

BURRAGE SAYS NOTHING NEW IN BABY CASE

Refuses Explain Statement That If Plan Fails Kidnappers To Know Reason Why

NORFOLK, Mar. 30.—(A.P.)— Rear Admiral Guy H. Burroughs, retired, told newsmen today that "nothing has happened" in further negotiations here for the return of the kidnapped Lindbergh baby. "I will give you this statement," he said. "If there is failure the kidnappers alone will know why." Burroughs, who said he was speaking for his fellow intermediaries, Dean H. Dobson-Peacock and John Hughes Curtis, refused to explain the meaning of his statement.

To expressions of hope that they might bring about the early return of the kidnapped Lindbergh baby, one of three Norfolk negotiators yesterday added the assertion that Colonel Lindbergh had requested they carry forward their efforts.

Returning from a trip to the other Sourland mountain estate, made partly by air in spite of unfavorable weather, the Very Rev. Dean H. Dobson-Peacock told reporters:

"All I can say is that things are satisfactory so far. We want to keep on with our work. We are still optimistic."

Asked if any means of identifying the baby had been taken by him to Hopewell, he replied:

"I carried only information that Colonel Lindbergh had requested that he, together with John Hughes Curtis, himself, builder and Rear Admiral Guy H. Burroughs, retired, continue their negotiations."

At the time he spoke the Episcopal churchman had not conferred with his associates and he indicated he must see them before plans for their future activities were definitely decided upon.

Later in the day, after meeting his associates, the dean issued a formal statement in which he said they were continuing their efforts to recover the baby "at the earliest opportunity."

After reading the statement, reporters clustered around him to hear it. Dean Dobson-Peacock said:

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Jap Flier Planning Hop Over Pacific, Is Killed

NEW YORK, Mar. 30.—(A.P.)—Final arrangements were being made for his contemplated non-stop flight across the Pacific. Capt. Yoshimori Nagoya, Japanese flier, was killed yesterday when his plane, a mass of flames, plunged into a Jamaica Bay inlet.

Leroy Turner of the naval reserve leaped, fully clothed, into the icy waters, and brought out the crushed body.

Captain Nagoya had just taken on 600 gallons of fuel and announced his intention of flying to Newcastle, Del., to have final adjustments made on the plane. He had hoped to start his ocean hop, for a \$50,000 prize offered by the Tokyo newspaper *Hochi-Shimbun*, within a few weeks.

The plane left the ground with difficulty, rose 25 feet, hit the ground, bounded up to 200 feet, glided over the water, burst into flames and fell.

Turner dived, swam under water to the submerged cabin, unlatched the door and hauled the body of the dead pilot to the surface.

Jury Decides Skeleton Is 1926 Storm Victim

HALLANDALE, Mar. 30.—(A.P.)—A coroner's jury decided today that the skeleton of a woman found near Danie Feb. 17 is that of Mrs. Hadie Kimball, victim of the 1926 hurricane.

She was separated from her husband and two children during the storm when they attempted to flee from their houseboat in the East Canal canal to Hallandale. The body of one of the children was found the next day.

Maine's 12 Votes To Be Given Roosevelt

Party leaders opposed to the move for instructions gave way to the increasing strength of ardent Roosevelt supporters and said that in the interest of harmony they will not oppose making the delegates to the New York governor.

PRESIDENT WILL VETO BONUS BILL IF OFFERED HIM

Hoover Serves Notice On Congress That He Heavily Disfavors It

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30.—(A.P.)—President Hoover served emphatic notice upon Congress yesterday that a veto would affect new southerners' bonus legislation.

Speaking to newsmen, the President declared he was "absolutely opposed to any such legislation." The \$2,000,000,000 immediately available, these loans financing production of new crops in a surplus-rich nation, are being made now at the rate of \$1,000,000 daily.

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
