## RECIPES

- Waffles**  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1/2 level teaspoon salt  
1 cup milk  
2 eggs  
Whites two eggs  
1 tablespoon melted butter.  
Sift flour, then measure, then add baking powder and salt and sift three times; add milk gradually, yolks of eggs well beaten, butter, and whites of eggs beaten stiff, cook on a greased hot waffle iron. Serve with maple syrup.
- Hot Baking Powder Biscuits**  
4 cups flour  
3 level teaspoons Cabinet Baking Powder  
1 level teaspoon salt  
4 level tablespoons butter or lard  
1 1/2 cup milk  
Sift flour once, then measure, and salt and baking powder and sift three times, rub in shortening with fork or spoon, add milk, mix lightly, turn out on a well floured board and roll or pat one inch thick, cut and bake in quick oven (450 degrees F.) fifteen to seventeen minutes.
- Strawberry Shortcake**  
Make dough as for Hot Baking Powder Biscuits, adding two level teaspoons of sugar to the baking powder and flour, if sweet short-cake is desired. Roll dough in two round pieces and spread with butter. Bake in two round cake tins fifteen to twenty minutes in moderate oven, at 350-300 degrees F. Brush with melted butter. Put the strawberries and juice between the layers, and on top of short-cake. Whipped cream, sweetened and flavored to taste, can be added.
