**FRAZIER INDICTED**

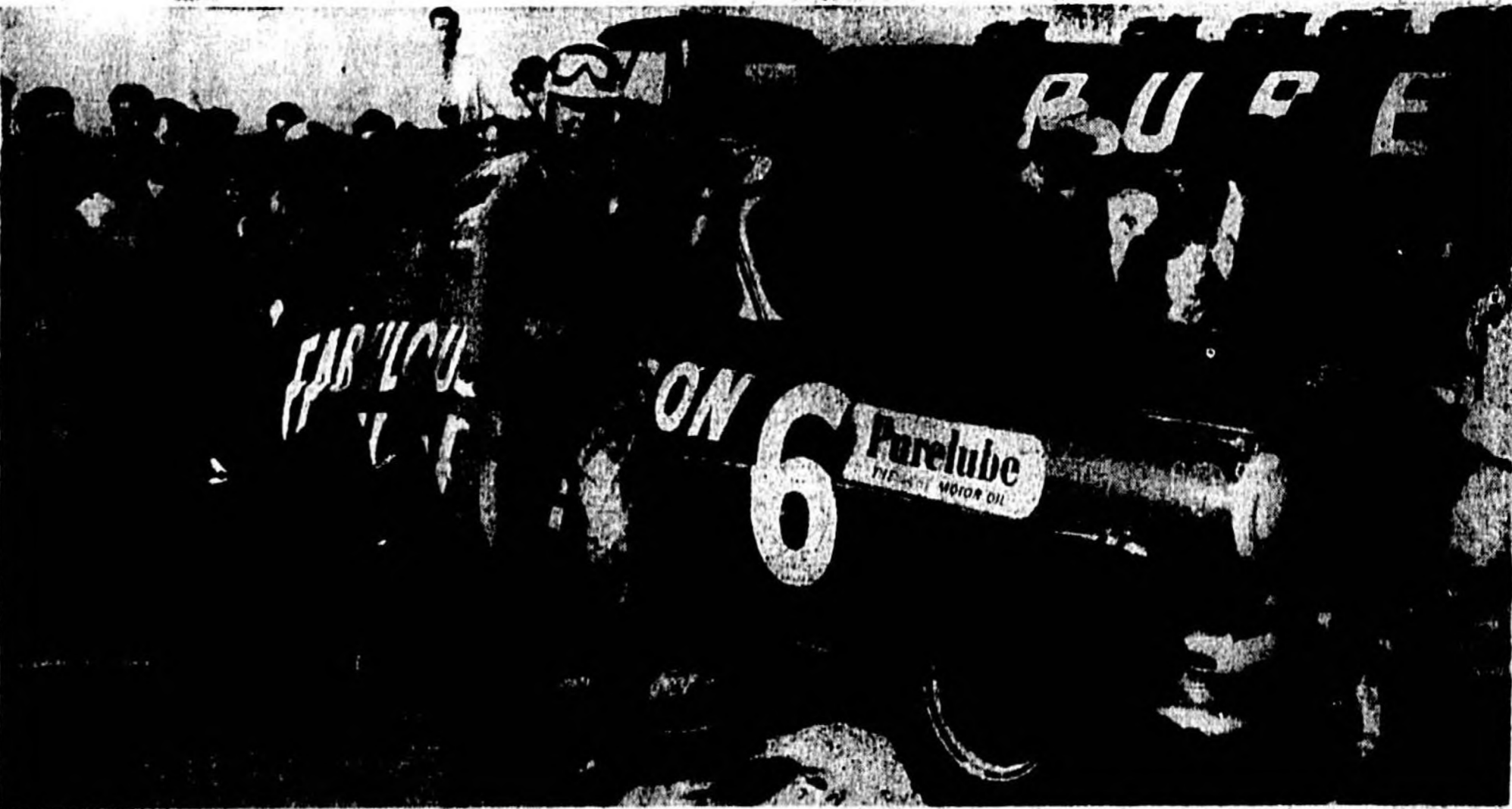
**GAMBLING TAX**

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### U. N. Negotiators Modify Demand On Truce Supervision

#### Key Question Of Voluntary Repatriation Still Up In The Air

MUSAN, Korea (AP)—Allied negotiators today accepted a 60-day limit on exchanging prisoners and offered to compromise their demands for supervising a Korean truce.

The Communists had proposed the 60-day limit. The exchange period is to start when an armistice is signed. The agreement does not touch the key question of voluntary repatriation.

The United Nations Command, holding 132,000 prisoners, had wanted 30 days more than was allowed. The Reds list only 11,550 men in their POW camps.

Allied staff officers negotiating details for supervising the exchange, offered a 2-point compromise: addition to men on temporary leave, the Allies will drop two demands the Reds oppose.

One of these would forbid shifting troops during a truce in a manner that could constitute an offensive threat. The other would require weekly reports on the location of all major military units.

The Reds originally agreed to rotating 5,000 men monthly. They have increased this to 30,000, including men on rest and recuperation leave in Japan.

SEATTLE, Korea (AP)—A light touch of spring hit Korea's eastern front today, along with probing Communist infantrymen.

The mid weather was continuing and a thaw was starting.

A Red company of about 100 men pounded an Allied advance position west of the Munding Valley on the eastern front for 10 minutes Tuesday night and Wednesday morning. The Allies withdrew on order about dawn but recaptured the position about 10 hours later against no opposition and found 12 Communist dead.

U. S. Fifth Air Force warplanes cut Communist rail lines in 35 places Wednesday morning. Pilots also reported destruction of two locomotives and one Red rail car.

The Air Force flew 301 sorties Tuesday and cut rails in 100 spots. Nine B-29 superforts bombed the Suncheon south bypass rail bridge Tuesday night. Three other B-29s hit the rail yards at Sandong and one raided the Kyompsu steel mill.

Allied fighters and bombers attacked 100 Red trucks Tuesday night and destroyed 19. Pilots also reported a string of 16 boxcars destroyed in Northwest Korea.

U. N. warships pounded road and rail networks off the east coast.

Two starters on Duke's basketball team—Bill Fleming and Rudy D'Emilio—attended the same high school, Northeast High of Philadelphia, Pa.

### JANE RUSSELL



LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Jane Russell fell from a motor instead of a man in the premiere of her latest picture being Tuesday night.

Notes of the debacle were a bit off to be a slight discomfunder under one eye. Noted actress had her husband, Bob Waterfield, who came here with her for the premiere, then parked his big 1940 Lincoln in a few hours before the light went on.

She, it said, blamed the damage to her dress, for a car door. Her husband's sudden departure led to rumors of a fall, but Jane said:

"I had talked to Bob over the phone and everything's fine just OK. We didn't have any difficulties. Bob had to leave to attend to business in Los Angeles."

There, she said, she learned the motorist, came and maintained of the Los Angeles room, re-painted the machine to locate him.

On the way, she said, she found the feet of the machine where Mrs. Russell made her entrance. After the show, she hurried back to her hotel room, passing up post-prime to her.

In the afternoon

James Shepherd, Irvin's brother-in-law and brother of the defendant who was shot to death recently by Sheriff McCall, said his brother had used his car the night of the alleged crime. He testified that the next morning he drove his brother's car to Irvin's house where officers arrested the brother and seized the car.

A pistol taken from another Negro serving a life term for the rape was introduced. Luther Thomas, foster father of a fourth man accused, identified the pistol as the property of his son, Ernest Thomas, who was slain by a posse in Madison County.

### Lake County Case

The state spent most of the morning submitting evidence attempting to place Irvin and the car in which he was riding at the scene of the alleged rape and point on the highway where the white couple testified they were overcome.

Just before the noon recess, the state rested its case. The defense began this afternoon.

Plaster casts taken of tire tracks and footprints were shattered in judgment back from the Supreme Court after an earlier trial. However, Lake County Deputy Sheriff James L. Yates testified footprints at the point where the woman claimed she was abducted matched those of shoes Irvin wore that night.

Yates said tire tracks at a point near where the woman claims the rape occurred matched those of the car in which the Negroes were riding. He said a handkerchief found at the place where she said the rape occurred contained a piece of lint similar to that which littered the back seat of the car and which she testified adhered to her dress after the attack.

Defense lawyers hammered at Yates' technical ability to take dependable tire track and footprint casts and got from him a statement the casts were not made until after the car and Irvin's shoes had been seized.

The attorneys also made much of the exact location at which the attack is supposed to have occurred, apparently no more than a few yards from the Lake Sumter line. Yates insisted the spot is in Lake County.

If it were in Sumter County the whole proceedings would have been

make use of Gen. MacArthur's ability."

Other Lincoln Day developments:

1. Rep. Sabath of Illinois came out of the White House saying President Truman told him he might seek the presidency again even at the expense of his health, if it would serve world peace. So far, the President has not said publicly whether he will run again.

Sabath's report drew comments today that President Truman may be following a pattern used by his that White House visitors gave similar reports after talking to the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt just before he accepted nominations for third and fourth terms.

2. In Baton Rouge, La., Louisiana's pro-Eisenhower Republicans tried to show in court that a Taft leader was behind action nullifying a GOP primary vote favorable to Eisenhower. The Jan. 15 balloting gave Eisenhower forces 10 to 12 contested seats on the party's State Central Committee. Two weeks later, the committee declared the election illegal. Questions in Tuesday's hearing of the subsequent lawsuit followed the line that National Committeeman John E. Jackson, a Taft backer, held controlling proxies at the state meeting.
