BURRAGE SAYS NOTHING NEW IN BABY CASE

Refuses Explain Statement That If P.I. in Kidnapers To Know Reason Why

NORFOLK, Mar. 30. (A.P.)—Rear Admiral Guy H. Burrage, retired, told newspapermen today that "nothing new happened" in further negotiations here for the return of the kidnaped Lindbergh baby. "I will give you this statement," he said "if there is failure the kidnapers alone will know why." Burrage, who said he was speaking for his fellow intermediaries, Dean H. Dobson-Peacock and John H. Curtis refused to explain the meaning of his statement.

To expressions of hope that they might bring about the early return of the kidnaped Lindbergh baby, one of three Norfolk negotiators yesterday added the assertion that Colonel Lindbergh had requested they carry forward their efforts.

Returning from a trip to the Mrs. Southland mansion estate, made partly by air in spite of unfavorable weather, the Very Rev. Dean H. Dobson-Peacock told reporters: "All I can say is that things are satisfactory so far. We want to keep on with our work. We are still optimistic."

Asked if any means of identifying the baby had been taken by him to Hopewell, he replied: "I carried only information."

Dean Dobson-Peacock added that he, together with John Hughes and Rear Admiral Guy H. Burrage, would continue their negotiations.

At the time he spoke the Episcopal churchman had not conferred with his associates and he indicated he must see them before plans for their future activities were definitely laid upon.

Later in the day, after meeting his associates, the dean issued a formal statement in which he said they were continuing their efforts to recover the baby "at the request of Colonel Lindbergh, made personally by him."

Maine's 12 Votes To Be Given Roosevelt

PORTLAND, Mar. 30. (A.P.)—A Maine delegation of 12 voters instructed for Governor Roosevelt seemed assured today as the final session of the state Democratic convention got under way. Party leaders opposed to the move for instructions gave way to the increasing strength of ardent Roosevelt supporters and said that in the interest of harmony they would support the delegates to the New York governor.

PRESIDENT WILL VETO BONUS BILL IF OFFERED HIM

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. (A.P.)—President Hoover served emphatic notice upon Congress yesterday that a veto waits any new bonus legislation.

Speaking to newspapermen, the President declared he was "absolutely opposed to any such legislation." The \$2,000,000,000 expenditure necessary to pay the balance on veterans' compensation certificates, he asserted, would preclude any balancing of the budget.

Immediately opposition was aroused in Capitol Hill. Representative Cuddy (R. Mass.), said he would use every power within his means to push through the House one of the 16 bills already introduced to provide additional payment upon adjusted compensation certificates.

Cannery declared that if a bonus bill is not placed before the House he would "fight it out the petition way," obtaining 145 names upon a request to bring up the question. The Democratic controlled Ways and Means Committee has placed the bonus first on its order of business following disposal of the troublesome tax question.

County Court Docket Released Today By Prosecuting Attorney Leonardy

HYDE TURNS ON HIS OFFICE IN FIERY TIRADE

Terms Department As 'Prize Boob In The History Of Finance' Hits Farm Credits

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. (A.P.)—Secretary Hyde's long smoldering dissatisfaction over turning the agriculture department into a money line agency for the benefit of farmers yesterday burst into flame.

"He called the department the 'prize boob in the history of finance,'" and said it was sending more money on farmer security and sustaining more losses than ever before in the history of money lending in the world."

Soon afterward Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, said Hyde was "monstrously out in sympathy with the relief which the law provides should be administered through his department."

Congress voted \$200,000,000 for agricultural credit this year in the Reconstruction Finance Corporation act, making \$50,000,000 immediately available. These loans financing production of new crops in a surplus-producing nation are being made now at the rate of \$1,000,000 daily.

Hyde explained yesterday that the agriculture department was handling the agricultural loan because the Reconstruction Finance Corporation is doing business as a business basis. Loans that are now being made under the name of agriculture cannot by the fact that they are called rural business loans.

Mr. Annie Ayres, mother of Perry, was indicted as an accessory before the fact. No mention was made against Sam Ayres, Perry's father, although he was held on a charge of drunkenness.

National guardmen were called out to protect the Ayres and Johnston when angry citizens mobbed a and the Lakeland jail shortly after their arrest. The prisoners were transferred to the county jail here for safekeeping and troops remained on guard until Monday night.

The grand jury in its indictment charged Johnston with first degree murder for the slaying of Police Officer T. A. Nicholson, Mr. Ayres was charged with accessory before the fact, and Perry was charged with accessory after the fact.

HOUSE GROUP OKEYS 5 NEW FUND RAISERS

Amendments To New Revenue Bill May Bring In Another \$15,000,000 In Tax

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. (A.P.)—The House Ways and Means Committee today approved five amendments to the new revenue bill which are expected to yield an additional \$15,000,000.

They propose increases in corporation income tax, corporate income tax of 15 percent on consolidated and affiliated entities, an eight percent levy on oil and gas production, a five percent tax on the production of minerals, and an increase in the maximum rate in the proposed gift tax.
