They were seeking the sea where the waters were to divide, as for the children of Israel, and give them passage thy shore, to Jerusalem. They did not know how long was the way. They knew only that the Warriors would yield to their songs and the world would be won to peace. Of twenty thousand German children seven thousand only lived to cross the Alps. Hunger and disease left a trail of little bodies all the way along. The remnant got to Geneva. They hastened to the sea and the miracle that had buoyed them through their dreadful pilgrimage. There were the dancing waves, the surf, the mosekery! The great illusion was gone. Five shiploads of French children were sold into slavery along the Barbary coast, and even as far as Bagdad. The Moslem had smiled and waited.

"Faith and iniquity are the most iniquitous masters that a nation can have," he said. The age of innocence is the age of tears in excess. We are in epoch of famine and want. America will not follow its Stephens today in children's crusade.

"The apostles of peace at any price" and their "perpetual leader" they are pleading with us for inaction, for helplessness. They would bind our young gait of the western

children's crusade.

Washington, D. C., April 21.—Major Gen. Hugh L. Scott, chief of staff of the army was on his way today to the border, as the personal representative of Secretary of War Baker, to report on the military problems confronting General Funston.

General Scott's report, on which the Washington government's final action on General Carranza's request that the American expeditionary forces in Mexico be recalled, probably will depend to a great extent, is not expected until a week or ten days. Meanwhile, no definite course of action is known for unless further outbreaks against the American troops demand immediate

steps. Reporters who were expected to learn more today on some of the questions involved in the continuing report to Carranza, were unable to do so. Before Carranza's departure, however, he said:

He said that the American Expeditionary Forces in Mexico were to be recalled if the Mexican government did not make a clear statement of the situation. That could be gotten in official reports.

Before his departure last night, General Scott said he did not expect to go into Mexico to observe the situation, as he would be welcomed.
