

Report States Raise Of Citrus Prices Deterred

Canned Juice Competition, Heavy Volume Continues

LAKELAND, Feb. 6. (Special)—Heavy volume of Florida citrus continues to discourage any substantial move toward higher price levels, according to current reports of the Florida Citrus Commission's dealer service men.

Florida fresh fruit not only is facing competition from California and Texas oranges and grapefruit but also from canned citrus juice, which is resulting in big volume sales of fresh fruit and competing canned items such as apple, pineapple and tomato juice, the reports, covering the week ending Jan. 29, indicate.

Most of the citrus commission men found that quality of Florida fruit was improving as the season progressed, but there still were a few complaints that oranges and tangerines were not holding up well. This condition has been blamed chiefly on the unusually warm weather this season in Florida and, at times, in the market. The quality of grapefruit has been reported unusually good since early in the season.

A typical report was the one from Chicago and Elgin, Ill., which said in part: "Florida oranges are moving readily in these markets, but no permanent strengthening of the market is indicated, since supplies seem to be too heavy for the consumer to absorb. The public is just beginning to realize now that canned citrus is the best buy that has been offered for some

"Florida oranges are only now showing fairly consistent eating quality and juice content for which they are famous, and are admittedly superior to the California fruit in general as regards these qualities. Not as much can be said for color and sales appeal, however. An encouraging picture is seen in the small city of Elgin, Ill., where receivers state that the Florida movement at this time is going ahead of California citrus volume, a very unusual situation in that market, where in past years the rate of sale in favor of California was as much as 10 to one.

He said a quick thaw would cause more damage than a gradual advance in temperatures. It may take several days to determine the total damage to the citrus crop.

Farmers in the big strawberry growing area around Plant City reported young berries were frozen to the bushes and tender truck crops generally seemed to be killed.

At 7:30 A.M., Miami, the lush winter resort city, shivered at exactly 32 degrees. All public schools were ordered closed for the day. Perhaps the coldest spot in Florida was Jasper, in the northern part of the State, with a chilly 21 degrees.

The heart of the great citrus belt was gripped in temperatures ranging from 25 to 30 degrees. Isolated spots in the citrus region had even lower temperatures.

One of the southernmost cities on the west coast, Fort Myers, reported 33 degrees. Freezing weather extended generally over the fresh vegetable section, the winter breadbasket of the nation. Daytona Beach on the East Coast, another resort center, woke up this morning to find the mercury at 25 degrees.

Agronomy Director Declares Corn Yield Could Be Increased

GAINESVILLE, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The director of the Florida Experiment Station Agronomy Department, W. E. Stokes, said today farmers could increase the state's total yield of corn by more than 1,000,000 bushels.

Stokes said to do this many farmers would only have to plant a better variety of corn than they have been using. He explained that numerous tests by the experiment station and farmers in cooperation with the station have indicated that farmers who plant the common run of corn could hike their yields 20 percent by planting an improved variety.

Florida has been growing about 700,000 acres of corn and getting an average yield of 10 bushels per acre. Agriculturists say this is a low yield, but about half of Florida's corn acreage is

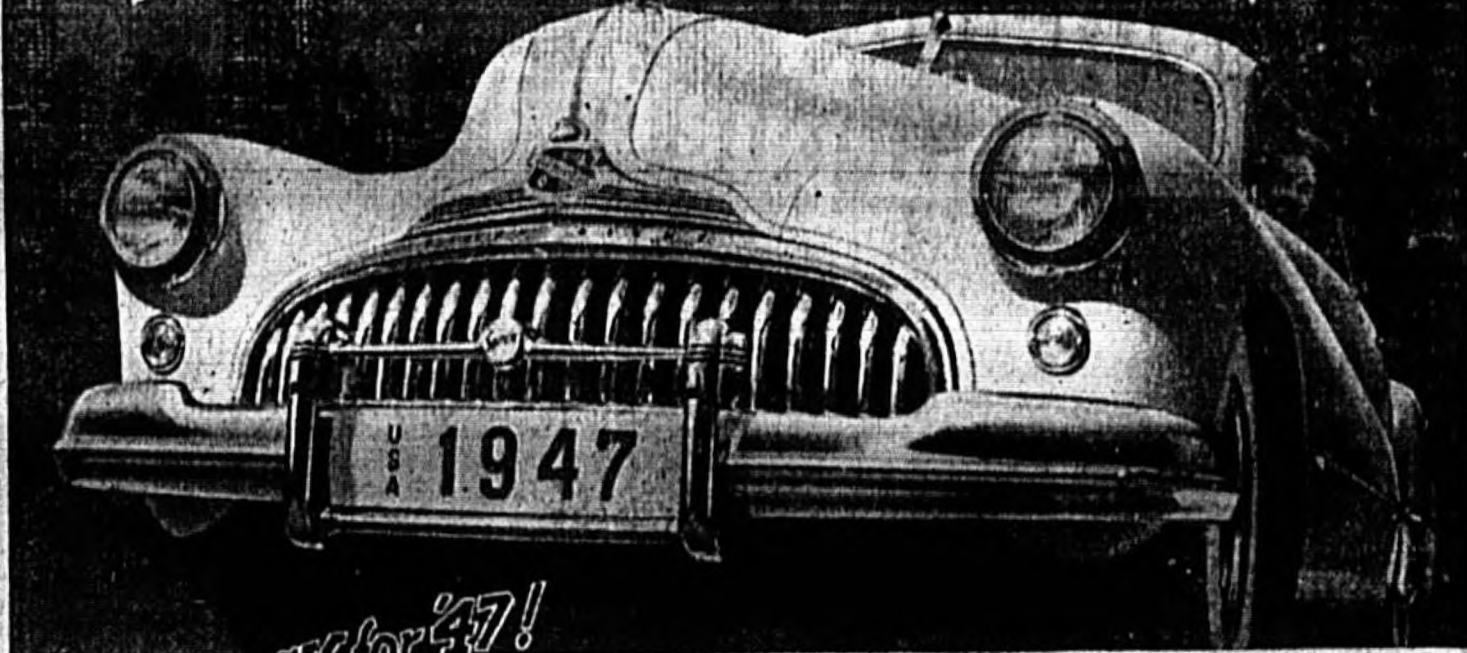

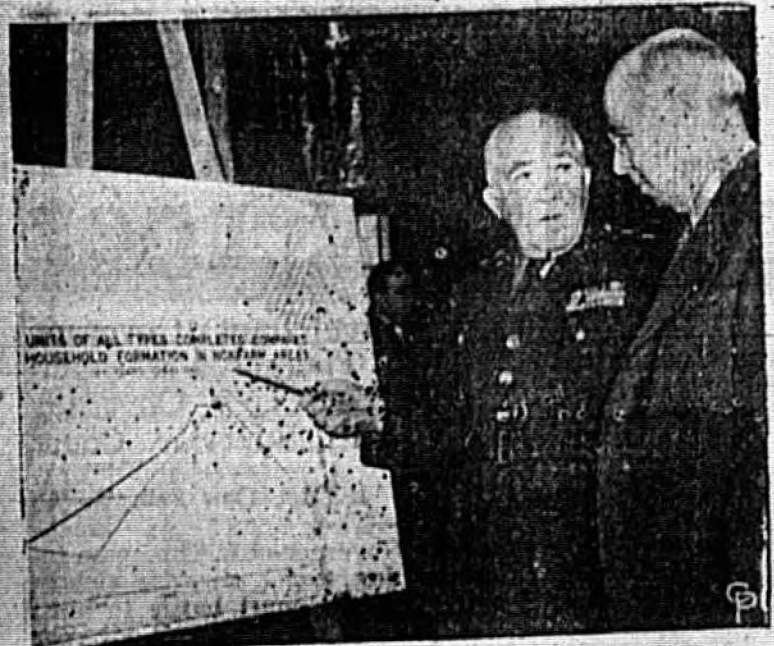

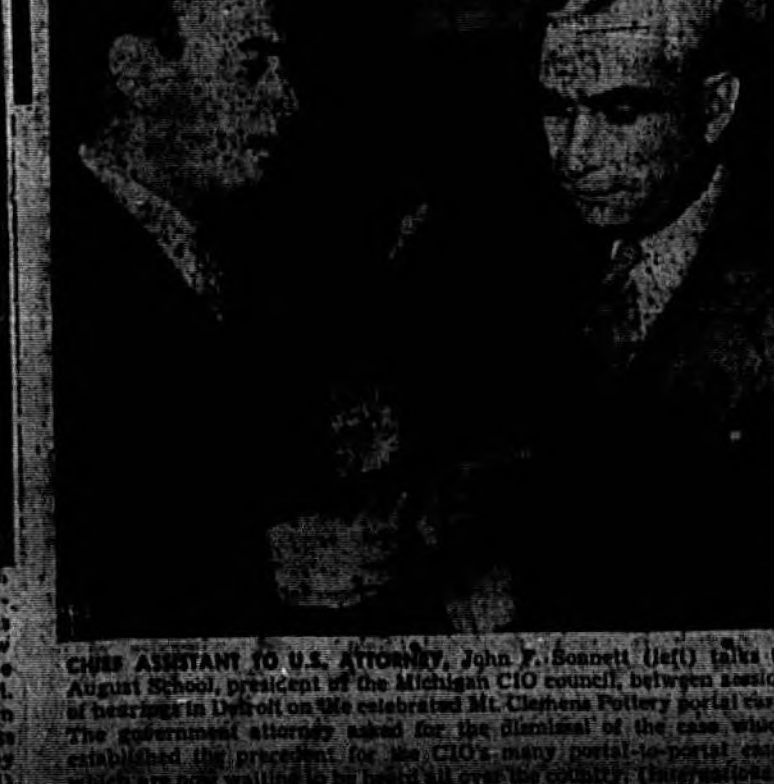

State Is Counting Up Damage Caused By Recent Cold Wave

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 7. (Special)—The Florida citrus and vegetable industry still is counting damage from yesterday's cold wave. Apparently the tender vegetable crop suffered a loss of millions of dollars. One official estimated the loss would run at more than \$5,000,000 in Broward county alone. Meanwhile, a heavy rain over the Central Florida citrus belt this morning brought good news. Citrus leaders said the rain today might reduce the loss by 50 to 75 percent. They pointed out that rain would keep the mercury from a rapid rise today and prevent fermentation and freeze rot. Reports on the extent of damage in the citrus groves were conflicting, however, and there is no responsible estimate of the total loss. A grove-by-grove check is regarded as necessary. Meanwhile, Chairman Rollie Tillman of the Citrus Commission is expected to decide today whether to call a hearing on a possible embargo on citrus shipments. The weather was moderate over South Florida this morning and bathers again appeared on Miami Beach. Vegetable farmers who suffered severe losses made plans to replant immediately.

Patrolman Recovers 3,315 Stolen Cars

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 7. (Special)—Florida Highway Patrolmen recovered 3,315 stolen automobiles valued at \$3,285,000 during 1945 and 1946, it was disclosed today when Director H. N. Kirkman filed his biennial report with the State Department of Public Safety. The patrol apprehended 508 escaped prisoners, 657 wanted criminals and located 665 missing persons during the two year period. A total of 7086 accidents were investigated by highway patrolmen. Their records show that such accidents resulted in 629 deaths and injuries to 5,464 persons. Arrests for traffic violations and miscellaneous offenses numbered 17601. Of this number 14255 persons were convicted when brought to trial. Reckless driving topped all other traffic violations with 6584 such cases listed. Next in order were 4308 cases against individuals charged with No Drivers License. Drunken driving caused the arrest of 2962 offenders. Written examinations were issued to 10109 motorists while patrolmen rendered some aid or assistance to 16634 others. They administered first aid to 1545 persons. Among other activities of the patrol its members spent 628,930 hours patrolling highways and 240,443 hours on station duty. In patrol duty they traveled 8,629,206 miles. Department examiners took 62,982 hours to conduct tests for 259402 applicants for drivers license. Of those examined 185,836 successfully passed the tests while 67261 failed. During the year 1946 highway patrolmen recovered 1421 stolen cars worth \$1,500,000; captured 265 escaped prisoners; 360 wanted criminals and located 274 missing persons. They made 10516 arrests in 1946 showing an increase over 1945. They also issued more warning notices in 1946 handing out 7247 such tickets while in 1945 they gave out only 2862. The patrol also spent more time on patrol, investigated more accidents and examined more applicants for drivers license in 1946 than in 1945. Starting the biennium with a balance of \$181,000 the Department of Public Safety took in approximately \$1,710,000 from sale of drivers licenses and spent approximately \$1,500,000 and now has on hand \$390,000 to its credit.

Feb. 10 Is Deadline For Survivors Claims

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 7. (Special)—Feb. 10 is the date set by which dependents of Navy veterans who died after discharge must file claims for social security benefits in order to receive payments retroactive to date of death. Questions regarding submission of claims may be answered by the Seventh Naval District Civil Readjustment Offices in Miami and Jacksonville. In compliance with the Social Security Act, as amended in 1946, dependents who file claims after Feb. 10 will receive retroactive payments for only three months

prior to the date on which they submitted their claims.

(Continued from page 1) little metal squares which convert light into power. Stroboscopic lights played on a disk rotating at 900 revolutions a minute, made a painted gear apparently stand still or form symmetrical designs when both blue and red lights played upon it. A small propeller apparently stood still, although rotating very fast. Electric eye recording by means of a light flash of the exact moment when a paper disk, whirling with a high whine at 15,000 revolutions a minute, broke with a loud pop, was a real thrill for the audience. Music from a record was transmitted by light to the electric eye, but was stopped when the light path was interrupted. Variations of light flashes in an electric lamp resulted in a tune being played on the loud vibration resulted in an odd tone in a tune being played on the loud speaker. When a flashlight direc-

ted at the eye was hit, the light vibration resulted in an odd tone, while pocket combs moved swiftly in the light path seemed to scream in protest.

Many other scientific feats were shown including the new wire tape recording and playing device, sound effects of electrons thrown off by uranium and other radioactive materials, light of the firefly duplicated with chemicals in a flask, and experiments with invisible light which lit up shawl patterns in the dark with brilliant colors. There was a special afternoon show for children. The program was sponsored by H. H. Coleman of the Florida Power and Light Company and by Principal Herman E. Morris of Seminole High School.

Stassen, Taft Clash Over Labor Policy

(Continued from page 1) the Labor program advocated by his former protégé from Minnesota, Republican Senator Joseph Ball, Stassen advised against the ban on industry-wide collective bargaining envisioned in the Ball Labor Bill. He criticized Ball's recommendation that employer be allowed to get court injunctions to stop strikes and he attacked Ball's proposal to outlaw maintenance of membership in union contracts.

On the positive side, Stassen called for a compulsory cooling off period before strikes, and the appointment of an over-all Labor czar, a federal Labor conciliator, who would function independently of the present Labor Department.

In any given dispute, he said, union and management would be required to seek peaceful settlement through negotiation for at least ten days. If they fail to reach an agreement, they would so inform the federal Labor conciliator. The conciliator in turn would call both parties together for 30 days

of further negotiating. Then, if there were still no agreement, workers involved in the dispute would vote whether or not to strike, the voting to be open to the rank-and-file employees and to be conducted by secret ballot.

NEW FLIGHTS ANNOUNCED

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 7. (AP)—Florida airways announced today that two airmail flights daily between Jacksonville and Orlando will be started Feb. 15. The flights also will serve Gainesville and Ocala. In addition, two more flights will be added later to serve St. Augustine, Palatka, Deland and Sanford. But no date has been set for these additional flights.
