

### Lee Generals Of Jacksonville Win Big Ten Crown

#### Landon Lions Are In Cellar With Five Losses And One Win

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Jacksonville teams finished second in the Big Ten high school conference football race, according to official Dickinson system rating compiled by John M. Hayes, 141 of high school of one who is conference president.

Robert L. Lee, undefeated and untied general, led an index team of Jacksonville to the Andrew Jackson trophy as runner-up in line with 21-0.

The Dickinson system provides for such action when a team would be penalized in its point rating by inclusion of extra victories.

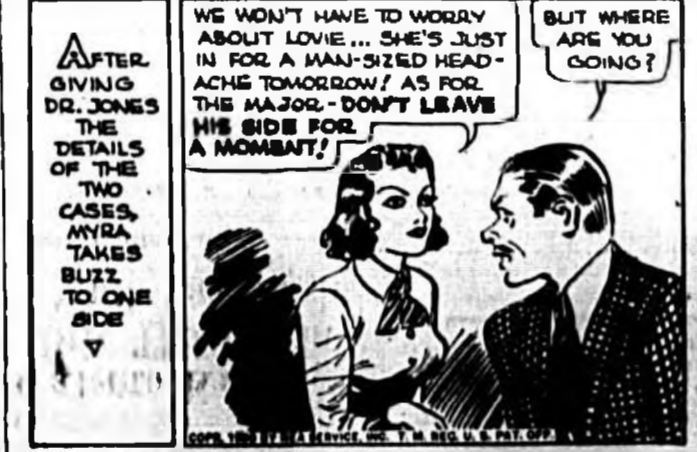

1,200 Fascist Students Hold Demonstration

Increasing Demands For French Territories Expected To Bring Formal Action Daladier Asserts France Will Fight Premier Warns That Italy's Libya Is Most Vulnerable

Warlike cries resounded from embittered France and Italy today while by contrast delegates of 21 American nations met in conference at Lima, Peru, to work out their problems and destinies in peace.

In Rome, anti-French demonstrations continued as 1,200 students marched through the streets shouting "forward Italy" and demanding French territories.

The rising volume of Fascist cries for Tunisia, French protectorate in North Africa, diplomatic circles predicted, may lead to formal Italian demands for "concessions" there.

In Paris, sources close to Premier Daladier said France would fight if necessary, to defend the protectorate and point out significantly that Italy's neighboring Libya would be far more vulnerable to attack than the well-protected Tunisia.

Re-inforced mobile guards patrolled the streets of Tunis, the protectorate's capital, and French troops were held in barracks awaiting developments.

One person was gravely wounded and three others less seriously injured in demonstrations by Italians, French and Arabs which lasted almost until midnight.

Blackmailers

On numerous occasions, Mussolini has solemnly pro-
claimed that Italy coveted no other territory. Following
his Ethiopian conquest he was very strong in his declara-
tion that Italy's colonial aspirations had been satisfied
and that henceforth existing boundaries would be re-
spected.

He has consistently maintained that his interest in
Spain is not territorial and that his only consideration
there is seeing to it that a communistic regime is not
established.

But Mussolini's word like that of his prototype Hitler
is not to be taken at its face value. It may be recalled
that Hitler also has made statements in regard to terri-
tory directly opposite to his intentions and his per-
formances.

He repudiated the Locarno Pact by sending troops
into the Rhineland's neutralized zones; shortly after he
said it was neither the wish nor the intention to mix in
internal Austrian affairs or annex Austria. In March 7,
1936 he said: "Czechoslovakia, like Poland, always fol-
lowed the policy of representing their own national in-
terests. Germany does not desire to attack these states."

Aside from being ruthless dictators, both of these
men have proved themselves unmitigated liars of the
first water. Their international policies cannot be dis-
tinguished from blackmail, and as most everyone knows,
the way to deal with a blackmailer is not to do business
with him.

Seekers Of Free Space

Free publicity given by newspapers is partly respon-
sible for the decline in paid advertising, in the opinion of
the Titusville Star-Advocate, which goes on to say that
free publicity makes the advertisers believe that news-
paper space is worth just what they pay for it—it is
given away, it isn't worth anything. "There is no more
reason," says the Star-Advocate "why a newspaper
should give away its advertising and boosting publicity
to events in the community for which a charge is made
than there is that the clothing man should give away a
shirt with each suit of clothes purchased, or that the
grocer should give a customer his bacon because the
customer purchased his beefsteak at the grocer. The only
thing a newspaper has to sell is advertising. If the edi-
tor gives it away he can't expect anyone to pay for it, or
to have a very high regard for it."

Wise and self-respecting newspapers have long since
discontinued the policy of giving space to commercial or
profit-seeking enterprises or projects. There will be al-
ways seekers of free space, but they receive courteous yet
firm refusal in all well-regulated newspaper offices. A
good newspaper sells its advertising space to its adver-
sers and its news columns to its readers; and a
newspaper is not honest with itself or its patrons when it
gives its news space to its advertisers or attempts to dis-
turb its advertising as news.—Tampa Tribune.

By dropping the entire plan into one bill it goes before congress on a "take it or leave it" basis. This enabled a coalition headed by former representative C. C. Cummings, Democrat, New York, chairman of the powerful House reorganization committee, to muster enough strength to beat it.

Mr. Cummings was defeated in re-election in November and is expected to be succeeded in the committee chairmanship by Representative J. P. Coughlin, Democrat, Illinois, an ardent new dealer.

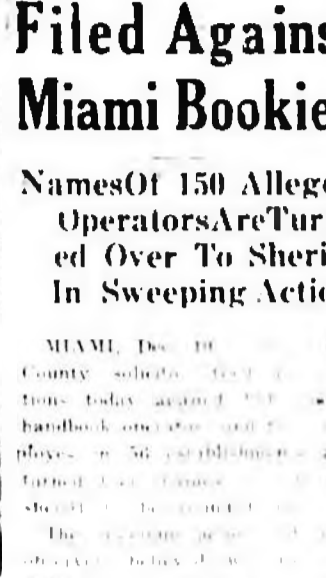
