Only One Of Its Kind In Southeast U.S.

Sunshine Important To This Winter Springs Home

The city of Winter Springs is host to one of the most ambitious experimental projects yet subsidized by the U.S. Housing and Urban Development Department — a solar energy home.

In 1975, Florida Gas Company, along with hundreds of other utility and development companies, large and small, applied for a federal subsidy to build an experimental solar energy residential home. The company received a grant of \$26,000 for this purpose.

Construction of the house, located in the Highlands section of the city, involved many agencies and local firms. Florida Gas turned the building and operations of the house over to its subsidiary, Florida Land Company, which maintains offices in Winter Springs.

Sub-contracting was done by the firm of Florida Residential Communities Inc. Designers for the project are the Winter Park firm of Helman, Hurley, Sharvat, and Peacock.

The Florida Energy Center at Cape Canaveral is taking part in overseeing the solar energy aspects, and Chrysler Corp. took an existing gas air conditioning unit and modified it to adapt to the solar energy system being used in the home. The companies involved are underwriting the balance of the cost not covered by the federal subsidy.

Outwardly, the home is of conventional residential design. I 14 haths. The home faces the north and collector panels cover the

Inside you again find the conventional theme, but there is a sophisticated system of 40 sensor devices located strategically throughout the house. These sensors will electronically monitor temperature, humidity; wind velocity, sunlight, air flow, etc., and feed the information into telephone lines which will transmit the data to Boeing Aerospace Data Processing center in Huntsville,

This is the only system of its kind in the southeast section of the

The home in the Highlands is unique for several reasons. It is the only single-family unit residential demonstration project operating on 95 per cent solar energy, at this stage of completion.

The other special feature of the home is that solar energy is used not only to produce heating, but to generate the air-conditioner unit. Water, collected in the collector panels on the conditioner limit. Water, collected in the collector panels on the roof and heated by the sun is processed through a heat-exchange device to produce the necessary energy. There is a natural gas backup system for use in extended periods of cloudy weather.

Frank Carter, program coordinator for Florida Land Company, said the concept of solar energy is not new. The theory has been around since the 1920s and 30s. Solar energy was used in submarines in World War II. This project is one of the most ambitious for harnessing the sun for use in residential homes.


Carter said the only other such grant-sponsored solar energy project in the state is an apartment complex being constructed in a small city in the Panhandle. This project is concentrating on using solar energy only for heating purposes.

HUD will be monitoring the Winter Springs home for a period of five years to ensure the operations of the system.

Completion costs of the project from all sources, according to the horne was built as an experiment and to help find solutions to the national energy crisis, the home will be sold on the market for the average price of a home of this size — approximately \$55,000. The eventual owner also will save upwards of 75 per cent in the

A dedication ceremony is being planned for the end of the year, according to Charles Row, manager of communications of Florida Gas Company. The tentative plans are for a period of a month or so for public viewing before the house is offered for sale. He said these plans are dependent on the progress of the experimental project.

"The purpose of this project is to evaluate the solar energy ackage for residential homes, Row said."

Carter Orders Halt Of U.S.

Arms Shipments To S. Africa

By United Press International Under orders from President Carter, the United States is ending all arms shipments to South Africa because of "blatant deprivation" of black rights there, and Western powers in the U.N. Security Council plan to support a resolution calling for a renewable six-month

international weapons embargo.

The U.S. embargo will not be much of a change from the current American position, since a virtually complete embargo on arms to the Pretoria regime has been in effect since 1962. But Carter said he may use additional measures if South Africa does not improve on

And at the U.N., informed sources said the United States, Britain, France, West Germany and Canada agreed late Thursday to support the embargo, and the council was scheduled to meet today on that matter.

Profits Up For Auto Industry

DETROIT (UPI) — The U.S. auto industry apparently has succeeded in offseting rising labor costs and government orders for safer, cleaner and more fuel-efficient cars: It appears headed for a record profit-making year.
The "Big Three" automakers' combined

earnings for the third quarter, announced this week, totaled \$702.2 million, up 36 per cent from a year ago and more than twice the Julyiber profits of 1975.

So far this year, General Motors Corp., Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp. have earned combined profits of \$3.89 billion — the highest nine-month profit total in the history of the auto industry.

'I Got What I Deserved'

MOCKSVILLE, N.C. (UPI) - Daniel R. Webster "got just what I deserved." He was sentenced Thursday to die in the gas chamber for murdering his wife. Webster said, "I think I got a fair and just verdict in this court."

Webster, 51, who has spent 22 years in various jails, told the jury in explicit detail how he beat his wife on the head with an ax, then strangled her and cut her throat. "You're looking at a cold-blooded murderer and if I had it to do over again I would probably do the same thing...," he said.

Pot Law May Become Stiffer

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Judiciary Committee's vote to decriminalize possession of small amounts of marijuana is likely to be overturned next week, and the result may be worse for the casual smoker. By forcing a vote, Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., and his supporters so angered conservatives and his supporters so angered conservatives that a stiffer amendment on possession of small amounts of marijuana will be offered and is virtually assured of passage, UPI learned today.





Airbags Or Windbags

Obviously, the federal regulators have enlisted the National Highway Traffic Safety Ad-ministration in their campaign to convince the public that mandated airbags in automobiles will be good for them. And that's regrettable; for until now, the NHTSA has been one of the more credible

Currently, the highway safety agency is put-ting on an airbag "road show" which Rep. Bud Shuster of Pennsylvania charges is "phony from start to finish." Making use of a simulated airbag that is substantially different than one you would get in a car you bought, Shuster points out, the NHTSA demonstration is "deliberately misleading the public."

Any remaining credibility the agency might have after such tricks and games is bound to suffer further as a result of a more recent performance by NHTSA administrator, Joan Claybrook. Not content with a gimmicked-up simulated airbag, Claybrook comes perilously close to an outright untruth in a statement made to U.S. News and World Report and reported in the magazine's Sept.

Asked by the USN & WR interview why Washington will soon require new cars to have airbags or some other passive restraint that automatically protects passengers, Claybrook

"One reason is that the auto companies will not make airbags available as optional equipment. You cannot today go into a dealership," she continued, "and buy a car with an airbag in it."

While, as far as we know, the latter is true, the first part flies in the face of the fact that the U.S. auto industry has offered airbags on an optional basis in the past and plans to do so in the future.

Ford, in a recent Wall Street Journal news story, announced that it will offer the airbags on a full-size and a subcompact in its 1981 model year while General Motors, two weeks earlier, had amounced that airbags would be optional in all of its 1981 models. Both offerings, it should be noted, are in advance of the order of Secretary of Transportation Brock Adams requiring the auto companies to begin phasing in both the airbags and passive seat belt systems during their 1982-1984 model years.

Moreover, as Claybrook well knows, at least one U.S. auto manufacturer has offered airbags on practice when public demand did not come up to

As a matter of fact, director Claybrook admitted this herself later on in the interview with U.S. News and World Report. Asked why the government order requiring airbags provides that they be installed on big, luxury cars first, rather than small cars that are involved in the most than small cars that are involved in the most serious accidents, Claybrook replied:

Paying Off' Congress

Indications are that Congress may quietly drop the idea of easing some of its older members out the door with a \$3,000-a-year going-away

Skipping the arthmetical complications, a representative or senator retiring at the end of the 95th Congress in 1978 with 20 to 32 years service will receive a less-than-spartan pension of \$42,880 a year. This is based on 80 percent of his average salary for his last three years.

Because congressional salaries were boosted to \$57,500 earlier this year, however, members who retire in 1980 at the end of the 86th Congress

will qualify for a pension based entirely on the higher salary. It works out to \$46,000, or a difference of a little over \$3,000 a year.

It seemed to House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. that extending that \$3,000 to

congressmen retiring next year would help clear out a lot of aging wood on Capitol Hill, and he alipped legislation to that effect through the House. The measure is now before the Senate, where it is beginning to receive the attention is

Tax Cuts Best Way **Economy:**

taking place all over town. This aspect of October 31 has come to overshadow two very important dates in the Church year calendar. Halloween is really the evening coming before All-Hallows' or All Saints' Day, Nov. 1. Down through the years, the religious emphasis has been subdued by the secular.

All Saints' Day was instituted by the early Church about 610 A.D. and became an official observance of the Church in 835 A.D.

It has expanded from merely a commemoration of martyrs to include all those who have died in the faith as well as those living who have the grace of God in their lives.

In Christian terms a "saint" is a believer in Jesus Christ as

Lord and Savior, not just an exceptionally plous person. Thus, in the Apostles' Creed, "I believe in the holy catholic (universal) church, the communion (fellowship) of saints (believers)"...

Prayers are not offered to the saints but rather that we might live

the life of faith and commitment shown by them.

Reformation Day, observed by many Protestant groups, is October 31. It was on this day in 1517 that Martin Luther posted 95 statements that he wanted to debate with church authorities. The day, for many years, was the occasion of divisive statements against another Christian body. The modern emphasis is on the renewal of the proclamation of the Gospel and a recalling of the whole Church to its evangelical origins. Reform must be a continuing task of the church in all ages.

To be a part of the reforming Church of all shades of doctrinal stands is to be one of the saints of God. And being a saint consists in truly knowing and following Jesus Christ. "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free. Revival Services Planned





Mary Witengier is program director of exceptional student education, which includes programs for the 600 gifted children in Semissie County's school population of 32,000. "Students who may be eligible for the Gifted Children program

are referred by the classroom teacher," Mrs. Witingier said.

The state Department of Education says those students who will be included in the Gifted Children program must meet the following definition: "superior intellectual development or outstanding talent and is capable of high performance including those with demonstrated achievement or potential ability. The mental development of a gifted student is greater than two standard deviations above the mean. (In most tests the mean

If the student passes all preliminary tests satisfactorily, further testing is done by a school psychologist.

"The individual psychological examination calls for a lot of general knowledge, and the students are also given a wide-range

attending his regular classes four days.

"Some children find they are unable to keep up with the gifted program and still complete their regular school work," Mrs. Witengler said, "so they drop out."

Some talented children are never accepted into the program,

"This program is set up for academic achievers and we have not yet tapped talent and creativity," Mrs. Witengier said. But the program is expected to provide a broad base of ex-perience for children who do participate. "This program is supposed to involve some of a child's in-dividual strengths, skills and leanings," Mrs. Witengier said.

"Some children may be deeply involved in reading and writing poetry, plays. For those children the language arts would be

"Other children may be into experimenting, animal husbandry, perhaps genetics. Then a special program would be created for that child as well," Mrs. Witengier explained.

Children in the Gifted Program share regularly in field trips, Mrs. Witengier said, which are designed to take them through a city or a facility in far greater detail than other children might

"These trips are designed to be exploratory," Mrs. Witengier said, and explained that some field trips made by the students included travelling to St. Augustine and Tarpon Springs, ex-

oring the cities both on the bus and on foot. One class even simulated an archaelogical dig, allowing students to uncover objects and catalog them just as they would if they were uncovering the site of an ancient city, according to Mrs.
