

Seminole Stages Sensational Play To Win At Ocala

Wildcats Defeated By 33 To 24 After Hot Battle On Courts

In a sensational comeback after losing an early quarter lead, Coach Leonard McLoone's Seminole High School basketball squad scored a 33 to 24 victory over the Ocala Wildcats in a Northeastern Conference game played at Ocala last night.

Seminole led, 12 to 4 at the end of the first quarter only to see this lead shot to bits as forward Thompson and center Turner, of the Wildcats, picked up 17 points while Seminole was garnering but three points in the second quarter.

The last half was just the opposite of the first half for Seminole, which ended up 15 points while Ocala was held to three points, the Wildcats picking up two points in the third quarter and only one point in the last quarter.

Featuring the game was forward Kurt Whitten's continued fine work on the offensive, the return to form, and the game of Jack Hough, guard who has been out of action because of illness, and Seminole's effectiveness in attacking from outside.

Whitting had 10 free-shots on 12 attempts, the same range being 100% for the Seminoles. Thompson and some of the 15 shots were successful. Free shooting was a feature of the last two games, Seminole completing eight of 11 against Landol last Saturday and seven of 11 against Tarpon on Thursday.

Seminole meets Orlando at the Orlando Coliseum at about 8:00 o'clock, tonight, while the 1935 season comes to a close on the local court at 8:00 o'clock Saturday night with the Lockburg team as opponent.

Hoover Demands Return To Gold Standard At Once

Budget deficit, implying either impounding taxation or more devaluation or inflation. A convertible gold currency now would help avoid all three by aiding in reverse employment and decreasing the need for relief.

"The devaluation which has already taken place has been made and will show in still higher costs of living. It affects every wage and salary earner. Surely, a 10 percent cost of living increase, already now in prospect, should be enough without further increase beyond that level."

"One of the declared purposes of devaluation is to, in effect, write down debts by increasing prices. Surely the debtors, who include most holders of common stock and equities in real property have suffered enough if they get a 41 percent reduction. The creditors who in the modern world include every holder of a life insurance policy, of a savings bank deposit, a veterans' certificate, and every holder of a bond or a mort-

gage, deserve compensation. It would be a boon to them if they were assured through immediate convertibility that they would not suffer any further. It would be a boon to our great endowed universities and hospitals if they knew that this is the end of their privation."

"We can get in appearance a fair prosperity out of inflation. There is much inflation poison in the national blood through the combined effect of the devaluation, expanded bank deposits through government borrowing and the federal reserve credit policies. The fever may grow at any time. There is no real recovery on inflation medicine. If the currency were

backed by gold, making it payable in gold bullion — the modern method of open payment. There is no need to wait for six nations before we re-establish the gold standard and restore confidence in our currency. They

would be bound to follow suit. They are far more afraid of us doing just this than they are of any American 'managed currency' of which they have us of a disadvantage.

Soviet Press Sees Germany Planning, Hungry For War

Nazi Fascism Held Moving Toward Conflict In Central Europe, Later With Russians

MOSCOW, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Official organs of soviet opinion upbraided Germany yesterday with accusation of plans for aggression in both eastern and central Europe.

On the heels of the approval of the London agreements extended by Maxim Litvinoff, commissar for foreign affairs, on the condition that they are made effective in their entirety, the authoritative press pictured the Nazis as hungry for war under the guise of "diplomatic chattering."

General display was given by the Czechoslovakian newspaper *Narodni Politika* that Japan, Germany and Poland were preparing for war against the soviet union. The influential paper and *Pravda*, however, concentrated their attacks on Germany with incidental jibes at England.

"The situation is very tense," said *Pravda*. "It is getting ready to occupy east and central Europe in order to prepare for war on the western front. That is why it is against the eastern parts and mutual assistance."

"Further, it is trying with English help to destroy Franco-Soviet co-operation. The English bourgeoisie must take into account that the mass of English tollers does not want war and does not approve of encouraging the aggressive plans of German fascism."

The Germans are maneuvering," said *Pravda*, "to avoid all except the air pact in order to leave their hands free in the east; and even the British press is now compelled to realize this."

"It is necessary to look at the facts in the face to prevent those aspiring war, from passing words to action."

LONDON, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Great Britain today opened negotiations directly with Russia, Germany, and Italy to determine the next step to be taken for the general settlement of the issues of European security and armament.

It was understood that England and France had come to an agreement on what course to pursue in view of recent notes from Germany and Russia.

In these notes, Germany said she needed aviation protection in view of Russian power and Russia indicated that Germany should agree to the proposed Eastern European Security Pact in its entirety.

Hitler Orders Conscription Of All Money

German's Cash Will Be Used To Buy Up Raw Materials And Consolidate Debts

BERLIN, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler conscripted the nation's cash yesterday to buy raw materials and consolidate debts.

In one of the shortest laws passed by the Nazi government, the hunt for liquid assets was begun and will spare none upon whom the reichsmaster of finance will call for cash.

Lutz Scherzer von Krenig, the finance chief, was given wide powers to seize funds through credits, and is limited only by the Führer's personal estimate of the extent to which he should strip liquid assets from those who have them.

Von Krenig may go to banks and demand loans. He may go to private firms and individuals and insist upon their parting with their cash reserves or are not absolutely essential to their well-being.

Though official sources were silent on this point, there was a widespread belief in financial circles that the government may to a certain extent call upon Germans who still have bank accounts and securities abroad to make this

536 Carloads Celery May Be Shipped North Next Week

Possibility that 536 carloads of celery may be shipped from Florida during the week beginning next Monday evening was seen in the Sanford office of the Florida Celery Control Committee early this afternoon after a compilation had been made of the information made by shippers in the face of a probable pre-state period next week.

The compilation indicates that Sanford shippers expect to move 429 cars, Bartow shippers 20 cars, Manatee shippers 30 cars, and Oviedo shippers 12 cars.

This movement totals 821 cars, and the Control Committee by reserving an additional 15, brings the probable movement to 836 cars.

A full discussion of next week's movement and the need for regulation will be made during a Committee meeting in Lakeland tomorrow afternoon.

George Washington Was Leader Of Volunteer Fire Department Of His Day

George Washington, father of his country, was very much interested in fire fighting and fire protection, according to Fire Chief Frank Cleveland. Outfitting the department that protected the territory in which he lived, and helped to buy the hand pump with which it fought fires.

Since the days of the Revolution, fire fighting has become a more difficult task. Chief Cleveland says that our modern industries and living conditions have added many hazards that were never known when the country was young. To fight the increasing hazards, it has been necessary to study ways of preventing fires and improve methods of extinguishing them.

"The firemen in Washington's time," said the chief, "were never called on to fight fires in big buildings and under dangerous conditions such as we have—and fire fighting methods then were much cruder than they are today. The old-time volunteers pulled their hand pump to the fire with ropes, and then proceeded to drown the fire with as much water as they could pump."

"Today fire departments find

of all do everything possible to help reduce the number of fires. When fires do break out, they respond as quickly as possible on motor apparatus, so that the fire will not have time to spread. Instead of using a hand pump of water to wash out the fire, the firemen use the minimum necessary to put it out, because the contents of a building that have been soaked with water are damaged just as surely as if they had been allowed to burn."

"In the old days, firemen worked with little equipment, and no real knowledge of scientific fire-fighting as practical today. The modern fire department has come a long way since that time, and has kept up with progress in other fields in increased efficiency."

President Roosevelt canceled all business engagements as a token of respect and arranged a trip to Mount Vernon, the Washington home on the Potomac.

A half dozen controversial amendments still stood in the way of the big relief bill before a final vote.

The allocation of \$250,000,000 of Public Work funds to the Navy for warship construction was declared by Secretary Eberle, Democrat, North Dakota, and Dickinson, Iowa, with the fate of the amendment in doubt, both voted "aye."

All the influence the Administration could bring into play proved futile. With members of the powerful labor lobby looking down as "enemies prepared to vote," Senator Glass, Democrat, Virginia, chairman of the appropriations committee, took the floor against the amendment.

He lashed out furiously at party members who "back in the name of the President" and then fight on the floor for a proposal which they knew is obvious to the White House. He argued that the credit of the nation was at stake in the forthcoming vote and that the President would veto the measure if the amendment was adopted.

In reply to charges by proponents of the amendment that with it the bill would destroy the nation's wage structure, Glass read a letter from Roosevelt which he received yesterday morning, shaking a flat denial.

"I object to and deny the assertion that the wage provisions in this bill will result in a lowering of wages paid by private employers," the President wrote. "I

Ignoring strong White House opposition and warnings by party leaders that the prevailing wage amendment to the \$4,500,000 work relief bill threatened to destroy the credit of the government, the Senate yesterday adopted the proposal by a vote of 47 to 45.

The one-vote margin was a stinging defeat for President Roosevelt and a tremendous triumph for organized labor whose leaders threw their full strength into the fight.

Twenty-one Democrats deserted the White House to join with 21 one-farmer-laborites in favor of the amendment. Only two Republicans—Metcalf, Rhode Island, and Hale, Maine—voted with 41 Democrats against the measure. Senators Fletcher and Trammell of Florida voted against the amendment.

Labor's victory, however, may be short lived. The Administration will make an attempt to eliminate the proposal when the measure is passed and sent to conference with the House.

The embattled amendment was offered by Senator McFadden, Nevada Democrat. It specifies that the government must pay the prevailing wage rates on construction initiated under the pending act.

Government spokesmen charged the amendment would wreck the jobs program and make public employment so attractive that it would be impossible ever to get relief workers back to private payrolls. It was the plan of the Administration to pay a maximum



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Motor Patrol Of 100 Men Visioned By State Officers

Study Is Given To Rec-
ommendations To
Be Handled Solons

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Feb. 22.—(AP)—A state motor patrol, of approximately 100 men, to be under state service, regulations, was envisioned today by high officials here as study was given to present legislation in the 1935 legislative year.

Some officials, who declined to be named directly, said they believed the patrols, which were equipped with motorcycles, fast automobiles, radio and other means of communication, would be used to prevent highway robbery.

A state automobile driver's license, good for the first year, estimated to produce \$700,000, would be issued to the state and finance its first year of operation. Afterwards, the officials believed an annual driver's license of 50 cents each would be sufficient.

Members of the patrol would be selected on civil service examination. They would be subject to inspection by the state auditor of accounts, and would be required to file annual reports on their activities.

The chief of the motor patrol

would be appointed by the governor. Approximately \$3,000 would be allotted for men for maintenance, equipment and personnel salaries. A percentage of his salary would be deducted for accident and retirement funds.

The officers holding the motor patrols would replace the tag, traffic and weight inspectors now employed by the motor vehicle commissioners, who would be relieved of road commission. In addition, the patrols would have full police powers with authority to arrest drivers.

County authorities' fees would not be cut off by the patrols, the officials said, as the patrols would not be paid for making an arrest, and afterwards, would turn over law violators to the county for prosecution.

If such a measure passes the legislature, officials estimated it would take at least six months to establish the motor patrols. Approximately 25 men would be placed on state highways, and the remainder would be assigned to cities, towns and administrative units.
