Last night, Flint's police chief said he had been assured by the union that pickets would not attempt to prevent office workers from entering.

Meanwhile, there was renewed hope for some signs of an agreement to end the long and bitter wage dispute between the auto workers union and the major corporations of the automotive industry. The union prepared to-day to resume negotiations with the Ford Motor Company on its demand for a 30 per cent wage increase. There were rumors that the company would make pay concessions in return for a guar-antee sgainst unauthorised work stoppages. Ford has not yet ac-cepted the union's proposal to discharge or fine wildest strikers, but the company is proceeding with wage discussions amid in-dications that a satisfactory solution may be reached.
