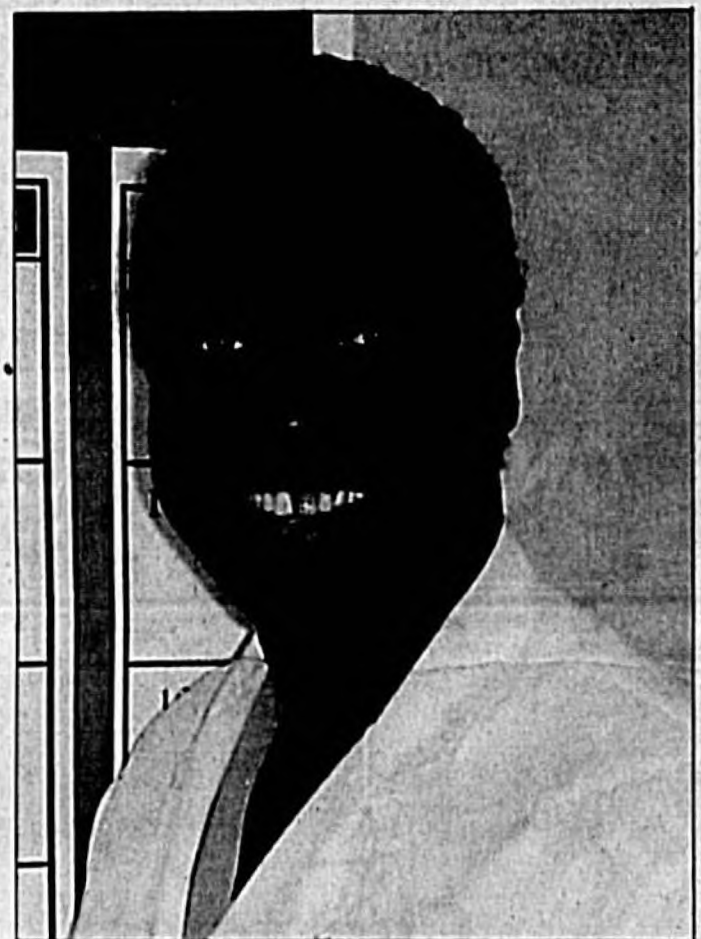

## Front Porch receives \$98,000 grant

SANFORD — Seven months after Gov. Jeb Bush named Goldsboro as a Front Porch community, the local council has secured \$98,000 in funding for one of its primary goals.

The Goldsboro Front Porch Council identified a void in services for elderly residents living in the community and established an assistance program to enhance the quality of life for seniors.

"We want to provide an umbrella of services for our elderly," said Velma Williams, the Sanford City Commissioner from District 2, which includes Goldsboro. "They are one of the most vital parts of the com-

munity. The youth may be the future, but they can't truly succeed without the help of our senior citizens who have invaluable life experience."

The Council has set a budget of \$260,000 to provide transportation services, minor home repairs, arts and crafts activities, landscaping services and a regular home visit program to monitor the overall welfare of seniors. More than half the money, \$133,980 has been pledge in in-kind services from

local businesses, with the remaining funding to come through state grants, fund-raising projects and private donations.

With the \$98,000, the council has nearly met its budget to fulfill the first of several community initiatives.

"Sanford is doing a very good job," said Yolanda Boronell, community coordinator for the Governor's Office of Urban Opportunity. "In a very short time, the community has come together and established a

working board. The hope for a new Front Porch community is that it will secure \$50,000 in funding within its first year. The council has nearly double that goal within the first six months. They've hit the ground running."

In its proposal, The Front Porch Council listed six specific areas of service it will establish, including:

- An arts and crafts program designed to exercise dexterity, provide mental stimulation and allow seniors the opportunity to socialize. Activities would range from ceramics and photography to holiday activities and sing-a-longs.
- Yard care services to assist elderly resi-

### Britannia Airways making move to Sanford airport

SANFORD — Officials at the Orlando Sanford International Airport recently announced that Britannia Airways is moving to OSI beginning in January.

The relocation of Britannia is part of an agreement that will make Sanford the airline's Central Florida gateway for the next seven years. Britannia, part of the Preussag Group which also owns Thomson Holidays, will operate 315-seat Boeing 767-300ER aircraft. The airline will operate year-round service from the United Kingdom, and is expected to increase OSI's traffic by more than 80,000 passengers per year.

"We have been watching the growth of Orlando Sanford and are impressed to see the airport continue to refine and enhance its operation," said Paul Cooper, purchasing manager for Britannia. "Its overall convenience, combined with recent terminal expansion and additional gates will provide and excellent experience for our passengers. Landing at Orlando Sanford ensures our guests' holiday gets off to the best possible start."

Larry Gouldthorpe, president of TBI Airport Management at OSI, noted Britannia had moved its service from Sanford to Orlando International Airport two years ago.

Airport Council International ranked OSI as the fastest growing North American airport in 2000, among airports with one million or more passengers.

## Robinson unearths academy's history

Time capsule found after five decades

SANFORD — During the recent construction work at Crooms Academy, Mr. Robinson, a janitor at the school, recently found a time capsule buried at the school some 50 years ago.

In the time capsule was information about the groundbreaking and the dedication of the new Crooms Academy building in 1949. During those ceremonies, the citizens of Sanford honored Professor and Mrs. J.N. Crooms, the principal and assistant principal.

Included in the capsule was a program from the May 16, 1947 Testimonial Banquet given in honor of this dedicated couple. They were educational servants in the community for 40 and 37 years respectively. The address for the occasion was given by Dr. William H. Gray, president of Florida A&M College in Tallahassee, and Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, president emerita and founder of Bethune-Cookman College in Daytona.

The capsule also included the commencement schedules and class rolls of the classes of 1948 and 1949.

The Class of 1948 held their Junior/Senior Social on Friday, June 4 at 8:30 p.m. at Jerry's Arcade. On Sunday, June 6 at 4 p.m., the Baccalaureate sermon was delivered by the Rev. C.L. Jones, pastor of St. John Missionary Baptist Church in Sanford. On Tuesday, June 8, at 12:40 p.m., the class had its Senior Chapel. On Friday, June 11, at 8:30 p.m., the commencement address was delivered by Dr. Richard V. Moore, president of Bethune-Cookman College.

The Class of 1949 heard a Baccalaureate sermon by the Rev. A.C. McQueen, pastor of New Mt. Calvary Missionary Baptist Church. The com-

# Helping hands

Deputies finish roof started by former colleague

Friday afternoon a dozen sheriff's office employees converged at a DeLand home to give a widow and fellow Seminole County deputy a special and needed Christmas gift — a new roof.

Deputy Helen Kilgore lost her husband, Deputy Mark Kilgore, on Nov. 10. He reportedly suffered an injury from trying to fix a leak on his home's roof. That injury caused an aggressive staph infection and spread too quickly for doctors to treat.

A local corporation made the holiday efforts last weekend possible. The Sunniland Corp. in Longwood donated thousands of dollars in roofing supplies to Seminole County Sheriff's Office deputies helping in the home project that, a month ago, took the life of one of their own.

"They gave me an estimate [in materials], but not a price," said Sgt. John Negri about the Sunniland Corp. "I asked what's the price? They said no we want to take care of this for them."

## Officers turn into elves for Christmas

SANFORD — Local law enforcement agencies lent a helping hand in recent weeks to ensure the holidays are merry for all Seminole County kids and seniors.

On Dec. 13, Seminole County Sheriff's Office employees played the role of Santa's elves again as they answered hundreds of Christmas letters.

The delivery of the letters from the US

Post Office to the sheriff's office was a little delayed this year because of anthrax concerns. For the first time since its inception in 1995, postal officials opened all the letters, inspected and pre-sorted them to ensure the safety of sheriff's office personnel.

"At that time [1995] no one had been doing it before, so the post office was kind enough to let us do it," said Sandy Cannon of the sheriff's office intelligence center. "It's very satisfying for the employees."

In two or three days, employees completed responses to the Santa letters during their lunch breaks and at home. In the beginning employees were handwriting the responses. This year a uniform black and white letter was used encouraging children to color in various Christmas pictures on the letter.

"We're pretty good at it. We've been doing it for awhile," Cannon joked.

The sheriff's office also helps any underprivileged children that are identified through the Santa letters by buying gifts with money from the sheriff's office Employee Benevolent Fund, said Cannon.

The sheriff's also collected items to donate to seniors who are shut-ins. The Meals on Wheels program picked up the gift baskets of personal care and food items Dec. 14 to distribute. According to Cannon, the Meals

## Pageant organizers looking for someone to wear Miss Seminole crown

SANFORD — Two months from now, someone's dream will come true when the 2002 Miss Seminole County is crowned.

Miss Seminole County Scholarship Pageant organizers, in the meantime, are encouraging young women from the area to submit applications for the third annual event.

"The pageant offers some very exciting opportunities for the young women," Pageant Executive Director Beverly Baird Boothe said. "It is a stepping stone to the Miss America Pageant, and numerous

scholarship opportunities are offered in their various areas of talent."

The 80-page application contains the rules and regulations for the pageant — ranging from the type of clothes contestants can wear to what makes a good platform of interest. The deadline to submit applications is Feb. 1.

Although the pageant is held in Sanford, Boothe emphasizes it is a community affair.

The winner will represent Seminole County throughout the year at various events and during June's Miss Florida pageant.

"Being part of the community is an integral part of the pageant and Miss Seminole County," Boothe said.

The third annual event will be held Saturday, Feb. 23, in the Helen Stairs Theatre. The program opens with morning interviews and culminates with the evening's pageant. Participants will have the opportunity to meet one another during rehearsals and the lunch and dinner provided during the day of the event.

Competitions include interview, swim-

suit and evening wear, and contestants are judged on their poise, style and platform. The panel of judges are trained in the rules and regulations of the Miss America Scholarship Pageant.

Once Miss Seminole County 2001 Sasha Marie Platt hands over her crown, this year's winner will have numerous scholarship opportunities offered to her from various colleges, including Seminole Community College and Stetson University. She also receives a scholarship from the local pageant franchise.

## Local phone number and address of IRS published

For the first time, Florida taxpayers will be able to find telephone numbers for their nearest Internal Revenue Service office by calling information or looking in the local telephone book, U.S. Sen. Bob Graham announced recently.

In response to constituent complaints about long waits when they called a nationwide toll-free number, Graham sponsored a provision in the 1998 IRS Restructuring and Reform Act mandating that local phone numbers and addresses for regional offices be published and made available to the public.

Florida and Montana are the first two states to have the numbers and addresses made public.

"I am very pleased to learn that these numbers are finally being publicized so that the people of Florida will be able to get more timely answers to their questions about their taxes," said Graham, who sits on the Senate Finance Committee.

A caller typically will get a voice-mail system that invites them to leave their name, telephone number and question. An IRS representative will research the answer and return the call.

Locally, residents may reach the regional IRS office at 321-674-0047. The office is located at 850 Trafalgar Court in Maitland.

# The Way We Were: History of local DAR, Part II

Today we continue the history of Sallie Harrison Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, which was organized May 1918. In May 1919, Brenda deVere Morrison made a motion "that a committee of four be appointed to consider a memorial for the soldiers of the recent World War." This was approved and fund raising was begun

immediately. In the regent's report that year, Mrs. Starling had stated "Our treasury, like Mother Hubbard's cupboard, we gave a card party." Card parties, along with rummage sales, were the preferred money making projects for many years. By March of 1920, the chapter had decided on a Marble Arch as a War Memorial. There is a not in the minutes of the November 1920 chapter meeting stating that the ladies planned to place an evergreen wreath on the monument in Fifth Street Park on Christmas morning in memory of the eight boys from Seminole County who had died in the war. To find out more about this monument, since it is not in the

park, Mrs. Boyd referred to Peter Schaal's book "Sanford as I Knew It" where she found that a marble shaft, donated by Frank Miller, had been erected in the Fifth Street Park as a memorial for the men who had fought in World War I. More than 1,600 people were on hand when it was unveiled on Feb. 16, 1919. It was the first such monument erected in Florida. A conversation with George Mayberry, commander of Campbell Lossing Post # 53 of the American Legion, revealed that the monument had at one time stood near the Legion Hut on the lakefront, had been moved to the Legion building on U.S. Highway 17/92 and now stands in front of the pre-

sent Legion Hall at 2870 Sanford Avenue. Back to Sallie Harrison Chapter's project of a marble arch. In October 1919, the organization asked Mr. Forrest Lake to be chairman of the Men's Committee to raise funds. Mr. Lake accepted the appointment and "very graciously announced that the men would obtain the money, giving the Daughters the unusual privilege of staying at home." As time went on, conversations with the "Legion Boys," as the minutes refer to them, indicated that they would greatly prefer the building of a home or recreation house for the Post

dents in maintaining their property. Services would include grass seeding, mowing and removal of debris such as leaves, limbs and hazardous items.

- Personal grooming services, from periodic shampoos to comprehensive hair care. In addition, the program would ensure personal care products are available to seniors.

- Transportation to medical appointments, church services, grocery stores, social service appointments and recreational outings.

- Minor home repairs to prevent small problems from becoming major problems effecting health and safety. The repairs would cover a broad spectrum of jobs, from caulking windows, doors and plumbing to fixing small roof and wall leaks.

- A "Knock-Knock" lifeline program. Because many seniors live alone, the program would

provide regular visitation to the elderly to check on their health and welfare. It would include assistance with small tasks like mailing monthly bills and assisting in making social service or medical appointments. The program would also include visitations by young people as part of a mentorship activity.

The entire program would have oversight from a full-time outreach worker, who would enlist volunteers to man the services. The nature of some services would require that they be provided at the senior's residence. The remaining activities would take place at the Good Samaritan Home and the West Side Recreation Center.

"We won't be able to provide everything at once," Williams said. "It will take some time to get some of the services established and manned with volunteers. We're working very hard to provide these programs as soon as

possible." The Front Porch program was created by Gov. Bush to revitalize depressed urban areas. While access to state and federal funding is an important part of the program, the success of Front Porch relies solely on a community's commitment to change. The community creates its own council, which establishes priorities and programs to revitalize the area based on the area's individual needs.

The Governor's Office of Urban Opportunity provides guidance and assists the council in cutting through state and federal bureaucracies by connecting it directly to government agencies. In addition, funding requests from Front Porch communities are usually get top priority over similar requests from non-Front Porch communities.

To date there are 12 Front Porch communities, all of which had to pass a rigorous review process before earning the designation.

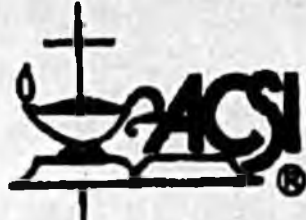

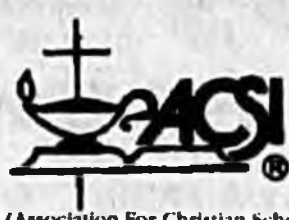

Continued from Page 5A rather than a marble arch.

A resolution was passed by the chapter stating: Resolved: To help build a genuine home which will last during the lifetime of each and every member, and which the Daughters hope may be used in the same way by their sons after them; Resolved further: That the Daughters wish to emphasize that this gift is as free as air, that they reserve no rights or interests; that they make no claims and ask no privileges."

Over the next several years, fund-raising for the Memorial Fund included a ball on June 14, 1921; subscription bridge in 1924; a "Society Vaudeville" starring actors who were wintering in Florida, and a bridge luncheon which included an exhibit of antiques at the Forrest Lake Hotel (Tickets \$2).

The chapter was greatly concerned when the Legion Boys built a log cabin on the lakefront in 1924, stating that a stately handsome home preferably of lasting stone had been their intent, and they feared the log building would not endure. That log cabin is still there!

Other philanthropic activities included donations to the School Board to help pay for school lunches, sewing layettes for European and Chinese babies and hemming dressing and tray scarves for the Sanford Hospital. These sewing projects were often completed during chapter meetings.

While contributing to the needs of Seminole County citizens, the chapter did not forget that its members were first members of the National Society, and with this in mind, they spent considerable time and money in support of National and State goals.

One of the goals of the National Society has always been the marking of historic spots. On the national level, the hope in 1922 was for a modern road crossing the United States following the pioneer trails, with a statue of a pioneer mother and her children erected in each state through which the highway passed. This was finally accomplished in April 1929.

In Florida, the goal was to mark the site of Jean Ribault's landing on the Atlantic Coast between St. Augustine and Jacksonville. This is the location of the first settlement of French Huguenots in America, in 1562. Sallie Harrison contributed its share toward the project. They involved the entire community, including school children who donated their pennies.

Mrs. J.N. Whitmer was the chapter's first chairman of the Old Trails Committee. In 1920, she reported that a search was under way to locate the deed to the cemetery at Fort Reed. However, the earliest marker placed by the chapter was the one at Mellonville Avenue and Second Street, commemorating the site of Fort Mellon. The plot of land where it is located was donated by Harry Bodwell, developer of the Mayfair subdivision. He and Forrest Lake agreed to donate the bronze tablet, but the boulder was to be provided by the Sallie Harrison chapter. It was hoped that a Florida rock could be used, but none was found to be suitable.

A granite stone was ordered in March 1925 at a cost of \$115. It was finally in place by April and the unveiling was set for May 15, 1925. The ceremony

was impressive. The municipal band played martial music; invocation was by Dr. E.D. Brownlee, pastor of First Presbyterian; an historical sketch of Fort Mellon, written by Mrs. Whitmer, was read by G.W. Spencer Jr. The tablet was unveiled by G.A. Speer and the exercises closed with the playing of the "Star Spangled Banner," by the band. Following the ceremony, a reception was hosted by Sallie Harrison Chapter at the Woman's Club.

Mr. Cameron, Mr. Connelly and Mr. Foster had also contributed to the cost of the marker, and finally in November 1925, Mrs. DeForrest gave the balance due on the marker.

In later years, under the guidance of Annie Caldwell, the chapter would place six other markers. In addition, a special marker was placed on the grave of Mrs. Starling in Lakeview Cemetery upon her death in 1931.

At the present intersection of

Mellonville Avenue and Grove Manor Drive, a marker identifies the location of Fort Reed, another of the string of forts built along the route from Fort Mellon to Fort Brook in Tampa. This marker was unveiled in 1934 and rededicated in 1990.

On the 100th anniversary of the founding of Rollins College, in April 1935, a marker was placed on North Park Avenue near City Hall. At some time, this marker was removed and stored with other discarded

road signs by the road department. Fortunately, Mr. Franke, working with the Seminole County Museum, found the marker and it was erected and rededicated on the former Lyman Bank Building at the corner of Park Avenue and First Street. Trustees had met in the former Lyman Bank to formally organize Rollins College.

In February 1937, under the leadership of Mrs. H.J. Lehman, the city of Sanford celebrated the centennial of the founding

of Fort Mellon (Feb. 8, 1837).

One of the many exciting events was the dedication of Fort Mellon Park and the unveiling of a marker commemorating the founding of the fort donated by Sallie Harrison Chapter. This, too, was an impressive event, attended by many notables, including a descendant of Captain Mellon and Carola Sanford Dow, General Sanford's daughter. Also attending were Dr. Alfred J. Hanna of Rollins College and other dignitaries.

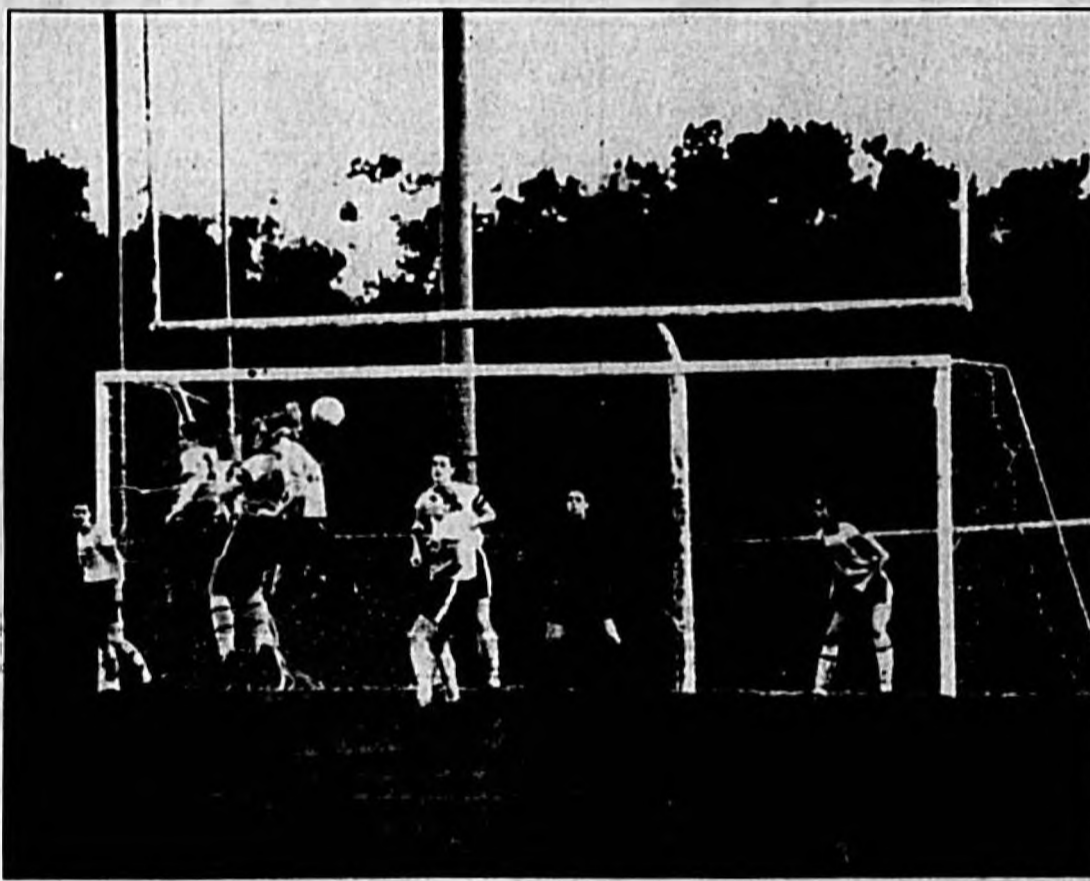

Ole Miss (7-4) jumped out to an early lead on a three-pointer by Kelly Ally just 30 seconds into the game which sparked an 11-2 run. The Lady Rebels capitalized on 13 Golden Knight turnovers and poor shooting (25-percent on 7-for-28) to take a 36-19 advantage at the half.

The game didn't swing in UCF's favor during the second half either as tenacious defense by Ole Miss kept the Golden Knights (6-5) without a field goal until junior Lanetra Cooks scored on a three-pointer at the 13:20 mark. Two minutes later, the Lady Rebels earned a 41-point advantage (66-25) - their largest margin of the game.

The biggest difference in the contest was rebounding and foul shots. Ole Miss owned a 53-31 advantage on the boards while UCF went 8-for-21 from the free throw line.

Despite the loss, it was a banner night for Cooks. She tied the school record for most three-pointers in a game with seven and also tied her career-high with 24 points. Freshman Ali Roberts contributed 15 points in the loss.

In the day's earlier game, South Alabama (2-0 in the Classic) unofficially won the tournament by edging Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, 64-62, as the Jaguars made three of four foul shots in the final 1:02 of the game.

On Friday, Sara Carter hit a three-pointer at the buzzer to give South Alabama a 62-61 overtime win over Mississippi.

Ole Miss led by as many as 21 points in the game and had a 37-20 lead at the intermission as USA shot only 33.3-percent from the field compared to 55.6-percent for the Lady Rebels.

The second half was the opposite with the Jaguars outshooting Ole Miss, 44.4-percent to 24-percent.

In the other game, sophomore Marvelous Washington tossed in a career-high 19 points as UCF snapped a two-game losing streak with an 87-80 victory over Texas A&M-Corpus Christi.

The first half was hard fought as the lead changed hands no fewer than six times. UCF was up 21-19 with 9:14 left before intermission but a three-pointer by Amanda Bryant sparked the Islanders, who would capitalize on the Golden Knights' 13 first-

## Downtown targeted by burglars

### Almost a dozen Sanford establishments report break-ins during holiday week

SANFORD — In a rash of holiday crime, 10 downtown Sanford businesses fell victim to the hands of burglars this past week.

Friday morning four different establishments reported break-ins to the police. Angler Roofing at 409 Laurel Ave., Sanford Dry Cleaning at 205 N. Palmetto Ave., Global Construction at 210 S. Park Ave. and Jack's Cycle at 223 W 3rd St. all reported burglaries that probably occurred Thursday night or early Friday morning.

Nothing was reported stolen from the businesses except \$50 from the dry cleaners. Other businesses might still

report missing items as several of the owners are away on holiday vacations, and a true account of their inventory may not be completed until their return, said Cleo Cohen, police department spokeswoman.

Burglars also victimized almost a whole city block in downtown Sanford sometime between Christmas Eve and Christmas day.

## Police catch 'Scream' bandit

SANFORD — With the help of "some damn good police work" an alleged armed robber was brought to justice Thursday after committing several stick-ups over the holiday weekend, said a police spokeswoman.

Thomas Jamell Daniels, 17, of Sanford was arrested Wednesday night by Sanford Officer Erik Zabick who noticed the juvenile acting "a little suspicious" in the Handy Way parking lot at 25th Street and Sanford Avenue.

According to police, Daniels approached the convenience store and tried to open the door, but it was locked. Officers intercepted Daniels as he walked back to the vehicle. When they asked if it was his car he replied "no it's someone else's". The officers suspicions were raised even further as they had just witnessed Daniels exit the vehicle to walk to the store's entrance.

The vehicle turned out to be stolen, and within the car officers found two guns and tools that could possibly be used in an burglary. Sanford investigators started questioning Daniels at 3 a.m. and by the afternoon he had confessed to two armed robberies committed on Dec. 23.

Investigators followed-up with questioning after Daniels' initial arrest because of several reasons, said department spokeswoman Cleo Cohen. Although the guns found in the vehicle did not match the gun used in the robberies, his arrest came "in the same general area" that police recovered a blue cargo van known to be used in the robberies.

Daniels began his robbing crusade at approximately 11:20 p.m. last Sunday when he approached the 1st Street Kwik Stop convenience store front counter brandishing a silver handgun. He was wearing a mask made famous by the 1996 Wes Craven horror flick Scream. Daniels received about \$300 from the store clerk and exited the store.

About 20 minutes later the Halloween masked robber struck again at the Circle K store at 2631 Sanford Avenue. The second robbery is in the jurisdiction of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Daniels has been charged with grand theft auto, posses-

## Water Works

### Aeration system makes city's water cleaner

LAKE MARY — State of the art technology is making the city's water cleaner — and possibly better tasting — for residents.

A new aeration system is now in operation at the city's water plant, Public Works Director John Deamud said. The \$1.3 million plastic structure has been on-line for about a month.

"The aeration system is state of the art for volatilizing compounds and impurities," Deamud said. "We now probably have the best water in Seminole County."

Water is pumped from the city's wells to three 40-foot aeration towers located on Rinehart Road. As the water cascades down through the tower, whiffle-like balls break up the liquid into smaller droplets. As air is forced up through the tower, it volatilizes the contaminants found within the water particles.

Plans for the new water filtering system began earlier this year when dichloroethene (DCE) was found in deep aquifer water in eight wells in Lake Mary and Heathrow. The contaminants do not occur naturally in the environment and are mostly used in manufacturing, adhesives, paint removers and other items.

A formal investigation into the source of the contaminates was initiated last spring by officials from the Department of Environmental Protection, who declared in July that the city's water was safe to drink. The source has yet to be found.

Although the water was never unsafe for Lake Mary residents, the city authorized the firm of Blount Sikes & Associates to design and construct the aeration system. In addition to addressing DCEs, the system helps reduce other compounds within the water, such as iron.

"Some people even say the water tastes bet-

## One-cent local sales tax returns Tuesday

SANFORD — Monday will be the last day for the 6 percent sales tax in Seminole County.

For three months, the county has had a reprieve from the one-cent local option sales tax after the 10-year tax expired at the end of September. Voters approved Sept. 4 by a 72 to 28 percent margin a 10-year extension of the tax to begin Jan. 1, 2002.

"In some joking references we had some people saying they would hold off until October to do their Christmas shopping," said Pam Hastings, administrative manager of the county's public works department.

The additional one cent applies to all retail goods that are also subject to the state sales tax. Most services are excluded such as those provided by professionals in the fields of medicine and law.

The local option tax also has a ceiling

for expensive single items. The extra penny only applies to the first \$5,000 of a purchase therefore the maximum impact is \$50. That could be one Ulysses S. Grant saved for consumers on any major buy before Tuesday.

"The question becomes, from a consumer standpoint, is \$50 going to make a decision," Hastings said. "From a car dealership's standpoint, I don't think \$50 makes or breaks a car sale."

Although the state department of revenue administers, monitors and enforces sales taxes, the county has mailed out several notifications alerting consumers and merchants to the three-month break and reinstatement of the tax. Hastings said it's not only important for consumers to understand the

tax, but also retailers who might have to adjust their cash registers.

"We wanted to be absolute certain the word was going out," Hastings said.

The 10-year extension is slightly different from the original, as not all the proceeds will be funneled back into area transportation needs. Seminole County Schools will receive 25 percent of the one-cent sales tax to improve classrooms and to build two new schools.

Some projects funded through the one-cent sales tax might also be delayed now because early estimates were compiled before the economy was hit by the terrors of Sept. 11. During the next 10 years, the one-cent sales tax was estimated to bring in approximately \$530 million with just under \$48 million slated for 2002.

Since the county has not been receiving the one cent sales tax the past three
