"Boyle Says Figures Prove Funds Spent On U.S. Highway 1

In an interview here this week, State Senator Lloyd F. Boyle of Sanford stated that he would like to "get the record straight" in regard to the funds spent on the roads in Brevard and Seminole Counties during the past seven years in which he has served the two counties as senator.

Boyle said that it was not true that more money had been spent on roads in Seminole County (his home county) than in Brevard and quoted figures from the State Road Department indicating the fact.

According to a letter from R. M. Hartsfield, secretary of the road department, a total of \$4,106,835.21 has been spent in Brevard County for improvement on the primary road system since 1945 compared with only \$1,790,294.50 in Seminole County.

Boyle said that in only one year did road improvements total more in Seminole than in Brevard—1947 when expenditures were \$895,581.99 in Seminole and \$820,294.59 in Brevard. He added that in the very next year, 1948, Brevard expenditures totaled \$1,180,055.83 compared with Seminole's \$198,622.86 or more than five times the amount spent in his home county."

PRICE VIOLATIONS

LAKELAND (Special)—Sales of mid-season oranges for less than \$1 a box, not Valencia oranges, apparently caused rumors of floor price violations.

That was the conclusion of A.V. Saurman, general manager of Florida Citrus Mutual after a careful check of all reports of violations.

Mutual has in effect a floor of \$1 a box for late season Valencia oranges going to canneries. A similar floor on mid-season oranges was abandoned in January.

BIG ESTATE
MIAMI (Special)—When Ralph D. Mershon died here Feb. 16 his estate was estimated at "more than one million dollars."

An inventory filed in County Judge W. F. Blanton's court Tuesday appraised the estate at \$8,038,060.95.

Mershon, a retired electrical engineer, willed most of his property in trust to Ohio State University, Columbus, O.

He also willed his day-front home for vacation occupancy by university officials and personnel.

Most of the estate was in securities, with real estate worth \$149,500 and cash amounting to \$144,711.02.

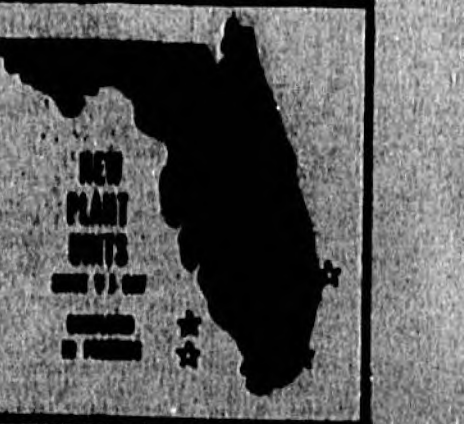

CUBAN SMUGGLER

MIAMI — A federal grand jury Tuesday indicted Gregorio Simonovich, reputed Kingpin of Cuban smugglers, on 17 counts of smuggling aliens into the United States.

Simonovich recently was convicted and sentenced to two years in prison for conspiracy to smuggle aliens into this country by air from Cuba. Three more conspiracy counts against him are pending.

Latest indictments were based on testimony of 17 aliens, most of them displaced persons from Europe who came here from several states to testify that Simonovich smuggled them into this country.

trucks, two locomotives and 12 box-cars destroyed. B-29 Superforts attacked the Chongja Rail Bridge and Communist front lines.
Naval and Marine warplanes from American carriers pounded both coasts of North Korea Tuesday. Pilots from the Philippine Sea and Boxer attacked rail targets in the Hamhung-Wonsan-Yangdok triangle on the east coast. A-1 Corsairs, Marine fliers from the Balrook reported destruction of more than 100 buildings and six gun positions.
American warships hit a variety of Red targets on the east. The Iowa and Mackenzie fired on Red soldiers at the eastern end of the battle line. The Hammer attacked the Koin area and the Rochester and Edmunds hit rail targets and Communist shore batteries in battered Wonsan.

queries and his replies would be published in full. Only one of the governor's long list was put to him by a newsmen: "Why do you keep your Crime Committee out of Tennessee?"
Kefauver replied his home state was omitted because the committee's investigations did not show it occupied an important place in the interstate crime setup. He added it would have helped him politically to take his committee into Memphis because local political heads were opposed to him.
He told reporters he has "no plans" to accept Warren's invitation to debate him on his "fitness to be President" and repeated that the governor had been given an opportunity to appear before the Crime Committee.
He said he will not renew his call on the governor when he returns to Tallahassee April 30, but added if Warren wants to greet him he will welcome that.
Commenting on his chances in the Florida preferential primary May 6, Kefauver said he realized "I have a hard uphill fight in the state because of the virulent opposition of Fuller Warren. I have no personal ill will to Fuller Warren. I am sorry he hates me with such a vengeance."
He said he is pleased with his showing in the New Jersey primary Tuesday where he was opposed on the Democratic ticket and commented he considers the vote "morally binding on the delegates. I hope they will be for me."
Kefauver took off from here for Panama City, where he planned a brief meeting with supporters. He will be in Pensacola tonight.

Odham said the program cost \$1,800, and would be his last, although he plans shorter radio quiz shows, running up to six hours, in several cities before the May 6 primary.
Odham insisted there is no "hoax," as Gov. Warren suggested about the documents he exhibits to support his claim that high administration figures plotted two years ago to build a Jacksonville-Miami turnpike without competitive bids.
Ell Fink and William Joe Sears, the Jacksonville lawyers whose names were on the memorandum about legality of building the road without bids, issued statements at Jacksonville declaring they never gave such a memo to any official state board. They didn't sign anything, though they said they could not discuss matters of their law clients.
Alabama has declined to name the man in whom the memorandum was addressed, but said he was "very high" in the administration.
Fink said "The very fact that more than two years have elapsed since the alleged conspiracy is undeniable fact that at no time have I ever discussed such a project with a state agency having authority with reference to same should be conclusive proof of the falsity of the statements."
Odham was accused of an "absolute lie" by Charles Ausley, Tallahassee attorney and McCarty supporter.
Ausley has said Ausley directed state workers to the location of some mislaid 1941 race track bill veto messages that he claimed were embarrassing to McCarty. He said Ausley was a "race track lobbyist" who had been paid \$7,500 by Hialeah Park.
Ausley said "Odham's statement is an absolute lie. I have never been a race track lobbyist and have never received a single cent for lobbying for any race track. The payment referred to by Odham was a legal fee for services in a law suit involving a constitutional question. The veto messages referred to were located by state employees."

Smith will be opposed in the November election by Archibald S. Alexander, former undersecretary of the Army, who was an opponent for the Democratic nomination.
