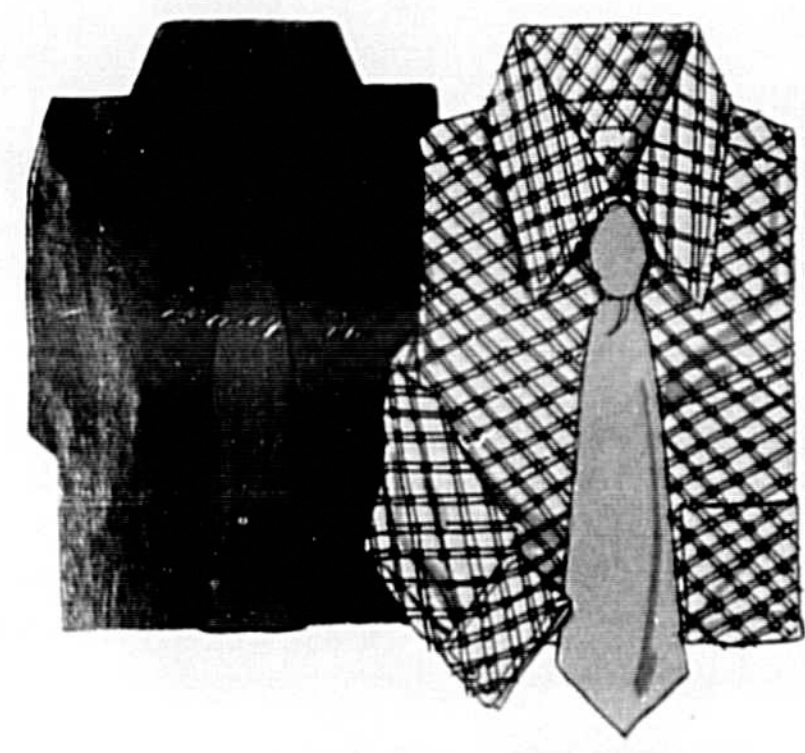

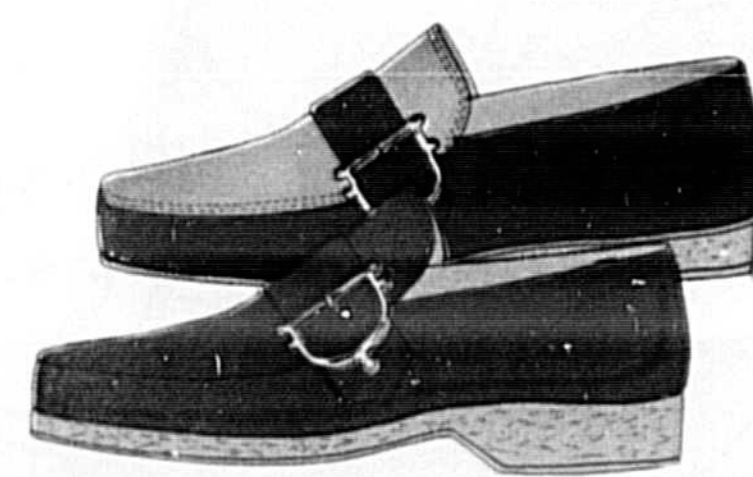

# Tallahassee Presentation Monday City, County Seek Police Academy

A joint city-county committee started polishing Seminole's bid for the State Police Academy at an 11 a.m. meeting at Sanford City Hall today.

Sheriff John Polk said the group is determined to make a presentation in Tallahassee Monday that will boost Seminole's proposal to locate the multi-million dollar in-

stallation at Sanford Airport and Osceola Airfield from number eight to number one spot on a state committee's list of recommended locations.

Polk returned from the Capitol Tuesday and told members of the Seminole County Commission, Sanford City Commission and Sanford Airport Authority, "We've got to let them know Bill Reed isn't running the show."

Polk said after attending Tuesday's state cabinet session "the Cabinet has an open mind" and hearings to be held by the Academy site selection committee Monday and Tuesday won't be before Reed. Polk confirmed reports that it appears Reed, Director of the State Department of Law Enforcement, tried to "stack" the site selection so sites costing over a million dollars

would be selected by the Cabinet. Polk said 35 of the over 40 site proposals for the academy were from "real estate people with no mind."

"When the Governor and Attorney General asked the committee for the top 10 list in the Cabinet meeting they couldn't produce it," Polk reported. "But we later found out Sanford-Seminole is number eight on the list."

"We have two Cabinet members who'll vote for us," Polk revealed but he declined to identify the Cabinet members.

"It's not up to the Department of Law Enforcement to pick the

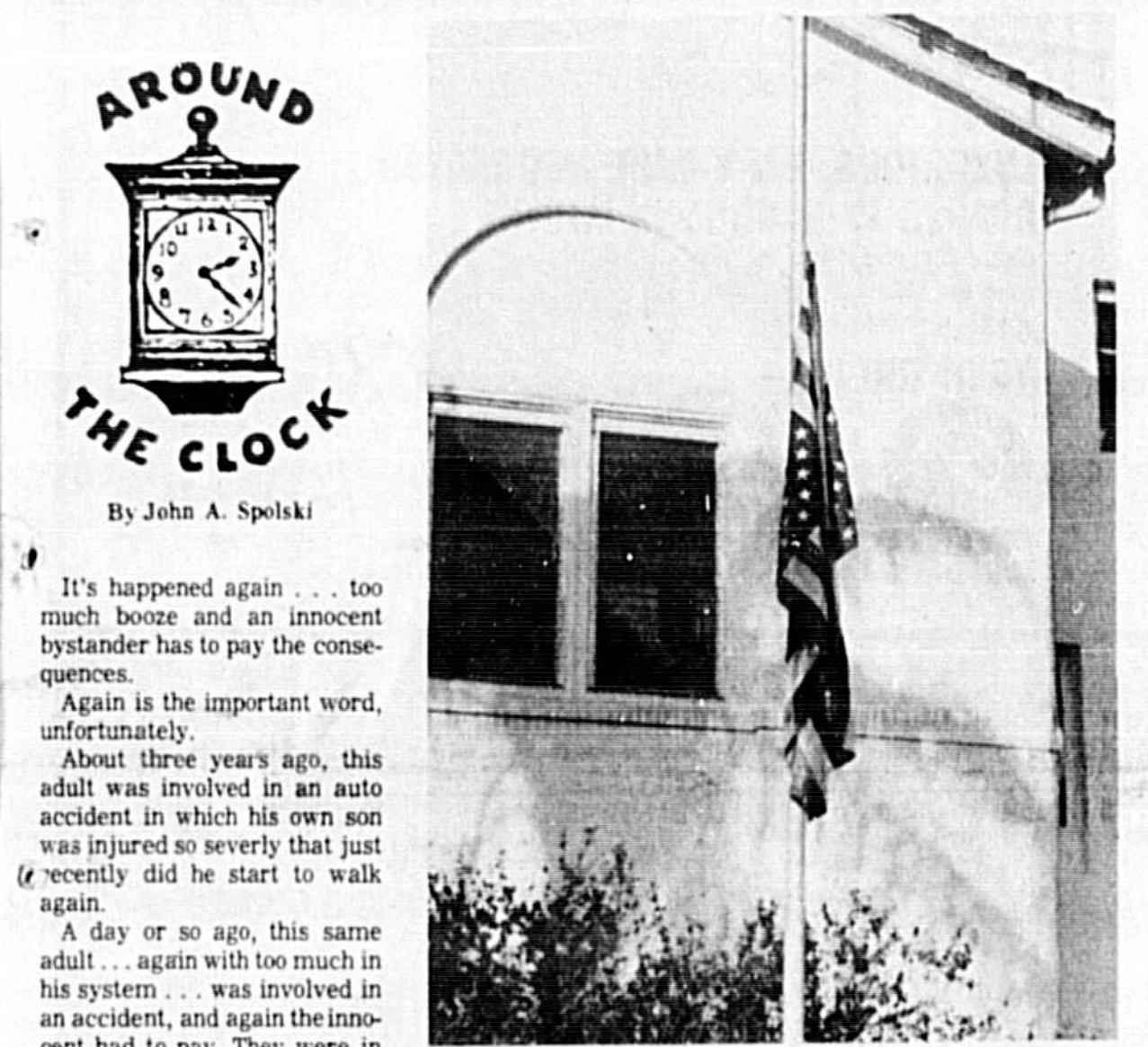

## 'Doesn't Like Any Sites Proposed'

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert Shavin says he is unhappy with all five proposed sites for an \$8 million Florida Police Academy.

"I think they should either locate it in Tallahassee near the state Law Enforcement Department building or, if they move it out of Tallahassee, put it in Central Florida near the police who will be attending it," Shavin said Tuesday.

A site selection committee recommended, in order: two sites in Gadsden County about 15 miles west of Tallahassee, two in Leon County and one in Jackson County about 60 miles west of the state capital.

The Cabinet directed the panel and the General Services Department to return with definite cost commitments on the first five choices at the Feb. 6 meeting.

J. L. Larkin, a committee member and building construction and maintenance director in the general services department, said the committee expected to hold a hearing on the proposals next Monday or Tuesday.

On a 4-2 vote, the Cabinet directed that the hearing be held Tuesday.

"Reed's hand picked site will also require construction of a sewage treatment plant," Polk said. "We're going to let Bill Reed know he's not running this state."

Tuesday the Cabinet postponed naming the Academy site for three weeks and ordered the site selection committee and the General Services Administration to hold hearings on proposed sites Monday and Tuesday and get definite cost commitments.

Seminole has been vying for the Academy for two years. The latest proposal offers acreage

at Sanford Airport, at the going rate, as site of the Academy classroom and barracks buildings and county-owned acreage at Osceola Airfield for a firing range and pursuit driving course.

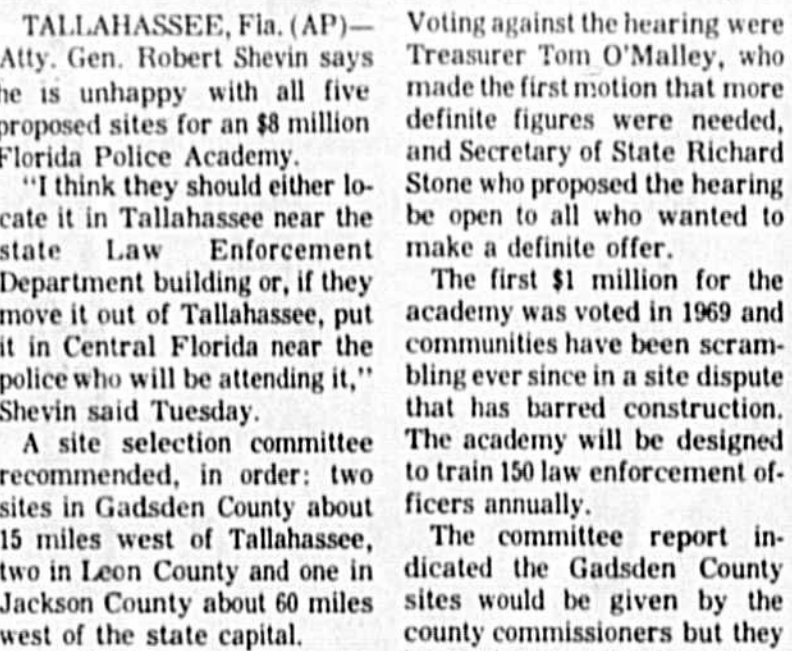
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"WE CAN MAKE SEMINOLE NUMBER ONE"

## About Peace Treaty U.S., So. Vietnam Talking

SAIGON (AP) — Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr. met for an hour tonight with President Nguyen Van Thieu to discuss a revised draft of a peace agreement.

There appeared to be growing evidence that a cease-fire was near.

While the U.S. Embassy would not disclose the substance of the conference, it appeared that Thieu gave President Nixon's special envoy some answers on the revised draft.

Haig had waited in the wings all day while Thieu met for 7 1/2 hours with his National Security Council and four military corps commanders at Independence palace, reportedly to discuss what steps South Vietnam would take to protect the territory and people it now controls, once a cease-fire goes into effect.

Spokesmen would not say whether Haig would meet with Thieu again or when he would leave Saigon.

Haig also is scheduled to confer with the leaders of Cambodia, Thailand and Laos.

Asian diplomatic sources in Washington said they believe an agreement ending the war is very near. They anticipated the second, much on the order of the Greater Mail and Regency Square in Casselberry.

South Vietnamese sources said on Tuesday that Nixon and Thieu planned to declare a unilateral cease-fire Friday on the eve of Nixon's inauguration. Sources said today that Nixon and Thieu still plan to declare a cease-fire but the day may be pushed back.

The Presidential Palace issued a denial of a Columbia Broadcasting System report quoting palace sources as saying South Vietnam and the United States were ready to declare a cease-fire. But it was not clear whether the statement was intended to deny the cease-fire report or to deny that the report originated at Thieu's palace.

## \$2 Million Shopping Area Set For 17-92, SR 434

The mayor brought the matter to the City Council's attention to determine if they could foresee any opposition to the plan. No opposition was expressed.

At the workshop meeting held to lay out goals for the new year, the mayor also recommended that the city consider "sitting down with Sanlando Utilities" to discuss the possible purchase of the water and sewer company which serves certain new areas in the municipality.

Councilman Dick Crenshaw said with all privately-owned sewer companies to be phased out, the city has the "upper hand" currently and now would be the time to press forward with the acquisition.

Jaques also recommended the city look into a water expansion program west on SR 434 as soon as possible.

Discussed as well was the possibility of all the cities of the Seminole and the county government undertaking a cooperative animal control

program with identical ordinances adopted in each city.

Council Chairman William Klosky proposed that the city go back into the trash collection business with funding from the federal revenue sharing moneys Jaques said before the plan is undertaken all costs involved should be determined. The Council discontinued service in December when it was shown to be operating in the red.

Klosky continued that some thought should be given to purchasing additional fire equipment in light of the fact some 500 new homes are either in the planning stages or under construction in the city.

He pointed to the need for the city to hire a full-time bookkeeper and possibly a secretary to assist City Clerk Omie R. Shornate.

Crenshaw said the various city departments should go on a purchaser order type of arrangement and in the future no bills should be paid unless accompanied by a purchase order.

Councilman B. H. Ferrell told the board, meanwhile, that more attention should be paid to the zoning board and its recommendations. He said the members of the advisory board given considerable attention to each matter brought before it and in most cases personally view land before giving its approval to developments.

## Sheoah Requests Water Line Use For Irrigation

WINTER SPRINGS — Although Monday night's meeting of City Council was touted as a joint venture with board for an exchange of ideas and discussion, the camaraderie failed to materialize.

Only two members of the Planning and Zoning Board, Mrs. Etta Harville and James Palmer, were present for the meeting. Absent were Howard Allard, Scott Shaffer and John Apple.

The meeting was delayed, as has been the case in recent weeks by the absence of City Attorney Thomas Freeman, who arrived approximately a half-hour late.

Councilmen perused their portfolios, apparently for the first time, precipitating a remark from Councilman Victor Miller to the mayor as to whether he was dropping a subtle hint for a change in the meeting.

Mayor Granville Brown has consistently stated that he is in favor of changing the meeting night from Monday to "any other night."

Mayor Brown reasoned, "I have been trying to get the meeting changed to Tuesday, or Wednesday, or Thursday. It will get a load off us (the and City Clerk Mary Norton) and give you all a chance to do more homework."

Later in the meeting, Councilman Clifford Jordan opined that special meetings would "get more done...clean up a lot of items."

In other business Mayor Brown indicated council should pursue their portfolios as to a county dog ordinance and "back this ordinance against the city ordinance."

Mayor Brown also requested the council study a proposed resolution by the Sanford Chamber of Commerce pertaining to trees. This entity, he said, has requested the city pass an ordinance requiring developers to procure a permit before they remove trees of a certain diameter.

Also under consideration by council is a resolution proposed by the county school board in which developers, builders and contractors would provide appropriate money in development to defray the cost of school construction.

WINTER SPRINGS — City Council will take action next Monday on a request by developers Robert Von Hagge and Bruce Devlin for use of a water line along SR 494.

Mayor Granville Brown explained Sheoah Boulevard will have a median with shrubbery which will be irrigated as well as shrubbery in the Sheoah Apartment complex parking area.

Development Enterprises, Mayor Brown said, is requesting to tie into the water line and are willing to absorb the maintenance above ground as well as the electrical bill for the pumps, etc.

Councilman Troy Piland questioned whether the arrangement would be of a permanent nature and received a reply from Mayor Brown these was no state time limit.

City Attorney Thomas Freeman opined time would be a consideration should the city go into the water and sewer business then it would be the city's responsibility to provide the water grants.

Mayor Brown explained the situation to council that Florida Land Company was building a road and median which they will later deed to the city. Development Enterprises is requesting to tie into the water line which Florida Land is placing in the middle of the street. Councilman Clifford Jordan stated the city would have its power bill paid for watering of the property.

In another matter, Mayor Brown related he had received a request from a Seventh Day Adventist Church, to be located on Moss Road, for permission to erect a tent to hold services.

Mayor Brown said the church owns seven and one-half acres of property at the location and anticipates erecting a church with construction to commence next month. The tent, Mayor Brown said, would be used for the services until completion of the church.

Jordan said the city ordinance permits churches and their accessory uses in the area, but questioned whether a tent could be construed as an accessory use.

Jordan related he felt "too many churches" were being added to the city but questioned whether the tent would be conducive to growth or an asset.

Mayor Brown said he would contact the church pastor for more information in the matter.

Mayor Brown also mentioned to council that water and sewer plans had come into the office Monday for sections 8, 9 and 10 of the city located off Hays Road.

## Seminole Advisors Meeting

At the January 11 meeting of the Seminole High School Advisory Committee, Dr. J. C. Ringling suggested that some means be devised by which positive information could be disseminated through the community concerning pupil personnel problems at S.H.S. Dr. Ringling stated, "The Committee's main purpose is to study the school operations and bring this information to the public; for example, this morning I have received information that I was totally unaware of until now."

Dr. Ringling was referring to a presentation by Wayne Epps, Assistant Principal for Pupil Personnel, regarding pupil discipline, suspensions, and expulsions. Epps emphasized student rights and due process in handling student problems. For example, students have the same rights as any other citizen in the community.

One example, according to Epps, is on searches and seizures; just because the teacher wants a student searched does not mean that you legally can do so; there must be probable cause and due process must be followed. Even though Seminole High School is leading the county in the number of suspensions, with 194, in total days suspended S.H.S. ranks third—the reason being that every suspension is for two days except in rare instances where a distinct behavioral problem exists. In this case, generally it is for ten days and expulsion is recommended.

Contrary to popular opinion, S.H.S. has had only nine expulsions thus far this year and one case is pending. In every expulsion except one, the offense was of a criminal nature and was referred to the courts. Furthermore, contrary to public opinion, there have been only two days of disruption thus far and eight of the expulsions resulted from these two days.

Epps also stated that if the students would report incidents to the school administration, it would be a great help. In some instances where the students will report incidents to their parents and the parent may call the school and we are unaware of any irregularity. Many times, on investigation of these cases, once the parent has called, it has been found that the incident was exaggerated or did not happen at all.

# Pumpkin Cake, Bread Make Perfect Treats Anytime

spices. Set aside.  
2. Beat eggs in large mixer bowl until foamy. Add pumpkin, vegetable oil and whole bran cereal; mix thoroughly.  
3. Add sifted dry ingredients to cereal mixture, stirring only until combined. Fold in chocolate morsels and pecans. Spread evenly in ungreased 10 x 4-inch tube pan. (350 degrees F.) about 1 hour 10 minutes or until wooden pick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool completely before removing from pan. Place on cake plate; drizzle with confectioners' sugar glaze, if desired. Yield: 16 servings.

Pumpkin pie is legend in the culinary world. But this dessert does not have a corner on the pumpkin's dessert scene. There are many others just as delicious, but lesser known. Among these are pumpkin cakes and coffee cakes, for which recipes are featured in today's column.  
Choco-Dot Pumpkin Cake combines the flavors of chocolate and pumpkin in a spicy, nutty cake, given extra crunch with whole bran cereal.  
Pumpkin-Go-Round is a yeast bread with a mellow pumpkin filling, made with instant butterscotch filling, canned pumpkin, nuts and spices. It makes two rings. One can be frozen for later use.

**PUMPKIN-GO-ROUND**  
Yeast Dough:  
4 to 5 cups sifted flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
2 packages dry yeast  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup butter  
2 eggs  
Pumpkin Filling:  
1 cup solid pack pumpkin  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 pkg. (3 1/2 oz.) instant butterscotch pudding mix  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon cloves  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
Softened butter  
Confectioners' sugar  
Frosting

**Method:**  
1. In large bowl mix 1 1/2 cups flour, sugar, salt and undissolved yeast.  
2. Combine milk, water, butter in saucepan; heat until liquids are warm (120 to 130 degrees). Butter need not melt. Add to dry ingredients; beat 2 minutes at medium speed, scraping bowl occasionally.  
3. Add eggs and 1/2 cup flour, or enough to make a thick batter; beat at high speed for 2 minutes.  
4. Stir in enough additional flour to make a stiff dough.  
5. Turn dough onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, about 6 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place until double in volume, about 1 hour.  
6. Prepare Filling: Combine all ingredients except nuts in mixing bowl and beat 2 minutes. Add nuts; refrigerate until needed.  
7. Punch dough down; divide in half. Roll 1/2 of the dough to a 20 x 7-inch rectangle. Spread with the softened butter and 1/4 of the pumpkin-nut filling. Roll up from long side; seal edges; shape into a ring on greased baking sheet with sealed edge down. Seal ends together firmly. Cut slits two-thirds through to center of ring at 1-inch intervals; turn each section on side, working quickly.  
8. Repeat with remaining dough and filling. Cover; let rise in warm place, until doubled, about 1 hour.

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## English Parkin, A Treat

A New Yorker who comes from Yorkshire, England, still remembers the gingerbread she was brought up on. She says it is called Parkin and is a rough country dish, served to youngsters with milk to drink and to grownups with mugs of tea or coffee. She adds that in her day "it was always enjoyed in the kitchen and was never served to the guests!"  
Our curiosity aroused, we dipped into Audrey Allen Gorton's cookbook, "In Defense of British Cooking," published by The Stephen Greene Press, and here is what Mrs. Gorton has to say about this cake.  
"Parkin is a north country gingerbread and is associated particularly with Yorkshire. It is also found in Lancashire and Cheshire and may be bought in almost every bakery there. The oatmeal used gives it a nutty flavor and it is very good with cheese. It keeps for a long time when stored in a tightly covered biscuit tin."  
1 cup unsifted flour  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon ground ginger  
4 cups quick-cooking oats, uncooked  
1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted  
1 cup milk  
Confectioners' sugar, if desired  
Into a large mixing bowl turn the flour, baking soda, salt, sugar, ginger; stir together thoroughly. Stir in oats.  
Add melted butter, molasses, eggs and milk; stir until well blended.  
Turn into a greased rectangular baking pan (13 by 9 by 2 inches).  
Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until top is firm to the touch and sides have separated from edge of pan - 40 to 45 minutes.  
Place pan on wire rack and cool. Cut into forty-eight 2 by 1 inch bars. With a small spatula, remove from pan. If used, sprinkle lightly with the confectioners' sugar.  
Makes 48 bars.

**EMPANADAS**  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
1/2 pound ground beef  
1/4 teaspoon monosodium glutamate  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
4 tablespoons chopped onion  
2 tablespoons diced green pepper  
1 clove garlic, minced  
2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped  
1/2 cup finely chopped olives  
1/2 cup seedless raisins  
2 tablespoons capers  
1/2 cup tomato sauce  
1 package pastry mix

Melt butter in skillet. Add beef and sprinkle with monosodium glutamate. Add onion, green pepper and garlic. Cook, breaking up with a fork, until meat is browned. Remove from heat, stir in remaining ingredients except pastry. Prepare pastry according to package directions. Roll pastry one-sixteenth inch thick on lightly floured board or pastry cloth. Blend together monosodium glutamate, horseradish, mustard, catchup, paprika, cayenne, salt and garlic. Gradually stir in wine and vinegar. Add salad oil; beat to blend. Add shrimp. Marinate several hours in refrigerator.

1 1/2 cups olive oil, divided

Combine 1 cup of the olive oil, vinegar, peppercorns, 1 teaspoon of the salt, bay leaves, monosodium glutamate, onions and garlic in saucepan. Simmer 1 hour; cool. Sprinkle lemon juice

over halibut steaks and sprinkle with remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt. Dip steaks in flour on both sides. Cook in remaining 1/2 cup olive oil 15 minutes, turning once. Place in serving dish; pour cooled sauce over dish. Refrigerate several hours.

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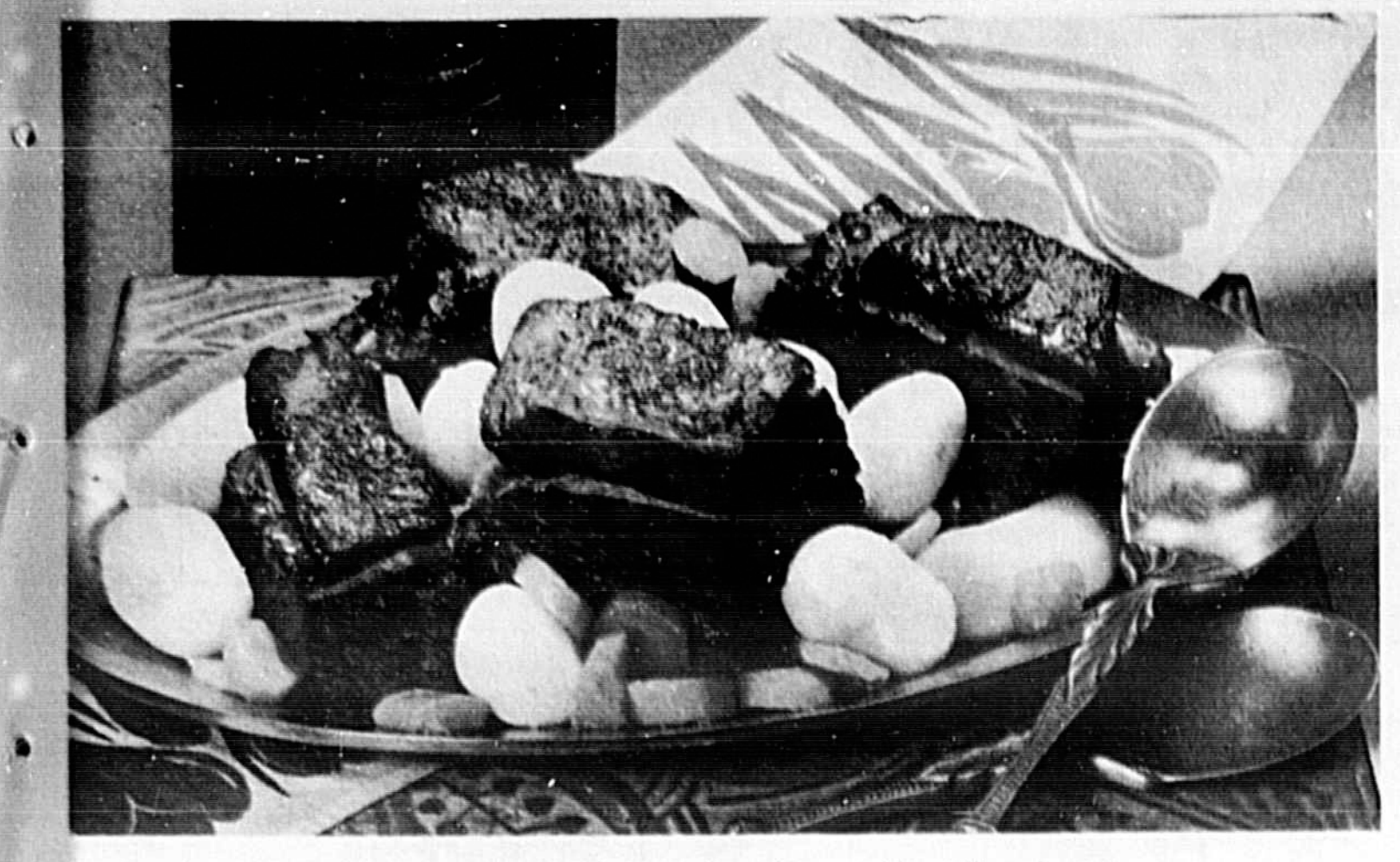

## As Preservatives Use Of Nitrites Discussed

You have probably often been in a situation where a decision raises the question of risk or benefit. Even so, you must decide.

Similarly, the Expert Panel on Food Safety and Nutrition of the Institute of Food Technologists is currently having some doubts about using nitrites in cured meats, such as ham, bacon and frankfurters. Are nitrites safe?

This situation adds up to a first-class dilemma. Without nitrites the risk of botulism from cured meats would jump. But with nitrites, cured meats might expose people to a potential carcinogen or cancer.

So what's a food scientist to do?

"On the other hand, the risk side of the question, under certain test tube conditions, nitrites and amines combine to form a nitrosamine. Nitrosamines have been shown to produce cancer in laboratory animals," she said.

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## Sandwich Recipe Is New

**TUNA AND RIPE OLIVE PUFF SANDWICHES**

1 can (6 1/2 or 7 ounces) tuna  
1/2 cup coarsely chopped canned ripe olives  
1/3 cup mayonnaise  
1/4 cup finely chopped celery  
1 tablespoon minced scallion  
1 tablespoon minced parsley  
1/4 teaspoon dried crushed saffron  
2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese  
2 egg whites  
8 slices rye bread

Whole pitted ripe olives, radish roses and celery for garnish  
Drain and flake tuna; mix in the chopped olives, mayonnaise, celery, scallion, parsley, saffron and 1 tablespoon of the cheese mixture.

In a small mixing bowl beat the egg whites until they hold stiff peaks. Gently fold into tuna mixture.

Toast bread on one side under broiler. Spread ontoasted sides with butter. Spread tuna mixture generously over buttered side of each slice; sprinkle with remaining 2 tablespoons cheese.

Broil about 4 inches from high heat until topping is heated through and lightly browned.

# On Police Academy Site Sheriff Says Sanford Ignored

Sheriff John Polk said today he's trying to contact Gov. Reubin Askew and state Cabinet members in efforts to be heard January 29 by a state site selection committee for the proposed multi-million dollar state Police Academy.

"This is vital to all law enforcement officers in Florida," Polk said, "and I think with something this big we should be given a public hearing."

Polk left a Tallahassee Cabinet meeting Tuesday with the understanding the joint Sanford-Seminole county proposal to locate the police academy at Sanford Airport and (Casselberry) Airfield near Geneva would be heard by the site selection committee next Monday or Tuesday. But Wednesday, Polk said he was told later in the Cabinet meeting, after several north Florida people pushing the top five sites recommended by the state committee complained and objected, the Cabinet voted to have its appointed committee hear only the top five selections and report back February 6 with binding proposals on costs to the state to receive the land and supply it with water, sewerage and electricity.

"It boils down to the principle of the thing," Polk said today. "We've haven't been properly heard."

The state committee recommended the north Florida sites (all near Tallahassee) without inspecting our site. They evaluated our proposal based on a three-page questionnaire they sent out," Polk said.

Asked if politics is involved in the Academy site selection, Polk said, "The only politics in it now are Bill Reed's politics." The sheriff said he honestly feels the State Department of Law Enforcement director "stacked the deck" to get the Academy within driving range of Reed's Tallahassee office even though the majority of the law enforcement officers to receive training at the Academy are from central and south Florida.

Folk said the joint city-county committee made up of representatives of the Sanford City Commission, Seminole County Commission and the Sanford Airport Authority are still working to "polish" the Sanford-Seminole site proposal in hopes they will get a chance to be heard in Tallahassee January 29.

Wednesday, Killeran Properties Inc. withdrew its proposal to sell the state land for the Academy in Leon County for \$1.13 million. The site was number four on the state committee's list of recommended sites.

## Daylight Time May Extend Year-Round

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional boosters of a plan to extend Daylight Saving Time to a year-round basis say their chances are better than ever because of increasing crime and the nation's fuel shortage.

The extra hour of daylight on winter afternoons would hamper purse snatchers and muggers who prey on late-afternoon pedestrians and it would reduce the use of electric lights in office buildings, they say.

Rep. Craig Hosmer, R-Calif., planned to introduce in the House today a bill to extend DST from its present six-months-a-year status to a full-time basis. DST is in operation in virtually all the states from the last Sunday of April to the last Sunday of October.

Hosmer's office said 31 other House members had agreed to sponsor the legislation as of Wednesday night. The bill that died in the last Congress had 14 sponsors.

One of the most important names on the bill is that of Rep. John Moss, D-Calif., chairman of the subcommittee that must first consider the bill.

"I've been sponsoring this bill for several years in the hope that sooner or later its time would come," Hosmer said in a statement Wednesday. "This year may be it."

Moss, who was cool toward similar legislation in the past, said the fuel shortage is the primary reason he has decided to back the measure this year.

"I think at a time when we are admittedly faced with an energy crisis it makes very good sense to have year-round Daylight Saving Time," Moss said.

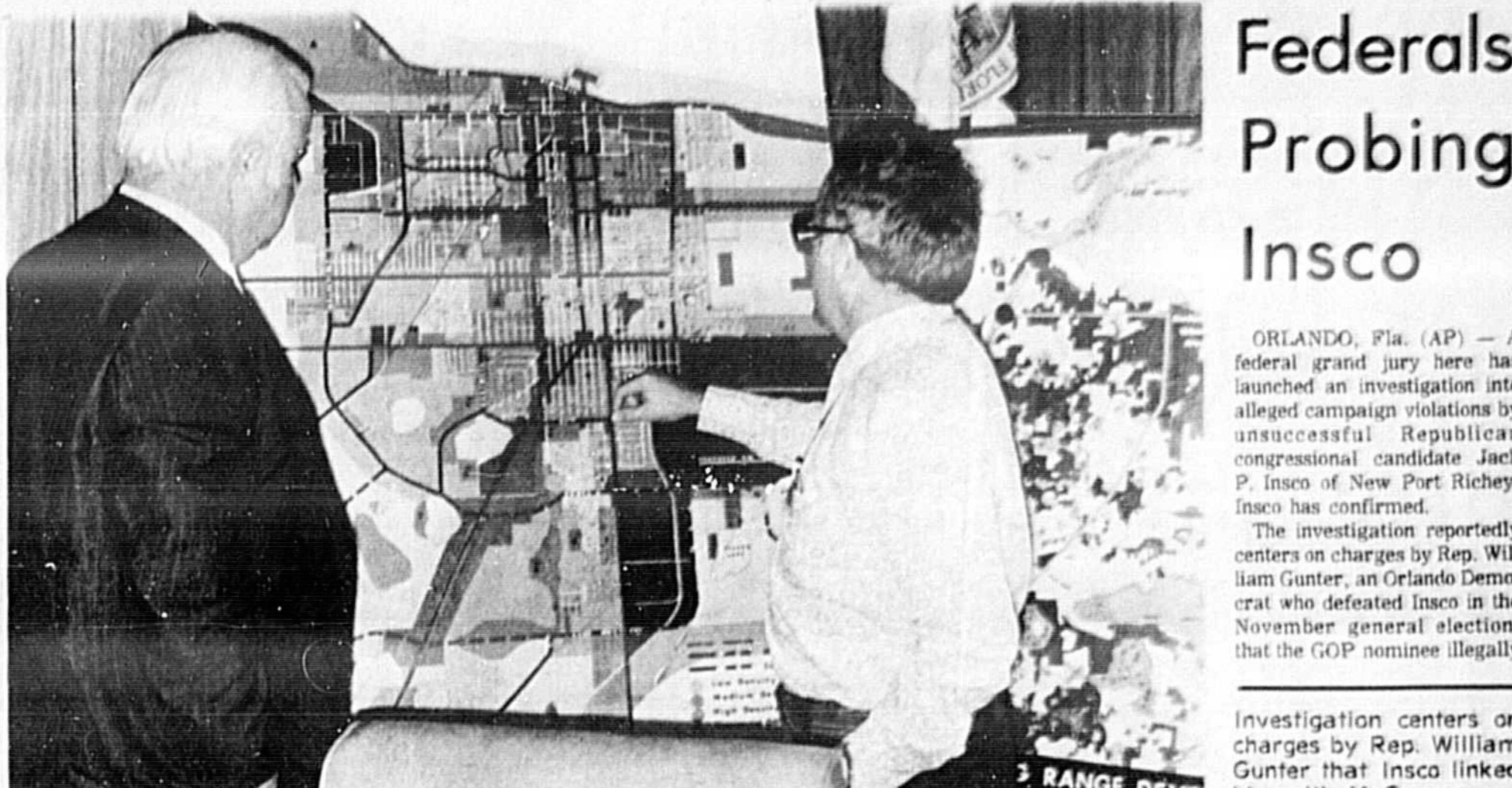
Moss explained that under Daylight Saving Time big office buildings, for example, could take advantage of sunlight until later in the day and thus save on electricity.

Hosmer stressed what he thinks extension of DST would do to the crime rate.

"We want to get the people home from work before the twilight hours, which are the worst crime hours," Hosmer said.

Before the first educational penny is spent anywhere in this county, it should be a prerequisite that schools like Crooms, Southside Elementary, and Sanford Middle School should be improved.

## Wildlife Area Seen As Nuclear Sub Base

COCOA, Fla. (AP) — The Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge and nearby Mosquito Lagoon is under consideration as a site for a \$4 billion Trident nuclear submarine base, today newspaper reported today.

Quoting information gleaned from a classified document accidentally leaked by an aide to U.S. Rep. Lou Frey, R-Fla., the Cocoa newspaper said the Pentagon is expected to decide within about two months between the Florida site and two other recommended East Coast locations near Charleston, S.C., and St. Marys, Ga.

The newspaper quoted the classified report as saying the base would be the home port for 25 Tridents, America's newest and largest nuclear missile submarine.

The chief advantage of the Florida site, the newspaper quoted the report as saying, would be the natural security provided by the desolate area. ## School Complaints Brought to Board

Serrates said the principal of the school had asked for maintenance money since 1963 to fix broken windows and he added, "they are still on the list."

Serrates said instead of air conditioning, the school needed to be put in condition. "Why air-condition a garbage dump?" he added.

Carolyn Stenstrom, school parent, advised one Sanford school was 70 years old and complained about the roof conditions. "When it rains, you can't go to school at all, that's why."

## Federals Probing Inso

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — A federal grand jury here has launched an investigation into alleged campaign violations by unsuccessful Republican congressional candidate Jack P. Inso of New Port Richey. Inso has confessed.

The investigation reportedly centers on charges by Rep. William Gunter, an Orlando Democrat who defeated Inso in the November general election, that the GOP nominee illegally printed bumper stickers linking Gunter to Democratic presidential candidate George McGovern.

Inso conceded Wednesday that his printer, Glenn Beneke, printed as many as 100 of the "McGovern-Gunter" stickers, but called the investigation a minor annoyance.

"We just had a handful printed up to get him excited," Inso said in an interview.

Inso said he is being accused of a "technical violation" of federal campaign statutes because his name did not appear on the stickers.

"I'm not the least bit concerned about it," Inso said. "There aren't any serious charges to begin with, only whether my name was on a placard, no flagrant violation of the law."

Inso has accused Gunter of being a "poor winner."

"He's just being vindictive," Inso said.
