

Sanction Crime Rate Up 4 Per Cent 6 Years

Violent Crimes Soaring

WASHINGTON (AP)—The nation's crime rate rocketed 4 per cent in the last six years—with violent offenses rising 11 per cent last year alone—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported today.

The annual report on U.S. crime, the FBI reported:—Since 1960, while the nation grew 9 per cent, the volume of crime rose 42 per cent.—In the past year, the per capita crime rate was up 10.2 per cent while the number of crimes rose 11.4 per cent.—The number of serious crimes solved averaged 34 per cent, a drop of 2 per cent below the number solved the previous year. The percentage of crimes solved also dropped 1 per cent over the previous five-year period.

The report estimated that nearly 2.2 million serious crimes were committed in 1966, including an estimated 10,000 homicides. More than \$1.2 billion in property was lost but more than half of this later was recovered.

The report noted that statistical reports of crimes from local jurisdictions has improved in recent years but it observed that arrest statistics for example, were submitted by agencies representing only 70 per cent of the U.S. population.

The report listed as factors affecting crime such conditions as economic status and more of the population, weather, attitude toward law enforcement problems and composition of the population, with reference particularly to age, sex and race.

Hoover said that during the past year the 11 per cent jump in violent crime was led by robbery, up 14 per cent, forcible rape up 10, homicide 11, and aggravated assault 10.

Property crimes also were up 11 per cent, with larceny over \$50 up 10 per cent and automobile theft up 10 per cent.

The report noted that while 61 per cent of those arrested for robbery were under 30, for this group accounted for 63 per cent of those booked for auto theft. Of all offenses on the FBI's crime index, the report said, "auto theft, by far, the largest percentage of arrests of persons under 18."

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Sanction Strategy Planned By FEA

CLEARWATER (AP)—The leaders of the Florida Education Association (FEA) began meetings behind closed doors today to plan tactics for enforcing its sanctions.

The association has approved sanctions including efforts to prevent teachers from other states, tourists and new industries from coming to Florida.

Deputy Chairman of the FEA, J. Edgar Hoover, said the association is planning to launch a campaign which will effectively spread the sanction campaign which he said is currently 90 per cent of the FEA's activity.

Paul Constant, executive director of the FEA, made a speech opening the three-day school officials and said the association is winning "a colossal struggle with the enemies of education."

"We are indeed winning the war," he said. "Teachers are no longer hiding behind their professional status."

Constant said there have been many attempts to divide the ranks and weaken the association's ability to solve. We must be prepared for every tactic.

He said the meeting for the government and legislative action will include "expensive and accounting for every legislator they will be identified as friend or foe," he said.

Harman said there must be a teacher in every present for the 1967 election.

"To those who ask, when are you going to get off the backs of the government and legislative action?" he said. "We say when they no longer turn their backs on Florida school children."

"The governor and the Legislature must face the reality that we can no longer hold business as usual," Harman said.

More closed meetings are scheduled Saturday to study sanctions enforcement and to keep the majority of the force in the state.

CORNEBEEF STUFFED PEPPERS
 6 large green peppers
 1 cup corned beef

 Remove top and seeds from peppers, cook in boiling water until almost tender (about 15 minutes). Drain. Mix corned beef and next four ingredients. Fill peppers, top with crumbs. Place peppers in a little water in a baking pan. Bake in 375 degree oven for 25 minutes or until tender. Serve.

PUMPKIN FRITTERS
 4 eggs
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 tsp salt
 1/4 tsp nutmeg
 1/4 tsp cinnamon
 2 cups flour
 1 (16 oz) can pumpkin
 1 tsp vanilla
 1/2 cup baking powder
 melted butter
 Beat eggs with sugar, salt, spice and flour. Beat until mixture becomes smooth and fluffy. Add pumpkin, vanilla and baking powder. Whip until thoroughly mixed. Fry in oil. Let in melted butter until crisp. Remove brown on both sides. Do not fry too fast because fritter will be done in middle. Make about 4 dozen.

CRANBERRY-SOUP CREAM SALAD
 1 (7 oz) can cranberry-flavored gelatin
 1 cup hot water
 1 can whole-berry cranberry sauce
 1 cup chopped celery
 1 cup chopped nuts
 1 cup sour cream
 1/2 cup raisins and 1/2 cup water and let cranberry gelatin and cranberry sauce, celery, nuts and sour cream and stir into gelatin. Pour into mold and refrigerate. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise if you wish. Serves 6-8.

MACARON PIE
 1/2 saltine crackers

14 dates, cut very fine
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 1 tsp almond extract
 1 egg white, beaten
 Cream crackers until very fine. Add dates, sugar, pecans and almond extract. Mix well; then fold in stiffly beaten egg white. Put into buttered 8 inch pie pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Serve cold with whipped cream.

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Navy Jets Down 2 MIGs

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. Navy fighter-bombers shot down two MIG jets over North Vietnam today in the first dogfight in two weeks the U.S. Command announced.

The command also announced that 40 Vietnamese civilians were killed and 26 were wounded when U.S. Army helicopters returned enemy ground fire in the Mekong delta nine days ago. It said the civilians were in a "large group" which was firing on the helicopters.

The Soviet designed MIG15s the most advanced plane in North Vietnam's air force were brought down by air-to-air missiles fired by F4C Phantoms from the carrier Constellation.

The latest confirmed kills were the first since July 21 when Navy pilots from the carrier Bon Homme Richard downed three of the carrier model MIG15s. On July 27 U.S. pilots said they probably shot down a MIG15 but this was never confirmed.

The score now stands at 82 confirmed MIG kills by U.S. pilots and 20 American planes downed by the Communist inter-

'Black Power' Brown, Governor Kirk Tangle

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Black Power advocate H. Rap Brown turned his back Wednesday on Gov. Claude Kirk when he tried to welcome him to Florida, and walked away from a sheriff, who tried to read him a riot act.

Brown told a rally, "The streets are yours. Take them whenever you're ready."

The U.S. Command said a "U.S. Army light helicopter fire team"—believed to number two or three helicopters—was supporting the militia against 10 miles south of Saigon and "received permission to return enemy fire being received from a large group."

Senate Rebuffs Kirk In Probe Of Sheriff

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Legal aides of Gov. Claude Kirk said there is a "distinct possibility" the governor will move to again suspend Lee County Sheriff Penders Thompson despite a setback in the Senate Wednesday.

The Senate voted unanimously not to remove Thompson from office — as recommended by Kirk—and, in effect, re-elected him to the post he held since 1948.

The vote came shortly after a surprise speech by freshman Republican Sen. Ralph Clayton of Deland who criticized aspects of the special gubernatorial investigation of Thompson.

Clayton, a member of a select four-member committee assigned to look into Kirk's actions against Thompson, said, "I want to tell you this: that you'd better be careful in your approach to cleaning up your crime, because most of your dictators start that way."

"You've got to be careful who you give these badges to," Clayton said.

In a July 31 suspension order, Kirk said that results of an investigation indicated Sheriff Thompson was guilty of malfeasance and misfeasance of office, neglect of duty, and alleged specifically that the sheriff had known of gambling activities in his county and had done nothing to prevent them.

The suspension order specifically stated that Thompson permitted L. M. Dixon, described as a "bodie" or "club" operator, to continue gambling activities.

The governor has the power to suspend officials from office, but it takes concurrence of the Senate to remove them.

The Senate acted on a report by the special committee, of which Clayton was a member, and headed by Republican Sen. Joseph McClain of Tampa. Other members were Democrat Sen. John Mathews of Jacksonville and Elmer Friday of Fort Myers.

The committee had voted 4-0 to recommend that Thompson not be removed.

Gubernatorial legal aides Gerald Mager and Shelby Highsmith, who preside over the Thompson investigation findings before the committee Tuesday in an eight-hour hearing, were sharply critical of the Senate action.

Mager said there is what he called a "distinct possibility" Kirk will move to suspend Thompson again based on additional evidence that he said since has come up.

"It is within the prerogative of the governor to suspend the sheriff again based on those matters not specifically included in those (previous) charges," Mager said.

Gobbledygook — Navy Style

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy has put out its latest dictionary of gobbledygook allegedly used to inform sailors about transfers or assignments, and FYI, ROB PA doesn't mean stick up your father.

FYI is the old standby abbreviation, "for your information."

ROB is "report on board," and PA means "pending availability."

These are the simplest of an assemblage of verbal mishmash which the Navy has drawn up to keep interviewees messages short.

A new Navy order sent to all ships and stations directs commanding officers to use the abbreviations "to the maximum extent possible, except where the need for clarity is an overriding consideration."

Not only are there abbreviations in the little Navy dictionary but also equivalents for certain phrases, sentences or groups of sentences used in naval orders—280 entries all told—from ABPM to WHAP.

The Navy managed to use as few commonly known abbreviations as possible but improved on one or two. In addition to FYI, there's FYIG which means "for your information and guidance."

COBUS means "continental United States," but the Navy also has INUS, "in the United States," as well as OUTUS, which means you know what.

"It's ridiculous," one officer said, "but if we had to spell those words out, our communications would be behind three years."

He maintained the list is useful WHAP—when and where applicable.
