### Courts will hear all of fired county official's complaints

SANFORD - A former Seminole County official embroiled in a \$20 million lawsuit she filed after being fired will get her day in two courts after her claim for wrongful termination was reinstated on appeal.

Once the county's Land Acquisition coordinator, Joyce Suber was fired October 24, 1996, for misconduct, including falsifying time cards, discussing items in an investigation into her department and abuse of authority. Suber maintains the accusations are untrue and that she was wrongfully terminated.

"The court found Joyce has a right to have her claim heard," Suber's attorney, John Head said Friday.

Suber filed her lawsuit against the county on June 30, 1997, alleging age discrimination, sexual harassment and wrongful termination after serving more than nine years, earning outstanding performance reviews from her bosses. A county investigation concluded she forced two county employees to work on her son's Gulf County political campaign for property appraiser.

Suber appealed her firing, but a county grievance committee upheld it.

The county also ordered an investigation of the Land Acquisitions Division of Public Works. Information from that investigation was turned over to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement when Clerk of the Courts Marianne Morse discovered improprieties and possible criminal activity. A shakeup of management followed, including the abrupt resignations of County Manager Ron Rabun and key officials. **See Suber, Page 6A**

### Local environmental writer chronicles a pristine Cuba

SANFORD - In between journeys, local environmental writer Bill Belleville shared his latest adventure aboard a scientific expedition ship to Cuba.

On assignment for the Discovery Channel, Belleville, a member of the 40-person crew, returned to his Sanford home Monday following a one month journey to the island of Cuba where he also met Fidel Castro.

Castro spent about two hours on board the 206-foot vessel speaking to scientists and journalists through an interpreter mostly about the environment, Belleville said.

"He was very curious about what we were doing," Belleville said. "He seemed to like talking and asked what type of things we did in this country. He even gave the cook a lobster recipe."

The purpose of the trip, Belleville said, was to explore Cuba's pristine coral reef and collect baseline data, something that has never been done there. The information, he said, can be used to help plan for the future.

Belleville, who made 12 dives into the surrounding waters of the coral reef, said Cuba is what Florida was 100 years ago before all the development. During the expedition, which was funded by the Discovery Channel, Belleville wrote and transmitted 14 dispatches to the channel's website.

"We discovered 30 new fish that have never been documented or seen before in Cuba," he said. "It's a thrill to be next to the cutting edge of science."

What made Cuba ideal for the research project, Belleville said, was the untouched condition of the coastline and the coral reef because of the country's grim economic conditions. The embargo preventing travelers from the United States to Cuba and vice versa also prevents the exploitation of the coastline. If they aren't careful, however, he said Cuba could see the same negative effects on the coral reef as have been seen in Florida's Keys.

"The question is will they maintain the conservation ethic even when the developers start coming in with lots of money," he said.

Belleville, 52, said during this trip he had the **See Cuba, Page 6A**

### The man who plans to unseat the chairman

SANFORD - It took him half a year to secure a special telephone number that Bob West believes will help him in his campaign for election to the Board of Seminole County Commissioners.

The number is 767-OTAX (0824).

West, 45, says there's a real "contrast" between himself and Commission Chairman Randy Morris, whose District 2 seat he would like to take on the board.

"Randy likes big government and lots of taxes," West said. "I'm for tax relief, no new taxes, no new debt without voter approval and better control of growth as Seminole County approaches buildout. Taxpayers, not politicians, need to decide whether to encumber your future tax bills. You know best how much you can afford."

West, 45, has been campaigning for the position since October and has rounded up \$10,000 in contributions.

"More than 75 percent of the donations I've received are for amounts of \$100 or less," West said. "This kind of sup-

port from citizens who are giving what they can in an effort to make this needed change is inspiring.

"For a challenger to get this much support this early on is a good sign," he said, "especially when I'm running against the chairman of the Seminole commission. It's also a sure **See West, Page 6A**

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# Pulitzer Prize winner to speak to Sanford chamber members

SANFORD - Eddie Adams, winner of the 1969 Pulitzer Prize will be the featured speaker at the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce installation of officers and awards banquet on Jan. 16 at the Timacuan Golf and Country Club in Lake Mary.

Doug Sills, president and chief executive officer of the Columbia Medical Center, Sanford, will be installed as the chamber's 53rd president. Awards to be presented at this year's event include the 1997 Topper and Luis Perez Humanitarian Awards, business person of the year, volunteer of the year, ambassador of the year, the president's excellence award, and the sports hall of fame award.

In addition to winning the Pulitzer Prize, Adams has received more than 500 international and national awards. He

is the most decorated and most published photographer in America today and certainly one of the most respected and versatile photographic talents of all time, said chamber director Ronald Rose.

Adams photographs leaders in all fields, from heads of state to personalities in film, television, sports, and high fashion. Adams' photographs regularly appear on the covers and front pages of magazines and newspapers including Time, Newsweek, Vogue, Paris Match, Parade, The London Sunday Times Magazine, The New York Times, Stern, Vanity Fair and Life.

Adams has also photographed 13 wars, the latest in Kuwait in 1991. One of his most memorable photographs showing a Vietnamese general shooting a Viet Cong at point blank range earned Adams the Pulitzer in 1968.

# Entrepreneurs must define purpose of business

I recently reviewed an email from a client that I have been working with for the last year. He is struggling with a number of issues in trying to run his business. First and foremost, is the need to produce more real income from the business. There are two ways to do this: reduce expenses or increase income while holding expenses constant. When we first talked about this, it became apparent to me that another problem was underlying the issue.

The basic problem, it seemed, is that he had not made what I think is the basic decision about his business. That is, why does it exist? You see, he was concerned about family members who worked for him and the effect any changes would have on them. I spoke to him like an old "Dutch" uncle and asked him what purpose did his business

serve. He began telling me about what good service they gave and the jobs they created and the freedom he enjoyed. But while all those things are great and important, they are not as important as making the owner money.

A business exists to create return to its owners. Anything else is simply wrong and in the long run doomed to failure.

After one of our counseling sessions, my client and his family members went back and met over the issues we explored. In the course of the meeting, they discovered that changes would have to be made. An unprofitable division that supported one family member would have to go because while it did not serve the overall health of the business.

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# The way we were: First Baptist Church in the mid 1950s

Bob Cassels recently sent me a copy of a 1950 Christmas program presented by the music department of First Baptist Church which he had found between two floors of a house he is renovating at 218 W. Fifth Street. It has my dad's name in it so he thought I would like to see it.

The title of the cantata was "A Christmas Mystery" by Nathaniel Lundquist. Several of the participants are now deceased while many of those in the intermediate ensemble are now grandmothers. I'm sure that many of these names will be familiar to you.

Other in the Intermediate Girls Ensemble were Carrel Crim, Dianne Drew, Carol Ellison, Evie Kratzert, Mary Lloyd, Sue Koke, Betty Ann Slaton, Barbara Wimberly, Jane Osborne, Cindy May, Rose Kratzert, Jackie Berryhill, Penny Pulver, Lynn Crabtree, Joyce Benton, Sharon Riser, Allison Lee, Ethel Riser, Sheryl Woodard, Kathy Westfall.

Organist was Mrs. Marvin Milam who served in this position for about 30 years. The director, Kirby Rogers, was a music student at Stetson University and a classmate of mine there. He was paid \$100 per month and served for two years. We were good friends and I remember catching rides back to Stetson with him occasionally on Sunday nights. One night he forgot me and my dad had to drive me over. Kirby now has his doctorate and lives in Edgewater with his wife Evelyn.

While I'm writing about First Baptist Church, I'll continue with some other information from 1955-57 as found in A History of First Baptist Church: 1884-1984 that I wrote for our 100th anniversary.

Two of those who were licensed to preach in 1955, Leonard Jones and Wesley Hamil, did enter the full time ministry and have been pastors of Baptist churches for many years. Leonard has been a pastor in Seminole and Orange counties while Wesley is in LaBelle.

Miss Ruth Archer, also a Stetson student, resigned as music director and part time church secretary on August 1. Mrs. Roy Reel succeeded her as part time secretary; this was the only secretarial position at First Baptist at the time. Kirby Rogers came as part time music director in September.

On October 30, John Miller resigned as educational director to accept a position as pastor of a mission church in Hypoluxo sponsored by First Baptist Church of West Palm Beach. On Nov. 30, Fred B. Fisher was called to be associate pastor at a salary of \$4200. He was to assist Dr. W.P. Brooks, pastor since 1929 with pastoral duties and to also oversee the educational program.

The church's first newsletter was mailed out in February of 1956. It was named "The Booster" and was produced once a month and edited by Rev. Fisher.

The E.D. Brownlee House at 506 Magnolia Avenue was bought for \$11,000 on March 11, 1956 and the Ponder House on September 5 for \$4,200. Marvin Milam loaned the money for the latter at 4 percent interest. The McCasin house across Magnolia was sold and the proceeds applied to the church dept.

The first recorded youth week was held at the church beginning on April 15. Serving as officers were pastor Frank Bryan; associate pastor, Forrest May; youth director, Martha Grogan; Sunday School superintendent, Otto Thomas; deacon chairman, Howard Allred; and treasurer, Milner Osborne.

Mr. and Mrs. O.P. Wade gave one acre of land at Elder Springs that year for the Elder Springs Baptist Chapel. The church paid \$1,000 for the house on the property which was being used for Sunday School and an open air building was erected for wor-

ship services. Dr. H.H. Martin was pastor of the mission and ordained as deacons were W.D. Stansell, C.W. Ergle and R.E. Soderblom. The mission was begun by First Baptist in January 1954 and was organized as Elder Springs Baptist Church October 7, 1957. A new building was built and Joe Douthitt was called as first pastor. Several years later it withdrew from the Southern Baptist Convention and became an independent Baptist Church now named Victory Baptist.

First Baptist approved a budget of \$51,913 for 1957; Dr. Brooks' salary was \$5,460.

On March 31, 1957, Dr. Brooks issued a challenge to the Hermit-

Morris Sunday School class to start a branch Sunday School in the Pinecrest area in order to reach out to new people. The class took up the challenge and began meeting at Pinecrest Elementary School on May 5. Attendance grew rapidly so they were able to constitute as a church on June 27. Rev. Joe Courson was called as pastor and there were 80 charter members.

On Easter Sunday 1957, a record 1,120 people were in Sunday School at First Baptist. All of the church owned houses on the block were being used for classes.

Kirby Rogers resigned effective May 26 W.L. Harmon became

director of the adult choir and Mrs. Guy Bishop took over as director of the youth choirs. A graded choir program was begun in September, six new choirs were formed for children, youth and young adults.

In November, the church voted to increase the deacon board by nine members; those elected and later ordained were Donald Knight, Benny Austin, Melvin Dekle, G.B. Drake, I.E. Estridge, Irving Pryor, W.A. Kratzert, Louis Hoop and W.D. Gunter.

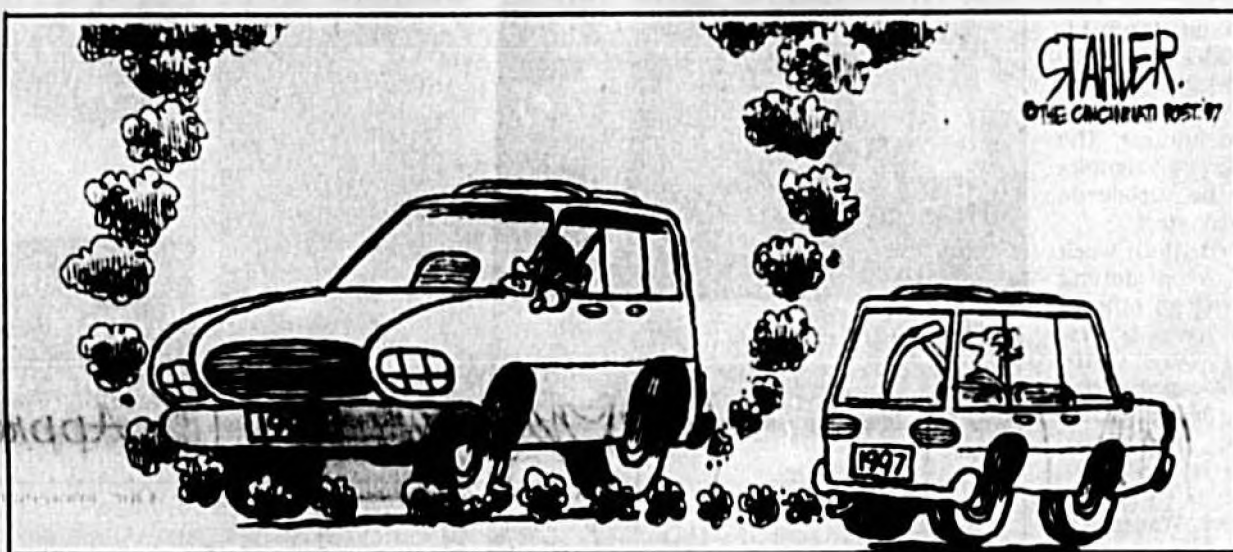
### Our Seminole County students

#### Longwood: No pay, no service

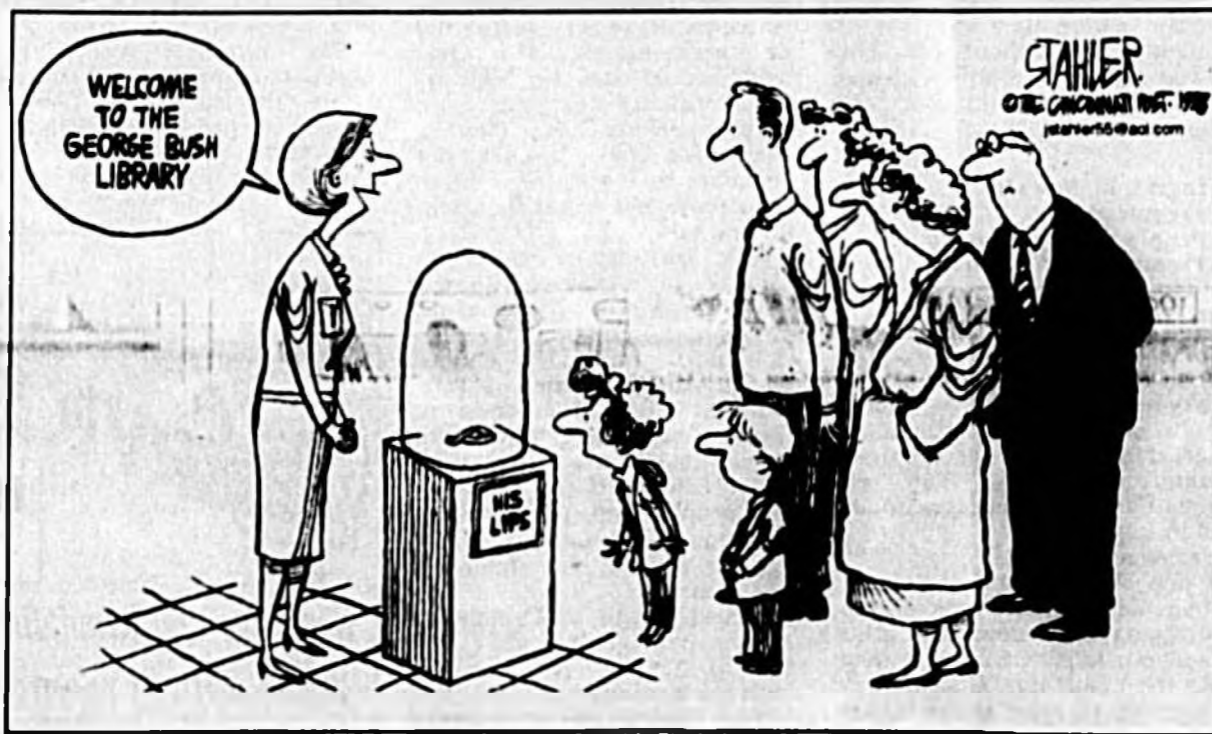
Recent media coverage attempts to make Longwood look as if its political leaders would be completely wrong if they refused to follow the edict of one newspaper on the matter of the CRA on 17-92. One article stated, inter alia, that "...commissioners ought to do what's right for the people they represent..." Fortunately, Longwood's elected officials followed this advice and did what is best for the people of Longwood. We should all stand and applaud.

Longwood has a large number of enclaves for which it gives fire and police services but receives not 1 cent in revenue. Longwood pays for all of the streets that surround these enclaves but gets nothing in return. The bottom line: Longwood has been subsidizing the county for a long, long time. The county gets all the money, and we pay all the bills. Consider East Street, for example. Another newspaper printed an article about this street and the need for its paving. What wasn't said is the area of the east side of this street that is an enclave, and the owners would not be assessed so much as 1 cent for its paving. Neither could they be forced to help defray the expense of a sewer line.

What county officials refuse to acknowledge is the law on this subject that states, "The Legislature recognizes that enclaves can create significant problems in planning, growth management, and service delivery, and therefore declares that it is the policy of the state to eliminate enclaves." The statute further states, "In order to expedite the annexation of enclaves of 10 acres or less...a municipality may: Annex an enclave by interlocal agreement with the county having jurisdiction of the enclaves..." Note that state policy is to eliminate enclaves and provides a vehicle "to expedite" their elimination.

About three years ago, annexation of enclaves was a subject of discussion. What happened? Our then new leaders went to Sanford with hats in hand which the county commissioners promptly filled up with garbage. Instead of saying absolutely no, we'll go to court because the proposed agreement violates state policy, Longwood's leaders acquiesced to an agreement that permits annexation only when and if the property changes hands. In the meantime, residents of Longwood would continue to subsidize the county. It was wrong then, and it is wrong now. Note the language in the statute: "In order to expedite." So much for following state policy.

Now let's take a look at the



parcels on 17-92 that might meet the lawful definition of slum or blighted area. They are not in Longwood. They are enclaves. Our code enforcement officer has no jurisdiction in the county. Where has the county been? County officials want to use money derived from Longwood to fund improvements on their slums/blighted areas. More subsidizing by the people of Longwood. Baloney! And if the county wants a sewer line on 17-92, let them pay for it. The residents of Longwood should not be paying for a sewer line for people not in our city and for whom we could not force to hook on!

Finally, if the county refuses to permit Longwood to annex all of its enclaves, I hope our commissioners tell the county to start providing fire and police services to property it owns in our city and that we will no longer respond to emergencies in the county if county personnel are not available because they are responding to property they own in our city. Apopka sent a message to Orange County. No pay, no service.

Our elected officials have a duty only to the citizens of Longwood. County commissioners, on the other hand, should not forget that Longwood residents are also residents of Seminole County.

# Mail order swimsuit businesses in hot water

TALLAHASSEE - Florida Agriculture and Consumer Services Commissioner Bob Crawford is taking action against two South Florida companies involved in mail-order swimsuit businesses. A lawsuit has been filed against Priscilla Swimwear Inc. and Golden Tropics of Miami Inc., and the owner of the companies, Marian Albert Hillman. The action was taken after his office received more than 170 complaints from people in the United States and Canada. The complaints alleged that after responding to advertisements in Seventeen and Cosmopolitan magazines, they either did not receive a swimsuit or they did not receive an acceptable swimsuit. The reasons for the swimsuits being unacceptable ranged from mismatched bikinis to the swimsuits being "torn, stained, soiled or otherwise unfit." The ads promised the suits could be returned for a full refund, yet, most consumers who returned the suits never received a

refund. A temporary injunction preventing the companies from engaging in further deceptive tactics has already been entered by Judge Murray Goldman, based on the motion filed by Crawford.

"This lawsuit should put people on notice that scamming the public will not be tolerated," Crawford said.

Documents filed by the state also revealed that the companies were not paying for the magazine ads.

The defendants were charged with violating the state's Unfair Trade Practices Act, the Mail or Telephone Merchandising Rule, and misleading advertising. The potential fine penalty for each violation is \$10,000, restitution to consumers and punitive damages.

Although mail order can be a convenient way to shop, Crawford said shoppers should not be too hasty. Never send cash and keep copies of all ads and correspondence, he said.

# Dignity for animals

The report of circus trainer Richard Chipperfield's hospitalization after being mauled by a tiger in St. Petersburg, Fla., did not reveal the whole story.

What compels elephants, tigers, and other "circus animals" to attack their trainers is the simple fact that the fear-based methods of "taming" these animals, drive many over the edge like a battered wife. You have only to look at the "tools of the trade" -- whips, bullhooks, chains, fire sticks, and electric shock prods -- to figure that out.

Social isolation, sexual privation, beatings, confinement to small cages, and food and water deprivation are all well-

documented aspects of animal-based circuses. Undercover footage has revealed trainers of big cats beating them with ax handles and punching them in the face with closed fists -- small wonder, then, that some animals crack. The tiger in the latest Chipperfield incident paid with his life.

It is time to stop patronizing animal circuses and send the hapless performers to sanctuaries where they can live in dignity and without fear. This would prevent future tragedies involving both humans and animals.

Morris, who has been the chairman of the board in three of the four years he has served in his first term, is expected to announce his 1998 candidacy in the next two weeks. He said Wednesday he considered his work for the county his top priority as of today.

"He's probably not that concerned yet," West said, "and figures there's no big rush."

West said he was a life-long Republican who participated in his first presidential campaign as a first grader passing out Richard Nixon flyers for the 1960 election against John F. Kennedy.

A native of Westminster in Bucks County, Pa., West went to Florida Bible College in Kissimmee and did missionary work for 20 years for the New Tribes Mission. He said his passion is computers and that while with New Tribes he created linguistics programs that helped translate foreign languages so they could be used on the average personal computer.

West said he owned his own bookstore when he was 21, and was in Thailand for 10 years as part of his New Tribes Mission assignment.

He is currently the state field director for the Florida Chris-

tian Coalition and is a member of the Zoning and Planning Board of Seminole County. He and his wife, Eileen, have been married 25 years, live in Longwood and attend First Baptist Church of Orlando. They have three children.

"I've become involved in politics to try and make a difference," West said. "I encourage good but less government."

West said he had worked on campaigns for Sen. John Oastalkiewicz, Rep. Bob Brooks, Rep. Tom Feeney and Seminole County Commissioner Grant Maloy. Maloy's wife, Athena, is an office manager in West's campaign.

"I'd like to see Bob West do well," Grant Maloy said Thursday. "He's straight forward and honest - not as flashy or as Clintonesque as Randy Morris."

Maloy said that West was a "big help" in his getting elected. "He's a good conservative Republican who has done a lot behind the scenes. Bob's not going around complaining but actually showing there are better ways to do things."

"He was the chairman for the Contract with the County program, which many of us supported. Should he get in office, Bob West will be another vote against unnecessary spending and fight for lower taxes. I'd welcome a vote like that," Maloy said.

Seminole County filed a motion in the 18th Judicial Circuit Court to dismiss the claim for wrongful termination. Suber is seeking \$250,000 damages on that charge. The court granted the motion, from which Suber's attorneys appealed. The United States Court, Middle District, reinstated Suber's claim and bifurcated the proceedings. The federal charges of discrimination will be heard in federal court. Other charges will be heard in Seminole County circuit court.

"We asked the District Court to be the appellate court. Joyce was very pleased that the court agreed with her petition to amend and have her claims heard," Head said.

Besides the \$250,000 damages for wrongful termination, Suber is seeking \$5 million for age discrimination, \$5 million for the county's refusal to respect her employment and property rights, and to continue her employment, and \$10 million for sexual harassment. She contends in her suit that she was "regularly subjected to unwanted sexual advances and innuendoes by male members of the county staff, including elected officials, employees and paid agents." Her attorneys claim as a condition of employment "we are past the age of patting a woman on the butt and telling her to enjoy it."

The lawsuit is currently in the discovery phase, in which information from both sides is gathered and shared. Suber recently testified 12 hours in her deposition.

"We firmly believe all of Joyce's allegations will be proven true," Head said.

ers to the Sanford branch library.

"I was very upset to find out that people were using the Internet to view pornographic images at the library," Hinckley said. "I try to give my kids the type of childhood where they are protected against this type of thing."

Hinckley said her 15-year-old daughter, who was working on a school project at the library, let her know that boys as young as 10 or 11-years-old were accessing explicit images, which could also be seen by those walking near the computer screens. A filtering screen the library uses is not adequate to block the images from those not using the computers, she said.

When Hinckley expressed her concerns to one of the librarians regarding the use of computers in the children's area to view pornography, she was told if this happened library patrons were told to move to the adult area computers which are about four feet away. "I'm concerned this is drawing people into pornography and this can lead to violence against women and children," she said.

Hinckley said she spoke to branch manager Janean Campanaro but was not satisfied with the response.

"She told me they were aware of the problem but she said they had a legal opinion that

said they should not block the Internet completely because the could be sued by the ACLU or something like that," she said.

Campanaro said she has received some complaints and it was her understanding that county attorneys were working to see what the library can do.

"There are a whole lot of issues here," Campanaro said. "This is a something that is going on across the country and there's no easy answer."

The Internet technology, Campanaro said, is something so new that society has not yet figured out how to deal with the pros and the cons.

Upon further investigation,

Hinckley said she learned that Orange County libraries had software that blocked most of the explicit material on the Internet.

Campanaro said the block used in Orange County could also filter out material for legitimate uses.

For example, she said, if you block out the keyword "breast," that could eliminate research information on breast cancer.

Hinckley said she has spoken to several other parents who have complained and she plans to distribute flyers at the library Monday morning warning the public on what exactly can be accessed through the Internet.

## Plenty of honors in Oviedo ROTC

A lot of high school students have the wrong impression about the Naval Junior Reserve Officer's Training Corps. Believe it or not, they are not just the kids in the hall who carry the flag during the National Anthem or the ones outside sweating and marching around.

ROTC is actually an organization for dedicated students who are trying to decide if a career in the military is for them.

At Oviedo High School, the program is even a little bit more.

"Besides all of the education and training, we learn how to be a family in this program," explained Cadet-Ensign Alfonso Hernandez. "We also learn how to be a part of the community, both at school and in the real world. The values that are taught here go way beyond military training."

The reason for that is Colonel Joseph Nardo. After serving in the Marine Corps for 30 years and retiring in 1990, the Colonel decided to try substitute teaching. Although this may seem an odd choice for a Marine man, but Nardo said he loved the job from the start.

"Teaching is so rewarding," he said. "Kids are like sponges and when you see their faces light up when something clicks, that in itself is the payoff."

Once Nardo began filling in at Oviedo, he realized that there was a big hole in the curriculum where the ROTC program should be. In fact he was approached with the idea

of heading up the program. Four years ago, the first ROTC class began at the high school. Right away, Nardo began passing on his years of experience in both military and human relations.

By the second year, Oviedo's ROTC program was awarded the title of an honor unit. Units are given the title of honor based on inspections and achievements. Only 10 percent of the nation's programs are honor units and the fact that Nardo's was named by the second year is quite an accomplishment.

Being an honor unit gives the students more opportunity for special scholarships to academies that are not available to regular units. In 1994, one student received an appointment to the Naval Academy and in 1995, two students received appointments. Already this year, one student was awarded an early appointment to West Point, the nation's Army Academy.

The reason for all of the success is many faceted.

First, Nardo puts school work first.

On Wednesday afternoons, students who need help with their studies attend a tutoring session run by the students on the Academic Team. The team is composed of honor students in the program who dedicate their time to help their peers. The Academic Team also participates in competitions.

After school activities keep the students busy when they are not doing their school work. Seventy percent of the ROTC members are on one of the various teams.

The drill team is a very im-

portant part of the program, and is split into three divisions: basic, exhibition and color guard.

There is also an Athletic Team which represents the Oviedo ROTC in various events.

About 35 students are members of the Orienteering Team, which uses maps and compasses to navigate courses.

The star of the program, however, is the marksmanship team.

"Our number one concern with the marksmanship team is safety training," Nardo explained. "We always have adult supervision, instructors and coaches at every practice and event. We only use pellet guns and use the indoor range that the kids in the program built from an old greenhouse." Last year, the team earned

an all-expense paid trip to Colorado Springs, Colorado to compete in a national tournament when they won the State of Florida competition.

Although military life is usually viewed by civilians as harsh, the atmosphere at Oviedo is quite the opposite. There are naval science classes, there are drill and marksmanship teams and there are uniforms.

Above everything, however, there is a family.

"So many people do not fully realize what Col. Nardo does for us, the school and the community," said Cadet Petty Officer Daunte Sapp. "He really doesn't get to mingle as much because he has so many responsibilities, but Col. Nardo is the glue that holds everything together. Everyone who knows him respects him." "Everyone thinks that Ma-

rines kill," Hernandez added. "Col. Nardo has opened our eyes to the fact that is untrue. He is hard-core with a big heart. Col. Nardo cares and loves all of the kids in the unit and is always here to help us with anything. The biggest lesson I have learned from him is that I am here to help wherever and however I can."

While the ROTC program is truly a success at Oviedo High School, it is more through the hard work and genuine concern of Nardo than through the actual military aspect of the program.

Sometimes the most care comes from the person it is least expected from.

In Nardo's case, his care for students and determination to see them better themselves through education comes from a someone who is a true man first and military second.

## Lake Howell heads for Washington

"The chair recognizes the students from Lake Howell High School."  
 That's what will be ringing

across the floor of the U.S. Capitol next spring when they become the first group ever from the state of Florida to participate in Congress '98, a student-run congressional session in Washington, D.C. The program will run in

Washington from Feb. 13-15 and seven Lake Howell students - Dawn Hatton, Kelly Roth, Kate Ehman, Tim Holets, Steve Williams, Mike Critchet and Josh Swallows - will attend.

Congress '98 is open to students from all over America interested in politics and government and has been running since 1934 but it wasn't until this year that a group from Florida was represented.

Once the students get there, they will have the opportunity to witness a bill designed by the students go through debate among the national students and, ultimately, have it eyed or nayed. Once Lake Howell got the word, the seven juniors put together their proposed bill which will no doubt be heavily debated.

At one point, the Lake Howell delegation considered a bill for the direct election of the President of the United States, bypassing the electoral college, but then decided to go with a different issue, one that affects high school students everywhere.

Lake Howell's bill reads, "A Resolution to Intervene Militarily to End Drug Trafficking From South America."

The resolution suggests that the President of the United States would be required to certify that the nations responsible for importation of drugs into the country are cooperating with U.S. Law officials and making progress in ending such trafficking. Certification must be made within a year of the date of the passage.

It adds that a resolution would be required to determine if military intervention is necessary if the offending na-

tion is not in compliance with the agreements.

The bill is sponsored by two senators - Holes and Roth - and two representatives - Hatton and Williams.

The bill will be debated and everyone is looking forward to the experience.

"It's a student run congressional session," Hatton said. "We got a letter asking us to form a delegation and decided we wanted to come up with something controversial because we wanted it to be debated."

The group put together its facts and sponsor David Dees thought it would be a great way for his students to learn about the workings of student government.

Now, the Lake Howell students are trying to raise money for the trip. The total cost to send seven students comes to \$3,656 and will cover expenses for three days.

Hatton said everyone is starting to get excited.

"I'm kind of nervous," she said. "I've never done anything like this before. We'll get the full effect of what it's like on Capitol Hill."

Many of the students attending the conference are already in students government at Lake Howell and also have some special concerns about Seminole County government. Especially about education, revising the school exam policies and eliminating block scheduling.

The Lake Howell students may be a formidable group to represent Florida. Most members are on the school debate team and several said they plan on being very active in the debates on other bills from all over the country.

gation against Ron's Video (marked as XXX Video at Space 16 in the air-conditioned Gold Building at Flea World.

XXX Video is one of 11 spaces or outlets that Davidson has at the market. "He's been a successful flea market guy for quite a few years, and there's never been any trouble," Winter Park attorney David Wasserman said from Las Vegas on Friday. "He sells everything from trinkets to toys and puzzles."

It's the overwhelming inventory of adult tapes at Space 16 the county is concerned with - not what Davidson has in his other Flea World spaces. "The outlet offering adult material is a separate and distinct business," said John Dwyer, county current planning manager.

County Commission Chairman Randy Morris talked to Flea World owner Sid Levy on Friday and will talk again before the commission meets

Tuesday. "Once Sid Levy understands what is going on, I believe he'll agree with enforcement of the code," Morris said.

Should the county convince the landlord of its concern, there would still be trouble brewing between the county and Davidson. Wasserman said he was ready for a fight.

"Anyone who has been there knows that Flea World is really a fun place," Morris said. "And that it's a place that sells itself as a family entertainment center. There are children who love to go to Fun World and go through the flea market each weekend. It's clearly not a place where porn and adult videos should be sold."

Wasserman said Friday that "in Mr. Davidson's case, we are not seeking to obtain an adult entertainment license because Mr. Davidson's inventory is not a substantial or significant portion of his stock in trade." Wasserman said that even if

it were determined that Davidson's operation is considered an adult video store under the new Seminole County Code, then he is entitled to the same legal rights as Excitement Video and Bob's Video (who are licensed) and should be granted an adult entertainment license."

Other Flea World vendors seemed surprised about the sudden ado about Davidson's adult video operation. Hugo Alvarez, who has a jewelry repair shop - space 17 directly across from XXX Video - said he had no problem with the store.

"Some people go right by, others go in," Alvarez said. "I've never heard anyone complain. My customers aren't concerned. Either am I. If someone wants to go in there, that's their right."

Dennis Carl, who tends a booth known as CD's & More in another section of the market, says he's sent customers to Davidson's store. "When someone asks for family videos, I send them one direction. When they ask for adult videos, I send them to the Gold Building."

"So what's the fuss other than a lot of political b.s.," said Flea World general manager George Schnippel. "Next, they'll want to take the beef out of hot dogs. Where's all this end? It's a free country."

A shop employee, who asked not to be identified, allowed a reporter but not a photographer inside XXX Videos on Friday. There's an American flag

at the entrance and a sign: "If adult material or nudity offends you, Do Not Enter." Another reads: "You must be 18 or older to enter."

"I don't look at this stuff, I just sell it," the employee said. Few of the video titles can be reprinted in this newspaper. Some were marked "Gay Videos," others, "All-Girl Videos."

There was a \$20 county occupational license issued to Ronald Davidson on one wall.

"Want a John Wayne movie?" the employee asked. "We have some cartoons, too. 'Porky Pig and Friends, Beauty and the Beast.'"

These films were on a small shelf in the middle of the room - and amounted to less than one percent of the inventory. This was not the ideal place to find the Duke or Daffy Duck.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said Friday that he was "glad to see the approach Seminole County was taking in the adult video issue. We're concerned with what is happening here or anywhere else in the county."

Dale will attend Tuesday's commission proceedings that include the commission's decision as to which potential adult entertainment sites would be identified. The Sanford City Commission would like the county to drop the airport acreage.

"We don't like it that any site has to be identified but we believe the westside sites are much less likely to be ever considered," Dale said.

# Seminole uprising

## Arrow Force VI pulls off second 'upset' of week, 61-45, over Lake Mary

**SANFORD** - It's almost too easy to overlook Arrow Force VI.

In a conference known for its Oviedo and Lake Howells, Seminole has quietly put together a pretty impressive team of its own this season and proved it last night, crushing visiting Lake Mary, 61-45, at Bill Fleming Memorial Gymnasium.

For the Rams, it was a rout that came at a bad time. Lake Mary recently won its own competitive basketball holiday tournament and was on a six-game winning streak but has struggled in the county.

Seminole, which finished third in the Lake Mary Holiday Classic, came out and never let the Rams back into the game after running to an early lead.

"I think Seminole is a very good team," said Lake Mary coach Mike Gaudreau. "They scared me because the last time we played them, they didn't play too well. They defended us and played with more intensity."

It showed on the court and in the stands as the Seminole crowd gave their team a standing ovation as the clock ticked down in the final minute. It was the second win in three nights against a Class 6A team - the 'Noles beat Lake Brantley two nights ago - and solidified a strong bid for a run at the district crown.

"We were very energized tonight," said Seminole coach Bob Traina. "I'm pleased because we needed to show some killer instinct."

Much like Oviedo, Arrow Force VI isn't a team with a clear superstar. Sometimes it's Daryl Redding. Last night, it was Zeke Seymore who led the 'Noles with 19 points and several spectacular dishes.

"Zeke is shooting well," Traina said. "He needs to take good shots and make good decisions and when he does that, he's effective."

The Seminole defense, though, coupled with some poor shooting from the Rams, spelled all the difference. Lake Mary wasn't knocking down its free throws or three-pointers and Paul Beik (18 points) didn't have his usual big game.

Seminole fell down big, 8-2, as Beik scored six points in the first three minutes, but Seminole made its first run of the night.

Seymore put in an easy layup. Redding hit a jumper and Seminole pecked away at the Rams until Seymore tied it with a jumper and free throw for a three-pointer.

Then, Seminole went on a 6-0 run, capped off by a Redding tip in at the first quarter buzzer to put the 'Noles up, 17-11.

After Randy Abrams hit a jumper to cut it to 17-13, Seminole went on 7-0 run and Lake Mary never threatened again.

Redding had 11 points to help Seymore's big effort and Terri Patrick added eight.

For Lake Mary, Abrams added nine points.

Arrow Force VI is now 12-5 overall and 2-0 in the SAC. Seminole was scheduled to play at Winter Springs in another SAC contest at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, then play at

Still, they have had a decent season despite a slump after an impressive start.

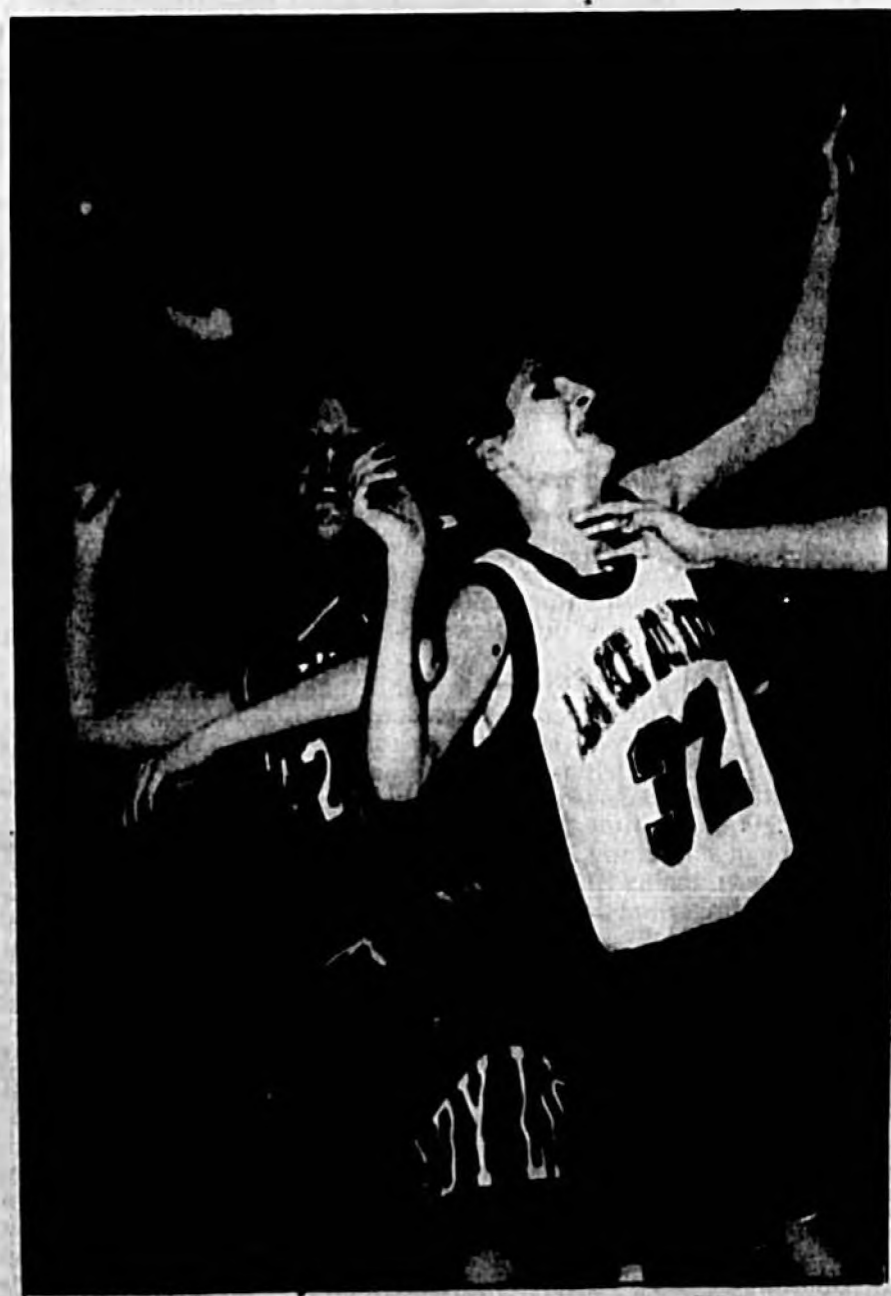
"I would have liked for my senior year to have gone better but we hit that slump," Reed said. "I know we'll finish strong and I think we can upset anyone in the districts."

## Sunshine bass thrive in Newnans Lake

SANFORD - Anglers who are looking for some of the best sunshine bass fishing in Florida need to check out Newnans Lake east of Gainesville.

Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) fisheries biologists are predicting a replay of last season's phenomenal fishing when anglers caught 44,000 sunshine bass from the lake between October 1996 and June 1997.

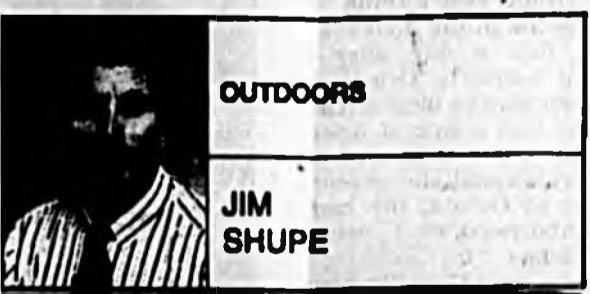
GFC biologist Randy Myers said the GFC stocked Newnans in 1996 with 200,000 sunshine bass fingerlings, five times the normal amount, to determine if saturation stocking was justified in terms of number of fish harvested by anglers.

This spring the GFC increased the number of sunshine bass it stocked in the lake by an additional 100,000, totaling 300,000 in an attempt to make fishing even better.

Anglers have been catching their limits regularly since October. Most of the fish caught are those that were stocked early this spring. Currently, these fish are 11 inches long and weigh close to 1 pound.

"One out of every 12 sunshine bass being caught weighs 2 to 4 pounds," Myers said. "Catching these larger sunshine bass shows that there are plenty of fish left in the lake from the 1996 stocking and is an early indication of another fantastic sunshine bass season."

Last April and May, as the water temperature warmed, a tremendous trophy sun-

shine bass fishery developed in the lake. Anglers caught several hundred fish weighing over 7 pounds each.

Live crawfish and commercial shiners were the most effective baits for larger fish, while grass shrimp worked best for catching smaller fish. The most common technique is using a cane pole with 12-20 pound test line and fishing five to seven feet below a slip cork.

The best and most consistent areas to fish are around the three GFC fish attractors which are marked with large buoys. The areas around the mouth of Hatchett Creek, in the north end of the lake was the hot spot during April and May for large fish. The cool water inflow from the creek historically attracts fish during warmer months.

The daily bag limit is 20 sunshine bass. Only six of the 20 fish may be 24 inches or greater in length.

There is a county park with a boat ramp on Highway 20 at the south end of the lake.

While we are on the subject of Trent Dilfer, can I ask a very difficult question?

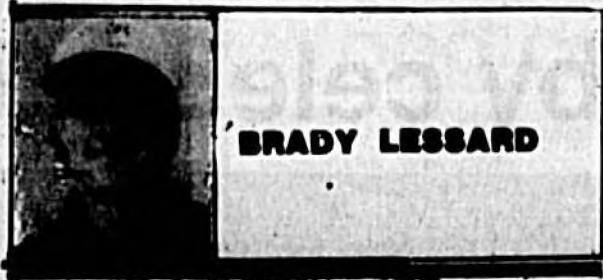
How in the world is this man going to the Pro Bowl?

# Wood carving is a way of life for retiree

Wood carving is an art, skill and hobby in which Dick Brown has been involved for over 22 years. He has shared his passion with others through classes since a month after he began.

According to Brown he actually took up the hobby while his wife was ill. "She had cancer," he said. "She did a lot of sleeping. A lot of the time I would come home from work and she'd be resting so I would start carving to pass the time."

"I used to carve on my lunch hour when I was in electronics," he said. "I retired about three years ago. The first person I ever taught though was when I had been carving for only a month or so. I was at the beach and was carving a unicorn. Someone asked me to teach her so I did. When I lived in Citrus County over 400 took my classes throughout the years. That was about five or six years ago when I did that."

Brown now finds time on a daily basis to practice his carving. He notes that he begins his day with food and carving and works throughout the day and ends his day the same way. He stated that he has gone to Lake Monroe, Sanford Landing, Lake Eola and numerous other sites and set and carved things that he sees or just carves to relax.

He shares that he "does a lot of fish carving especially bass" but also enjoys carving most any animal. Once Brown carved a large, three-foot alligator. On another day he made small one-inch cows to "go along with a railroad crossing" set. "I just did a six-inch Abe Lincoln," he quipped.

Taking anywhere from approximately five hours for small animal carvings to up to a week working 10 hour days for the three-foot alligator, Brown stays busy with his art. He does use patterns but admits that occasionally he discovers items he would like to carve in magazines and such or refers to the many files of animals he has collected.

Presently, Brown teaches a weekly class at the Sanford Senior Center. He has 20 stu-

dents there but only three to four arrive for each class.

"I try to let the ones I teach know what they can carve," he said. "It doesn't take long to teach them. I show them what they can do. I think anybody can learn to carve. I even had a class of blind people once. They were more careful than sighted people. My advice for beginners would be to take classes. I would also say to get a good knife and lots of Band-Aids."

Although Brown says that he used to work with a lot of bass wood he now gets two by two wood from local lumber stores. At times people also give him various grates and kinds of wood but Brown always uses water based paint for the finishing touches.

Brown is a widower with three children, Steven, Stephanie and Susan. He has been a Sanford resident since May of 1997 but has lived in Florida for 12 years.

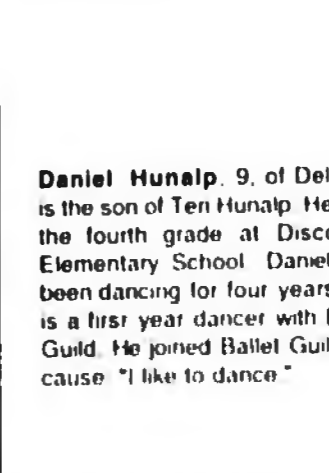

## One of Mexico's finest young painters showcased at SCC Fine Arts Gallery

SANFORD - "Daniel Ponzanelli, The Third Generation of Mexican Artists", a special exhibition of the works of one of Mexico's finest young painters, is being presented in a month-long show at Seminole Community College's Fine Arts Gallery, January 8-February 5, 1998.

Featured are many of the works from Ponzanelli's "Signs of Desire" show exhibited during the fall of 1997 at Mexico City's Hotel Fiesta Americana and presented by former Mexican president Miguel de la Madrid Hurtado.

Daniel Ponzanelli's artistic accomplishments continue a tradition of by several generations of Ponzanelli family artists whose work is recognized in both Europe and the Americas. The former NFL great, who played for the Los Angeles Raiders, throws his fall/winter job broadcasting for FOX sports to the side, temporarily, so that he can tackle a tougher adversary: acting. He follows other sports luminaries like Shaquille O'Neal, Michael Jordan, Fred Dryer and Alex Karas, to name a few, into that other game called show business.

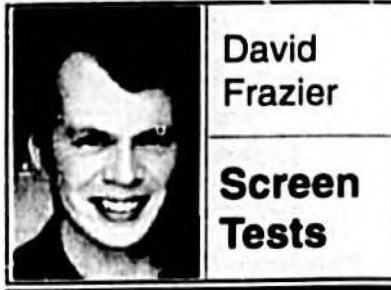
To me, it is unfair that talented, struggling actors, or even credible, proven ones, take back seats to these novices, who are riding the red carpet into Hollywood because of their stature in another profession. Because Long made the Pro Bowl and won a Super Bowl ring makes him worthy to sign a three picture deal with 20th Century Fox and to be named "Male Star of Tomorrow for 1997" by the people at Sho West? Hey, I wrote this review! Where's my agent? That \$20 million contract better be ready to sign when I get to the office, baby!

The nuttiness of studio officials and producers notwithstanding, it's poetic justice when these sports figures bomb as Long does in the new movie *Firestorm*, an achingly dull, amateurish film.

Long plays a member of an elite group of firefighters called Smokejumpers. These guys and gals enter blazes via the air, and, if you're not up to the challenge, you have to "pound more ground before you fly the sky."

A forest flames out of control, and, in the middle, a selfish, yet intelligent madman (William Forsythe) is trying to escape while holding a beautiful ornithologist (Suzie Amis) hostage. The malefactor is trying to get back to a stash of cash he stowed away before going to jail. However, the inferno in the Wyoming woods and Long stand in his way of blazing a trail.

*Firestorm* is doused from the start. Directed, in his debut, by veteran, Academy Award winning cinematographer Dean Semler (*Dances with Wolves*), this film is no hotter than an icebox. Semler works from a badly written script by Chris Soth, who wrote this screenplay as a thesis when he was in screenwriting school and it shows. Soth introduces these Smokejumpers, which really exists, as some para-military group. There is nothing to learn about these folks because they're too busy saving people or throwing axes into bad guys. They're essentially a gimmick. But what can you expect from a plot that is hackneyed formula with an important twist that comes out of

left field and leaves the audience scratching their numbed heads.

Semler could have screwed up a good script though. Take, for example, the starting sequence where Long and his chief (Scott Glenn) save a little girl. It has no intensity, no sense of urgency and it ends up gushingly sentimental. Another sequence involves a chase through the woods where Semler would like for us to believe that when a chainsaw is thrown from a moving motorcycle it can land directly into the center of a windshield of a pursuing vehicle.

In any case, *Firestorm* is not the start the square jawed, Hungry Jack ad boy, Long,

wanted, especially when he is trying to sell Hollywood on his worth as a marketable actor. In other words, he should join

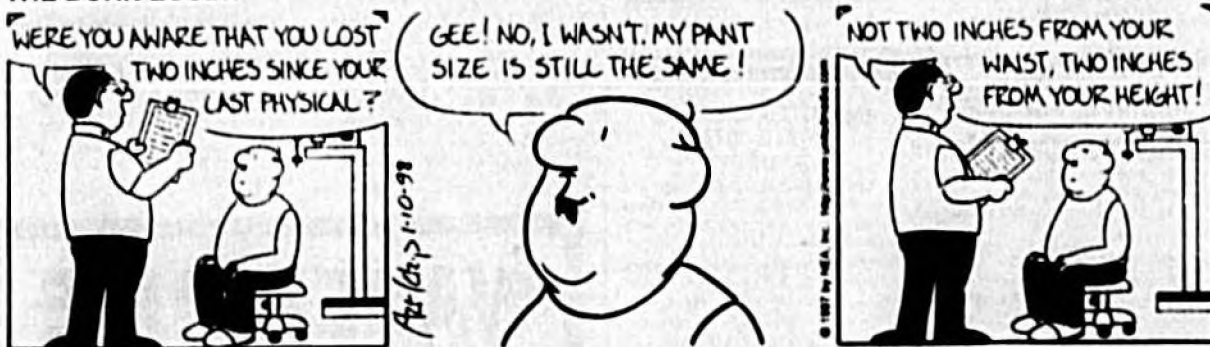

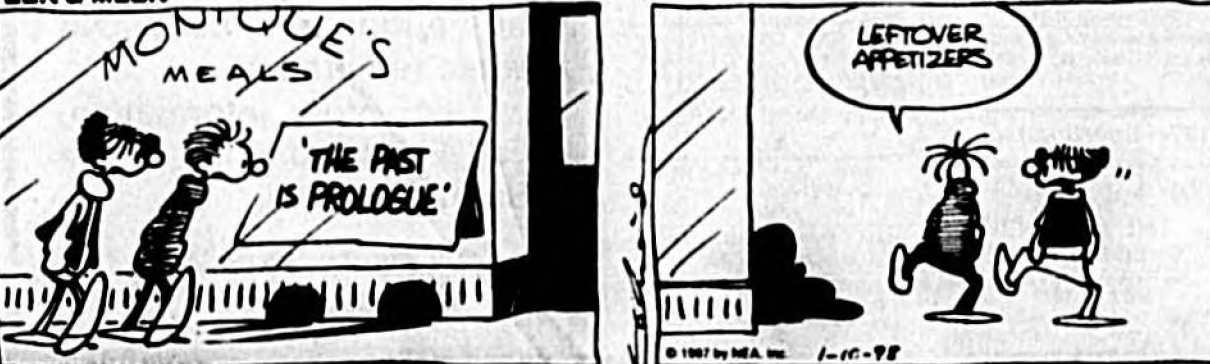

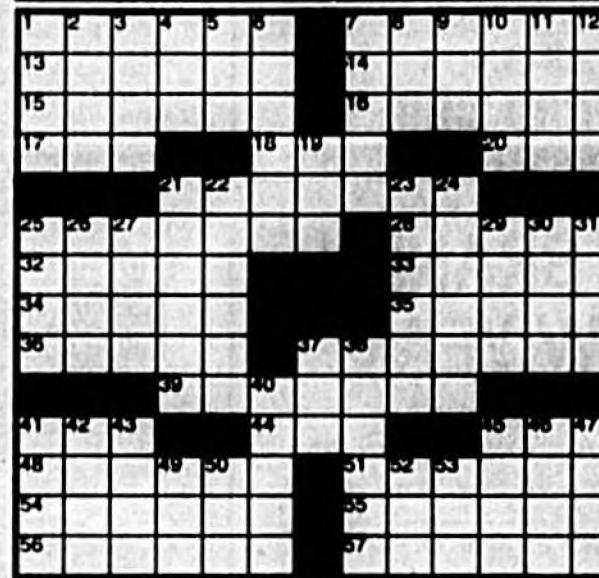

**Elevation counts**

**PHILLIP ALDER**

After shaking the snow off his overcoat and hanging it up, the Senior Life Master was ready to start his monthly class.

"Half the time we defend, yet we spend almost 100 percent of our time discussing bidding with partner. That isn't right. You and your partner should give more time to leads and signals."

"You will find a simple example on the first sheet I have handed out."

The students studied the North and East hands from today's diagram.

"South opens a 15-17 no-trump. How would you defend against (a) two no-trump and (b) three no-trump? In both cases, your partner leads the heart five. Declarer wins with the queen, plays a diamond to dummy's queen, and calls for the diamond nine. What do you discard?"

He let them think for a minute or

two. Then the SLM continued.

"First, which heart did you play at trick one? You know partner has somewhere between two and four high-card points. So, his hearts cannot be that strong. You want a spade switch, not a heart continuation. Therefore, drop the two. No third hand high here."

The SLM asked them to look at the full deal on the next sheet.

"On the second diamond, your discard depends on the contract. Against three no-trump, throw the spade king. This tells partner about your sequence. But against two no-trump, you need that extra spade trick. You must discard the discouraging club two. After seeing the heart two and
