(Continued From Page One) tective Committee letters of Aug. 6 and Aug. 30.

"Fully conscious of the serious problem represented by the accumulating interest on the city's present indebtedness, we are willing to propose that in the event your tax collections for 1932-33, including such sums as may be realized from the sale of tax certificates issued against the 1932-33 levy, aggregate not less than 90 percent of the 1932-33 roll, depositors should accept such cash realization in full settlement of coupons payable on Jan. 1 and July 1, 1933.

"We are further agreeable to your using whatever portion of the levy for debt service you can collect in cash in excess of 60 percent of the tax roll to purchase City of Sanford bonds at the market, on the understanding that any bonds so purchased are to be cancelled and retired.

"All of the foregoing is conditioned upon the assessed valuation of the City remaining substantially unchanged from 1931-32, excepting as it may be necessary to remove from the assessment roll lands foreclosed on account of delinquent taxes and assessments.

"It is also conditioned upon the tax rate remaining at 30 mills to be divided substantially 60 percent for debt service and 40 percent for operations, just as heretofore.

"In order to minimize the possibility of the City being without sufficient funds with which to operate, the Committee will undertake to purchase such tax certificates as it may select in lieu of 1932 taxes, sufficient to assure the City a collection of 60 percent of all the taxes assessed, provided 40 percent of the assessed taxes are voluntarily paid before the date of delinquency.

"No distinction should be made between the sale of tax certificates to the Committee and the sale of certificates to other parties, and all proceeds from the sale of tax certificates, regardless of the identity of the purchaser, will be considered as cash collections for the purposes already mentioned.

Last night, City Clerk Lamson presented the tentative budget of operating expenses for 1932-33. It had been drafted after several conferences in which the Commissioners, cutting in every department of operation, had reduced the budget from last year's \$118,963 to a tentative \$94,008.25.

Through increased freight rates on vegetables from Seminole County last season it is estimated that the retailers received approximately \$200,000 more than they would have under the freight rate that prevailed during the previous shipping season.

...the report said: "The Anglican bishops gathered at Lambeth from all parts of the world, while excluding from Christian life the pursuit of undisciplined indulgence and the selfish neglect of parenthood, affirmed by a preponderant majority that in those cases where there is a clearly defined moral obligation to avoid parenthood and where there is a morally sound reason for avoiding complete abstinence, other methods may be used, providing that the one in the light of Christian principles."

The Federated Council of Churches of Christ in America has also by preponderant majority made a similar declaration. Speaking for the United Church of Canada, we associated ourselves with these representative voices."

The report issued the warning: "It is clear that the time has not yet arrived when one can declare positively what will be the ultimate effect of the practice of contraception upon the human organism with its intimate interrelations of emotional and physiological factors."

It is therefore clear that no contraceptive method should be employed without competent medical advice and even then only subject to the obligation to exercise self-control in every phase of life."

### TARIFF CHANGE IS PROPOSED BY ROOSEVELT

...the other farm states were forced deep into a depression."

Roosevelt said the Democratic party would put tariff duties "as low as the preservation of the possibility of American industry will permit."

He said the platform of his party favored a competitive tariff which would put American producers on a market equality with foreign competitors.

He proposed the duties be lowered through international negotiation by consenting to reduce to the extent some of our duties in order by a lowering of foreign tariffs that a larger measure of reciprocity may be admitted.

"This," he said, "the Democrats propose to accomplish the necessary reduction through the agency of the tariff commission."

Roosevelt delivered the address at the most important point on his coast-to-coast tour—in the heart of the Iowa farm strike zone.

The farmers, he said, have been attacked by increased taxes on the one hand and by a constantly depreciating dollar on the other.

"Therefore," he argued, "it seems to me nothing less than old-fashioned horse-sense to seek means to circumvent both of these attacks at the same time. That means first to seek relief for him from the burden of his expense account, and second, to try to restore the purchasing power of his dollar by getting for him higher prices for the products of the soil."

"I have definitely connected them," he declared, "with the broadest aspects of a new national economy, and I shall continue during the ensuing weeks to expose that prosperity in its broadest sense—covering every part of the business and covering industry and agriculture as well as commerce—springs first of all from the well itself and second from our ability as a nation to restore our parity with the other nations of the world."

### Roosevelt Fan Mail Is Destroyed By Fire

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Although Governor Roosevelt, Democratic presidential candidate, today's point of answering all letters sent to him, he will be forced to disappoint several hundred persons throughout the country, Democratic national headquarters announced yesterday.

well as our recent action indicated that we might, however, under the circumstances I feel that we are safe for another year at least, but that some definite action should be taken before the end of the next fiscal year in order that our people will know exactly what to expect as future assessments on their property."

Commissioner V. A. Speer said yesterday afternoon he said, "I'll accept the proposition in the absence of anything better, but I'm not in favor of running the ship on the rocks or out to sea until we've got fuel to get to port safely."

Commissioner C. A. Byrd said that his sentiment is contained in a comment he made two weeks ago when he and Mayor Dumas were voted down as acceptors of the committee's plan. That statement was: "I feel that the Bondholders' Committee's proposals constitute the best proposition that we can get at this time and that we would be going a long way toward effecting a permanent settlement by wiping out all the back interest as well as accumulating current and future interest, through partial interest payments as the committee has recommended. Under the committee's recommendation the millage for the coming fiscal year would be 30, whereas any other plan of action is practically certain to result in a millage in excess of 30 which would be ruinous to our property owners. Former City Commissioners have found that by going to the courts they cannot gain anything and that the only hope of our City lies in co-operation with the Bondholders' Committee as they control over 87 percent of our bonds."

Commissioner W. A. Leffler said, "The changes suggested by

the city are very important. If the committee accepts these changes without qualifications, the complete revised plan may go a long way toward a final settlement. The action of the Commission on Tuesday is understood by me to mean a re-opening of our negotiations with the committee."

### Dunedin City Heads Seek Debt Refund Over 40-Year Period

DUNEDIN, Sept. 30.—Three Dunedin city officials left today for New York to confer with representatives of a bondholders' committee on a plan to refund Dunedin bonds over a 40-year period at a lower rate of interest.

Mayor A. J. Grant, Commissioner C. Y. McMullen and Attorney Frederick T. Peebles will confer with bond men next Monday. The officials have been instructed not to make major changes in the refunding plan as originally drawn by Peebles.

The bondholders' committee, which controls \$500,000 of Dunedin securities, is headed by former Senator Truman Newberry, of Detroit and Belleair.

Dunedin has \$1,900,000 in outstanding bonds. Holders of nearly \$400,000 worth have agreed to accept the refunding plan.

### Sumners Declares Resubmission Will Be Considered Soon

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Chairman Sumners, of the House Judiciary committee yesterday said "resubmission of the 18th Amendment" was a "foregone conclusion" and that it may be considered at the coming session of Congress.

The Texas Democrat always has supported the 18th Amendment and he reiterated yesterday that he still held his convictions. However, he said:

"Regardless of attitude toward the liquor question, the position of the major political parties and the other indications of public attitude and purpose establish that it is a fact that the resubmission of the 18th Amendment as it is usually stated, is a foregone conclusion."

"Quite probably that issue will be submitted during the next session of Congress."

"It is my purpose to favor such submission. The question is right. The national campaign will be over and it would seem as good time as any to get this question back to the people for the expression of their attitude and judgment with reference to it."

### WEST WILL VOTE FOR DEMOCRATS SURVEY REVEALS

#### Once Republican States Are Placed To Roosevelt's Credit

NEW YORK CITY, Sept. 30.—Surveying victories for the Democrats throughout the Western states, particularly along the Pacific seaboard, are predicted by Collier's Weekly, as the result of a non-partisan survey made by Walter Davenport, the magazine's political editor.

California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, and Nebraska are among the formerly solid Republican states which are placed in the Democratic column by Mr. Davenport, in an article entitled "Hoover Loses the West," Roosevelt victories are also predicted in Arizona, Nevada, Montana, New Mexico and Oklahoma. The "probability is strong" that the Dakotas will go Democratic, also.

"The anti-Hoover tide is strong," declares Mr. Davenport. "All those weary Western states that are by tradition, if not tradition, decidedly Republican in national affairs, are ready for a change, eager for a new deal, willing to follow a new leader.

In the state of Washington you find thousands of registered Republicans signing up for Roosevelt against Hoover. In Oregon one sees paralysis in the old Republican organization as clearly as in

Washington, Oregon is due for a political reverse.

"California, the Democrats have registered 130 percent more votes than they were able to muster in 1930. Add to that determined showing the very large protest Republican vote that will be Roosevelt's for no better reason than that it is weary of the current line-up and you have a situation that lends no comfort at all to the Hoover management. I talked to country editors, to farmers, to clerks—employed and otherwise—to doctors, lawyers, politicians and teachers. And as I talked the astonishing fact grew that Herbert Hoover's name was being mentioned a dozen times to Franklin Roosevelt's once.

"True enough, Mr. Hoover was usually discussed adversely, the rest of the time with praise so faint as to be barely discernible. But almost invariably the speakers, Republican and Democratic, discussed Mr. Hoover in national terms, devoting extraordinary time to what they regarded as his failures, his shortness of vision, his incapacity for including the little fellow in his manifestoes, his genius for antagonisms."

#### CHURCHILL BETTER

LONDON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Winston Churchill, British statesman, who was taken to a hospital Tuesday when he became seriously ill, was reported by physicians yesterday to be very much better. He had suffered a relapse from an attack of paraplegia.

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 30.—(AP)—A man giving the name of R. J. Williams, arrested here recently on suspicion and turned over to St. Augustine officers, on charges of obtaining funds fraudulently, is wanted in Holyoke, Mass., for a payroll robbery, officials said yesterday. Lavish spending led to his arrest.

#### AERIALIST RECOVERING

PENSACOLA, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Hospital authorities yesterday said Mrs. Genevieve Cannestrelli, circus aerialist injured during a performance Tuesday, was getting along very well. She suffered a fractured skull when a block in the big top fell on her head and she plunged 30 feet to the arena floor flat on her face.

#### EATING INCREASES

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.—Eating in the city has become a big business with hundreds of meals being served daily in social restaurants. United Air Lines reports serving 100,000 meals aloft this year. ### Machado Opponent Seeks Passports To Leave Country

HAVANA, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Police and students engaged in a gun battle today in front of the residence of Senator Wifredo Ferrer. Two women bystanders faint, but no one was injured. This is the second anniversary of the death of so-called students' "boss" Rafael Trejo. The date last year was marked by various bomb-lays.

#### HAVANA, Sept. 30.—(AP)—

Carlos Manuel de la Cruz, leader of the opposition to President Machado in the Cuban house of representatives, asked for a passport yesterday following the outbreak

of political violence Tuesday which resulted in the assassination of one government and four opposition leaders.

Members of the police asserted they had uncovered a huge dynamite bomb, capable of inflicting wholesale death, in Colon cemetery near the spot where it was originally reported Dr. Clemente Vasquez Bello would be buried.

Dr. Vasquez Bello, president of the Cuban senate, leading candidate for president of the nation at next year's election, and a close associate of President Machado, was the first victim of the wave of assassinations.

Had he been buried in Colon cemetery there would have been a large gathering of high government officials near the place where police said they found the bomb.

de la Cruz had been granted asylum, sought a passport for himself. It was learned he would be provided with traveling documents in time to leave for Europe early in October.

The office of the secretary of the interior last night announced the arrest of four men accused of the assassination of Dr. Vasquez Bello. Police previously had arrested Luis Arturo Bell, son of George Bell, register of deeds of Havana and it was understood Bell gave information that led to the arrest of the others. Names were withheld, "pending the arrest of accomplices."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Three Cuban fliers yesterday made a call upon Pres. Hoover, vowing him, they said, "to repay the visit of Col. Lindbergh to our country."

### Restoration Of 2 Cents Postage In Progress

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—The House postoffice subcommittee, investigating the postal rate, yesterday unanimously voted for restoring of the two-cent postage rate on first class mail matter.

The group announced "This action was taken in view of the representations made to the subcommittee at its hearings, the fall-off in the volume of first class mail since the three-cent rate went into effect July 6, and the postmaster general's recent statement that the two-cent rate should be restored as soon as the postal business warranted it." The committee, now holding hearings on postal matters, will report to Congress at the December session.
