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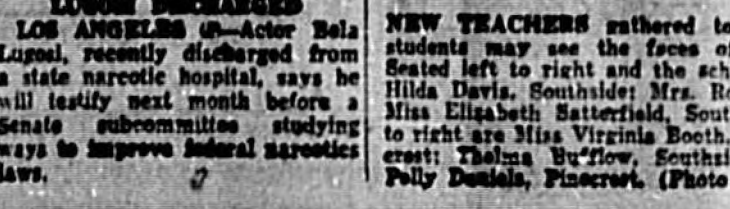

**Get-Acquainted
Field By Boy Scouts**

NIAGARA - ON - THE - LAKE, Ont. (A)—Today was "Get Acquainted Day" for the vanguard of some 10,000 Boy Scouts from all over the world who will participate in the eighth world jamboree here.

About 2,500 scouts from 66 nations have already pitched their tents on the jamboree site, adjacent to historic Ft. George. Thousands more were arriving today. The jamboree will be officially opened Saturday afternoon by Gov. Gen. Vincent Massey, chief scout for Canada.

The scouts are expected to consume 500,000 pounds of supplies, most of which they will cook themselves over charcoal fires.

A daily newspaper will be published and a special telephone exchange "Jamboree Ontario"—has been established for the occasion.

Peters has not heard from Schmidt but expects him to visit her soon. She recalled that her son told her he was going to work out the problem himself but "now others entered the picture and it doesn't sound like Danny any more."

Mrs. Peters was referring to a statement by Schmidt's attorney Howard Welch, of Sacramento, that Schmidt has made up his mind he does not want a reconciliation.

"There has been no one trying to get them back together," she said. "Even the lawyers don't seem to want them to try to piece it together again."

The former Mrs. Schmidt said she remarried in the belief Schmidt was dead. The young airman was recently released from Red Chinese captivity.

According to Mrs. Peters, Una telephoned her Monday and asked for her help in seeking "Danny's forgiveness."

"She was scared stiff . . . She's just a confused kid of 19," Mrs. Peters said. "Maybe she made a mistake—but I can't help think of what Christ said of another who made a mistake. He said let him without sin cast the first stone."

The airman's mother quoted Una as saying she had left her second husband, Alford Fine, and was in hiding with her and Schmidt's 2-year-old son.

"She told me," Mrs. Peters said, "as soon as I put my nose out of hiding they will take away my baby."

Scientists, Beards Just Go Together; Save Shaving Time

GENEVA. (AP)—Why do many scientists wear beards?

Just for the fun of it, some of them say. It's a habit, say others, or it saves time shaving. A few even admit their wives made them do it.

Those were some of the answers uncovered in an unscientific poll of bewhiskered scientists at the international atoms-for-peace conference here.

Francis Perrin, French high commissioner for atomic energy, said: "I struck a rock while swimming in 1937 and broke my jaw. This prevented me from shaving for several months. After that, I just decided to keep my beard."

Dr. Peter Fortescue, an engineer at Britain's atomic energy research establishment at Harwell, said: "I started mine during the war for the fun of it. The army didn't allow beards but I was in the home guard. I find it saves many man hours by not shaving."

Prof. W. V. Mayneord of the British Medical Research Council said: "I happened to be ill and with nothing to do, I grew a beard. I liked it and I kept it. But it's only a temporary phenomenon."

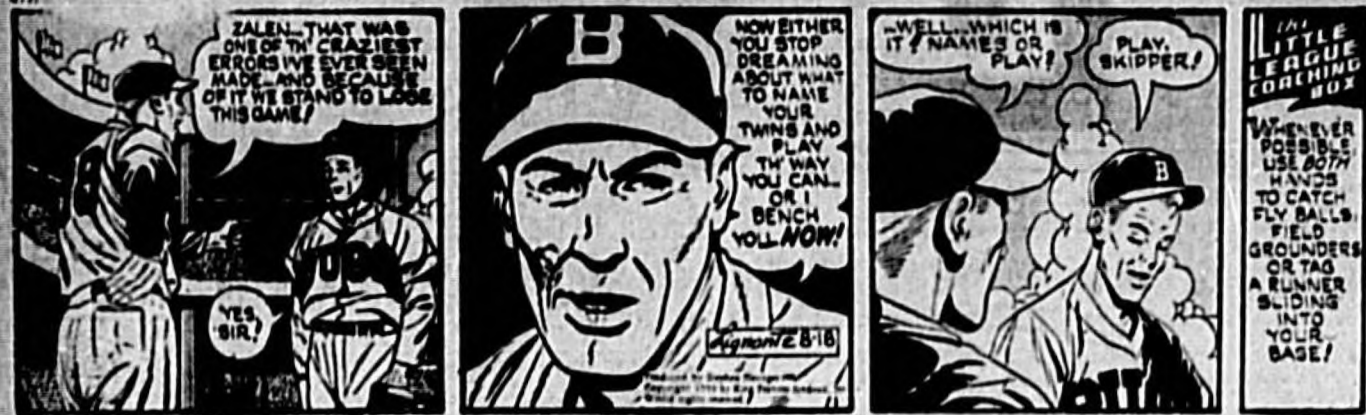

Probe Continues Although Autopsy Confirms Injuries

FREEHOLD, N. J. (AP)—An investigation into the death of wealthy Charles Havac will continue although an autopsy confirmed that brain injuries suffered in an auto crash were what killed him.
Havac's body was exhumed yesterday from the Grove Church cemetery in North Bergen, and reburied after the autopsy, ordered

by Monmouth County Prosecutor Vincent P. Keuper.
Havac, of New York, died July 7 as a result of the crash on the Garden State Parkway. The car in which he was riding plunged down an embankment after a tire blow-out.
Two days before the mishap, Havac left his \$100,000 estate to his housekeeper Mrs. Carrie Spancell, 43, of New York. She was in the car at the time of the crash, along with William Jackson, 51, also of New York, who was driving. Mrs. Spancell and Jackson, both Negroes, were hurt.

Mrs. Spancell was held as a material witness and Jackson on a technical charge of causing death by auto. They were arraigned yesterday and held in \$5,000 bail each.

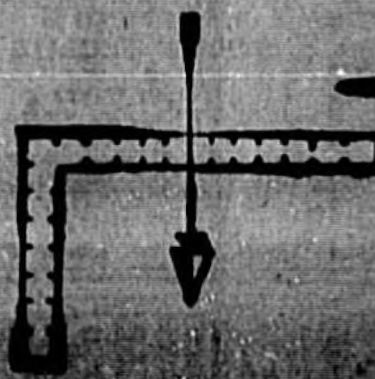
