Child Abuse Reports Urged

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—Doctors, traditionally reluctant to report child abuse cases, will be paid higher expert witness fees and given professional help in a pilot program to encourage them to come forward in such cases. Dr. Jay M. Whitworth, associate chairman of University Hospital's pediatrics department, told a seminar on child abuse Wednesday that a request for \$30,000 to finance the program is included in the 1978-79 state budget request.

Gunter Denies Staff Charges

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter says he has never pressured staff into working on their own time to get his "FAIR amendment" on the November 1978 ballot. Gunter denounced Wednesday charges by a group of staff that he pressured them during a meeting last week to gather signatures for the amendment, which prohibits pain and suffering lawsuits resulting from automobile accidents.

OSTEEN (UPI)—A mother and son today are in the third day of their power lawnmower trip to Center, Ky., in search of fame, adventure and a visit with relatives. Mrs. Delmar Miller, 39, and her son, Donnie Payton, 22, left their home in Osteen Tuesday and covered 35 miles the first day on the shoulder of U.S. 41. They hoped to make the trip in 22.5 days to earn a place in the Guinness Book of Records aboard their 1969 riding mower, which has a top speed of 5 mph. At Center, they will visit Mrs. Miller's grandmother, Ocie Compton.

Pets Land Master In Jail

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—Thomas Beck's pets put him in jail Wednesday. Beck keeps a 165-pound leopard and a 450-pound lioness in his backyard, next to Jacksonville's Stonewall Jackson Elementary School. Last July 14 he pleaded no contest to violating the city zoning code and cruelty to animals. He was placed on probation and ordered to redesign the animals' cages, obtain a zoning exception and pay \$10 a month for probation supervision. He was jailed for failing to meet any of the requirements of his probation.

Florida Woman Cleared

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—A Miami, Fla., woman, Patricia M. Candia, was the only person found innocent Wednesday among 22 defendants in a federal court trial on charges of conspiring to distribute Mexican heroin in Florida, Utah, Arizona, Wyoming, Arkansas, California, Oregon, Colorado and Michigan. Among the 21 found guilty was David H. Jackson of Miami, alleged ring leader of the gang, who also was found guilty of being a career criminal and faces a possible life imprisonment sentence.

Judge Reverses Zoning Rule

MIAMI (UPI)—A judge reversed county rezoning of an island in Biscayne Bay Wednesday, apparently clearing the way for a \$100 million hotel and home development on property owned by a group that includes C.G. 'Bebe' Rebozo. However, Dade County attorneys said they may appeal Circuit Court Judge Herbert Stettin's decision.

How Leisure Time Spent May Be Key

GAINESVILLE (UPI)—The type of leisure activity an ex-convict learned in prison may determine whether he hangs out at a bar and gets into trouble again or joins a bowling league and becomes a part of the community. That is the premise being tested at the North Florida Evaluation and Treatment Center, where groups of volunteer inmates are becoming acquainted for the first time with such activities as golf, tennis and needlepoint. "Recreation in a restricted environment... must help reduce the tension and misery of confinement," Dr. Gall McCall, a University of Florida professor and former parole officer, who heads the program, said. "It also should have some carry-over activity that these people can use in the community after they have served their time."

An Outpouring Of Compassion

"They went out for a hamburger and never got back..."
Those few words tell the story of the tragedy that has befallen the Albert Dallabrida family of Sanford. It is a story, a happening, their friends, relatives and neighbors still have trouble accepting.

Such a thing couldn't have happened, could it? But it did.
It happened last Friday evening when nine members of the Dallabrida Bunch (as the sign outside their mobile home refers to them) were going for the hamburgers.

As police tell it, the Dallabrida van attempted to cross the southbound lanes of U.S. 17-92 into the restaurant when, forced to travel a few feet north in the southbound lanes to get to the restaurant "in" lane, it was hit by a 25-foot truck.

Killed were Mrs. Albert (Betty) Dallabrida; two sons, Richard and Robert; and a daughter, Robin.
Our condolences go out to the surviving family members, their relatives and friends and all who knew them and respected them.

It is just a reminder that life is, indeed, tenuous and that we cannot predict what will happen from one minute to the next.
It is also a reminder, that out of such heart-break and suffering, some good can evolve.

That is happening in this case.
The reaction from those wanting to help has been encouraging and gratifying. No sooner had the news of the event circulated for example, than did Seminole High School principal, Donald Reynolds initiate a fund-raising effort to defray the costs of the hospital and burial expenses of the Flagship U.S. Bank of Seminole.

The effort is worthy of note and commendation. So, too, are the efforts of other groups—among them, the student body at Crooms High School, the Winter Springs VFW and auxiliary; and Sanford Moose Lodge 1651. And there probably will be others.

Jackson Picks Up Points NEW YORK (UPI) — George Steinbrenner was still sound asleep when the phone in his home rang early Wednesday morning.

He had been in Boston the night before at a get-together in which Carl Yastrzemski was roasted for the benefit of the Jimmy Fund, which aids afflicted youngsters, and hadn't gotten home until 2 a.m.

Now only a few hours later, he wondered who it could be waking him up and it turned out to be one of his employees, Reggie Jackson.

"Can you have breakfast with me?" his \$2.3 million outfielder asked him.

"You mean to say you get up just to ask me that?" Steinbrenner said, looking at the clock near his bed and trying to shake some of the sleep out of his head at the same time.

"There's something I want to see you about and it's important," Jackson went on. "I'd like you to have breakfast with me. There's a nice little Greek coffee shop at 79th Street and Madison Avenue where we won't be bothered and we'll have some privacy. Could you meet me there, say, in about an hour?"

The Yankees' principal owner said okay, he'd be there.

When Steinbrenner got to the shop, Jackson picked out one of the tables in the back and the two men talked generalities for awhile. During the course of the conversation, Jackson opened a box he had brought containing a magnificent glass statuette which had been presented to him, along with a new automobile, by Sport Magazine a week-and-a-half ago.

Underneath the rich looking piece of glass sculpture was inscribed why Jackson had been given it — for being chosen the Most Valuable Player in the 1977 World Series.

"I'd like you to have this," Jackson said. "From me to you." George Steinbrenner was so touched, he didn't know what to say. He knew what the award meant to Jackson. Knowing that, he declined to accept it.

"I'd prefer you give it to your Mom or Dad," he said. "If you want to have a replica made and then give that to me, I'd appreciate it just as much. The important thing to me is the thought."

Later, Jackson's gesture still was on Steinbrenner's mind. "It wasn't done for show," he said. "There weren't a million people around in this little coffee shop, just him and me. That gives you an insight as to what kind of human being Reggie Jackson is."

With this year's free agent draft coming up Friday, people still keep asking George Steinbrenner about last year's draft, from which the Yankees originally selected Jackson. Specifically, they ask him whether he feels Jackson was worth the \$2.9 million, and would he do the same thing all over again.

"I'd do it again, every day of the year," says Steinbrenner. "I'll put it this way: I had to pick an MVP on the Yankees, day in and day out, it would be Thurman Munson. Go down the list and you won't find anyone more valuable to his team than Munson was to us. Maybe you'll find someone who was equally valuable, like Carl Yastrzemski or Rod Carew, but not more so."

"If I had to name the MVP for the playoffs and the World Series, it would be between Lou Piniella and Sparky Lyle. That's not taking anything away from any of our other players.

"But when people ask me whether Reggie Jackson was worth all that money and what it was expected in return, I tell them, we'd've liked him to hit 30 homers, and he hit 32; we wanted him to drive in 100 runs, and he drove in 110, and we would've liked him to have 30 game-winning hits, and he had 21.

"Most of all," Steinbrenner goes on, "we would've wished him to be one of our biggest contributors when we needed it most. During August and September, when we did need it most, he would've done it for us."

"Forget what he did in the playoffs and the World Series. Reggie Jackson's greatest contribution this year weren't those five homers in the World Series. His greatest contribution came in August and September when we were trailing the Red Sox and Orioles and then had to beat them head-to-head."

Red Sox Sale Is Postponed

BUNTON (UPI) — The proposed sale of the Boston Red Sox has been delayed indefinitely.

Executors of the estate of the late owner Thomas Yawkey called the American League to ask off today a meeting of other AL owners, who were to vote on whether to approve the transfer of ownership.

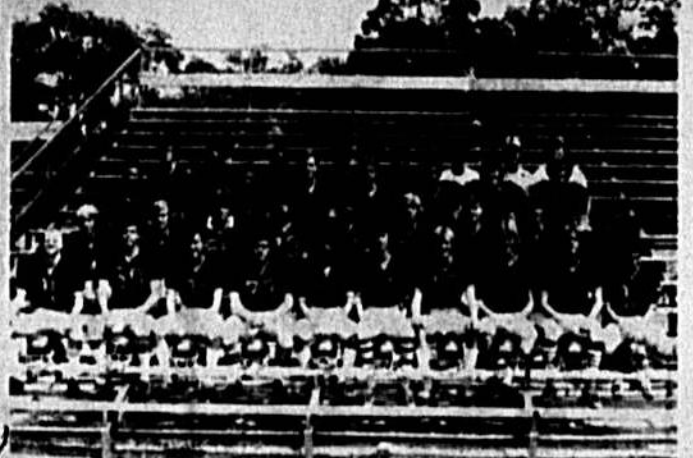

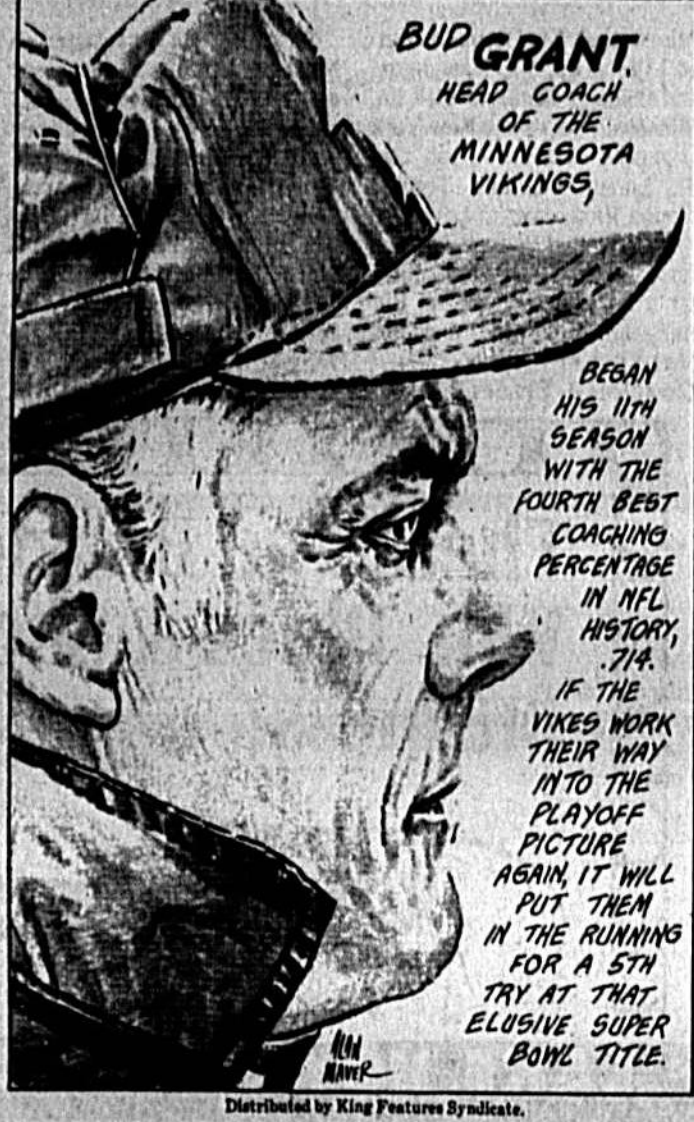

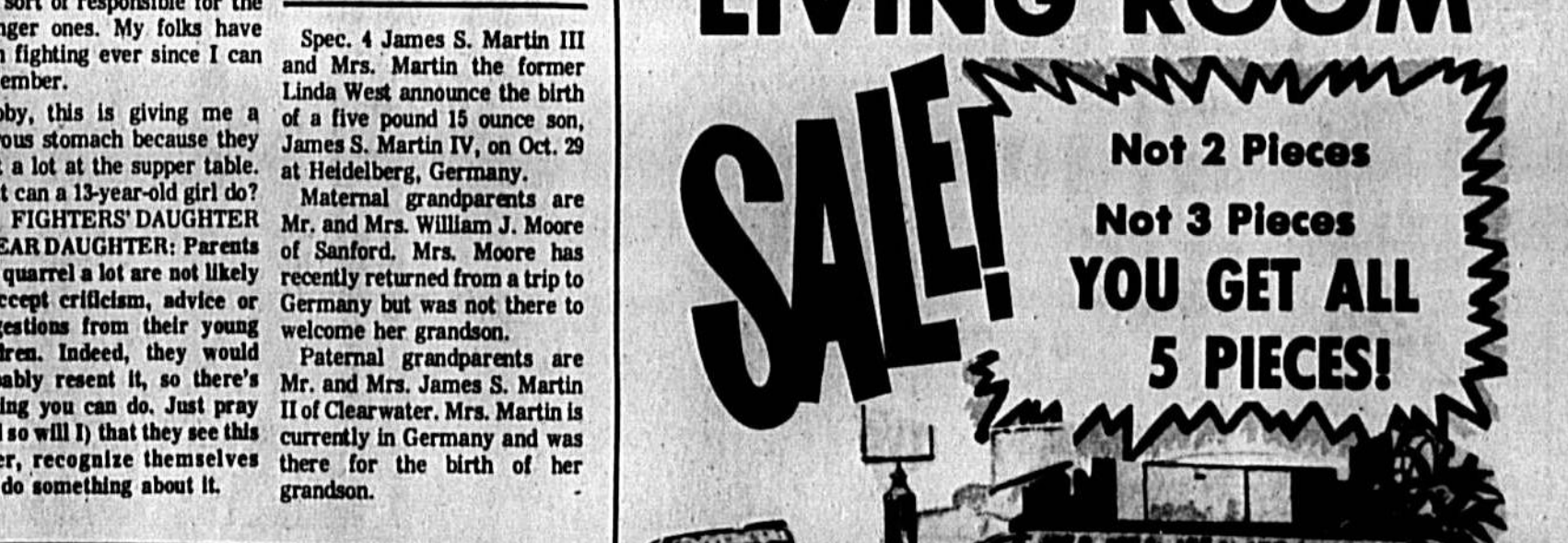

Dr. Darby: From Celery To Midges

Dr. John Darby, administrator of the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, Agriculture Research and Education Center, Sanford, Fla., says he has the opportunity of doing research work anywhere and at any time.

"I cannot get that excited about paperwork, but there is some satisfaction in doing it. We solve problems to save farmers a lot of money and thus help with the export of foods from this country, about the only thing that helps our nation's balance of payments," he said.

During his 22 years at the Sanford research center, Darby has worked directly or indirectly in all types of experimental work from specialty type rhubarb grown from seed on Zellwood muck to celery investigation.

Some years ago, he notes, Sanford was the celery capital of the world and now only one area farmer is growing celery commercially. The experiment station also has worked with field corn and soy beans, primarily toward increasing yield per acre. Sixty per cent of the station's work is with vegetables, 28 per cent with field crops and 10 per cent in environmental programs. Most of the work is conducted with cooperation from the University of Florida.

This is particularly true in the Zellwood area.

Currently three scientists from Gainesville are working on a celery pest-management study paid for with a \$40,000 grant from the Celery Growers Exchange of Florida.

Dr. Darby said that, since the use of certain chemicals has been banned, the "leaf miner" worm has been wreaking havoc on celery crops. The worm mines holes in the celery leaf and kills the plant.

The study involves thousands of acres of vegetables. The local station is using eight scouts who go out twice weekly to count spots and observe the infestation. Preparations are underway to have color, black and white and infrared photos taken of the celery fields for statistical information.

Currently, Dr. Darby is involved as a member of a task force of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce in initiating a research program for the control of the blind mosquitoes, also known as midges, are plaguing the Monroe lakefront and downtown areas of Sanford.

Feeding The World

Dr. Walter J. Scudder of the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, Agriculture Research and Education Center, Sanford, Fla., tells what is being done locally to help feed the world in *Seminole Magazine*, Sunday.

If state and federal funding is forthcoming for the program, Dr. Darby said that three chemical rooms at the experiment station will be converted into blind mosquito laboratories.

When Dr. Darby transferred to the Sanford facility for research work, another 20 acres near there is rented and the Zellwood station has 25 acres on the north shore of Lake Apopka. The local station also has 18 employees funded through the U.S. Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA).

Dr. Darby and his wife, Marjorie, a third generation Floridian, have two children, John Jr., in his sixth year in dental college at Emory, and a daughter, Beth who lives in Gainesville and teaches at Sunland.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Unemployment rose slightly to 7 percent in October, indicating no improvement in the nation's job market over the past seven months, the Labor Department reported today.

Unemployment has hovered stubbornly between 7.1 percent and 6.9 percent since last April. September's 6.9 percent rate represented a post-recession low.

President Carter, apparently discouraged by the lack of improvement in the job market, has promised to propose new measures next year to stimulate the nation's lagging economy — including some tax breaks.

Carter's own economic advisers concede they do not expect unemployment to fall any lower than 6.5 percent by the end of 1977, and 6 percent in 1978. Some independent economists view those predictions as optimistic.

Some 6.9 million Americans were unemployed in October, representing little change over the month. Total employment edged up 138,000 to 91.3 million — representing a 3.5 million increase over the past year.

A 7 percent unemployment rate is high by historical standards, but 2 percent below the recession peak of 1975.

Joblessness among blacks, which tends to fluctuate each

month, rose 0.8 percent to 13.9 percent — meaning black unemployment has actually increased over the past year.

Black unemployment peaked at 14.5 percent during the recession and returned to that level again in August — prompting a public call for black action.

The unemployment rate among men over age 25 rose to 4.4 percent in October, the highest level in the past eight months. This coincided with a decline in factory jobs, including steel layoffs and an aerospace workers strike.

Teen-age and female unemployment meanwhile declined slightly, and joblessness among white workers held steady at 6.1 percent for the fourth straight month.

Total unemployment has fallen by more than 600,000 over the past year, with most of the decline occurring among persons laid off from their previous jobs.

Men and teen-agers took most of the newly created jobs in October, but over the year women have filled about half of the 3.5 million additional openings. Most new openings in October occurred in construction, services and the finance industry.

Dallabrida Faces Traffic Charges

Albert Dallabrida Sr. faces a maximum \$500 fine in connection with a traffic accident that killed his wife and three of his children.

Sanford police issued the citation Thursday, charging Dallabrida, 53, with making an improper left turn in front of an approaching vehicle. He is scheduled to appear in Courtroom D, 100 Rand Mall, Sanford, on Nov. 7 at 9 a.m.

A police spokesman said all citations involving traffic fatalities require a court appearance by the defendant.

"Any other charges that will be filed will come from the state attorney's office following an investigation," Officer Louis Coombs said. Coombs said it could be 30 days before police turn over to the state's attorney a report on the death.

The accident occurred at 8:45 p.m. last Friday as the Dallabrida family attempted to enter the Burger King Restaurant, U.S. 17-92 near Airport Boulevard.

Hughes' relatives sat quietly, some with tear-filled eyes, when the verdict was read. A family friend, Rice Spenser, said later the verdict "means open season on men."

The Hughes were divorced in 1971 but resumed living together at the request of his mother when he was seriously injured in an auto accident. Mrs. Hughes testified that she felt obligated to nurse him back to health, since he was the father of her children.

Prosecutor Martin Palus said he was convinced "justice has been done."

Hotchkiss called the verdict "a fair one," but doubted it would establish a wide-ranging precedent because most abused wives probably are not battered to the extent Mrs. Hughes was.

Hughes, known to local police as a chronic troublemaker, had burned Mrs. Hughes' schoolbooks, beat, threatened and smeared food on her and forced her to have intercourse with him the day he died, according to trial testimony.

"I think that the jury realized that a woman in this case, that endured something I think was beyond human endurance, should not be held responsible for this particular situation," said defense attorney Aryan Greidanus.

Open Season On Men?

She's Freed In Torch Slaying Of Her Husband

LANSING, Mich. (UPI) — Francine Hughes, who said she was fighting back for 13 years of domestic abuse when she set fire to her former husband's bedroom, has been found innocent by reason of insanity in the torch slaying.

Feminists, including members of the National Organization for Women,

had hoped for a clear-cut acquittal by reason of self-defense and a landmark decision giving women new rights to resist domestic abuse. The insanity verdict left in question the long-term significance of the case as a precedent in such matters.
