Monumental Loans

Even a nation so great, rich and powerful as the United States is jarred by the statement of Dr. Lewis H. Kimmel, public financial authority of the Brookings Institution at Washington, that the federal government will need \$22,000,000,000 to carry on its countless operations in 1948, with probably higher limits to come later. But Dr. E. M. Elkin, general tax attorney for the Westinghouse Electric Corporation of Pittsburgh, offers a little consolation by saying that congressmen who talk of \$25,000,000,000 or more are "disregarding the taxpayers."

It remains to be seen whether the taxpayers will, or can, reduce the vast national debts which have developed in the war and pre-war period. Presumably it can be done, but the operation takes courage and everlasting persistence. And strange to say, millions of American don't seem to care much how greatly the federal debt mounts up. They lack knowledge to understand and the will to oppose to the methods by which so many billions are extracted from American pockets. These processes should be more clearly explained, and so should the uses to which the federal money is put.

Telltale Footprints

The criminal who wears rubber gloves, and thinks himself safe because he leaves no fingerprints, had better read up on the latest development in his profession. Footprints can be traced and identified by the FBI.

Footprints are of course the one thing a criminal is sure to leave behind him. Even if made on wood or cement, they can be photographed for study. Then comes comparison with a file of more than 2,300 different types of heels and soles. If the suspect's heel agrees in size and design with the photographed print, and above all if it shows similar wear, nail impressions or missing fragments, he is likely to be the man.

Bare feet are photographed for a file. No two people have the same skin ridges on the soles of their feet. Hospitals know this, and for some time have been using footprints to identify babies.

The new method surpasses the old fingerprint system. Rubber gloves conceal fingerprints, but rubber footwear is just as telltale as any other kind. Persons contemplating crime as a career had better think twice.

Speed Grows Stale

There was a "kick" in the news that another speed record had been broken, and the huge B-29 superfortress, "Dreamboat," had broken all records by crossing the country from California to New York in 5 hours, 27 minutes and 8 1/2 seconds. But not very much of a kick. For this sort of thing has become so familiar that it is taken almost as a matter of course. Another equine record on the race course would probably arouse more attention.

Anyway, some sophisticated people will say, the best records we can make on this little old earth are pitifully slow in comparison with the speed of the planets and stars. If we could only push in among them for a speed contest, there would be a real thrill in it. And today some of our little earth-bound people are dreaming of doing this very thing, at least with regard to the moon, our nearest celestial neighbor.

Stage Families

The stage is in the blood of the O'Neills. Eugene, Jr., is to make his professional debut with a part in the Readers Theater rendering of "Oedipus the King" by the Greek dramatist Sophocles. His father was an actor also before he found his true calling as a playwright. Three times Pulitzer Prize winner and one of the few Americans to obtain the Nobel prize for literature, Eugene O'Neill's place is secure in the history of American drama.

Eugene, Jr., is the third generation to go behind the footlights. His grandfather, James O'Neill, was a highly esteemed actor, remembered best for his work in the leading role of "Monte Cristo."

While the O'Neills do not as yet rank with America's "royal family of the stage," the Barrymores, they have added lustre to the drama in the United States.

Dr. O. L. Barks Speaks Before a Red Cross Meet

Mrs. Ralph A. Smith Is Named Chairman Of Local Chapter

The annual meeting of the Seminole County Chapter of the American Red Cross was held last Thursday evening at Red Cross headquarters and was featured by addresses given by Dr. Orville L. Barks, George Eick and Don Cheney.

Dr. Barks told of the many ways in which Red Cross influence was felt while he was a prisoner of war in Germany. He said that the American physicians in the camp hospital were better equipped with the supplies, equipment and instruments than the German officers themselves. This was due to the fact, he continued, that the Germans simply did not have materials while the Allied doctors were given their requested items through the Red Cross if it were at all possible to secure them.

Dr. Barks said there were periodic inspections of the camp by Red Cross representatives and he cited an escape maneuver conducted by four internees on one such day. He remarked that the prisoners walked out of the gate nonchalantly garbed as the Red Cross representatives and two German officer escorts who had entered the camp a few minutes previously.

Dr. Barks stated that at one time the German officials called a meeting of American officers in Berlin for the good of the men in the prison camps. Red Cross representatives were present

and supported every demand and complaint made by the American officers. Dr. Barks declared that from this support, standards of sanitation and medical requirements were met, whereas without the backing of the Red Cross complete success was not assured.

Mr. Eick, who had been a combat flyer and had seen action over Italy and Germany, related the ever present influence and guidance of the Red Cross from the time he left for overseas service. He explained that after the first long hop they were met by Red Cross workers who presented them with hot coffee and doughnuts. At the same time, Mr. Eick continued, the men were issued kits packed by volunteer workers all over the nation. The chain of Red Cross assistance was again picked up overseas. Red Cross representatives had made arrangements for their quarters, showers, mess halls and generally taken in hand by the workers. In rapid succession, Mr. Eick cited instances of Red Cross assistance following through to the convalescent periods and finally home.

Mr. Cheney, Red Cross Field Director at the Orlando Army Air Base, outlined the expanded program upon which the Red Cross is now embarking. He said that while the Red Cross is primarily a peace time organization rendering many worthwhile services to the community, many of these services were necessarily kept somewhat in the background by the urgent demands of war. In addition to the expansion of these services, Mr. Cheney stated that the peak load of assistance to World War II veterans and their families had not yet been reached. He declared that as the years unfold, more dependence upon the Red Cross will develop.

Mrs. Ralph A. Smith was elected Chairman of the Chapter

for the forthcoming year, 1946. Other officers elected were Mrs. Harry Woodcuff as vice-chairman and Mrs. John Rogers as secretary. Mrs. E. C. Smith was re-elected as treasurer.

Appeal By Joyce Is Denied By Lords

LONDON, Dec. 18. (AP)—Britain's court of last resort—the House of Lords—turned down an appeal by William (Lord Haw Haw) Joyce to escape the gallows. Joyce is under sentence of death for treasonable broadcasts he made from Germany during the war. He was not in the House when the Lords announced their decision.

The appeal for the Nazi propagandist was based on the contention that he was born in the United States—in Brooklyn—and thus could not be guilty of treason to the British Crown.

Joyce was the second person to learn this week that his death sentence for treason would not be stayed. The British Home Office announced earlier that it would not reprieve John Amery—who also was convicted for his broadcasts for the Nazis. Amery is the son of L. S. Amery, Secretary of State for India in the Churchill war cabinet.

Amery is scheduled to go to the gallows tomorrow. However, no date has been set as yet for Joyce's execution. When the House of Lords announced its decision regarding Joyce today, a man sitting in the public gallery cried: "This man is innocent. I prophesied the death of Hitler and his return." Officials silenced the man immediately.

Point Score For Army Personnel To Be Cut On Dec. 31

Medical Department Officers Are Not Included In Point Reduction Plans

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—Another cutback, effective Dec. 31, will make eligible for release 600,000 more service men and women. The point score for enlisted men be reduced to 50, and their length of required service to 32 months. The point score for officers will be dropped to 70, and their length of required service to 48 months. This does not apply to male officers in the Medical Department. Three years have been lopped off the age limit which will be cut to 45 years for all Medical and Dental corps of the Dental and Veterinary Corps officers except plastic surgeons, as officers, and Medical officers excepting certain specialists, the point score will be reduced to 65. One important change concerns WAC personnel. For the first time, their length of service will be computed. Enlisted WACs will be eligible for separation after two years and six months of honorable service. The release for WAC officers is set after three years and three months. Release will be granted on application to WAC officers and enlistees married to discharged veterans of World War II, regardless of the date of their enlistment. The critical score for WAC personnel will not be reduced by the cutback changes. The Army said it would continue its current policy toward personnel in this category who no longer are needed and who are not qualified for overseas duty. Inadequate points or service will not stand in the way of their prompt release.

First Sanford Celery Ready To Be Shipped

Escarole, Lettuce, Peppers Available For Mixed Shipment

First-cutting of Sanford "golden heart" celery, quality of which appears to be excellent, is expected to take place Thursday morning at the farms of C. A. Linton and H. G. Behrens on the east side. Sanford was drenched last evening and during the night with the heaviest rainfall of the winter season, 1.36 inches up to 7:30 o'clock this morning, according to B. F. Wainner, weatherman. If the weather clears up, it is expected that from six to eight cars of celery will be cut Thursday. Zellwood, first to start cutting had celery that suffered from cold damage, reported M. C. Collins, sales manager for Everglades and Celery Company. "The Everglades section is mostly fair to ordinary, with some good quality. Some growers started cutting too soon, and quality would have been better if left for two weeks. "Sanford has its share of troubles also; but if we can keep level headed, keep our paper crews working and do not jump too quick," he added, "we stand a good chance of having the best quality going out. Sarasota is also papering celery. "Movement should run 30 to 35 cars a day for two weeks, but working up to 60 a day around mid-January. Zellwood should finish by then, and other sections will speed up. About 25 percent of the normal volume of celery shipments of this variety will be light until the last of January. "Mr. Cullum predicted that the cabbage movement will be normal volume in three weeks. "We admit being the best-quality section of this vegetable in Florida, and most buyers agree," he stated. "Couliflower, retarded by weather, is getting under way in shipment. Escarole is available in carlots or mixed cars. Peppers, eggplant and iceberg lettuce are available for mixed cars. "Only hardly enough fruit on hand to supply the holiday demand, citrus packers yesterday and today were unable to get new supplies due to the rain interfering with the picking. Most packers will operate through Saturday and will probably be closed during the Christmas week, although some packers are not fully decided on this, pending reactions on a meeting of the Florida Citrus Commission, decisions of which may affect the marketing of fruit.

Churchill To Visit Florida In February

British Statesman And Family Seek Warm Weather And Rest During Stay

LONDON, Dec. 19, (AP)—The laborite Daily Herald of London said today that Winston Churchill will resign from the leadership of the Conservative Party. The newspaper asserted that Churchill's resignation as opposition leader probably will be made public after his forthcoming visit to the United States.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—It is official that Winston Churchill is coming to the United States on a visit early next year. The White House announced today that the former British Prime Minister will arrive in New York in the middle of January. He will travel by the Seaboard Air Line's wreck-free Florida-bound "Silver Meteor" and will be accompanied by his family. The coming visit was made simultaneously in Washington and London.

At the suggestion of his medical advisor, Churchill will spend a month or more in a warm location seeking a complete rest. However, he will make at least one public appearance, Churchill will discuss "world affairs" in an address at Westminster College, Fulton, Mo., on Mar. 5. The former premier will be introduced there by President Truman. Churchill has accepted the invitation of Col. Frank Clark to stay at his house in Florida during February. He will be accompanied to Florida by Mrs. Churchill and his daughter, Mrs. Sarah Oliver.

Freezing Weather Causes 34 Deaths Throughout Nation

CHICAGO, Dec. 19, (AP)—The weather man holds out chilly prospects today for every part of the nation as a diet of snow and rain, sleet and sub-zero temperatures. At least 34 persons have died in a direct result of the weather. Snowfalls from the Midwest and southwest are piling white drifts and mountains along the Atlantic seaboard. Easterners can expect right to twelve inches of snow mainly in northern Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey, southeastern Pennsylvania and southeast New York. Temperatures in the Midwest and belt will ease up somewhat, but the chill will continue at least until Friday. From eastern Montana westward to Indiana and Illinois, the temperature is only slightly above today. The mercury struck far below zero in several sections. Tarkio in northwest Missouri has registered an icy 17 below. Another batch of cold air from Canada is expected to reach the Dakotas and Minnesota over the week-end. Railroads across the nation are operating behind schedules and travel is disrupted in many sections. Industries in Illinois and western North Dakota have been left with a shortage of natural gas. North Texas also has had below-freezing temperatures as far south as Austin, Tennessee and Birmingham, Ala., have had two inches of snow. Miami boasts a wet, warm weather yesterday, at 78 above.

Official Records Of Storm Troopers Tell Of Atrocities

NUERNBERG, Dec. 19, (AP)—Official records of Adolf Hitler's brown-shirted Storm Troopers tell the unvarnished story of atrocities perpetrated by these fanatics during the high times of the former Third Reich. The documents have been introduced by the American prosecution in the trial of 21 top Nazis on war crimes charges. One part of the Storm Troopers' records told how a single brigade of the troopers blew up or burned 65 synagogues during a two-day outbreak of anti-Jewish terrorism. The records show that the storm troopers were organized ever before Hitler's rise to power to beat up and terrorize all political opponents. The American prosecutors introduced the records as evidence to win war crimes convictions against some 600,000 lesser Nazis as well as the score now sitting in the Nuernberg prison's box. The Storm Troopers are the third Nazi organization to have its secrets laid bare to the world. The American prosecution contends that six German organizations should be convicted as criminal groups and their members held guilty of war crimes in varying degrees. Evidence already has been presented against the Nazi leadership and the high cadres. Efforts to have their way in court are the Elite Guard, the German High Command and the Nazi Gestapo. However, sharply critical questions by both the American and British representatives on the international tribunal have indicated that the United States prosecution may have a hard job in attempting to convict the lesser Nazis en masse.

Sgt. Louis Rowland Is On Way Home

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Dec. 19, (Special)—Sgt. Louis L. Rowland, 911 Magnolia Avenue, Sanford, Fla., is on his way home by Air Transport Command liner to the separation center at Camp Blanding, Fla., after 28 months of service at Anchorage and at Ladd Field, 11th Air Force base, 75 miles below the Arctic Circle. He entered the service in November, 1942. During the war Ladd Field was the focal point of the Alaskan (Alaska-Siberia) route ferrying operations conducted by the Air Transport Command, Alaskan Division. It was at this base that more than 3,000 lend-lease planes were turned over to the Russian army after being flown here by pilots of the Seventh Ferrying Group, A.T.C. The Alaskan Division's certificate for "commendable service under severe conditions peculiar to Canada" Alaska requiring ingenuity, perseverance and devotion to duty," was presented to Sgt. Rowland prior to his departure by Col. Louis H. Merrick, base commanding officer.

John Amery Hanged For High Treason

LONDON, Dec. 19, (AP)—Great Britain hanged a British agent for high treason, the gallows were used to execute John Amery, a prominent British propagandist, after he was convicted of high treason during the war. In the next cell from that which Amery went to his death was William (Babe) Hall, a former member of the British Fascist party, who was hanged for the same offense.

Patton Continues To Show Improvement

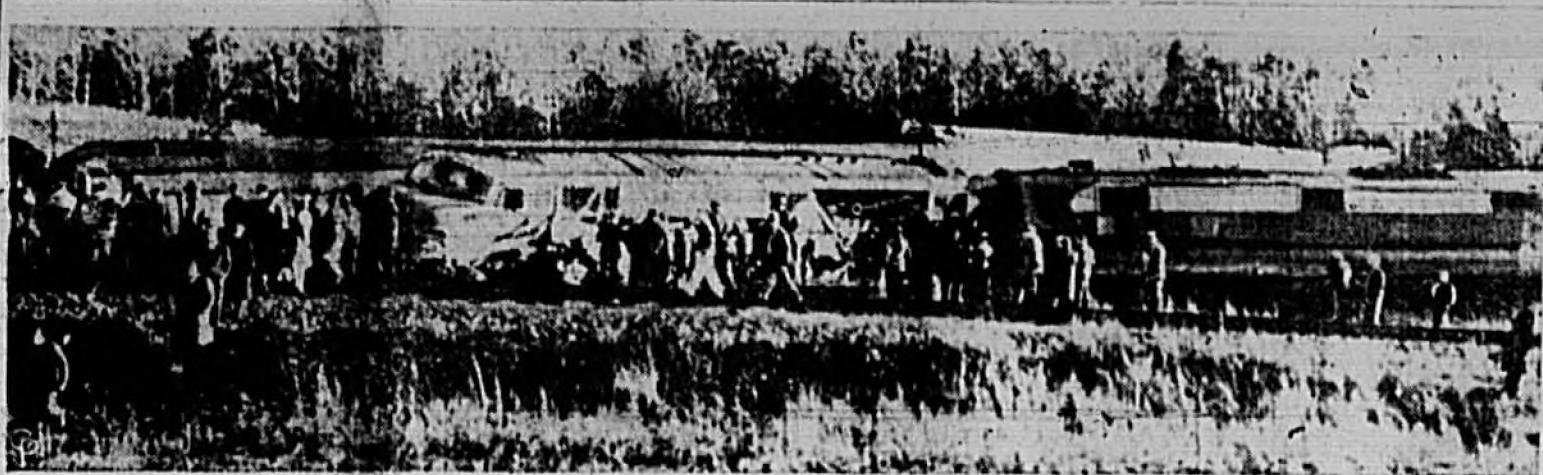

Barge Line To Baltimore May Be Started Soon

C. of C. Officials Confer In Jacksonville On Proposal

President H. H. Coleman, Geo. D. Bishop, chairman of the Traffic Committee, and Edward Higgins, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, attended a meeting in Jacksonville yesterday with Elias Treshler of the St. Johns River Line and W. T. Wolfe, traffic consultant for the City of Sanford, regarding the inauguration of a barge system from Sanford to Baltimore, Philadelphia, and Trenton.

In a letter to the Chambers of Commerce at Sanford, Jacksonville, Miami and Fort Pierce, Mr. Treshler stated that if they will assist in making arrangements with the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to lease at a reasonable rate surplus equipment now available, he will immediately inaugurate a barge line operating from these ports in Florida to Baltimore, Philadelphia and Trenton.

The Rivers and Harbors Committee of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce met to discuss the matter yesterday. The matter will be presented to the Seminole County Special Traffic Committee immediately.

It is very evident that the coast line steamers will not resume operation for the present until equable rates can be worked out with the Interstate Commerce Commission, which means that a resumption of this service is postponed indefinitely. Mr. Higgins said, "If the plans of Mr. Treshler are carried out, the State of Florida will have the benefit of water rates for all the traffic that his outfit is able to carry."

It is planned to make a presentation in Congress to approach the Reconstruction Finance Corporation on this project, pointing out the importance of it to the entire State of Florida.

Police are seeking the identity of an oil truck driver, who according to a State Highway Patrol report, knocked a cad containing two negroes, W.A. Walker and Sylvester Ferrel, off the Sanford Mt. Newsprint Raise To Hike Printing Cost

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 19, (AP)—American newspaper publishers will pay approximately \$20,000,000 more to put out their papers next year on the basis of an increase of \$8 a ton just granted on the price of newsprint. The action was taken, government quarters said, "to check further decrease in U.S. newsprint production, which has been gradually declining for some years." As production has gone down, the price of newsprint has risen steadily. The price of newsprint delivered in New York was \$60 a ton just prior to Pearl Harbor. With the latest increase the new ceiling will be \$67 a ton on the same basis.

Proposal Would Give Air Forces Equal Footing With Land And Sea Forces

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—The Navy General Court Martial has reached a decision in the case of Capt. Charles McVay III. The commander of the sunken Cruiser Indianapolis has been acquitted on one charge of inefficiency. However, there was no announcement of the court's decision on the charge of negligence.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—The Navy has acted quickly to prevent any statements by its officers against the unification of the armed services recommended today by President Truman. A memorandum was issued to all Navy and Marine officers even as the President's message was being read before Congress. Under the Navy order, officers are forbidden to express their opposition to the merger except when called as witnesses before committees of Congress.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, (AP)—President Truman today sent a special message to Congress calling for a merger of the Army and Navy into a single Department of National Defense. Mr. Truman said under the proposed merger, the air forces should be fully equal to the land and sea arms.

Thus the Chief Executive has stepped squarely in the middle of the long and bitter controversy between the Army and Navy top commands. He is siding completely with the Army, which has advocated the merger. In a Virginia Department press release for the merger.

Simultaneously, Mr. Truman has dashed the Navy's last hope for delay in action on the proposal. Said the President, "Further studies of the general problem would serve no useful purpose."

In his 5,500 word message, Mr. Truman declared his belief that the merger would provide the nation with the best means of keeping the peace. The President said he thought the National Defense Department should be headed by one cabinet officer. The National Defense head would operate with one under secretary and several assistant secretaries—all civilians.

Mr. Truman said the National Defense Department should have a departmental chief of staff, with a commander for each of the Army, the Navy, and the Air Forces. The President suggested the three component branches— that to prevent top-heavy thinking and action by any one of two branches of the services, the key positions in the department should be rotated among the various services.

The President took note of the Navy's strong opposition by declaring that once the merger was effected, no officer or civilian in any service would fail to contribute his utmost to make the unification a success. Parity for air power is one of the points stressed by the President. He also believes that the limited resources for scientific research should be systematically allocated. Unity of command in outlying bases and consistent and equitable personnel policies are seen as objectives more easily assured under a unified system of training administration and operation.

GENERAL WING DIES

RUTLAND, Vt., Dec. 19, (AP)—Death has taken one of the war's great aerial commanders, Major General Leonard F. Wing died early today at his Rutland home. Wing, who was 52 years old, succumbed to a heart attack. He led the 43rd (Winged Victory) Division in four major Pacific campaigns and landed in Japan with General Douglas MacArthur's occupation troops. In private life he was a Vermont lawyer.

ELECTED PRESIDENT

NEW YORK, Dec. 19, (AP)—A woman has been elected president of a \$2,000,000 New York City department store — she is the first of her sex to head a store of this size. She is Miss Dorothy Shaver, and she has been First Vice President of Lord and Taylor since 1937. Miss Shaver succeeds Walter Hoving, who has been Lord and Taylor president for ten years. Hoving has resigned to set up a new nationwide amalgamation of department stores.
