The increase, which translates into 9.6 percent annual rate, was consistent with economic forecasts promising a new surge of inflation approaching the double-digit range in the next few months.

Farm prices rose 2.4 percent in October, reversing a steady five-month decline that severely hurt income among the nation's farmers. Economists expect grain and beef prices soon will drive farm goods even higher. Higher prices for 1978 model cars and trucks brought a 2 percent rise in the cost of transportation equipment. All industrial prices rose 0.6 percent, and processed foods were up 0.8 percent.

October brought the biggest price increase in the wholesale market since a 1.1 percent increase in April. Wholesale prices have either declined or risen moderately in each month since then.

The Wholesale Price Index was 196.3 in October, up 5.9 percent over the past year. This means that goods costing \$100 a decade ago, now cost \$196.30 — almost double.

The wholesale index reflects costs at all stages of processing. Finished goods also rose 0.8 percent, and producer finished goods were up 1.5 percent - the biggest increase since

Foods ready for consumer sales rose 0.3 percent, the first increase in five months. Higher farm prices were blamed on

higher price supports, and some speculation in advance of newly announced Soviet grain purchases. Beef prices are expected to rise 10 to 15 percent in the next few months.

The higher food prices were reflected today in the Labor Department's report on wholesale prices during October.

Processed foods are now beginning to reflect the result of earlier farm shortages.

Prices rose for meats, poultry, fats and oils. October's increase in industrial goods was more moderate than the 0.8 percent hike in September. In addition to automobiles and trucks, one of the biggest increases reported was for jewelry.

Machinery prices also rose a substantial 1 per cent, but fuels and power prices showed signs of moderating.



"They went out for a hamburger and never got

Those few words tell the story of the tragedy that has befallen the Albert Dallabrida family of Sanford. It is a story, a happening, their friends, relatives and neighbors still have trouble accepting.
Such a thing couldn't have happened, could it?

It happened last Friday evening when nine members of the Dallabrida Bunch (as the sign outside their mobile home refers to them) were going for the hamburgers.

As police tell it, the Dallabrida van attempted to cross the southbound lanes of U.S. 17-92 into the restaurant when, forced to travel a few feet north in the southbound lanes to get to the restaurant "in" lane, it was hit by a 25-foot truck.

Killed were Mrs. Albert (Betty) Dallabrida: two sons, Richard and Robert; and a daughter.

Our condolences go out to the surviving family nembers, their relatives and friends and all who knew them and respected them. It is just a reminder that life is, indeed, tenuous

and that we cannot predict what will happen from one minute to the next.

It is also a reminder, that out of such heartbreak and suffering, some good can evolve.

That is happening in this case.

The reaction from those wanting to help has been encouraging and gratifying. No sooner had the news of the event circulated for example, than did Seminole High School principal Donald Reynolds initiate a fund-raising effort to defray the costs of the hospital and burial expenses of the Dallabridas. The funds are being deposited in the Flagship U.S. Bank of Seminole.

The effort is worthy of note and commendation. o, too, are the efforts of other groups-among them, the student body at Crooms High School, the loose Lodge 1851. And there probably will be

This outpouring of compassion is indeed a ositive development evolving from a negative

Another positive development spawned by the tragedy is the word that, at the suggestion of The Evening Herald, the Florida Department of Transportation will be sending a team of engineers o assess the accident site and determine what emedies might be implemented to prevent a repeat occurrence.

Specifically, what they will be checking is the ibility of extending the median divider farther south to prevent drivers from attempting a left turn nto the restaurant from that point

A complete survey and examination of that site and similar ones on major area highways - is sential. Now.Without delay.

Only then can we forestall and prevent such tmares as the one we have all lived through the ast several days.

Donna Erlich: An Advocate For Seniors

Latest addition to the Central Florida Legal Services staff at the office at 104 S. Park Ave., Sanford, is Ms. Donna Erlich, senior citizen advocate attorney.

Ms. Erlich will provide free legal help in civil matters for those 60 years and older who meet the income eligibility standards. She said most of those living on Social Security are eligible. -Ms. Erlich said she does not take fee generating cases (where

the client is suing for a large sum and the lawyer takes the case for a share of judgment received).

She feels a disproportionately small number of the Seminole

County senior citizen population is contacting her office for assistance as they are not aware of the service. She is available to speak to area senior citizen groups and nursing homes to explain what services are available.

If those with problems are not able to get to the office she will arrange transportation or if they are confined to their homes she or her secretary, Harriett Garrett, will even make house calls anywhere in the county.

Some of the type of cases handled include an injunction to prevent harrassment, administration of small estates, writing wills, consumer problems, problems with Social Security and

Ms. Erlich said those with problems should not wait until they reach the crisis stage, but should contact her when a problem first develops. For instance, she said, a client should not wait until he or she is being evicted but should come in when problems with the landlord first arise.

"Some people may feel embarrassed about coming in for the free service, but they should not as it is paid for by tax money and they have been taxpayers," Ms. Erlich said.

Ms. Erlich is a member of the Florida and Pennsylvania Bars and practiced law in Pennsylvania before coming to Florida in June. She is a graduate of the Temple Law Center in Philadelphia. She joined the Central Florida Legal Services office here in

Dr. Darby: From Celery To Midges

Herald Staff Writer

Dr. John Darby, administrator of the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, Agriculture Research and Education Center in Sanford, doesn't have the opportunity of doing research work

anymore and misses it. "I cannot get that excited about paperwork, but there is some satisfaction in doing it. We solve problems to save farmers a lot of money and thus help with the export of foods from this country, about the only thing that helps our nation's balance of payments," he said. During his 22 years at the Sanford research center, Darby has worked directly or indirectly in all types of experimental work

from specialty type rhubarb grown from seed on Zellwood muck to celery investigation.

Some years ago, he notes, Sanford was the celery capital of the world and now only one area farmer is growing celery commercially. The experiment station also has worked with field corn and soy beans, primarily

toward increasing yield per acre. Sixty per cent of the station's work is with vegetables, 20 per cent with field crops and 20 per cent in environmental programs. Most of the work is conducted with cooperation from the University of Florida. This is particularly true in the Zellwood

Currently three scientists from Gainesville are working on a celery pest-management study paid for with a \$40,000 grant from the Celery Growers Exchange of Florida.

Dr. Darby said that, since the use of certain chemicals has been banned, the "leaf miner"

worm have been wreaking havoc on celery

crops. The worm mines holes in the celery leaf and kills the plant. The study involves thousands of acres of vegetables. The local station is using eight scouts who go out twice weekly to count spots and observe the infestation. Preparations are inderway to have color, black and white and infrared photos taken of the celery fields for

Currently, Dr. Darby is involved as a number of a task force of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce in initiating a research program for the control of the blind mosquitoes, also known as midges, are plaguing the Monroe lakefront and downtown
