WHITEHORSE, Yukon Territory (UPI) - Robert F Kennedy, the senator turned mountain climber, began his personal pilgrimage up 13,-900-foot Mt. Kennedy today.

It was an effort to be the first person to climb the Canadian peak named in honor of his brother, the late Presdent John F. Kennedy. Weather conditions were

excellent when the senator's party reached the 8,500-foot base camp Monday afternoon by RCAF helicopter. The temperature was 20 above at the base camp and about 10 above at the summit

# TV Fans View Live Pictures Of Moon

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) -Ranger 9, blazing a trail through outer space for astronauts to follow, flashed live pictures of an arid lunar crater to American televiewers today before crashing on the

A battery of television cameras aboard the spacecraft sent back to earth a series of pictures of the lunar crater Alphonsus for about 20 minutes before the last of the Rangers crashed to destruction with

moon at 5,971 miles an hour.

pln-point accuracy 9:06 a. m. (EST).

The snapshots, including history's first for "live" television, flashed 245,500 miles through space and ended the Ranger project in America's moon exploration. Further probes will be made by successors to Ranger.

At the last few seconds before impact the screen showed numerous craters in great detail. The pictures appeared to viewers to "come up and hit you in the fact."

sion Laboratory (JPL) which controlled the Ranger flight, said many small craters never viewed before were seen on the floor of Alphonaus. Also it showed what appeared as a jagged crack on the floor of the crater.

> "It was 'go' from launch to impact, on schedule," a JPL technician exclaimed. The most complete series of

the moon ever taken will aid future manned moon flights to the lunar surface.

The first picture to be flashed on home screens in stereopticon fashion appeared to be clear. It showed a large crater and two smaller craters toward the lower bottom of the picture. Crater Alphonsus, was

in the lower left hand corner. More than 500 square miles of the highlands of the moon were covered by the first sequence of pictures, with the field gradually narrowing as ranger raced in to impact. Scientists at JPL described







The report by Howse and Associates of Tampa, drew protests from large number of tax assessors who disagreed with the way the tudy was made. Howze used a random sam-







Lien Von Borowsky: "The Florida Audubon So clety wishes to express its great concern about environmental contamination. It believes that the widespread and often careless use of insecticides and other pesticides is fraught with great danger, not only to the delicate web of life in the outdoors, but to

man himself. "We advocate that govern: mental agencies which dispense pesticides so lavishly over the lankscape be required to conduct basic research on the effects which such use has on both man and his environment.

"We reaffirm our opposition to the use of DDT in any mosquito control program in Florida.

"We are alarmed by the inereasing pollution of Florida's once-clean waters by industrial, agricultural and municipal waste.

"Another threat to clean water is the use of 'hard' detergents which do not break down and which keep on audsing and foaming after they have been discarded in home and municipal sewage systems. We urge that Audubon members and the public generally purchase only 'soft' detergents which will disinte-

grate after use. "For those and other reasons based on investigation the Florida Legislature will han the sale of hard detergents, will strengthen laws relating to the poliution of our waters, and will enact legislation controlling the use of penticides in the out-of-doors."

#### Which Has Fewest?

Two American dentists are rushing to Egypt to fill a cavity. An anthropologist is rushing with them, because the hole is not in anybody's tooth but in our knowledge of human history.

The dentists are from the Univers-Ity of Michigan, the anthropologist from the University of Pennsylvania. They plan to take X-rays and measurements of the facial bones and teeth of long-dead Nubians, a people who appeared in Egypt about 2000

The urgency is because the Nile River, backing up behind the Aswan Dam, is beginning to flood the ancient burial grounds of the Nubians and the Egyptian government has directed that all borrowed Nubians be put back before the waters reach

The scientists later plan to make the same studies with modern Nubians to discover what dental changes 40 centuries may have wrought in the human phiz.

What safe target will President Sukarno have to pick on when he finally drives all American interestsdiplomatic, economic and privateout of Indonesia, as he seems intent on doing?

Fidel Castro, another international troublemaker, at least has the advantage of the proximity of Cuba to the United States. This geographical fact alone is an embarrassment and pain in the neck for Uncle Sam.

But Indonesia, though a far larger country, is a lot farther away. Its threats and nibbling agression against neighboring Malaysia seem more a problem to Britain than to the United States.

Like Castro, whom he seems to be emulating, Sukarno has just seized American-owned rubber plantations in Sumatra and is making noises about closing down all U.S. Information Agency offices.

When there are no more businesses to expropriate and no more libraries to throw stones at and no more U.S. ambassadors to heckle, the next step may be to take another leaf out

of Castro's book and have Communist missiles installed in Indonesia.

But then, Sukarno has thrown in his lot with the Red Chinese in preference to the Russians, and any missile orders placed with Red China would be rather slow in being filled at this time.

Castro at least had the good sense to stay in the U.N., even if he has made himself an outlaw in the Western Hemisphere, Sukarno, however, is apparently trying to outlaw the whole world.

The decisions of a dictator, no matter how skilled he may be in the art of opportunism, are not easy ones.



#### **Ancient Mummy** Undergoing X-ray Tests

DURHAM, England (UPI)-An Egyptian mummy dated about 1,000 B.C. may turn out to be the first man known to have had an artificial limb. P. S. Rawson, the keeper of Durham University's Gulbenkian Museum of Oriental Art, said the mummy would be taken to a hospital within the next few weeks for X-rays of "his appalling misfortunes."

A preliminary X-ray has shown the man had six slipped discs, stones in the kidney and had lost a hand. "We hope to establish wheth-

er this man had been fitted with an artificial hand," said Rawson.

"If so, this may prove to be the earliest example. If he was an Egyptian court official appearing in processions it may he been decided that he should have an artificial hand in order to look normal."
