if it is given the means with which to proceed, which can be provided by membership. It already has done an excellent service in its study of the citrus problem. This is but one of the questions before Florida which must be weighed with a perspective that is state-wide. In trying to crystallize the sentiment of Florida to make it effective as a single force it is trying to do that which Florida must do to reach its destiny with the least waste of effort."

Headlines Of History

A man named Gutenberg invented movable type, the backbone of the newspaper business, as long ago as the fifteenth century, but it was not until shortly before our own Civil War that anything like the newspapers which we see today began to appear.
