

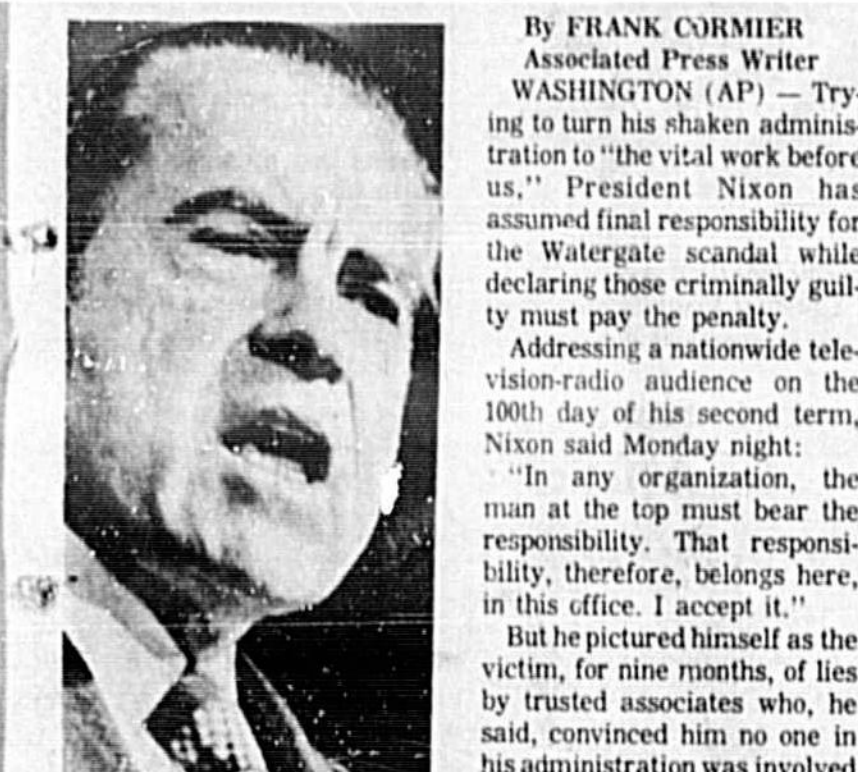

'Guilty Must Pay' Nixon Shoulders Watergate Blame



PURGE ABUSES — President vows

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Trying to turn his shaken administration to "the vital work before us," President Nixon has assumed final responsibility for the Watergate scandal while declaring those criminally guilty must pay the penalty.

Addressing a nationwide television audience on the 100th day of his second term, Nixon said Monday night:

"In any organization, the man at the top must bear the responsibility. That responsibility, therefore, belongs here, in this office. I accept it."

But he pictured himself as the victim, for nine months, of lies to justice, and that conviction, he said, convinced him no one in his administration was involved in last June's campaign burglary of Democratic National Committee headquarters in the Watergate office.

Speaking from his Oval Office in the White House, the grim-faced chief executive said:

"I pledge to you tonight, from this office, that I will do everything in my power to ensure that the guilty are brought to justice, and that all abuses are purged from our political processes."

Barely nine hours earlier, Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler had announced, on Nixon's behalf, the resignations of four key administration figures: Atty. Gen. Richard G. Kleinfelder, White House chief of staff H.W. Haldeman, presidential aide John D. Ehrlichman and White House Counsel John W. Dean III.

Dean was fired; the others were not. The only new element

added by Nixon in his address was authority granted Secretary of Defense Elliot L. Richardson, his nominee for attorney general, "to name a special supervising prosecutor for matters arising out of the case," said Richardson.

A number of Congress members of both parties have demanded that Nixon himself appoint a special prosecutor outside administration ranks.

The criticism was not stilled by Nixon's address, although he was general praise for his attempts to clean up the White House staff.

However, there were continuing calls for appointing a prosecutor with no administrative ties—a suggestion offered by Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine; former Rep. William Miller, the Republican nominee for vice president in 1964; and Rep. Shirley Chisholm, D-N.Y.

"I do not believe Congress or the people will be satisfied with the results of any investigation carried on by the administration," said Muskie.

Richardson, a former U.S. attorney and elected attorney general of Massachusetts, was put in immediate charge of all federal inquiries concerning Watergate. Nixon described him as a man of unimpeachable integrity and rigorously high principle.

His vice husky and emotional at the time, Nixon acknowledged at the outset of his 24-minute address that Watergate charges inevitably have raised "serious questions about the integrity of the White House itself."

Declaring that public faith in the presidency must "take priority over all personal considerations," Nixon said:

"Whatever may appear to have been the case before—whatever improper activities may yet be discovered in connection with this whole sordid affair—I want you to know beyond the shadow of a doubt that during my terms as president, justice will be pursued fairly, fully and impartially, no matter who is involved. This is a sacred trust and I am determined to be worthy of that trust."

However, he emphasized in discussing those who have been involved in the burglary, that he wanted to leave no implication of guilt. He said that it is a matter for the judicial system to determine. Kleinfelder said he resigned because of close ties to several individuals implicated in Watergate. Haldeman and Ehrlichman are leaving, on grounds their usefulness has been impeded.

Since March, Nixon said, Watergate "has clouded far too much of my own time and attention." "I must now turn my full attention once again to the larger duties of this office."

In explaining his stated intention of the full ramifications of the case, Nixon said:

"I will not place the blame on subordinates—on people whose zeal exceeded their judgment, and who may have done wrong in a cause they deeply believed to be right."

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Eight months ago President Nixon said the FBI and Justice Department had investigated the Watergate scandal thoroughly, and that his counsel, John W. Dean III, had cleared all administration employees of involvement.

Richardson To Conduct Probe

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Many members of Congress say President Nixon should have toughened his promise to mop up the Watergate scandal by moving the investigation entirely out of the executive branch.

In his speech to the nation Monday night, the President placed Elliot L. Richardson, his nominee for attorney general, in charge of the case but gave him authority to appoint a special prosecutor if he believes one is needed.

"I have a great deal of regard for Richardson," said Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine. "But he is a member of the official family and in the unenviable position of having to decide what other members of the family should be indicted."

A Senate resolution calling on the President

to appoint a prosecutor outside that official family—subject to Senate confirmation—is being introduced by Sen. Charles H. Percy, R-Ill.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., said Congress will insist on taking the investigation away from the White House and giving it to a prosecutor "who will go through with Watergate wherever it leads and whoever is involved."

Sen. Henry Bellmon, R-Okla., agreed. "I do not believe Congress or the people will be satisfied with the results of any investigation carried on by the administration. I wouldn't be satisfied."

House Democratic Leader Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. of Massachusetts suggested Richardson ask the deans of five of the nation's leading law schools to select a special prosecutor.

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Trying to turn his shaken administration to "the vital work before us," President Nixon has assumed final responsibility for the Watergate scandal while declaring those criminally guilty must pay the penalty.

Addressing a nationwide television audience on the 100th day of his second term, Nixon said Monday night:

"In any organization, the man at the top must bear the responsibility. That responsibility, therefore, belongs here, in this office. I accept it."

But he pictured himself as the victim, for nine months, of lies to justice, and that conviction, he said, convinced him no one in his administration was involved in last June's campaign burglary of Democratic National Committee headquarters in the Watergate office.

Speaking from his Oval Office in the White House, the grim-faced chief executive said:

"I pledge to you tonight, from this office, that I will do everything in my power to ensure that the guilty are brought to justice, and that all abuses are purged from our political processes."

Barely nine hours earlier, Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler had announced, on Nixon's behalf, the resignations of four key administration figures: Atty. Gen. Richard G. Kleinfelder, White House chief of staff H.W. Haldeman, presidential aide John D. Ehrlichman and White House Counsel John W. Dean III.

Dean was fired; the others were not. The only new element

added by Nixon in his address was authority granted Secretary of Defense Elliot L. Richardson, his nominee for attorney general, "to name a special supervising prosecutor for matters arising out of the case," said Richardson.

A number of Congress members of both parties have demanded that Nixon himself appoint a special prosecutor outside administration ranks.

The criticism was not stilled by Nixon's address, although he was general praise for his attempts to clean up the White House staff.

However, there were continuing calls for appointing a prosecutor with no administrative ties—a suggestion offered by Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine; former Rep. William Miller, the Republican nominee for vice president in 1964; and Rep. Shirley Chisholm, D-N.Y.

"I do not believe Congress or the people will be satisfied with the results of any investigation carried on by the administration," said Muskie.

Richardson, a former U.S. attorney and elected attorney general of Massachusetts, was put in immediate charge of all federal inquiries concerning Watergate. Nixon described him as a man of unimpeachable integrity and rigorously high principle.

His vice husky and emotional at the time, Nixon acknowledged at the outset of his 24-minute address that Watergate charges inevitably have raised "serious questions about the integrity of the White House itself."

Declaring that public faith in the presidency must "take priority over all personal considerations," Nixon said:

"Whatever may appear to have been the case before—whatever improper activities may yet be discovered in connection with this whole sordid affair—I want you to know beyond

Dare' Firm Injunction Ordered

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Attorneys for the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission were ordered Monday to prepare an order of permanent injunction against Dare To Be Great, Inc.

U.S. Dist. Court Judge Otto Skoplied ruled the company was in violation of a temporary injunction issued in August.

The SEC had asked for the permanent injunction, which would require the firm to register with the SEC any motivational course it sells which feature the right to sell the courses as a part of the purchase plan.

In a default motion the SEC charged the firm and its parent organization, Glenn W. Turner Enterprises, Inc., Orlando, Fla., had failed to respond to pretrial questions and the original complaint after the temporary injunctions were obtained outlining evils the securities acts are intended to suppress.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals affirmed Skoplied's ruling, labeling Dare To Be Great "a gigantic and successful fraud."

National Chairman Rebuffed On Watergate Demo Governors Turn Down Probe

HURON, Ohio (AP) — Faced again with opposition from his party's governors, Democratic national Chairman Robert S. Strauss' drive to broadcast a "two-partisan" pledge to get to the bottom of the Watergate affair.

This latest rejection came at a two-day meeting of Democratic governors in this Lake Erie resort. Strauss had proposed buying 15 million shares of stock to be used in a "two-partisan" pledge to get to the bottom of the Watergate affair.

The governors were usually unanimous in opposing the idea. Gov. Dale Bumpers of Arkansas, their chairman, told reporters Monday. Earlier in the day Strauss indicated at a news conference that he was backing off from the idea after talking to a number of Democratic governors.

Gov. Jimmy Carter of Georgia, whom Strauss appointed to head an unprecedented Democratic National Committee campaign effort in 1974, was one of the chief voices at the governors' conference against partisan exploitation of Watergate. He said he thought little of Strauss' idea.

But Carter also said the election of the Dallas lawyer as Democratic national chairman was one of the best things that had happened to the party in years.

The rebuff to Strauss was the second in two weeks by the governors, but there was no sign they were any less enthusiastic about him than when they played a major role in getting him the party chairman's ship last December.

Governors were among the critics when Strauss indicated he might accept a \$35,000 offer by President Nixon's campaign committee to settle some \$4 million in Democratic lawsuits that arose out of the Watergate break-in and bugging.

Strauss pulled back. His statements that he considered settlement a Republican admission of guilt helped kill the plan.

Famed Poet At SJC Reading

James Dickey, poet and author, will give a reading at Seminole Junior College May 4, at 12:30 p.m. There will be a reception following the reading, and a question-answer session at 2:15 p.m.

James Dickey was born in a suburb of Atlanta, Georgia, Feb. 2, 1923. His lawyer father regularly read aloud to him interesting rhetorical flourish, but at the time Dickey was less interested in words than football. He was a star back in high school and on the freshman football squad at South Carolina's Clemson College.

After a year at Clemson, Dickey enlisted in the United States Army Air Forces and was assigned to the 485th Night Fighter Squadron with which he flew 100 combat missions in the Pacific. During wartime missions, Dickey kept from being bored by reading; it was during this time that he became seriously interested in literature. Being a man who likes to participate, he then tried his hand at writing. "At first I spent most of my time writing erotic love letters to girls back in Atlanta and Montgomery. I guess I started being a writer because I found myself thinking: 'Gosh, that's pretty good' instead of 'That ought to knock her dead.'"

When Dickey returned from the War, his new passion for literature led him to Vanderbilt where he graduated Magna Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa. While a senior, his first published poem, "The Shark at the Window," appeared in Sewanee Review. On a graduate fellowship he earned his Master's in one year.

Dickey taught at Rice Institute one year and then was back in uniform for Korea. Two years later he was back at Rice, then in Europe on a grant, then instructor of English at the University of Florida.

Deliverance was published in the spring of 1970; Warner Bros. bought the movie rights and paid Dickey to do the screenplay.

When Dickey is not writing or teaching or giving lectures, he plays the guitar, takes archery practice, lifts weights, jogs, or translates poetry from four or five languages.

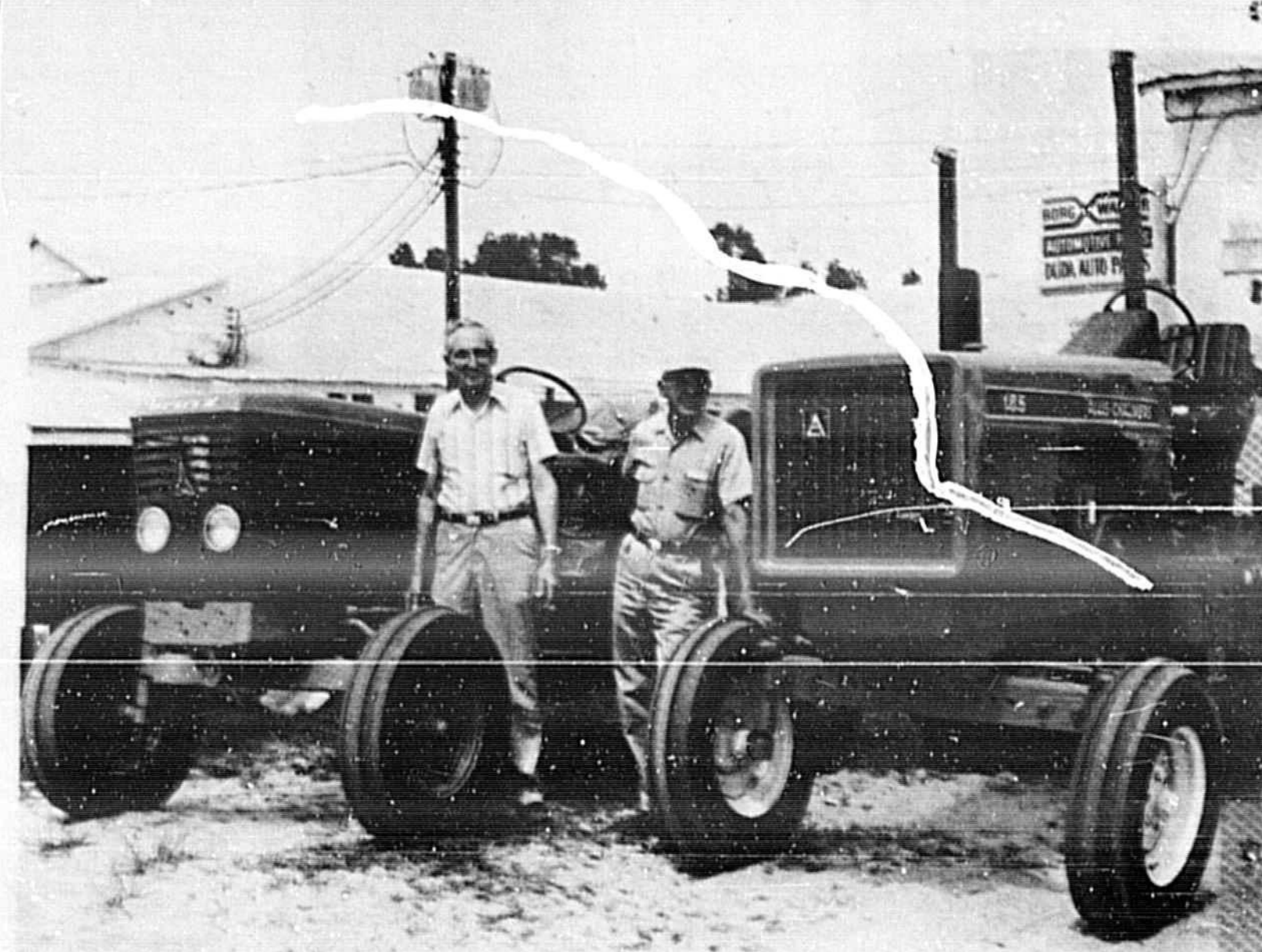

Guess What? Bee: Pork Still Expensive

 One month after the start of a week-long, nationwide meat boycott, an Associated Press sampling shows beef, lamb and pork prices are generally just as high as ever, if not higher.

The AP checked the prices of eight meat steaks in 17 cities on April 2. The week-end of the boycott called to force down rising prices. It checked the same items in the same cities on Monday. Just as consumer groups were calling for another boycott.

The survey found about 44 per cent of the steaks were unchanged in price over the four-week span. 29 per cent went up in price; 26 per cent went down; and 7 per cent were unavailable on one of the two check dates. About half the items were selling at California prices levels ordered by President Nixon late in March.

James A. Kidwell, manager of a Safeway store in the Washington, D.C., area, said: "Meat is selling just like normal now." Most beef had the list of items that were higher in price. The cost of a pound of standing rib roast went up in nine of the cities checked, with increases ranging from 7 per cent in Chicago, Los Angeles and Kansas City to 40 per cent in Detroit. Round beef was unchanged in six cities; down in one, Phoenix, Ariz.; and not available in one.

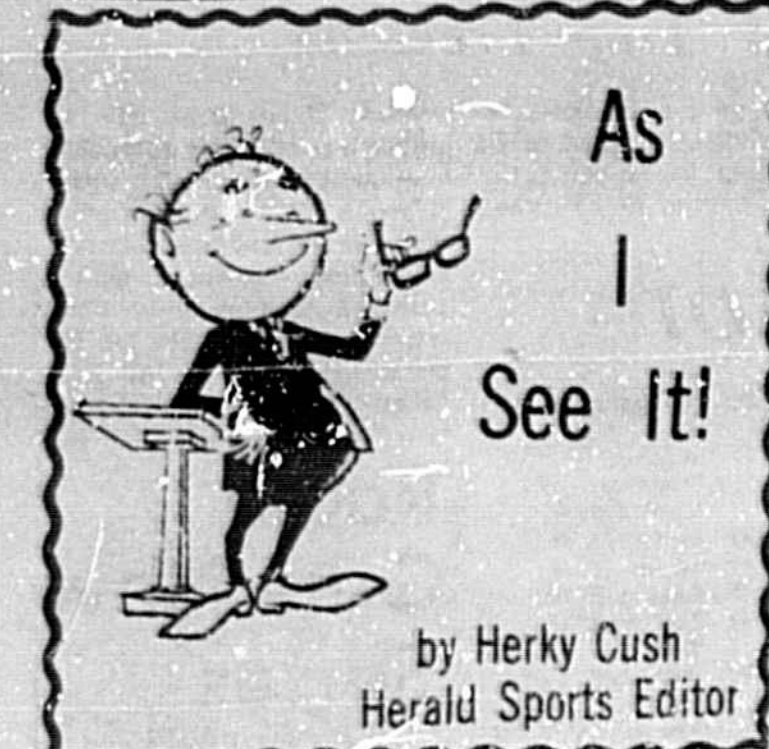
Go 'All Out' Against Polk CC Raider First Poke At State Tomorrow

He has won every major race on the Grand Circuit and has been the president of the Grand Circuit since 1961.

Agnew To Help Nixon 'Mop Up'

A restructuring of the White House staff made necessary by resignations (of key aides) ... was discussed with the Cabinet.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, seeking to put his White House in order, is said to be considering an expanded role for Vice President Spiro T. Agnew now that two top aides have left because of the Watergate scandal.

The President was closeted in the Oval Office with Agnew Tuesday, discussing the vice president's new responsibilities.

What they will be is expected to be announced shortly.

A restructuring of the White House staff, made necessary by the resignations Monday of chief of staff H.R. Haldeman and top domestic adviser John D. Ehrlichman, also was discussed with Agnew and at a 30-minute meeting with the Cabinet.

"It's a meeting that has to be seen as important," a White House source said. "We can assume that the subject dealt with the future more than such things as Watergate."

A participant in the Cabinet meeting said Kenneth R. Cole, executive director of the Domestic Council, will take over some of the duties handled by Ehrlichman and eventually may replace him.

It was also reported that Stephen B. Bull, assistant to the President, has taken on added duties in short-term scheduling and paper flow. It is not considered likely that he will replace Haldeman—but rather that the chief of staff's duties may be taken over in part by the Office of Management and Budget.

Haldeman and Ehrlichman were seen leaving the White House Tuesday carrying stacks of documents, even as the FBI mounted a 'round-the-clock guard in offices containing Watergate-related files.

Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the guard was posted "to physically protect the files to make sure that access and removal of any files were supervised in accordance with very strict procedure." He said FBI agents checked everything removed by the two resigned aides.

It was disclosed in Los Angeles that Ehrlichman learned last year that Watergate conspirators E. Howard Hunt and G. Gordon Liddy broke into the office of Pentagon papers defendant Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

Ehrlichman was interviewed by the FBI in his office last Friday.

Julie Reaffirms Confidence Of Father's Role In History

Mrs. Julie Nixon Eisenhower reaffirmed her confidence in her father and his role in history Tuesday night in a press conference at the Contemporary Hotel in Disney World prior to addressing the second annual banquet of OUTLOOK Central Florida.

She answered questions from the press corps after being greeted by poster children from several area organizations.

When asked if she was tired of answering questions from the President's daughter of representing the White House on many occasions, she enjoys taking an active role now that she is out of school and has free time to travel. The holder of a masters degree in education, she feels there will be time for teaching after her father leaves the White House. Her special interests are the handicapped, education, and ecology.

It was her concern for the handicapped that led her to Orlando as OUTLOOK's speaker as this Longwood based organization has the goal of "helping the community's 'non-handicapped' and 'handicapped' members feel comfortable with each other."

She said that she first became interested in OUTLOOK after hearing of it from Pat Hill, assistant secretary of the Department of Health Education and Welfare and last year's banquet speaker, who is a personal friend of the Nixon family.

In her talk, Julie told the 300 persons attending the banquet that it is inconceivable that any country which would elect Franklin Delano Roosevelt to four terms in the presidency would not accept the ability of the handicapped person to do a job.

She pointed out that there are 18 million adults in the United States with physical handicaps which limit their ability to hold a job and 10 million mentally handicapped.

This a sizeable minority, she stated, which like any other minority deserves equal treatment, fair job opportunity and a chance to lead a full life.

Both handicapped and non-handicapped displayed their talents in a potpourri of entertainment during the evening, including Toni Marie Chiffere silver medalist in the National Special Olympics, who did a free exercise routine.

LaBassiere said by the time Sanlando Utilities personnel Tuesday arrived at the scene and opened three gates on the line, thus charging the hydrant, the fire was out.

Source of ignition, the chief said, was apparently around an electrical box in the kitchen.
