

Cops investigate football pool

SANFORD - The Sanford Police Department has been asked to look into the possibility that a football fantasy league, in which several city employees participated, involved eriminal activity.

According to Cmdr. Dennis Whitmire of the Sanford Police, the state attorney's office has asked the police to "look into the possibility that some criminal offense has occurred" in relation to the league which involved the exchange of money in a game of chance.

Whitmire declined to say if the department believes any charges will be filed, saying only that an investigation is being conducted.

"We now have an investigation under way," he said. "There's nothing else I can say."

Arrest made in Habitat theft

SANFORD - Sanford Police have arrested Major Wheeler Sr., 40, of 1811 W. 13th Street in Sanford in relation to the theft of about \$400 in construction supplies from a Habitat for Humanity project at 2006 W. 16th Street

According to Cmdr. Dennis Whitmire of the Sanford Police Department, Wheeler allegedly took 37 sheets of plywood and 15 bundles of roofing shingles from the construction site. He then allegedly sold four sheets of plywood and the shingles to another man for \$12.

The police are investigating the involvement of the other man and others in this case. Other charges are expected to be filed soon.

Jett Aire Executive Services, Inc. has filed for reorganization under Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy code.

SANFORD — Prosecutors will file arguments soon with the Florida Supreme Court contending that death row inmate Joseph "Crazy Joe" Spaziano does not deserve a new murder trial.

The judge who granted Spaziano a retrial for a 1973 murder "erred as to several issues," said Assistant State Attorney Tom Hastings.

The Seminole County state attorney's office formally notified the high court Monday it will file written arguments within 90 days. Local pro-

secutors will be joined in the appeal by the office. of Attorney General Bob Butterworth. Butterworth said last week he wanted to avoid

LAKE MARY - A previously postponed special joint meeting on water problems in Lake Mary has been scheduled for this Thursday The meeting is slated to begin at 5 30 p m

During its last meeting, the city commission delved into setting up a list of priorities to be undertaken by the city to alleviate some of the problems, but there are many

Tomorrow night's joint meeting would be between the Lake Mary City Commission and the Water

Quality Management Committee. Committee. City Manager John The purpose is to review the tocus of the water committee and discussthe critical water quality and voltime issues the committee was to identify, especially in the Crystal Lake Basin

The meeting was called during January following the continued flooding of a number of areas in the city caused by the heavy rains of recent months. Citizens have also appeared before the city commission to express their anger over what they see as a delay in resolving the situation.

In a memorandum to members of the Water Quality Management

Luton wrote. "I believe we are all anxious for you to complete your work as quickly as possible so that the commission can begin to establish priorities and move lorward with a goal of hopefully addressing each and every issue prior to the summer rainy season.

According to minutes of a commattee meeting earlier this month, a number of recommendations are to be made for possible commission consideration. Among them is a recommendation that water quality tests be conducted, that Seminole County and the city undertake a joint drainage study aimed at the

possibility of pumping water from Timacuan to South Canal.

Committee members also discussed raising the overflow/ popeoff of the retention ponds, that Timacuan be asked to look into ways of containing run off on their own property and that the Timachan golf course stop using reclaimed water during the water level problem, and in its place, use existing take and pond water to ir-

State slashes regulations

TALLAHASSEE - Want new carpet? Well, calling an interior designer for advice ian't like calling the doctor in a medical emergency, a new state study concludes.

in an ongoing effort to slash thousands of state rules that clog the economy and slow the bureaucracy, lawmakers should end licensing of some professions with limited potential for public harm, the study suggests.

Interior designers, auctioneers, talent scouts, time-share solicitors and landscape designers are among the professions that may not require a license from the state to do business in the future.

Temporary health-care service pools and yacht and ship captains would also be freed from the present regulatory oversight under the proposal.

The seven professions stated to be deregulated represent 6,500 of 1.1 million licensees statewide.

Safety signs put on Pensacola bridge

PENSACOLA - Warning signs, reflectors and arrows on the pavement are being added after recent wrong-way crashes killed two motorists and seriously injured two others on the Pensacola Bay Bridge.

The Florida Department of Transportation began work Monday on approaches to the 3-mile-long bridge that connects Pensacola on the north with Gulf Breeze on the south.

But it doesn't address the problem of alcohol, a factor in two wrong-way crashes eight days apart, the second on Jan. 12, killing both drivers. Another wrong-way crash in 1991 also killed two drivers, both drunk, on the bridge. The project will cost \$8,000.

Rosewood to be true to history

LAKE MARY — Producers say they will be true to history in filming the movie "Rosewood," depicting racist riots in the west Florida community of that name in 1923.

Six blacks and two whites were killed in the violence that came after a black man was accused of assaulting a white

"It's a very important film, a film with a lot of historical and emotional relevance to it," said director John Singleton. Singleton, producer Jon Peters and actors Jon Voight and

Ving Rhames, who co-star in the film, held a news conference Monday night. Filming began Monday in rural northeast Lake County

between Orlando and Daytona Beach, where two towns have been built as sets representing the black town of Rosewood and the white mill town of Sumner.

In 1994, the state decided to award black Rosewood survivors and their descendants \$2.1 million in compensation, attracting national interest in the story.

Grocer stops gunman

ORLANDO - Grocer. Sam Turrisi. 78. wasted no time when he saw a gunman threatening his daughter-cashier at the Fort Pitt Grocery & Coin Laundry.

Turrisi walked in on the scene from a back room Monday night and told the robber to drop his gun. When the gunman didn't, Turrisi shot him with his 1911 model pistol.

The gunman, identified as Gilbert Ayala, 31, later died at a hospital. Police don't expect to file any charges against the

Woman dies in beach wreck

ORMOND BEACH - A suspected drunken driver speeding down the sand killed one woman and severely injured another. Geraldine "Gerry" Rickert, 59, of Belleview, near Ocala, died Fuesday afternoon. She was the first fatality since 1 Volusia County beaches, where driving is allowed in 10 mph speed zones.

Alcohol isn't allowed on Volusia beaches, and authorities said Tuesday night they have charged Robert F. Welleditch, 41. of Conneautville in western Pennsylvania, with driving while intoxicated; other charges were being considered. He is believed to have been traveling at 30 mph.

Richard Rickert, who celebrated his 40th anniversary with Gerry last year, said his wife never knew what happened.

'By the time I realized what happened, she was gone," he said. "It threw her about 12 feet in the air. He never slowed down, never hit the brakes or nothing."

The dead woman's friend, Joann Snow, 65, of Steamberg, N.Y., was taken to Peninsula Medical Center in Ormond Beach with several broken bones that required surgery, officials said. She was in stable condition and an ankle operation was scheduled today, a hospital official said this morning.

The death "will definitely add fuel to the fire" among those who want to stop beach driving, said beach spokesman Joe Wooden. "This will create one more element of controversy over driving on the beach."

Soldiers tear down tent cities at Guantanamo Bay refugee camp

GUANTANAMO BAY NAVAL BASE, Cuba - Time seems to have stood still for many of the Cuban refugees here. They say the day and month they fled their homes in inner tubes or on boats, but they don't give the It's as if it were still 1994, as if time stopped during the 18 months they have languished on this parched base on the southeastern tip of Cuba. For the last 127 who were to leave today on planes bound for Miami, life is only now begin-

ning again. "This time is lost," said Orlando Fondora-Betancourt, 24, as he prepared his three garbage bags full of belongings for his last night in a tent. "We'll try to recoup what we lost."

Cubans from the campa marks an end to the military operation that cost the United States more than \$150 million and occupied the lives of 8,400 military per-sonnel at its peak, the fall of

That was when 21,000 Haitians and 29,000 Cubans were living in tent cities strewn across the 40-square-mile camp. The villages sprouted up almost overnight on the only land available - golf courses, air strips and along the dusty cactus-lined roads surrounding the

Schools, churches and basketball courts were erected and phones were installed. To maké room, many military families were moved of the island. Other personnel lived in conditions not much better than

plywood dorme.

As months passed, tensions among the refugees produced riots, lawsuits, violence and 80 suicide attempts, but the poetry, friendships and at least three marriages.

"I'm extremely happy for the people," said Col. John C. McKay, who has been running the joint task force responsible for the camps since November "But I'm sad because I've made some very close friendships.
They are wonderful people."
As he spoke he looked out onto

the airstrip that was once a wave of peach colored tents. Now it's a field full of dusty dry spots, piled high with plywood, cinder blocks, canvas and other building materials.

The huge task of building up the base became necessary after tens of thousands of Cubans and Haltians headed for Florida in

the summer of 1994. The Haitians were fleeing the military dictatorship that ousted democratically elected President Jean-Betrand Aristide.

President Clinton, hoping to stave off a repeat of the 1980 Mariel boatlift, ordered both Cubane and Haitians be sent here until a decision was made on whether they would be allowed into the United States.

Young killers

Boys' cold-blooded crime exemplifies national dilemma

CHICAGO - The children, barely as tall as the judge's bench, stand in court as convicted killers.

Because a 5-year-old wouldn't steal candy for them, they dangled him out a 14th-story window and dropped him to his

Now, the wrenching question facing a judge this week is whether these youngsters — now 12 and 13 — should be locked up in jail with other criminals or placed in a treatment center.

It's an issue other states face as well, as the face of crime grows younger and meaner, and courts are left to sort the fates of children who commit grown-up offenses.

"You ask cops, you ask the courts - people are seeing more and more of these kids," Jess McDonald, the head of Illinois'

child welfare agency, said. Crime statistics back him up. Between 1990 and 1994, the latest year figures were available, the FBI reported the arrests of children 14 and under for murder and non-negligent manaloughter increased from 283 to 379.

Under a new Illinois law, the Department of Children and Family Services may transfer youngsters ages 10 to 13 to the state's corrections department. But when it did so with these two boys, juvenile court Judge Carol Kelly balked, saying fletly she did not believe the welfare department's contention that none of its facilities were appropriate.

For a week, Kelly has heard testimony from bureaucrata and experts on what to do with the boys. That hearing continued this week.

At their trial last fall, the boys were sentenced to indefinite state custody. Kelly has said the boys will be confined for no more than 10 years.

The two boys were 11 and 12 when they dropped Eric Morse to his death on Oct. 13, 1994, at a public housing project. Pro-secutors said the boys were angry because Eric had gotten them in trouble with, their mothers and wouldn't steal candy for them.

By all accounts, the two boys did not lead storybook lives. They grew up poor, in a hardluck pocket of South Side Chicago. Both are of limited intelligence and had numerous run-ine with police.

But experts are mixed on what should happen to them. If placed in the care of corrections, the boys likely would be sent to a locked institution with a highly structured environment, strict rules and an emphasis on vocational education. Psychiatric treatment would be extremely limited.

"They are warehoused," said Dan Macallair, director of a San Francisco-based prison reform group. He said juvenile corrections facilities are "violent,

"If the goal is to make these kids less likely to do violent acts in the future, you don't put them in a towardle matern." in a juvenile prison." said Mecallair, associate director of

Criminal Justice. "All juvenile prisons do is punish and alienate."

A residential treatment facility also is likely to be locked. But it the Center on Juvenile and would offer more opportunity for

boys, something a psychologist testified this week is crucial if they are to be rehabilitated. The boys would be sent to an outof-state home, since Illinois does not have such locked facilities.

Sexy political novel triggers search for author

WASHINGTON — A sexy, hot-selling fictional account of the 1992 presidential campaign has Washington buffs trying to figure out who wrote it, including President Clinton.

Even the editor of "Primary Colors," Daniel Menaker of Random House, swears he doesn't know who authored the lavishly reviewed book. whose Clinton-like protagonist is dogged by questions of his Vietnam War draft status and allegations of adultery as he tries to win the White House.

The writer, Anonymous, is variously believed to be a White House insider, a journalist, an established novelist or possibly, because of its mischievous contents, a Republican mole in the Clinton campaign.

Random House, which paid what Menaker described as a "fairly steep" advance based on reading only half the manuscript in April, has the book in its sixth printing after only a few weeks in bookstores.

"Words cannot describe how much I wish I had written it." wrote Time magazine's Walter Shapiro, who conducted what was purported to be an on-line computer interview with Anony-

The writer, who described writing the book as "a lonely process," refused to answer any autobiographical questions and said. "I hope my identity is never revealed" so the book can be judged on its merits.

Random House dealt only with an agent, Kathy Robbins, and a lawyer.

About the only thing the reader is told about Anonymous is that he or she is married. The book is dedicated to "my spouse, living proof that flamboyance and discretion are not mutually exclusive."

"Primary Colors" is copyrighted by Machiavelliana Inc., a mysterious company set

up to receive the royalties, which should be substantial.

Clinton, who hasn't read the book but says he may look at it on those long flights on the 1996 campaign, on Tuesday issued a smiling challenge for reporters to ferret out the author.

"You all find out everything in the wide world. The least you can do is tell all of us who wrote that book," Clinton said. "It's the only secret I've seen kept in Washington in three years."

A synopsis of the book is basically a summary of Clinton's 1992 primary campaign for the Democratic nomination, with names changed, relationships embellished and a few fictional intrigues added, including a sexual advance by first lady Susan Stanton on narrator Henry Burton, who is a thinly disguised version of key Clinton aide George Stephanopoulos.

The Clinton character is Gov. Jack Stanton of an unnamed, small Southern state.

He is portrayed as a man who was "incredibly undisciplined about time, and making decisions. and figuring out who should do what on staff' but who was always in control. His profanity-spewing wife describes him as "faithless. thoughtless, disorganized, undisciplined."

The book is full of other easily identifiable and richly drawn characters, including Richard Jemmons (Clinton campaign director James Carville). Orlando Ozio (former New York Gov. Mario Cuomo). Lawrence Harris (candidate Paul Tsongas) and Cashmere McLeod (Gennifer Flowers, who claimed she had a 12-year affair with then-Arkansas Gov. Clinton). McLeod has

"In spite of its sins, it is far and away the best thing I have read about the 1992 campaign," wrote author Michael Lewis in a New York Times review. He speculated that the author might be Stephanopoulos, who has denied it.

The Washington Post's column "The Source" insists the best candidate is magazine writer Lisa Grunwald, author of two successful novels.

One city election day

We believe the Sanford City Commission made a very wise decision Monday, regarding the proposed changes to the city charter. They generally agreed that two items be removed from the overall charter changes so that voters may make individual decisions.

The two separate items involve placing the police chief and fire chief positions under control of the city manager rather than the commission. and changing the city elections to March rather than December.

At this point, it is not the commission's responsibility to accept these changes, rather it is to determine if the suggestions are appropriate for a decision by the voters of the

After the commission formally approves placing the matters in three separate items on this December's ballot, various commissioners have indicated they would be able to address groups and make open comments on which way they would like to see the voters

Leaving the matter of the police and fire chief supervisor to later editorial comments, let's look at the matter of changing the elec-

During discussion in support of moving the city elections to March, Mayor Bettye Smith observed, "I would hope we could eventually see all of the cities in the county become involved in such a date. It could be a county-wide "City Election" day and not coincide with county, state or national elections.

We believe this is an excellent suggestion. In this way there would be no difficulty in determining the proper polling places. They would not fall into conflict with other polls connected with the larger elections.

Furthermore, the Florida Legislature, during the 1995 session, passed a law regarding municipal elections. It suggests each city review its codes regarding elections on a periodic basis and make appropriate changes if found necessary. The proposal has been used as a general guide in the past, but the legislature has not made it official.

Mayor Smith's suggestion is a good one. If all city elections in the municipalities within Seminole County were held on one date, with one set time for filing, we believe it will be better for every city resident.

As it is now, with Sanford's election in December, Oviedo holding its in September in connection with the primaries, and others holding theirs in November along with the state and federal elections, it's become a confusing mess.

We suggest the various cities give this some serious consideration. Bring the matter up for discussion at a meeting of CALNO (Seminole County's Council of Local Governments).


We believe it would be excellent to have a county-wide "City Election Day." and get everyone involved at one time.

Nigeria's Abacha remains isolated

WASHINGTON - Senior State Department officials privately fear that Nigeria is shaping up as the "South Africa of the '90s," as one U.S. official put it, because of a brewing debate over whether its military government should be slapped with economic sanctions.

A recent meeting between Nigeria's brutal dictator, Gen. Sant Abacha, and Rep. Bill Richardson, D-N.M., constrmed the Clinton administration's suspicions that the despot is oblivious to his record on human rights. In a rambling. 90-minute meeting in Lagos. Abacha blamed his image problem on the United States.

"Bill Clinton has done nothing but lead a campaign against me," Abacha told Richardson, according to senior State Department sources. Richardson was acting as an unofficial envoy for the administration, a role he has performed in hot spots from Haiti to Iraq. Abacha is under fire for ordering the execution of playwright Ken Saro-Wiwa and eight other

dissidents last November. The incident merely served to highlight the record of a man who retired Gen. Colin Powell says has "the worst CIA bio l've ever seen.' "Abacha is isolated, and he's not aware of how

deep his problem with the international community is," one U.S. official told our associate, Ed Henry. "He's clustered with a few

sycophantic aides who don't tell him any bad news."

Since the executions, Nigeria has been condemned by the United Nations, while the United States and several other Western nations have recalled their ambassadors. South African President Nelson Mandela has asked President Clinton to support an international boycott of Nigerian oil, half of which is sold to the United States. While Clinton has been noncommittal, two bills pending in Congress would im-

pose an embargo --

human rights. an approach supported by prominent activists like the Rev. Jesse Jackson.

tribes, Jackson himself has warned that Africa's most populous nation is a powderkeg that could explode into ethnic strife that would make the conflict in Rwanda - where over hundreds of thousands of people have been killed - "look like a birthday party. Abacha, however, seems ignorant of the

controversy. "I cannot understand why the relationship has deteriorated," Abacha told Richardson, according to a State Department source familiar with the discussion. "The U.S. has no understanding or appreciation for all the Nigerian efforts towards a democratic process. ... We military men are not animals." The general told Richardson that Nigeria has

been unfairly accused by the State Department of being a hub for drug trafficking. But then Abacha contradicted himself by complaining that he has not gotten enough credit for "sending Nigerians to the U.S. for prosecution on drug charges.

Abacha actually tried to defend Saro-Wiwa's execution on legal grounds. "If I had commuted the capital punishment I would have interfered in the legal process," Abacha said of the kangaroo court that convicted the playwright.

He railed at the fact that Clinton "keeps moving the goal posts."

Lamar bashes the flat tax

I have never been enamored of former education secretary, former Tennessee governor and current presidential candidate Lamar Alexander, but I once had a modicum of respect for him.

Then he put on a plaid shirt and pretended to be a prole. My regard went from modicum to minimum. Now he is trashing the flat tax and my esteem has disintegrated into random

Magazine publisher and fellow GOP presidential candidate Steve Forbes is pushing the idea of a flat-rate income tax system, and Alexander, who has been prospecting for public offices since Richard Nixon was president, is running scared.

In Portsmouth, N.H., Alexander warned that Forbes' plan, which eliminates all deductions, including the popular mortgage write-off. would cause a real estate crash. Two hundred miles north of where he was speaking, the nation of Canada has no mortgage deduction and the home ownership rate is about the same as in the United States. But, as we all know, facts are stupid things, so let's go west

In Des Moines, Alexander blasted the flat tax as a "truly nutty idea" that is the rough equivalent of the "Great Pumpkin" as a serious answer to the nation's problems.

Lamar is not dense; he is confused. The Great Pumpkin is really the thing on his shoulders that he calls a head.

He refers to the flat tax as nuity. Is he saying that Nobel Prize-winning economist Milton Friedman is nutty? He has been touting the notion since 1962. Is House Majority Leader Dick Armey nutty? He has a Ph.D. in economics and is a major advocate of flat taxes. Is he saying .. he better not be .. that the Curmudgeon is nutty? I've been pushing flat taxes for a decade.

Most such systems would permit generous personal allowances, then tax the remainder of earned income at the same flat rate. Forbes would give a family of four a \$36,800 deduction and tax the rest of their income at 17 percent. Armey would grant a four-member family \$33,300 and also tax the rest at 17 percent.

The system would be simple: You could file on a postcard. It would be fair: Everyone would be taxed at the same rate.

The flat-rate system would also: change us from a consuming society to a saving one; force tax lawyers and accountants to find honorable work; free the marketplace and allow money to flow where it will; eliminate loopholes and force the rich to pay their fair share: promote taxpayer honesty: increase incentives to work or produce more; simplify the budget process; make the cost of government much more visible to the public.

And get this: Congress could probably close up the shop and go home on the Fourth of July every year because they wouldn't be spending half their time inventing breaks for well-heeled

Is there any wonder many politicians are opposed? A flat tax would reduce their power, take away their raison d'etre.

Of the many misstatements and falschoods that are circulated in opposition to the flat tax. three stand out:

.. The lack of a mortgage deduction would destroy the real estate industry. See paragraph four. above, and ask yourself by what right does the government coerce us to buy real estate?

.. The lack of deductions would ruin charity. I personally feel this is a callous comment on the compassionate citizenry. I also wonder why I should

be subsidizing Parson Pat Robertson's narrow-minded views or my snooty neighbor's

.. The middle class would pay more taxes. 1 don't believe this, but test it for yourself. Look at your tax returns for the past several years. Add up all wages, salaries, pensions. Subtract \$26,200 (Forbes) or \$22,700 (Armey) for wife and husband, \$5,300 for each dependent. Multiply that amount by .17. That's the amount you would be paying under a flat-rate

I found I would be paying an average of \$850 less per year. Even if it were slightly more, it would be a worthy investment.

When principles land you in prison

Twenty-six-year-old Lori Berenson recently began her life sentence in a cold and overcrowded Peruvian prison. And back in the United States, newspaper readers are wondering how this bright, caring and relatively privileged young American could have strayed so far from her expected path. When I first heard Lori Berenson's story, I

immediately thought of my friend Carolyn. Carolyn Cleary

and I were roommates in college, and you must forgive a friend's bias when I saysheisa remarkably kind and intelligent woman. While others hold protests and rail against totalitarian cafes. Carolyn has always expressed her social conscience through service - at homeless shellers. tenant meetings. homes for troubled teen-agers and Christmas gift drives.

Berenson seems to share this trait.

While in the United

someone could be a decent person and still somehow be involved with lt? States, her community work tended toward

it possible that

practical, hands-on tasks such as serving in soup kitchens and organizing blood drives. Daniel Radosh, a friend of hers since childhood, describes a modesty of temperament that reminds me of my college chum. "She was never one to stand on a soapbox," he said. "I never heard her say 'class struggle' or 'oppression.' When she talked about her experiences in South America, it was about people who were starving or families that had been separat-

What happened? We can't ever really know, because Berenson's military trial was so grossly unfair - it was closed to the public, the judge's identity was concealed, and Berenson's lawyer was not allowed to cross-examine witnesses or present evidence in his client's

desense. I called Carolyn, assuming she would be distressed by Berenson's story. She was not. "She must have been incredibly naive,"

said Carolyn, explaining that the Tupac Amaru, along with the Shining Path, another Peruvian guerrilla group, were feared and hated by citizens across the country. But, I asked, is it possible that someone

could be a decent person and still somehow be involved with it?

Radosh rejects the idea that Berenson got swept up by anything. When he saw his friend screaming in Spanish at a press conference he found her "totally out of character." He later learned that she had been in solitary confinement for 30 days and had been instructed by military police to yell so that she could be heard without a microphone.

If Lori Berenson knowingly aided in the killing of innocent people, then she deserves her sentence. But something tells me there has been a terrible mistake. I confess that my sympathy may stem from the fact that she comes from my world, that she reminds me of people I know. I can't, in honesty, say how I'd feel if she did not.


But there is something else about Lori Berenson that compels me " something beyond the soup kitchens, the needlework and the long, brown hair.

Berenson has insisted that she not receive special treatment because she is American. She has expressed no interest in being transferred to the relative comfort of an American prison. And she has told her parents that she absolutely does not want a "Save Lori" campaign.

She is willing to spend the rest of her life in a hellish prison in order to uphold her principles.

Who among us can say the same?

Olestra warning presents marketing challenge for P&G

CINCINNATI - If Procter & Gamble Co. is to make a hit out of its take fat, it must persuade consumers to stay hungry after they read about possible side effects.

That could pose quite a marketing challenge, analysts said.

The Food and Drug Administration approved olestra last week for use in salted snacks and crackers. But the FDA is requiring a label warning consumers that the fake fat may cause some undesirable side effects.

"This 'red flag' on the label is going to give them a reason not to use the product." Al Ries, a marketing consultant in Great Neck, N.Y., said Tuesday.

The label will read: "This product contains olestra. Olestra may cause abdominal cramping and loose stools. Olestra inhibits the absorption of some vitamina and other nutrients. Vitamins A. D, E and K have been added."

As if the marketing challenge weren't enough, it remains to be seen whether consumers will like olestra's taste, said Jack Trout, a marketing consultant in Greenwich, Conn.

"I think packaging is going to be one problem, but I think taste will be the big thing," Trout

Not a problem, said P&G. The Cincinnati-based company said its tests show consumers like the taste of Olestra, on which P&G has spent more than \$200 million to develop.

Olestra is six to nine months from its debut in still-undisclosed test markets. It will be sold as Olean (pronounced oh-LEEN) and used in P&G's Pringles chips and also tested by Frito-Lay Inc.

P&G doesn't expect the label to turn off the health-conscious, spokeswoman Sydney McHugh

"We know that consumers want the type of products that Olean can make available to them," McHugh said. "We know that in tests we've done, once they try it, consumers are enthusiastic about the way it Olestra isn't the only additive

that requires such a label. Products containing polydextrose, a texturizer in baked goods, candy, frozen desserts and other products, must carry the statement: "Sensitive individuals may experience a laxative effect from excessive consumption of this product.'

Anna Cook, a shopper at a Cincinnati supermarket, said Tuesday she would avoid olestra because she tries to limit fat in her diet anyway by eating "vegetables and stuff which doesn't taste so good."

The director of the National

Hospital's trauma unit, Dr. Hector Weerasinghe, told The Associated Press that at least 53 people have died. Hospital sources said another 1,060 people were admitted with iniuries. 100 of them in critical condition.

Others were sent home after receiving first aid, meaning as many as 1,400 people may have been injured, the sources said.

The blasts came from the area near the Bank of Ceylon and the Central Bank of Srt Lanka, a few hundred yards from President Chandrika Kumaratunga's office, the naval headquarters and other government buildings.

Prasanna Wijewardhana, a Central Bank guard, said a blue and brown Indian-made truck drove into the security barricade outside the bank. Two men leaped out and opened fire. Some guards returned fire, but many of them fled, he said.

The attackers "were firing automatic weapons and had the advantage of surprise," Wijewardhana said. The blast left a crater eight feet deep and the front of the

street. Thick columns of black smoke rose over the city. Ambulance strens screamed and people rushed from their offices into the

buildings were damaged. Flames engulfed at least a half-dozen buildings, blocking

police and rescuers. The wounded were taken away in public buses and private cars.

Police at the scene said all the assailants were believed to have been killed, but a military spokesman said several people were arrested. He declined to

elaborate. Business executive H.D. Peirls was on the street when the blast occurred. "We saw cars burning. ran as far as possible from the area. As I was running, there was a second explosion. That caused more panic."

S. Amarawati, whose blouse was stained with blood, said. "Suddenly there was a terrific explosion. ... There were at least 12 or 13 people lying dead on the street.

The blasts shattered the windows of the 39-story twintower World Trade Center. Several international hotel chains are located in the area, as is The Associated Press's Col-

ombo bureau.

The attack was similar to previous attacks by the Tamil Tigers, whose suicide bombers killed 15 people in November in an unsuccessful attack on army headquarters.

Suspected Tamil Tigers blew ip two oil depots in Colombo in October, killing more than 20 security personnel, and hid a bomb in a coconut cart in the capital that killed 24 people in August. 'It is unfortunate that it

comes at a time when the government ... is seeking to arrive at a consensus on the devolution of power to redress Tamil grievances," said government spokesman Ravinatha Aryasinha.

The explosions occurred two months after the Srt Lankan military scored a major victory over Tamil rebels, capturing Jaffna City, their main outpost in the north of the country.

Rebels among the Tamil minority have been fighting since 1983 for independence from the predominantly Sinhalese

Two-dad twins

TUCSON, Ariz. — Twin girls fathered by different men apparently will stay with their mother after one of the fathers gave up his custody fight.

gave up his custody fight.

"Today was a good victory for the good," the girls' mother,
Brenda Taylor, 33, said Tuesday after a judge took the case
under advisement.

Lawyers on both sides said Taylor will likely get custody of 17-month-old Lauren. She already has custody of Lauren's twin sister, Megan.

Taylor's ex-husband, Peter Tonnessen of Colorado Springs, Colo., will likely be granted one weekend a month of visitation with Lauren.

For twins to have different fathers, the mother would have to ovulate twice in one menstrual cycle and have intercourse with two men around the time of ovulation.

DNA tests show Tonnessen is Lauren's father and Megan's father is Dean Taylor, who is married to the twins' mother. At the time the twins were conceived, Dean Taylor was living with her.

Tonnessen was estranged from Taylor at the time. She claimed he raped her hours after she had sex with Dean Taylor, but Tonnessen denied it and no police report was filed.

Tonnessen filed for custody of his unborn child in 1994, unaware his estranged wife was carrying twins. She moved to

Arizona before giving birth.

When Tonnessen lost an appeal to have the case returned to Colorado, he said he would default in the custody trial. He did not show up for a deposition or settlement conference and was ruled in default by a judge who ordered Tuesday's hearing.

Three wives meet untimely deaths

GATESVILLE, Texas — A man whose last three wives met untimely deaths was sentenced to 35 years in prison for the 1978 shotgun murder of his second wife, whose death had been ruled a suicide.

Jurors voted Tuesday to convict Jack Reeves, then deliberated two hours before deciding his sentence for the murder of Sharon Reeves.

Defense attorney Wes Ball said appeals were unlikely.

The Sharon Reeves case was reopened as Arlington police investigated the 1994 disappearance of Reeves' fourth wife, Emilita. whose remains were found last year. Reeves, 55, a retired Army master sergeant, faces an April 1 murder trial in her death.

Reeves' first marriage was annulled. His third wife drowned in 1986.

Prosecution witnesses testified that it was unlikely that Sharon Reeves killed herself with a .20-gauge shotgun by pulling the trigger with her toe, as investigators originally suggested.

The defense contended she killed herself because she couldn't choose between her husband and her boyfriend, an Army colonel she'd been dating while Reeves was on duty in Korea.

Bill ends overtime requirement

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Voting on strict party lines, the state Assembly approved a measure to eliminate the requirement that employers pay workers overtime for working more than eight hours in one day.

Republican backers said the measure would make it easier for businesses to draft flexible work schedules, such as a four-day week of 10-hour days. But Democrats complained that there were no limits on how many hours a boss could force employees to work in one day.

"It will make slaves out of individuals who are working." asid Assemblyman Joe Baca, a Democrat from San Bernar-

California is one of only five states that require time-andone-half pay after eight hours. The bill would not affect the federal law requiring overtime pay after 40 hours in one week.

The bill, which passed Monday on a vote of 41-34, faces a tough fight in the state Senate, where Democrats hold a 21-17 majority. All the yes votes in the Assembly were Republicans. Republicans said the bill would bring California into line

with other states that allow flexible schedules.

"This is a fair bill for women," said Republican
Assemblywoman Paula Boland. "This tells mothers if they
want to spent 10 to 12 hours (a day), they can get an extra day

at home with their family."

But Democrats complained that the bill did not require employees to consent to longer days and said it was part of a

national assault by Republicans on overtime requirements.

"This is the first punch of a two-punch onslaught," said
Assemblyman Wally Knox, a Democrat.

Wholesale prices jumped in December

WASHINGTON — Wholesale prices shot up 0.5 percent in December, matching November's increase, as energy prices posted their biggest advance in more than five years.

The Labor Department report on its Producer Price Index today came as Federal Reserve policy-makers met to consider whether to cut interest rates again to stimulate a lethargic economy.

Analysts said the energy price surge was a one-month phenomenon due to cold weather and a spike in crude oil prices and noted that prices already had fallen in January.

"The bigger story is that basically there is no wholesale inflation." said economist Bruce Steinberg of Merrill Lynch & Co. "I don't think the report will have anything to do with the (Fed) meeting. There's ample evidence the economy has weakened over the last several months and they will go ahead and lower rates."

The back-to-back increases in the PPI were the steepest since a similar advance in January 1995. Many economists had expected a 0.4 percent advance in December in the index, which measures cost pressures before they reach the consumer level.

Although many analysts expected the Federal Open Market Committee to cut short-term rates today because of mounting evidence of a weakening economy, others felt it would defer any decision pending the availability of more economic data.

Many official economic reports have been postponed because of government shutdowns caused by the federal budget impasse and subsequent blizzard. The PPI report, for instance, originally was scheduled for Jan. 11.

originally was scheduled for Jan. 11.

Analysts said any evidence of mounting price pressures could reinforce arguments against any further easing now out of fear of accelerating an inflationary spiral.

Fed policy makers nudged the federal funds rate down from 6 percent to 5.75 percent in July and then to 5.5 percent in December as signs of economic weakness persisted. The rate is what banks charge each other for overnight loans.

For the year, prices of finished goods at the wholesale level were up 2.2 percent, a moderate increase but slightly more than the 1.7 percent gain in 1994.

The department reports the December Consumer Price Index

on Thursday. Analysis were expecting a 0.3 percent increase.

The December PPI increase was the second in three months after a slight 0.1 percent dip in October. Analysis said the November gain was exaggerated by a one-month problem in adjusting new-model car and light-truck prices for seasonal variations.

The December advance was led by a 3.3 percent surge in energy prices, the largest since a 7.5 percent jump in October 1990. Until December, energy costs had fallen for six straight

months.
Food prices, on the other hand, inched up just 0.1 percent.

Fewer AIDS-infected Americans

WASHINGTON — This year, about 10,000 more Americans will die from the AIDS virus than will catch it, researchers say.

The projection means that, contrary to popular belief, the number of Americans living with the AIDS virus is actually going down.

Dr. Robert Biggar of the National Cancer Institute estimates that 600,000 Americans are infected with HIV, the AIDS virus, and about half of them already have full-blown AIDS.

He believes the number of new infections is declining because more people know how AIDS is spread and are protecting themselves. This is particularly true for gay men and intravenous drug users, who account for most AIDS cases.

Biggar says 1992 "was a beliwether year, because there were just about as many new infections as there were deaths." Since then, he estimates, the

number of AIDS deaths annually has considerably outstripped the number of new infections.

Actually, spread of the AIDS virus has been falling since the

epidemic emerged in the early

1980a.

In 1982, Biggar estimates, 100,000 to 150,000 Americans became infected. By 1993, this number had dropped to about 40,000. This year, he estimates that about 10,000 or 15,000 more Americans will die from

the AIDS virus than will catch it.

The number of people who carry the AIDS virus is difficult to measure precisely. Thus experts use a variety of statistical methods to try to learn the scope of the epidemic, including one employed by Biggar called back calculation.

AIDS typically takes five to 10 years to develop after someone becomes infected. Knowing this, Biggar and colleagues use the total number of AIDS cases reported each year to measure how many people must have been infected several years in the past.

Biggar presented his data Tuesday at the Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections, an annual AIDS meeting.

He compared the risk of getting infected between 1981 and 1986 and between 1987 and 1992. For needle drug abusers, the risk fell 30 percent between the two periods, and for white male homosexuals, it dropped 70 percent. However, the risk of c a t c h i n g t h e d i s e a s e heterosexually approximately tripled.

An average of about 13,000 Americans caught the disease heterosexually each year between 1987 and 1992, while 14,000 got the virus through dirty needles and 20,000 were infected through homosexual contact.

AIDS discovered for first time in chimp

WASHINGTON — The discovery that chimpanzees can get AIDS may give scientists a stand-in for humans when testing new vaccines and treatments for the disease.

Chimps are the only animal besides people that can be infected with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. But until now, it appeared as though they never got sick from it.

ference Tuesday, scientists from the Yerkes Regional Primate Research Center at Emory University in Atlanta reported the first case of AIDS in a chimp.

One of the things that has

One of the things that has made AIDS so difficult to control has been the lack of a

so-called animal model — a laboratory animal that can stand in for people in studies of the disease.

While monkeys get sick with a simian version of HIV it is somewhat different, and researchers fear that insights from studying these animals may not apply to people.

Over the years, scientists around the country have intentionally infected about 100 chimps with HIV in studies of the views

"We believe this to be the first development of AIDS in a chimpanzee infected with HIV," Dr. Francis J. Novembre, a virologist, said at the annual Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic infections.

Biggar cautioned that even though the number of infected people is falling, this does mean AIDS is no longer a problem.

"There are almost as many people dying of AIDS each year as were killed in the entire Vietnam War," he said, "and 40,000 new infections — that's a death sentence."

Taste African-American cooking

There's nothing that I love in a cookok as much as a story, so it is prob-ly little wonder that "Spoonbread ably little wonder that "Spoonbread and Strawberry Wine," by Carole and Norma Jean Darden, is one of my alltime invarites. The Darden sisters elegant black women now in their ide age — spent much of their early 20s touring the country to collect their mily's recipes and lore. Their book - which, happily, was reprinted by Doubleday in 1994 - took them west to California and across continents to Africa, but it is grounded in the American South, in Wilson, N.C. There, their grandfather — the indomitable Papa Darden — hanne his "d rden — began his life as a free ma at the age of 14, and worked to build a small business empire and to see 10 children through college (and several through medical achool). The book is peopled by a variety of memorable Darden relatives: people like the opin-ionated, irrepressible Corine Samson ta woman so devust she belonged to two separate churches), and Aunt Norma, Wilson's "hostess with the mostest" who "continues to give luster to the title 'homemaker.'

A new book to my shelf, but one similar to the Dardens', is the just-pub-lished "Dori Sanders' Country Cooking." Ms. Sanders, a best-seiling novelist ("Clover" and "Her Own Place") is a black peach farmer in South Carolina with the gift of a born story teller. Follow her back to "hogkilling time," and enjoy her recipes for "Peachy Barbecued Spareribs" and "Batter-Fried Country Ham Bites" while you're at it, ill you have the stomach for it, the Pickled Pigs Lips are probably delicious too; and the only recipe you're likely to encounter these days that calls for "1 to 4 pounds whole pig snouts"). Visit with Aunt Vestula and sample her Lemon Biscuits.

These books are wonderful to read, but don't leave the recipes untried. Cooking from these works will take you back in time, sitting at Aunt Norma's table or swapping recipes at the Sanders' farm stand if you are white, they offer a taste of African-American cooking. If you are hungry, they hit the

Cooking these recipes will bring you closer to those women for whom, in Sander's words, "food - and the joy it brought when shared with family and friends - was truly at the center of their lives."

For many farm women, it still is," she writes. "Some things time does not

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Deep breathing worsens pleurisy pain

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have pleurisy. What is it? How long does it last? Is there a cure and is there anything I can take for the condition?

DEAR READER: Each lung is covered by a thin, tough membrane called the pleura. When parts of the pleura are inflamed or irritated. patients experience severe, sharp pain that is worsened by deep breathing. Common causes of pleurisy include pulmonary blood clots (emboli) and infection, such as pneumonia and tuberculosis.

You need a thorough examination, chest X-ray, blood tests, and sputum cultures to discover the cause of your pleurisy. Once the doctor arrives at a diagnosis, he will prescribe appropriate therapy, such as antibiotics.

Some forms of pleurisy last a few days and then disappear, as the body heals itself. Other forms require drug treatment.

Pleurisy should not be ignored. This pain, which can be relieved with analgesics, is an indication that something is wrong with one lung. Follow your family physician's advice.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Every time I eat fruit or drink fruit juice, I get an inflamed red tongue with blisters on the edges. Do I have to quit eating tomatoes, strawberries, peaches and the like? Am I lacking something in my system?

DEAR READER: Being a relatively delicate organ, the tongue is easily irritated and inflamed. The causes include astringent mouthwashes. tobacco products, ill-fitting dentures. spicy foods, and — sometimes — the acid in certain fruits and vegetables.

Your tongue may bother you because some foods aggravate a low-grade irritation associated with one or more of the factors I mentioned. Or, perhaps. you could have a chronic, underlying viral infection in your mouth.

See your dentist. He should be able to discover the cause of your problem.

DEAR DR. GOTT: The latest arthritis cure I have heard of is WD-40, the lubricant. People are rubbing it on their feet and into their joints. Can this product help?

DEAR READER: WD-40 does not help arthritis, for which drug therapy, such as ibuprofen, is more appropriate. WD-40, a hydrocarbon lubricant, is a splendid product for a variety of household repairs. However, it has no place in the treatment of stiff joints,

unless you happen to be related to the Tin Woodman in the Wizard of Oz.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My fingernails are becoming ingrown. The problem started about three years ago and my family doctor, a dermatologist, a podiatrist and a surgeon suggest removal or have no answer at all. I'm 78 and in excellent health. I'm also a musician. and this condition is very paintal.

DEAR READER: No one knows why fingernails — or, more com ly, toensils — grow inward, cutting into sensitive flesh, leading to pain and inflammation. However, in many cases, the disorder can be prevented by trimming the nails squarely, rather than shaping them around the sides.

If proper trimming fails to solve the problem, surgery is usually secessary to remove the parts of the sail (and the growing portion of the nail hed) that curl under or extend into flesh.

I suggest that you see a qualified surgeon or podiatrist and follow his advice.

How does this apply to today's deal? Another of my obscure segues is coming up! You are in three no-trump, West leads the club five: six, jack, queen. How do you continue?


As always, start by counting your top tricks. Here, you have a paltry

If you must lose the lead twice, once in spades and once in diamonds, West might establish and run his club suit. It is essential to drive out his potential entry card first. Lead a spade at trick two, preferably the jack.

If you win the trick, take the diamond finesse at trick three as at least nine tricks are ensured: one spade, two hearts, four diamonds and two clubs. So, let's suppose West grabs his spade ace and leads the club king. Duck, win the next club and take the diamond finesse. Once again, you are on a clear road to your contract.
