Blue Jays 5, Angels 3: At Anaheim, Calif., Rance Mullins collected two doubles and a single, scored twice, and drove in a run to carry the Blue Jays. George Bell had a pair of RBI singles to help Toronto win its fifth straight game.

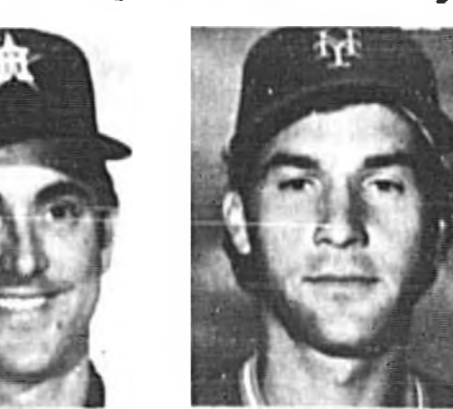
Red Sox 7, Mariners 1: At Seattle, Al Nipper and Steve Crawford combined on a one-hitter, allowing a sixth-inning single by Ivan Calderon, in the Mariners' fifth straight loss. Steve Lyons paced Boston's 10-hit attack by driving in three runs with a two-run homer and a sacrifice fly.

Ryan Registers 'Heep' Big K (4,000)

United Press International Nolan Ryan established a milestone Thursday night and the New York Mets almost stepped over it. Ryan struck out Danny Heep for his 4,000th career strikeout and Bill Doran's 12th-inning hit, his fifth of the contest, scored Dickie Thon from second base as Houston finally pulled out a 4-3 victory over the New York Mets. Ryan became the first pitcher in history to record 4,000 strikeouts and finished the game with 4,004. He started the night with 3,993 and struck out 11 over seven innings. Ryan, ironically, did not get the victory. The loss snapped the Mets' nine-game winning streak. "I was disappointed after my last outing that I didn't perform better," said Ryan. "I wanted to do it at home in front of the home crowd. I knew if I didn't do it tonight, I was going to do it on the road. That was definitely a motivation to do it tonight." Thon slapped a single to left off losing pitcher Tom Gorman, 4-4, to open the 12th and moved to second on a sacrifice. Doran then singled to give Dave Smith his fifth victory in eight decisions. Smith, 5-3, pitched the final three innings, allowing two hits. "The man's amazing," Doran said of Ryan. "It was a thrill for me to be out there and see it. It made the hit (game-winner) all that much nicer." New York took a 1-0 lead in the second inning Gary Carter and Heep led off with consecutive singles and moved up a base on Ryan's wild pitch. Howard Johnson drove in Carter with a bloop double into left field.

Houston went ahead 2-1 in the fifth. Thon led off with a single and stole second. With one out, Doran singled to center to score Thon. Dodgers 3, Cubs 1: At Chicago, Steve Teague's two-run single snapped a scoreless tie in the seventh inning to spark the Dodgers to their fourth straight win. Steve Sax added an RBI single off Ray Foutz, 3-4, in the seventh for the Dodgers. Bob Welch, 3-1, worked the first 7 1/3 innings for the win. Reds 2, Expos 0: At Cincinnati, Ben Bilardello's RBI single in the seventh inning broke open a scoreless game to lead the Reds. Ron Robinson, 5-0, pitched 7 1/3 innings for the victory. Cincinnati player-manager Pete Rose did not play and needs 38 hits to break Ty Cobb's all-time record of 4,191. Pirates 6, Giants 4: At Pittsburgh, Johnny Ray hit a two-run homer, rookie Joe Orsula went 4-for-4 and Ceciliano Guante pitched 5-2 innings of two-hit relief to pace the Pirates. The loss snapped the Pirates' four-game losing streak and handed the Giants their fifth straight loss. Braves 3, Phillies 2: At Atlanta, Rafael Ramirez singled home pinch-runner Milt Thompson in the bottom of the ninth inning to lift the Braves. Reliever Bruce Sutter, 5-4, was the winner. Larry Andersen, 3-3 took the loss. Cardinals 6, Padres 0: At St. Louis, rookie speedster Vince Coleman stole three bases, rapped two hits and scored twice and Jack Clark clubbed a home run to help John Tudor to his ninth consecutive victory and spark the Cardinals. Tudor improved his record to 10-7. Mark Thurmond, 3-7, suffered the loss.

Eriksson Gets Outclassed

BROOKLINE, Mass. (UPI) — Levels of the game exist in all sports, but few losers admit it as quickly as Stefan Eriksson. After being outclassed by fellow Swede Mats Wilander 6-1, 6-2 Thursday night in the third round of the U.S. Pro Tennis Championships, Eriksson did not pretend victory was ever within his grasp. "Everything I can do, he can do better. Every time I came close, he would come up with something. If I tried to stay back and be steady, he could be steadier. If I tried to pass him, he always guessed right," he said. Eriksson, 21, who attended the University of Minnesota before turning pro this year, said he had "never played a top-ranked player before" and termed it "a great experience."

## Gardening

### Graceful Fern One Of Easiest Plants To Grow

During the heat of the summer, there is nothing so refreshing as being surrounded by lush, rich green plants, which definitely add a "coolness" to the atmosphere around the garden, the patio — even indoors. One of the easiest, eye-appealing plants you can cultivate is the fern.

Ferns are among the world's oldest living plants and are lower on the evolutionary scale than seed plants. Some common ferns are Boston, Maidenhair, Staghorn, Rabbits-foot, and Pteris. Others, such as Asparagus plumosa and Asparagus sprengeri, are not true ferns since they produce seeds, not spores. Both make excellent garden plants, so we'll include them with the true ferns for the sake of this discussion.

The best way to propagate ferns is by division or by offsets as with Boston fern. The true ferns can be grown from spores, but this takes at least a year to grow usable plants. The spores can be shaken from the underside of the fronds when ripe and placed on ground sphagnum moss in a well-drained container.

To keep the sphagnum moist, you'll have to cover the container and place the container in a

spot where light is sufficient for normal fern growth. Young plants may be potted about six months after germination. Both Asparagus plumosa and sprengeri are easily grown from seed.

Ferns need a soil mixture that's rich in organic material. In fact they'll do well in 100 percent peat moss, or a combination of three quarters peat moss and one quarter sand. Which ever growing material you choose, make sure it drains rapidly. Fern roots are easily damaged by standing water.

When potting ferns, select a container with several drainage holes in the bottom. Never use pots that don't provide good drainage. The growing media should be kept moist at all times.

Best fern growth occurs when the temperature is 70 to 80 degrees. Most ferns will be damaged by frost and freezing temperatures. But, they will come back from the roots in the spring if you live in an area that suffers from frosts and freezing temperatures, you can bring your plants indoors. Actually, indoor temperatures are usually ideal for ferns. But, the low humidity found in the average home can be a real problem. Most ferns like a fairly high level

of humidity. You can compensate for low indoor humidity by regularly spraying your ferns with a fine mist of water.

When the humidity is too low, fine, thin-leaved ferns, such as the Maidenhair, develop scorched leaf margins. Boston and Rabbits-foot ferns as well as other types with thick fronds tolerate low humidity much better than those with thin ones.

Ferns do require some small amounts of fertilizer and will obtain some nutrients from the decomposition of the potting medium. Packaged liquid house plant foods, obtained from your favorite garden supply shop, are good for fern growth. But, apply them to your ferns at half the strength recommended on the container. Ferns will not tolerate high fertilization and will frequently show leaf scorch when fertilized too heavily.

Insects and disease are not a problem with ferns. They are really trouble free. Ferns are easily injured by insecticides and fungicides, so you're better off without them. If an insect or disease problem occurs, usually you can prune out infected parts and spray them with water.

There are hundreds of different fern types that can be grown both indoors for interior decoration and outdoors as part of your landscape. Their graceful foliage and ability to grow in dense shade and low light make them almost the perfect plant. Outdoors, you can plant them on the north side of your home, under trees as a ground cover, in tubs, hanging baskets, and in shaded spots near water features.

For a "cool" summer, set out some ferns, stand back and enjoy their beautiful, lush deep green fronds. You'll be glad you did.

You can either stick with him and accept things as they are, or say goodbye. The choice is yours.

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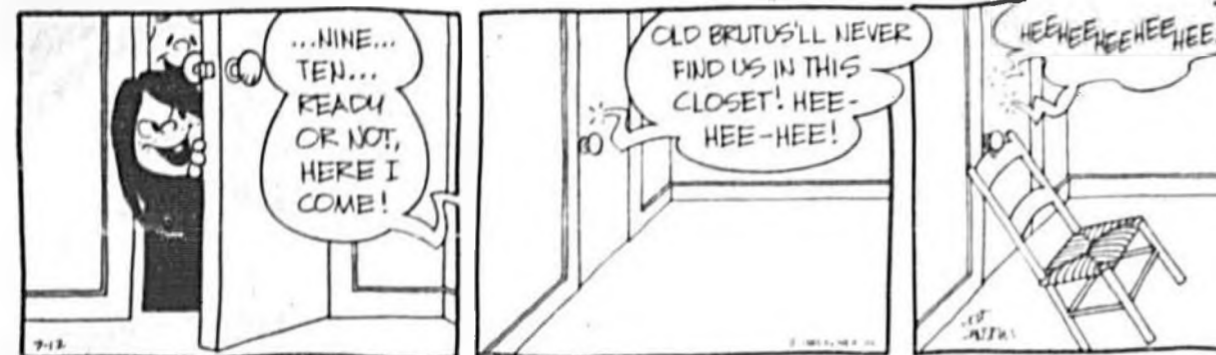
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Teen Nervousness May Cause Trembling Hands

DEAR DR. GOTT - My daughter is 14, and when she holds out her hand outstretched in front, it trembles to the fingertips. She has no bad habits, such as drinking too much coffee or smoking. Is this normal?

DEAR DR. GOTT - Tremors of the outstretched hand can reflect a variety of causes - from an overactive thyroid gland to a benign essential tremor, or tremulousness of unknown cause. To complicate matters, some adolescents - because of just plain nervousness - tend to be shaky.

Most people's fingers tremble a little bit during forced extension. I cannot tell from your question whether your daughter's condition is normal. To some extent, the degree of tremor can determine if the situation could be helped by medication. A very slight trembling is of no particular concern. However, if your daughter is concerned, a medical evaluation is appropriate. Encourage her to be examined by your family doctor.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I'm middle-aged and never had a particularly good memory for names, but now I can forget the name of a movie star two hours after I saw the movie; then I spend the next hour trying to remember it. The more I try, the angrier I get at myself.

DEAR DR. GOTT - Loss of memory can be a symptom of disease or it can be a normal variation. A doctor can best advise you. Many people routinely experience memory loss. We may have other things on our minds, worries, concerns about responsibilities. Under these circumstances, we may tend to forget inconsequential events and names.

I've found that the more frustrated I become at not being able to remember a name, the more elusive the name becomes. There are lots of tricks that people use to remember things. The most reliable, I suppose, is writing them down. Then you can refer to a written sheet to refresh your memory.

DEAR DR. GOTT - Is it true that a calcium deficiency can cause frequent headaches and excessive menstrual cramps? Is

taking calcium supplements an effective way to reduce the likelihood of getting headaches and cramps?

DEAR READER - I think not. People who are calcium-deficient may experience muscle cramps and weakness. Therefore, supplemental calcium may help in these instances. But ordinary headaches are usually due to tension and muscle contraction, and menstrual cramps are due to the effect of a chemical called prostaglandin. Therefore, calcium will not usually affect these

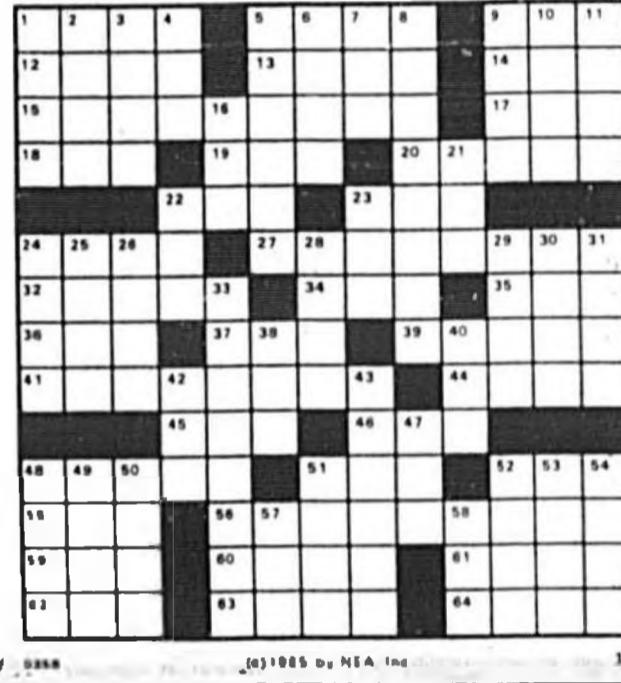

WIN AT BRIDGE

When a big fat finesse is staring you right in the face, it's hard to grit your teeth and count your tricks in the other suits.

It seems so unnatural not to go after your best and longest suit. It will help if you remember that the contract is all-important. First make it. If you have time afterward, think about overtricks, but not at the risk of your contract.

Shortsighted South won the opening lead with the spade ace in his hand and tided the club finesse. That lost and back came a spade. Declarer was still in good shape if clubs split, but no

such luck! When South finally and belatedly forced out the heart ace, West took three more spade tricks to set three no-trump. All declarer needed was his right fingers and either thumb to count to nine tricks - two spades, two hearts, four diamonds, and the club ace. But to be certain of taking all those tricks, he must take the spade king in dummy at trick one.

Next comes the heart jack and, if West ducks the ace, a heart continuation. That brings in nine tricks. As for the club finesse - save it for the next hand, when you might need it.

### Bolivian Government Fails To Delay Presidential Election

LA PAZ, Bolivia. (UPI) — Cheering supporters of leading presidential candidates poured into the streets to celebrate as President Hernan Siles Zuazo failed in a last-ditch effort to postpone Sunday's national election.

Bolivia's economic crisis, caused by 3,000 percent inflation, high unemployment, food shortages and an almost worthless peso, is expected to turn voters to the right — a prospect feared by leftist labor unions.

Labor unions and Siles Zuazo's ruling Nationalist Revolutionary Movement — a center-left party — fear right-wing retired army general and former President Hugo Banzier will be elected.

### TWA Hijackers Identified

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — State-owned Beirut radio today revealed the names of the gunmen who hijacked a TWA jetliner, killed a U.S. Navy diver and set off the 17-day hostage crisis. It said they would be prosecuted.

The radio, which is in mainly Moslem west Beirut and now controlled by the Shiite Moslem militia Amal, named Ali Younis and Ahmed Ghorbiel as the pair who commandeered TWA Flight 847 on June 14 after it left Athens for Rome.

The same men were named in radio broadcasts during the crisis but those identifications were never confirmed.

Today's report also mentioned Ali Atwal, who was arrested in Athens before he could board the Boeing 747 and was later freed in Algiers in exchange for the release of some of the more than 150 passengers on the plane.

In Thursday's action, the commission decided to top \$62,000 off the assistant city manager's budget. That figure covers the salary and related expenses for an assistant city manager and a secretary.

The commission also decided to up the salary for a city planner by \$14,000 and to add a computer technician for the data processing department. The technician will be paid \$12,000 a year.

Farr suggested the planner, a position scheduled to be added to the Engineering and Planning Department next year, be paid an additional \$14,000, making the total salary \$35,500. Farr, a planner himself, said the city would have to pay that much to get a top-notch planner with a graduate degree.

# Bush Forms Task Force To Combat Terrorism

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vice President George Bush says he is naming former Chief of Naval Operations Adm. James Holloway to be executive director of his task force to combat terrorism.

The vice president told the National Press Club Thursday his task force will include representatives of the State, Defense and Transportation departments as well as the FBI, the CIA and the Office of Management and Budget.

Bush said he would report task force recommendations to the president by the end of the year.

"The goal of this task force is to be certain that we are using every means at our disposal to combat this modern scourge," he said.

Administration officials have told United Press International that a variety of options are being considered as potential responses to the threat posed by terrorism, but that no action on any is imminent.

However, officials say the president believes military force should be a component of a U.S. response to terrorism. The Washington Post reported today.

Among many options being considered is the bombing of terrorist training sites, these officials told the Post.

Military officials are said to have pinpointed prospective targets, using up-to-date aerial photographs considered improvements over any the administration has had in the past.

NBC News reported Thursday that assassination of top radical leaders is also an option being considered.

The discussion within the administration follows the release of Americans held hostage in the hijacking of TWA Flight 847 by Hezbollah, or Party of God, a radical Shiite Moslem faction among the warring groups in Lebanon.

The plane, seized June 14 en

route from Athens to Rome, was forced to land at Beirut airport.

Bush said the United States wants to see the Beirut airport made safe for American travelers and expressed hope that the warring factions in Lebanon could work together to secure the facility.

Denouncing terrorists as "nothing more or less than common criminals who assault innocent men, women and children," Bush said that during his trip to Europe he found a "sea change" of public opinion in other countries against terrorists. Fifteen years ago, he said, the common belief abroad was that "one man's terrorist is another man's freedom fighter."

During the TWA hijacking, the administration threatened to impose economic sanctions on Lebanon, and indirectly on Syria, by closing the airport to commerce.

But White House spokesman Larry Speakes seemed to soften

the terms of the threat Thursday, saying all the United States requires is for Lebanon to impose security precautions standard at other international airports.

## Senators Angry Over Social Security Switch

# Reagan Should 'Keep His Mouth Shut'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican senators who voted to curb Social Security are harshly criticizing President Reagan's about-face on the issue and one even suggested that Reagan should "keep his mouth shut."

Reagan and congressional budget leaders reached a tentative framework for a deficit-cutting budget Tuesday that would preserve Social Security cost-of-living payments.

But Senate Republican leader Robert Dole indicated Thursday a solid agreement may be in jeopardy because of outrage among GOP senators. A Republican aide put the chances of getting a budget agreement this month at 50-50.

House and Senate budget negotiators met separately, private-

ly Thursday, but no bargaining session was scheduled this week. Some conferees have said an agreement must be made by the end of next week if one is to be passed before the start of the congressional summer recess, Aug. 3.

"I always think that if the president can't support us, he should keep his mouth shut," said Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, following a meeting of GOP senators up for re-election in 1986.

Assistant Senate Republican leader Alan Simpson added that, although the president was in accord with budget committee members and congressional leaders on dropping the Social Security provision, "that was not an agreement of the 50 guys who jumped off a cliff over here (to cast the vote)."

The Senate Judiciary Committee approved two proposed constitutional amendments Thursday that would require the government to balance its budget.

The proposed amendments face an uncertain future in the Senate and in the House, where opposition is strong.

Reagan promised during his campaign last year that he would not touch Social Security increases in cutting the deficit.

But in May, the Senate — with Reagan backing Vice President George Bush's tie-breaking vote, and with almost only Republicans voting for it — adopted a budget that called for scrapping next year's scheduled

Social Security cost-of-living raises.

The House budget protected the raises.

The latest budget framework Reagan worked out with congressional leaders would allow Social Security payments to rise with the cost of living. It also would allow an increase with inflation for the military and prohibit new taxes.

Reagan wants more cuts in domestic programs be made to offset the increases in Social Security. House budget negotiators huddled privately Thursday in an attempt to find up to \$6 billion in additional cuts, though there were indications any cuts would amount to less than \$1 billion.

## Wholesale Prices Stable, Retail Sales Down

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Wholesale prices in June remained unchanged from May after rising slowly in each of the preceding four months, the Labor Department announced today.

At the same time, retail sales fell 0.8 percent to \$113.9 billion in June with home furnishings and equipment stores recording the biggest decline.

But compared to a year ago, last month's retail sales were up 4.4 percent, the Census Bureau said in its monthly report estimating sales activity.

For the first six months of 1985, wholesale prices rose at a modest annual rate of 1.4 percent, the department said. For the last 12 months, the increase in wholesale prices was just 1.1 percent.

Craig Howells, a Labor Department economist, said the figures show "no inflation problems down the line that we can look at."

The department's monthly Producer Price Index found that energy costs declined in June after substantial advances in April and

May while prices for finished consumer goods dropped for the fifth time in the last six months.

The wholesale price index last month stood at 294, before seasonal adjustment. That means that goods that could have been bought for \$100 in 1967 now cost \$294.

The index measures changes in the wholesale price of nearly 3,400 goods sold in bulk. Wholesale price changes eventually influence retail prices and the consumer price index.

Howells said the decrease in energy and food prices were offset by increases in items such as passenger cars and cosmetics.

After rising 3.4 percent in May, energy costs dropped in June by 2 percent. The largest declines were for home heating oil and natural gas. The price of gasoline rose by a much smaller amount in June than it did in either April or May, the department said.

Food costs inched down 0.1 percent in June after falling 1 percent during the previous two months. The tiny decrease was due in large part to the fact that prices

them that cars, boats and other equipment could not be parked on school property and be offered for sale.

Benny Arnold, the school board's assistant superintendent for facilities and transportation, said the board has no policy concerning cars for sale on school property.

"In the past, we have contacted local police and had them tell the owners of the vehicles to remove them," Arnold said.

He explained that the school board has a sticker it places on the windshields cars parked on school property that are being offered for sale. The sticker says, "You are illegally parked" and

Both times the city commission discussed the proposed ordinance, it could not agree whether or not a permit should be issued by the city hall giving permission to sell a vehicle.

On May 16, when the ordinance was first introduced, a \$10 permit fee would have been required to post for sale a vehicle, boat or other piece of equipment. But Commissioner Russ Megonegal said \$10 was too much and said \$2 "would be about right."

The consensus of the commissioner was the "For Sale" signs make the city look "like a used car lot."

City Attorney Robert Petree drafted an ordinance based on

Mrs. Kastner also pointed to the money raised by men, women and children in Sanford and Seminole County to keep the zoo here some 10 years ago and during the intervening years.

"It is my belief if enough shoulders get to the wheel in Sanford and Sanford can provide high land, the zoo will stay in Sanford," she said.

The county has been leasing the 21-acre site to the zoo society for the past 10 years. In recent years, the society's board have been discussing a move, saying that the low-lying land is not a healthy environmental for many of the exotic animals.

MacLaughlin said a two-member board has been searching within Seminole County for a new site, but has been unsuccessful in finding a large enough parcel.

# Diamonds Are Forever

**T**he quest for bright, glittering pebbles, better known as diamonds, has been endless. They've been searched for, traded, smuggled, fought over, cherished and ogled since the 1st Century when Roman philosopher Pliny the Elder called them the most highly valued of worldly goods.

These sparkling chips — a pristine first cousin to coal — were once believed to have magical charms so powerful that they could not be worn.

Later, set in crowns, swords, necklaces and rings, diamonds became badges of royalty, wealth and love.

That remains much the case today, but diamonds now grace the fingers, wrists and throats of the common man and woman. However, great wealth, if not regal birth, is still required to amass a truly impressive collection, because diamonds not only retain their value, but their worth actually grows.

Almost every woman married in America receives anything from a diamond chip to a multi-carat stone in an engagement ring as a symbol of enduring love.

In many cases, Sanford gemologist John Kader said, the diamond outlasts the love. That leaves the woman, even if she has a broken heart, with a solid investment in stone.

That's not, however, what romantics have in mind when they shell out, on the average, about \$500 for this token of their affection. Kader said they are thinking in terms of beauty and for-ever-after happiness.

"Just as they feel like love is going to last forever," they chose a lasting symbol to represent that love, he said.

As babies are attracted to bright, shiny objects so are adults drawn to diamonds. And though styles change both men and women adorn themselves with them.

That trend reached a peak in the Gay 90s when the renowned "Diamond Jim" Brady elevated the 'rock' to an all-time fashion high and is reputed to have owned more than 20,000 of the sparkling stones.

Kader said diamonds started out as a man's stone and today male interest has been revived among

those who strive to project an image of stability, stature and confidence by donning a gem or two.

But there is one stone many likely would not wear, the reputedly cursed Hope diamond. Unusually, gruesome death was the fate of the owners of that 45½-carat blue diamond until its last owner apparently broke the spell when he donated it to the U.S. government.

For 27 uneventful years the feared stone has been on display in the Smithsonian Institution's Museum of Natural History in Washington, D.C.

But fear is the least common emotion expressed by those who look upon even the lowliest cut-and-polished diamond. Peter Schneirla of Tiffany & Co. in New York said, "Sometimes people can't even describe what they feel when they look at diamonds."

They are mesmerized by the stone's brilliant flashes of color, he said, noting that a diamond looks different from every angle because of its ability to bend or refract light and divide it into the colors of the rainbow.

That's why the newly engaged woman is likely to move her hand continuously so the diamond's flashes of fire can be fully appreciated and perhaps envied by admirers, Schneirla said.

It is for those women, and others, that Casselberry diamond cutter Jim Blanck plies his craft. In his eight years as a cutter, the 27-year-old Blanck said he hasn't made the wrong move and shattered a precious stone.

"I don't get nervous," he said. "I'm accustomed to dealing with it. I look at each job as one to be done and every diamond has to be handled very carefully."

The cut of a diamond is one of the four "C's" of the gem business. The cut contributes to the brilliance of the stone, but it isn't the most important of the C's, which include color, clarity and carat weight, Kader said.

The color of the stone comes first, with rare red and pink stones topping the list. Blue is next, followed by canary yellow and green and then down to white, with another shade of yellow at the bottom of the list.

Top-of-the-line white stones are crystal clear and have the flash and beauty of an impossibly faceted drop of pure water.

"I don't think you have to have a flawless

diamond to have a pretty diamond," Kader said. But if you're considering buying a diamond, clarity is important, and stones with visible deposits of black carbon should be skipped over, he said.

Probably the least important of the C's is carat weight, Kader said. "A small diamond can be just as beautiful as a larger diamond." But if all other factors are equal the larger diamond is of course going to be more valuable.

The C's all contribute to a diamond's worth, but it's strength — being 10 times stronger than any other natural substance — and rarity help this stone hold its place in the market, Kader said.

Actually, the idea that diamonds are rare is a well-concocted falsehood. Diamond deposits abound in mines and are sometimes found on the Earth's surface. They are common to one degree or another in most areas of the world.

However, Kader said, they are the most controlled commodity in the world, with 90 percent of all diamonds initially distributed through the DeBeers family, headquartered in England.

Through deals with nations such as Africa and Australia, two of the top diamond-producing countries in the world, the DeBeers for decades have retained a stranglehold on the diamond market. They have limited the number of diamonds offered for sale, thus inflating their value, Kader said.

And of all the diamonds mined, only about 20 percent are of gem quality suitable for jewelry; the rest are used for industrial purposes — grinding, cutting, etching and polishing.

But diamonds are more than chunks of coal that time, heat and pressure have transformed into valued baubles or useful tools. Strangely enough, you'll never find a diamond in a coal mine, Kader said.

But then geologic oddities don't concern the avid collector or once-in-a-lifetime buyer. And if you're seeking diamonds strictly as an investment, Kader advises that you don't buy jewelry. He says you should buy loose stones that are marketed purely as investments.

When investing in diamonds for adornment or as a speculator, Kader said you should first shop for your dealer to make sure the stones are honestly graded and priced.

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# Muppets Win Top 'TV Humanizing' Award

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — The Muppets, a movie starring Jane Fonda and a series set in a Boston hospital are among winners of the 11th Humanitas Awards, given for contributions to the "humanizing" of television programming.

Named for the cash awards this week were a Muppet special by Jim Henson, the movie "The Doll Maker" and the series "St. Elsewhere." An episode from the top-rated "Cosby Show" and an NBC documentary on Vietnam were also honored.

The annual awards were founded by the Rev. Ellwood Kiester, president of the Human Family Institute and producer of the syndicated series "Insight."

In the full-length category, for shows 90 minutes or longer, ABC's "The Doll Maker" pulled

down the \$25,000 prize.

In the hourlong category, the NBC series "St. Elsewhere," a drama focusing on a Boston hospital, garnered the \$15,000 prize.

An episode of NBC's "The Cosby Show," starring Bill Cosby, was awarded the \$10,000 prize for the half-hour episode titled: "Theo and the Joint."

Also appearing on NBC was the documentary "Vietnam — Lessons of a Lost War," which was awarded a non-cash prize in the news and documentary category.

For child animation, an episode of "The Muppet Babies" on CBS titled: "Eight Minus One Equals Panic," received the \$10,000 award.

A CBS special called "The Day the Senior Class Got Married" was deemed best in the

children's live action category.

The awards ceremony took

place at the Sheraton Universal Hotel in Studio City.

## NAACP Split Over Black Hiring Probe

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Two Southern California chapters of the NAACP have dissociated their branches from a national campaign by the organization protesting the hiring practices of five black music stars and six record companies.

The Los Angeles and Beverly Hills branches of the NAACP issued a joint press release Monday apologizing to the recording artists singled out in the campaign.

Melanie Lomax, Southern California regional coordinator of the NAACP's "fair share" program to promote equitable economic practices by employers, last week accused Tina Turner, Michael Jackson, Diana Ross, Lionel Richie and Prince of "hypocritical discrimination" in hiring people for behind-the-scenes work.

The national director of the NAACP's economic development program, Fred Rasheed, said the aim of the campaign was to negotiate voluntary "fair share" agreements with six major record companies for the

hiring of more black people.

The press release by the two chapters of the regional NAACP conference, however, declared that the companies and entertainers had been named prematurely.

"A preliminary investigation reveals that the major concern is with the record industry and not the entertainers," the release said. "Since the investigation is not complete, the NAACP is not in a position at this time to target or identify any record company or entertainer."

"We, therefore, apologize to those entertainers named."

The companies targeted by the national NAACP campaign are Capitol Industries-EMI Inc., CBS Records, RCA Records, MCA Records Inc., Warner Bros. Records Inc. and Polygram Records Inc.

Lomax said the investigation into alleged discrimination was a project of the Southern California regional conference of the NAACP and the national organization.

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
