Penalties Loom For Public Employees Who Call Strike

A Florida legislator, described as "friendly to the cities," told delegates at the Florida League of Cities Convention in Kissimmee Thursday that the state's constitutional revision commission may include penalties not only against unionized public employees striking, but even threaten to strike.

The Florida League of Cities is holding the three-day convention at the Hyatt House. It ends Saturday.

State Rep. Ronald Richman of New Port Richey, as guest speaker before the League's Urban Administration Committee chaired by Sanford City Manager W.E. Knowles, said the proposal before the constitutional revision commission is to penalize strikers and threaten strikers through their state retirement plan benefits. He said this measure has a "good chance of passing."

Also being considered, he said is limiting on collective bargaining wages, hours and monetary fringe benefits and excluding supervisors from collective bargaining, predicting the measure has a 50-50 chance of passing.

Richman was introduced to the committee by Knowles as a friend of the cities and a leader in the state House of Representatives.

He told the group other items expected to be included in the proposed new constitution include:

- Limitations or exclusions in the sunshine law, but he said these have not "been spelled out in detail."
- No proposals to reinstate the municipal court system. But, he said ultimately the municipal court system will be reinstated in the state, pointing to the overburdened case load in the county courts now from municipal cases. He

decried the fact that few state attorneys are prosecuting city ordinance violations since abolition of the municipal court system.

He pointed to the City of Sanford as an example of where the municipal court there in the last year before its abolition prosecuted 5,000 cases for violation of city law while only three cases were prosecuted in 1978 in the Seminole County court system for violation of city law.

Changes in the financial disclosure amendment sponsored by Gov. Reubin Askew last year which requires full financial disclosure by county and state officials.

A prohibition against double taxation. He said the problem with double taxation whereby city residents claim they are taxed for services by the cities and then taxed again for the same services by the county but excluded wholly or partly from receiving those services is that there is no set formula to determine exact areas of double taxation.

He said the issue may ultimately be determined by the courts, but he urged the Legislature to discover a formula.

— Single member legislative districts. This, he said, is the most important amendment which will be on the ballot.

Single member districts, he said, will make the Legislature more responsive to the public and more conservative.

Single member districts would not affect Seminole County as far as House of Representatives representation is concerned because State Reps. Robert Hattaway and Vince Fickett already serve in single member districts. But, Seminole representatives in the Florida Senate reside in multiple member districts. Both Lori Wilson and John Vogt's districts encompass the same territory of several counties including Seminole.

Only One Of Its Kind In Southeast U.S. Sunshine Important To This Winter Springs Home

The home in the Highlands is unique for several reasons. It is the only single-family unit residential demonstration project operating on 80 per cent solar energy, at this stage of completion, in the United States.

The other special feature of the home is that solar energy is used not only to produce heating, but to generate the air-conditioner unit. Water, collected in the collector panels on the roof and heated by the sun is processed through a heat-exchange device to produce the necessary energy. There is a natural gas backup system for use in extended periods of cloudy weather.

Frank Carter, program coordinator for Florida Land Company, said the concept of solar energy is not new. The theory has been around since the 1820s and 30s. Solar energy was used in submarines in World War II. This project is one of the most ambitious for harnessing the sun for use in residential homes.

Carter said the only other such grant-sponsored solar energy project in the state is an apartment complex being constructed in a small city in the Panhandle. This project is concentrating on using solar energy only for heating purposes.

HUD will be monitoring the Winter Springs home for a period of five years to ensure the operations of the system.

Completion costs of the project from all sources, according to Carter, is in the neighborhood of \$10,000. He stated that, because the home was built as an experiment and to help find solutions to the national energy crisis, the home will be sold on the market for the average price of a home of this size — approximately \$85,000. The eventual owner also will save upwards of 75 per cent in the cost of energy expenses.

A dedication ceremony is being planned for the end of the year, according to Charles Row, manager of communications of Florida Gas Company. The tentative plans are for a period of a month or so for public viewing before the house is offered for sale. He said these plans are dependent on the progress of the experimental project.

"The purpose of this project is to evaluate the solar energy package for residential homes," Row said.

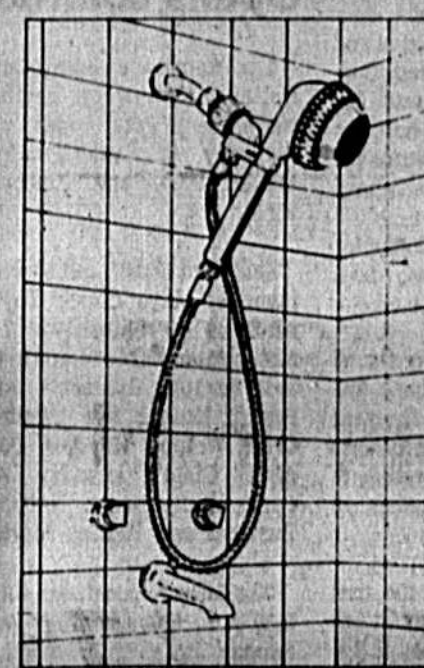

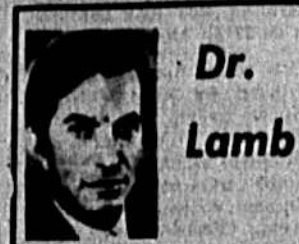

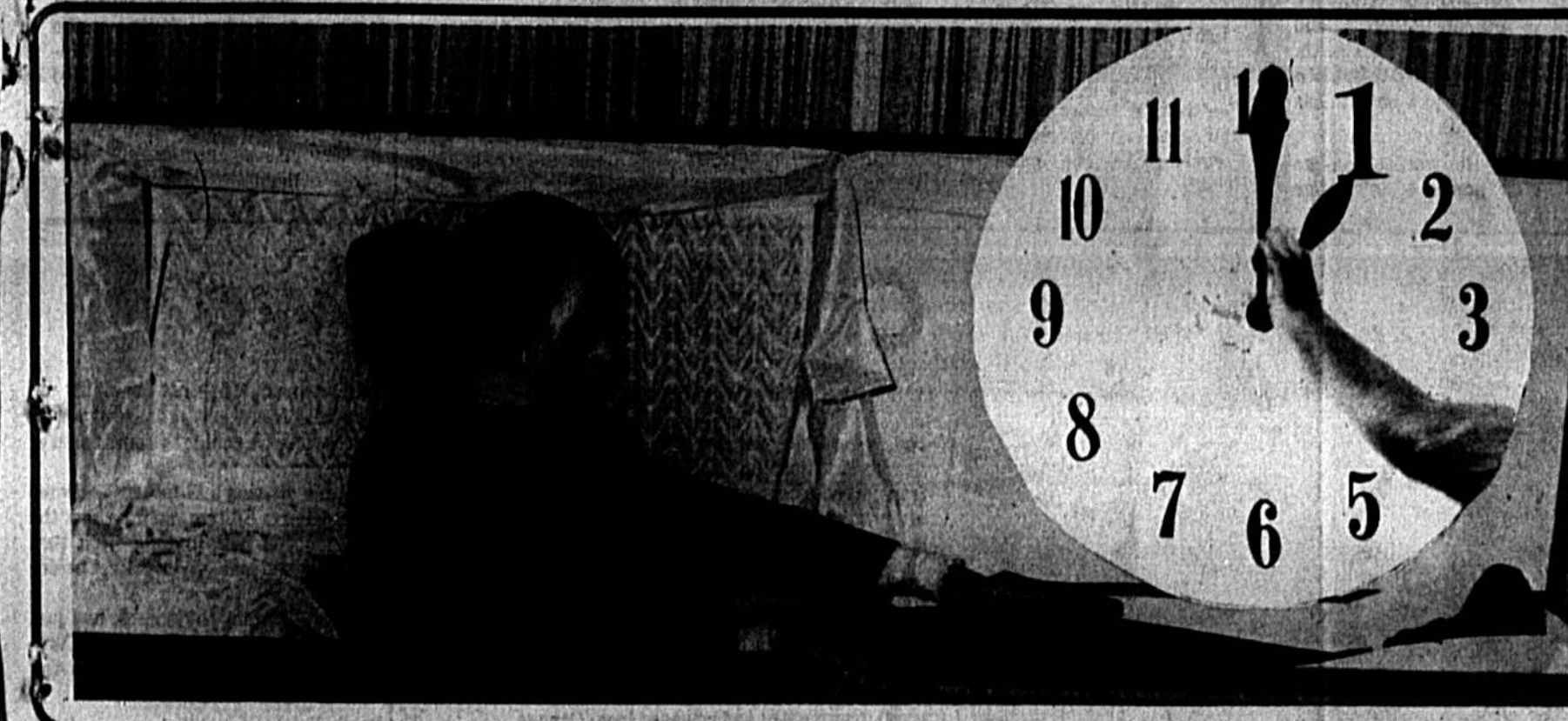
Ways To Regulate Body Heat Safely



DEAR DR. LAMB - I would appreciate your comments on relief from chills. The absence of both sensible and insensible perspiration creates a body temperature of 103 degrees plus in 80 degree weather. Would orthostatic hypotension with blood pressure levels of 70 over 50 being common contribute to this uncomfortable situation? DEAR READER - The low blood pressure and absence of sweating are probably caused by the same abnormalities. Individuals with these two disorders also often have problems with sphincters that may affect bowel or bladder function to some degree. We think these are related to abnormalities in the sympathetic nervous system possibly involving more than one area. I think you should be evaluated by a neurologist if you have not been already. Meanwhile, sweating is an important mechanism to cool the body. The insensible perspiration alone enables us to be air conditioned with evaporative cooling. You will need to take every advantage of mechanisms to keep the body cool that you can. So I am sending you the Health Letter number 74, Body Temperature and Fever, to give you a summary of how the body heat is regulated. Sanford Family Accident Victims Two Killed As Truck, Van Collide

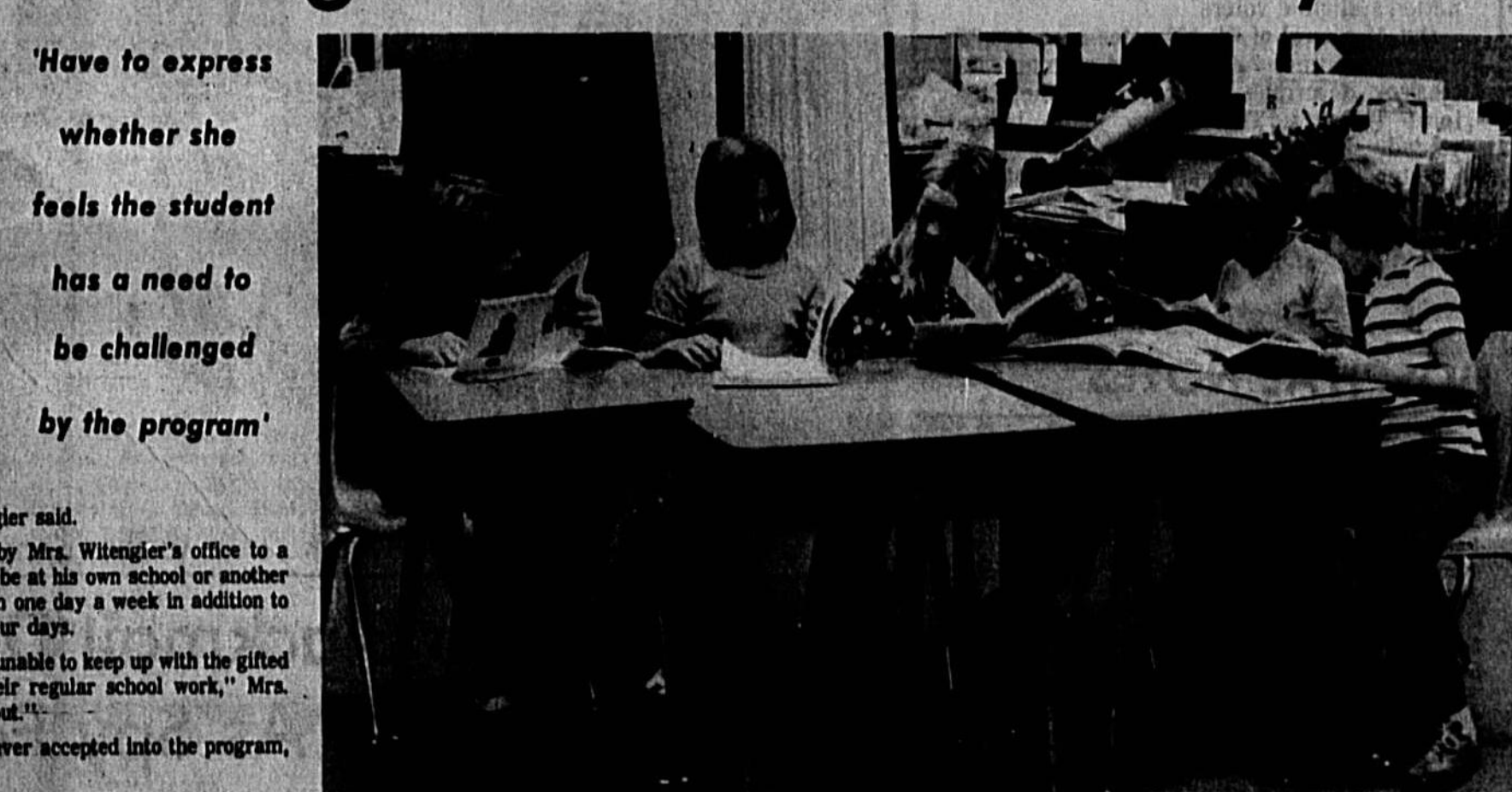
At least two young members of a Sanford family are dead this morning from injuries sustained in an accident Friday night in which eight other persons were injured—two of them seriously. The tragedy occurred at 8:45 p.m. Friday when the Dallabrida van with nine family members inside, was slammed broadside by a truck driven by James Lane, 23, of Jacksonville, on U.S. 17, just north of Airport Boulevard near the Burger King restaurant. Two other members of the Dallabrida family were fighting for their lives Saturday morning at Orange Memorial Hospital. Although details of the accident were sketchy today as Sanford police continued their efforts to piece together the incident, this preliminary account was issued by police. The Dallabrida van was traveling north on U.S. 1745 just past Airport Boulevard and turned left at the beginning of the median divider closest to the exit lane leading from Burger King restaurant. The van, police said, had to travel briefly southbound in the northbound lane. However, police said the impact occurred before the van reached the exit or entrance

600 Enrolled In Seminole Schools The Gifted Children Program: What, How, Why

Gifted children. Who are they? Where do they come from? What does the Seminole County school system offer them in the way of education beyond what they might get in an ordinary classroom? Mary Witengier is program director of exceptional student education, which includes programs for the 600 gifted children in Seminole County's school population of 22,000. "Students who may be eligible for the Gifted Children program are referred by the classroom teacher," Mrs. Witengier said. The state Department of Education says those students who will be included in the Gifted Children program must meet the following definition: "superior intellectual development or outstanding talent and is capable of high performance including those with demonstrated achievement or potential ability. The mental development of a gifted student is greater than two standard deviations above the mean. (In most tests the mean intelligence quotient is 100.)" When a teacher thinks a child may meet that standard the child is referred to the guidance counselor or chairman of the "staffing committee" at the school. Then the child begins a battery of examinations designed to prove whether he meets the state's requirements. Not only is the child's intelligence and potential called into question, but "a teacher also has to express whether she feels the student has a need to be challenged by the program," Mrs. Witengier said. "Much of the testing is oriented to word skills," Mrs. Witengier said. She added that most gifted children are "very verbal." If the student passes all preliminary tests satisfactorily, further testing is done by a school psychologist. "The individual psychological examination calls for a lot of general knowledge, and the students are also given a wide-range
