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NATO Relations Strained Again

The scheduling of an election in April as the first step toward constitutional government keeps alive the hope that Portugal can avoid falling under Communist domination.

That possibility sends shudders through NATO defense planners, and it still should.

The Mediterranean today is anything but a secure frontier for Western Europe.

There are fears that Spain would find it no easier than Portugal to deal with a transition in government, one that can be delayed only as long as Francisco Franco, old and ailing, remains a symbol of the existing order.

At the eastern end of the Mediterranean, Turkey has placed herself in limbo as a NATO ally in response to the cutoff of U.S. military aid mandated by her Congress.

Britain is planning to reduce her forces on Cyprus and Maldives, the name of economy. Finally, NATO faces the fact that the inevitable passing of Marshal Tito could end the relative neutrality of Yugoslavia, whose naval strength rivals that of Italy across the Adriatic Sea.

From one end to the other, the Mediterranean hardly emerges today as an area firmly protected by the mutual cooperation of the Western European nations whose security is affected by events on its waters or along its shores.

This erosion is taking place amid clear signals that the new Soviet navy intends to make the Mediterranean a major operating area.

The political uncertainties and diplomatic problems which threaten NATO's Southern Command deserve more attention than they are receiving from the United States of America and those European allies whose commitment to NATO remains strong enough to save the alliance.

Hope Remains

South Korean President Park Chung Hee achieved a victory in a national referendum on support for his major policies, although the election took place under conditions not in keeping with our own ideas of a fair campaign.

The real significance of this election lies in that 70 per cent of the electorate cast a vote of confidence for Mr. Park's policies. The impressive fact is that nearly 3.5 million voters cast their votes in opposition to the Park policies, an indication that free expression at the ballot box is possible in South Korea.

One Myth We Can Do Without

BURLINGTON, N.C. — (NEA) — Negro History Week according to the act of Congress has been turned into Black History Month according to the wishes of many.

The way the history books tell it, and the way millions of citizens have accepted it, is that Burlington's Abolitionist George Burdett was the first to call for Black History Month.

Briefly, the accepted tale is this: Drew spent much of his young life concerned with the collection, preparation and transfusion techniques of whole human blood and plasma.

It was of course not easy for a black man to direct the bank then, the U.S. military at the time being dead against the doctor's insistence that blood from white and black could be safely mixed in surgery.

Following the war, and here we quote from Drew's official biography as presented by the Afro-American Bicentennial Commission and other historians, Drew was in heavy demand on the lecture and medical conference circuit.

It is perhaps easy to understand why the histories finish Drew's story thus. The irony of a black bank founder dying from the refusal of plasma transfusion is too journalistically poignant not to be repeated indefinitely.

The reason Drew fell asleep at the wheel, after all, was because North Carolina in those days offered precious few accommodations for traveling Negroes, and the doctor was at 2 a.m. trying to drive straight through to a guaranteed welcome. Given this, why not also accept the likelihood of murderous medical bigotry?

Too Late To Delay Shortage?

What is there about oil that has given rise to almost universal agreement among Americans that this country must eventually become totally independent of foreign sources for its energy needs?

The United States is now, and for years has been, importing most of the raw materials required by modern industry and technology.

A little-noted report by the U.S. Geological Survey last year predicted that the nation may face future crises in the supply of some of its important minerals unless massive research efforts are begun soon to develop domestic resources.

Zinc. In 1972, the United States imported about 52 per cent of its zinc consumption, chiefly from Canada, Mexico, Peru and Australia.

Chromium. The United States imported 100 per cent of its consumption of this essential mineral in 1972, mainly from the Soviet Union, the Republic of South Africa and Chile.

Identified domestic resources of chromium amount to only about 1.67 million short tons and again they would be difficult to mine and expensive to use.

Survey scientists noted that while the nature and implications of the energy problem virtually exploded into public consciousness, concern about our mineral supply remained, for the most part, within the professional and technical communities.

Subway Train Crash

LONDON (AP) — A packed subway train crashed through the protective buffers of a station in London's financial district at the height of the morning rush hour today and slammed into a tunnel wall, killing at least 13 persons and injuring 68, officials and witnesses said.

Firemen used acetylene torches to cut through one of the twisted coaches to reach trapped victims. Some rescue workers had to crawl on their hands and knees.

About 50 persons were trapped in three coaches that were badly smashed, a spokesman for the London Fire Brigade said. "Two of the coaches are concentrated in an area where one coach would normally go," said Staff Commander Ernest Bright.

Kidnapers In Contact

BERLIN (AP) — A photo of kidnaped Christian Democratic leader Lorenz was sent to a German news agency today showing him with a sign saying: "Prisoner of the Second of June Movement."

The police took possession of the picture and a letter that accompanied it. It was the first word Lorenz since he was kidnaped some 21 hours ago.

The Second of June Movement is a band of anarchists who named their group for the day in 1967 when a student Benno Ohnesorg was shot to death during a leftist demonstration in West Berlin.

Officials said the incident occurred after agents were offered a stolen \$3,000 Corvette for \$1,200. The sports car was reported stolen last week in Nashville.

Fortitude is the raw willingness to fight for what one believes — to fight at all costs and regardless of injury.

Fortitude is faith in action and the young Christian church had many opportunities of suffering and martyrdom to show its conviction to the unbelieving world. Jim Angell quotes the late Robert Spike as saying for today, "If one were to pick out a virtue for the Christian life, endurance would be a good one. To stand in the face of the storm, with courage and without panic, is perhaps a more needed ingredient of Christian love than sympathy. This is not an endurance appropriate to the Stoic. It is cold and gray, guilt of despair.
