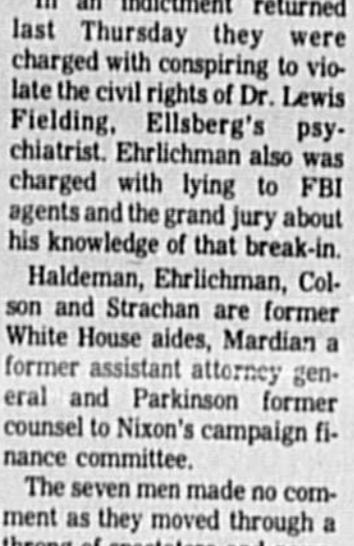

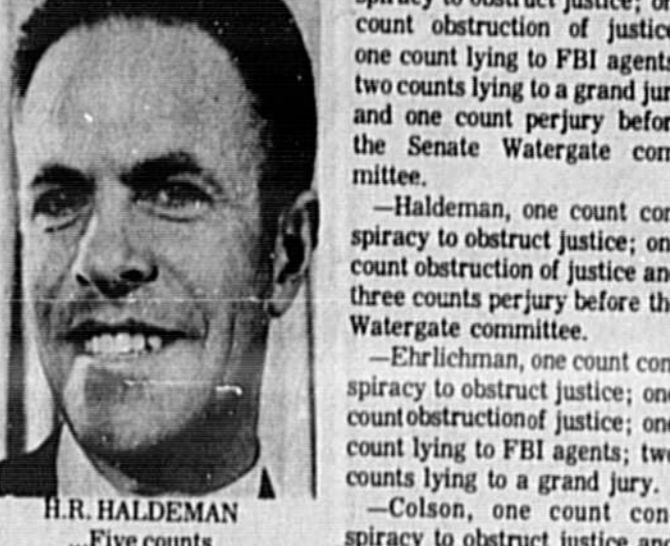

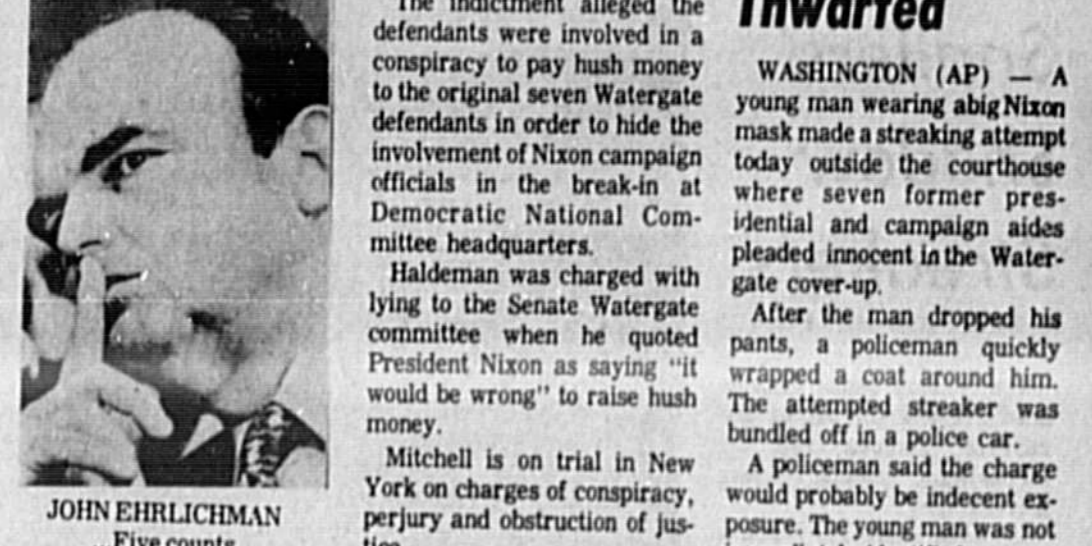

'Snailers' Shadow Streakers

The Nation's Senior citizens need not feel left out by the current campus fad of streaking. "Snailers" has arrived.

In Lima, Ohio, 67-year-old Virgil Cleves was arrested Friday for strolling in the nude in the city's public square with a female companion, also bare. Cleves said he was too old for streaking, the latest college fancy in which youths strip and dash short distances before spectators. He termed the event for older persons "snailing."

Cleves and Wanda Gray, 46, were charged with public indecency. Streaking continued unabated around the nation, with other variations cropping up here and there.

—During a Southwest Conference baseball game between Rice and Texas in Houston, Tex., Friday, Rice saw its winning streak reach nine games. Texas saw its winning streak end at 17 games and the fans saw just a plain old streak.

About the middle of the game, a nude man streaked in front of the bleachers. Many of the 1,500 fans stood and applauded. Just incidentally, Rice won, 5-4.

—In Denver, Colo., a United Air Lines spokesman reported an incident of semistreaking aboard Flight 306 from Cleveland to Denver.

The airline spokesman said a passenger went to the forward lavatory after dinner, took off all his clothes except his shorts, socks and shoes and streaked to the rear of the plane and back, put his clothes on and returned to his seat.

The man, described as in his 40s and balding, was not identified.

—In Seattle, Wash., streakers found no ally in the American Sunbathing Association, the nation's largest nudist organization.

—In Los Angeles, a group of nudists was arrested for streaking. "Nudists wouldn't be caught streaking."

—Anti-streaking also was reported in West Plains, Mo., where a group of bareheaded and barefooted high school-age boys ran around the town square, to the police station and through it.

Vesco Used Fifth Amendment: Sears

NEW YORK (AP) — Financier Robert L. Vesco used the Fifth Amendment just before President Nixon's re-election to avoid telling about his secret \$200,000 campaign contribution, says government witness Harry L. Sears.

After the election, Vesco sought White House help in a legal fight with the Securities and Exchange Commission through Nixon's brother, Donald. Sears testified Friday at the federal trial of former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell and Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans.

The government has charged that Vesco threatened to disclose the contribution if he didn't get aid from the White House.

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NATION TODAY

Vandals Damage Cars

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — Vandals damaged only the large cars left overnight at a service station by motorists hoping for early morning gasoline, police said.

Of the 100 cars parked at the station Thursday night, the tires on 15 large-model cars were slashed, police said. Smaller cars in the lineup were untouched.

Kennedy Hits Drug Gifts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said the reported drug-industry practice of showering valuable gifts on physicians and pharmacists "smacks of payoffs."

He commented after four former drug salesmen testified about presents to doctors and druggists to induce them to prescribe and sell their products.

Watergate 'Dwelling'

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla. (AP) — Predicting more frequent news conferences by President Nixon, Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler feels there is "still too much dwelling on Watergate" by Nixon's questioners.

Chatting with a small group of reporters aboard Air Force One as it flew Nixon here Friday, Ziegler said, "As he holds them on a more frequent basis, as I think he will, the area of questioning will shift... to things he's doing in foreign and domestic policy."

By Ziegler's count, 15 out of 19 questions at Wednesday's television-radio news conference dealt with Watergate and related matters. The President and Mrs. Nixon flew here for a weekend of sunshine before she leaves Monday to attend the inaugurations of new presidents of Venezuela and Brazil. Nixon will see her off at a ceremony at nearby Homestead Air Force Base.

San Francisco Strike

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — With the city crippled by the strike of 10,000 municipal employees and raw sewage flowing into its famous bay, Mayor Joseph Alioto has declared a state of emergency to prompt weekend negotiations.

Alioto made his declaration after union leaders rejected his proposed settlement of the two-day walkout, which has paralyzed municipal transportation, hospitals and other services. The mayor's rejected proposal included a five per cent increase for 11,000 city workers at an estimated cost of \$7.4 million and a dental plan to be phased in over three years. One union spokesman said an eight per cent increase might be acceptable.

Corporate Disclosures

WASHINGTON (AP) — Corporations and their officers found guilty of making illegal campaign contributions must report that fact to their stockholders, the Securities and Exchange Commission says.

"Such a conviction is material to an evaluation of the integrity of the management of the corporation as it relates to the operation of a corporation and the use of corporate funds," the SEC said in a statement Friday.

Thus far, nine corporations and eight corporate officers have been found guilty of making illegal contributions to candidates in the 1972 presidential campaign, and authorities say other cases are being investigated.

Rickover Opts Out

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Adm. Hyman G. Rickover, the Navy's 76-year-old nuclear warfare expert, has declined to join a discussion of women's rights.

A woman journalist asked Rickover Friday to define "the role women can play in your nuclear Navy."

When she mentioned by name Robin Quigley, a captain who commands the Navy service school in San Diego, Rickover responded: "Robin Quigley? What's that, a bird?"

'Boston Brrrrrr'

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Globe today had a one-word editorial on the new fad of streaking in the nude: "Brrrrrrr!"

Nobel Winner Dies

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Dr. Earl W. Sutherland Jr., whose research in hormones earned him a Nobel Prize in 1971, died at Jackson Memorial Hospital today after a short illness. He was 58.

The Nobel laureate, a biochemistry professor at the University of Miami, entered Jackson Memorial Hospital Feb. 27 suffering from bleeding at the base of his esophagus, a condition often associated with high blood pressure.

Terrorists Assassinate Peronist

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Terrorists assassinated a right-wing Peronist today, and the Marxist People's Revolutionary Army claimed responsibility.

The assassination came as a powerful bomb went off outside the plant of the leftist Peronist newspaper *Tricontinental*, injuring five persons and causing heavy damage, police said.

It was not known if the explosion at the paper was in retaliation for the assassination. Police identified the assassin as a member of the Peronist band called the New Argentine and National University Concentration.

Police said Castrofrini was leaving his apartment with his wife and father when he was intercepted by a man and woman. As he approached the man fired four shots at Castrofrini, who died in a car.

Sources said Castrofrini was a friend of Alejandro Givovenco, another right-wing Peronist who was killed several weeks ago when a bomb he was carrying in a briefcase exploded. Three others were injured in that blast.

Spain Vs. Church

MADRID, Spain (AP) — The Spanish government apparently is waiting for the Roman Catholic church hierarchy to make the next move in the case of dissident Bishop Antonio Anzoriz. The government reportedly wants the church to reply to its charges that the prelate endangered national unity when he distributed a homily Feb. 24 urging more freedom for Spain's Basque minority. The Permanent Commission of Spanish Bishops planned to meet again today and was expected to work on the answer.

Wilson, Arabs

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson is trying to convince the Arabs that Britain under the Labor government is going to follow an even-handed Middle East policy, political sources said today. The sources said the move was prompted by an Arab warning that Britain might be classified as "an unfriendly country" by key Arab oil producers if it does not give assurance otherwise. The assurance, the sources said, is in a letter from Wilson to Egyptian President Anwar Sadat.

Mortars Fired

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Khmer Rouge insurgents besieging the seaport of Kampong Speu fired 60 mortar shells into the center of the town overnight, killing 10 persons and wounding four, military sources said. They said the insurgents also attacked the government defense lines north and east of the town, 85 miles southwest of Phnom Penh. Government reinforcements moved into the town by boat late Friday from the seaport of Kampong Speu. The Cambodian command said fighting flared at six points around Phnom Penh, the first time that many simultaneous clashes were reported around the capital in two months.

Moon Rocks

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet scientists believe the rocks composing the moon and earth are roughly the same age. Tass said today.

The conclusion was drawn by scientists at Moscow's Institute of Geochemistry after studies of lunar rocks and soil brought back to earth by the unmanned Soviet moonships Luna 16 and Luna 20.

The scientists compared their data with American statistics, the news agency said.

New Courthouse Up To Voters

(Editor's Note — This is the third of four articles on the items on a county bond issue referendum held last Tuesday. The four bond issues proposed total \$4,660,880 for construction of a courthouse branch office building in south Seminole, a new agricultural center, a third floor on the Sanford courthouse judicial wing and a central county security facility (jail).)

Tuesday Seminole County voters will either approve or reject a \$1.8 million bond issue for construction of a third floor on the courthouse judicial wing at Sanford.

Due to booming population and the unplaned effects of Article Five (judicial revision) the courthouse-based system of courts has seen case loads jump by 400 per cent according to the judiciary. The addition of the judicial third floor may be forced upon the county because voters reject this bond referendum item.

A December feasibility study by Gutmann Dragash and Matz Architects Inc. estimates the third floor construction and furnishing will cost \$1.4 million. County commissioners have tentatively earmarked another \$380,000 toward a solution to crowded parking conditions around the courthouse but this might be required for construction of the third floor because of spiraling building costs, project commissioner Dick Williams said.

The architects' report notes approximately 10,000 square feet of usable space would be available on the third floor for expansion of judicial function. The new area would be able to handle some of the future needs of the judicial system.

The study doesn't go into definite plans as to just what would be housed on the new floor but Williams said the judges already need additional courtrooms in the less than two-year-old, \$4 million courthouse.

The courthouse now has three courtrooms and the county commission chamber has also been used for trials. A fourth courtroom is maintained a block away in leased building.

"We're now looking for another temporary courtroom facility here in town," Williams said. "There's no doubt we need more judicial space."

If the judicial addition bond issue is approved the new space wouldn't be available until the bonds are validated, sold, construction plans drawn, a contract awarded and the actual construction done. This sequence of events would take at least two years.

What if the voters reject the bond issue?

"I wouldn't be surprised if the courts order the county to build the third floor anyway, levying the necessary taxes over a two-year period," Williams commented. "If this is done we could have some real fiscal and legal problems."

Informally circuit court judges have already indicated to county commissioners this could take place if the bond issue is turned down by the voters.

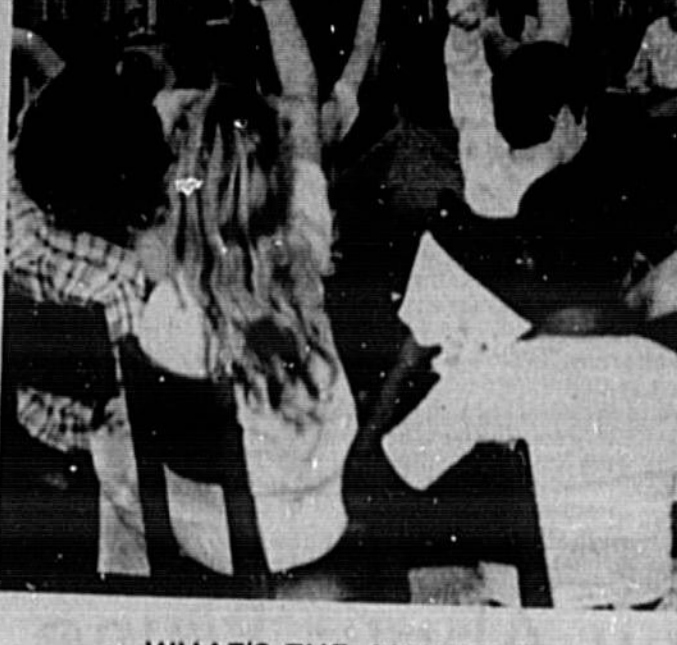

Jail Segregation Ends

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A federal court has enjoined Polk County's sheriff and board of commissioners from allowing racial segregation of prisoners at the county jail.

The injunction Friday was included in a consent decree signed by Sheriff Monroe Brannen. It stems from a complaint filed last May by Richard Kleindienst, then U.S. Attorney General. Brannen has said blacks are separated from whites at the jail for their own safety.

Turbulence Hurts Women

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — Two women were being treated at a hospital here today after being knocked down by turbulence from a taxiing National Airlines jetliner at Sarasota Bradenton Airport.

Merle Sears, 73, of Bradenton was admitted to the hospital Friday with broken ribs and Ann Schindler, 72, of East Aurora, N.Y., with a broken hip. Peri Gorman, 74, of Washington, D.C., was released after treatment.

A National official said the women were standing behind a fence when the Boeing 727 jet turned around to take off for Tampa and Washington.

Cocaine Grabbed, Man Nabbed

MIAMI (AP) — U.S. Customs agents have confiscated 34 pounds of cocaine with an estimated street value of \$1.3 million while arresting a Colombian man for possession of the drug, officials say.

Agents said Antonio Amaya, 33, was arrested Friday carrying a briefcase holding 14 pounds of cocaine. They said he was stopped after "searching for something" aboard a New York to Miami plane.

Agents said they had already stacked out a 3 1/2 pound package of cocaine they had found on the plane Thursday.

NAACP Feud

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Florida NAACP official Sam Jones says the civil rights group's state president doesn't have the power to remove him from office.

State NAACP field director R.N. Gooden had said Friday that president Eddie Mae Steward of Jacksonville was suspending Jones from the chairmanship of the legal redress committee for making unauthorized news releases.

"I plead guilty to making unauthorized news releases," Jones replied early today. "I'm a firm believer in the first amendment to the United States constitution granting all citizens the right to a free press and free speech."

Jones said chairman cannot be removed without being given formal charges of cause and that no such statement has reached him.

Jones, also of Jacksonville, had said Thursday that white political bosses, whom he did not identify, had misled some NAACP people into undesired attacks on Gov. Reubin Askew.

Gooden and Mrs. Steward had criticized Askew for not appointing black judges. Jones pointed out that Askew appointed four black judges before a new constitutional amendment required him to name judges only from lists submitted by nominating commissions.

Ford Claims Nixon Still More Popular Than Foe

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Vice President Gerald Ford says that while President Nixon's popularity is at a low ebb, that of the Democratic Congress is even lower.

"Much has been done... of the President's low rating of 27 per cent in a recent popularity poll," Ford said Friday in speech at the University of Tampa.

"But the same poll disclosed that the public rated Congress at 21 per cent — considerably lower than the President's," he said. "Both need help. It's dangerous if we don't rebuild that public image."

Ford told his audience that the nation "is not disintegrating. It's going through a period of transition."

And he said Americans are tired of rhetoric and want results.

"They do not care primarily whether Republicans or Democrats do the job," he said. "Elected officials must perform or face rejection at the polls."

Ford made the comments at a fund-raising dinner attended by about 170 people at the university. The dinner was to help former Rep. William Cramer, a St. Petersburg Republican, raise money for a Cramer Collection of papers at the university.

In a news conference at the school earlier, Ford spoke of having an "open door" relationship with the President.

He said that in meetings with Nixon, he has urged the President to make "more press conferences, more trips throughout the country, away from Washington... And I have repeatedly suggested that an attitude of cooperation with various committees of the Congress would be beneficial."

"I think we have made substantial headway in this regard," the vice president said.

Ford had been across the state in Miami Beach earlier in the day, where he had held another news conference and spoke at a fund-raising luncheon for St. Leo College, a private school in Central Florida.

Director Wants Revision Of Welfare Fraud Laws

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida's welfare director says the state should revise a law that led to the jailing of Catherine Clark, a Tallahassee woman who works as a maid to help support her six children.

"We're going to have to administer welfare fraud laws with some temperance because if we start throwing all the mothers in jail it's going to cost the state more money to provide foster homes," said Douglas Endley, family services director.

Mrs. Clark, 43, was sentenced to 18 days in the Leon County jail by county judge Charles McClure, who said he wanted to make an example of her. She had failed to report on time \$53 in extra income she and her husband John, a construction worker, had earned.

When released from jail last Wednesday, Mrs. Clark said she "asked the Lord to bless that judge because he thought he was doing right."

The Clark case has raised a number of questions about the state's crackdown on welfare and food stamp cheaters.

On the one hand, food stamp officials, Judge McClure and the assistant state attorney who prosecuted Mrs. Clark feel she clearly violated a rule requiring her to report income changes within a week.

Although most of the income was earned by her husband, he was not charged because she was the person who dealt with the food stamp office. She reported the changes but was late in doing so.

Rep. Dennis McDonald, R-St. Petersburg, one of the most vocal of a group of lawmakers who urged the welfare fraud crackdown, said, "It is possible to go too far... I think it's defeating the purposes of the law to put people in jail for an offense involving \$5 or \$50, especially when the money's been repaid," he said.

In Mrs. Clark's case, a minister who employed her repaid the \$48 remaining on her debt before she pleaded no contest to the fraud charge.

Endley said a 1972 law requiring food stamp officials to turn all possible fraud cases over to the state attorneys may be too stiff.



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More Gas Ready For Florida Drivers

MIAMI (AP) — Florida motorists will have their best chance in months of finding gasoline this weekend, according to a survey taken by the East Florida Division of the American Automobile Association.

The AAA said Friday that a spot survey of 275 stations across the state showed that 198 of them plan to be open Sunday. That compares to 110 last week.

AAA also reported the number of service station dealers among the 275 out of gas dropped from 79 last week to 49 this week. Long waiting lines at stations have almost disappeared, the association added.

But cost is rising along with availability.

A newspaper survey in Dade County showed that prices have increased about 20 per cent in the last two months and to almost 30 per cent at some stations.

Prices of regular gasoline at stations checked Friday ranged from 48.7 cents to 50.9 cents with premium gas going for \$1.2 to \$2.9 cents a gallon.

The AAA survey breakdown: FLORIDA TURFPIKE — Supplies excellent with only Palm Beach and Pompano Beach plaza stations limiting gas.

INTERSTATES — Supplies excellent with only three of 18 stations checked on I-95 limiting purchases. 17 open six days a week and five open Sunday.

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Donna's Deliberations

It was no secret in local government in 1970 that unconstititutional means were being used to annex highways as the cities of Casselberry, Altamonte Springs and Longwood raced to grab land.

The city attorneys, Joe Davis in Longwood and Altamonte and Ken McIntosh in Casselberry, made the fact very clear to elected officials.

The only law on the state books which permitted highway annexations was declared unconstitutional by the Florida Supreme Court in 1965, five years before the annexations took place. The law was not repealed and remains on the books to this day.

Davis and Mack Cleveland, both of Sanford, had special experience with the Supreme Court decision as members of the 1965 Legislature. They heeded the plea of then - Mayor A. R. Lermann of Longwood, pushing through special legislation to legalize Longwood's annexation of U.S. 19-92 frontage and the Winn-Dixie complex at the intersection of SR 43, accomplished before the Supreme Court decision was announced.

In the late 1960's when Longwood attempted to annex the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club, Cleveland representing the dog track warned city councilmen very emphatically that the law they were trying to use was unconstitutional. The city backed off.

But in 1970, the elected city leaders were not interested in legal aspects. Prime consideration was extending territorial limits, ensuring highways to make other choice properties contiguous (adjacent) to city bounds by virtue of the highways.

'Leapfrogging' Challenged

Civic leaders throughout Seminole County, notably the late former county commissioner, Vernon (Curley) Dunn wrote letters to the editor, traveled to Tallahassee and urged the moves, challenging the "leapfrogging" annexations at public forums. But the annexation processes under the unconstitutional law grinded on.

Longwood took SR 434 from its west limits to beyond I-4. SR 427 south to the railroad tracks beyond Milwee School, Seminola Boulevard from SR 427 to U.S. 19-92 and 19-92 from Orange Avenue to General Hutchinson Parkway.

To annex U.S. 19-92 from SR 434 to Seminola Boulevard, however, Longwood used the legal petition method. City officials directed owners of property bounding city lands to the west to petition for annexation of their parcels and the highway.

Casselberry, meanwhile, snatched U.S. 19-92 south from Seminola to its city limits, picking up 19-92 again at its intersection with SR 438 south past K-Mart. Also setted was SR 436 east to Howell Branch Road and west two blocks.

Altamonte Springs claimed SR 436 in portions east to Casselberry and west to I-4, latching onto SR 427 (Maitland Avenue) south to the Orange County line and north (Longwood Avenue) to the Milwee railroad tracks.

Altamonte later deannexed part of SR 427 north when they were pressured by abutting black section property owners for annexation and services.

Cities' Territories Multiplies

The three cities' annexations of the four intervening years, using the highways for continuity, have tripled Altamonte's size, nearly doubled Longwood's size and come close to tripling Casselberry's territorial limits.

The time now has come to pay the reaper.

Earlier this week the Seminole County circuit court ruling on only one aspect of the highway annexation statute. Longwood from the section of SR 434 and five lots in Rolling Hills to which the highway provided continuity.

The ruling by Circuit Judge Tom Weddell also said that a citizen has standing in the court to prosecute on behalf of the state of Florida in annexations of this sort.

The landmark decision poses more questions than it answers. Must another citizen go to court to oust the cities from illegally annexed territory? Will the cities act by requesting court judgments ousting the properties?

The answer to the second question is "not very likely."

Longwood, Casselberry and Altamonte Springs would have a tough time surviving if the revenues — ad valorem taxes, court fines, utility taxes — from the annexed territories were lost in lieu of beefed up city services.

What about the arrests made on the illegally annexed highways by municipal policemen?

Will the cities go to the legislative delegation, asking that four years annexation be legalized after the fact?

Delegation Heard Protest

Last year after unincorporated area residents banded together protesting the cities' annexation and rezoning policies, the legislators pushed through a local law slowing down the annexation and rezoning process, requiring that the cities to hear city and county residents effected.

City officials resented "fool," insisting the delegation was hindering their efforts to provide services to the annexed territory.

"We just want to give them city services," the officials said, venting their wrath on Seminole legislator, Rep. Eugene Mooney, delegation chairman.

The fact is that 90 per cent of the annexations and rezonings have been on petition from land developers and in many cases the developers were not seeking services primarily, but less stringent permitting requirements than the county government imposed.

Permitted development on flood prone lands is a glaring example of this.

The annexation story would not be complete without noting the courage of Mrs. June Lormann, widow of the former mayor, in filing the 1972 lawsuit against Longwood.

Believing she was fighting a cause that had to be fought, she was the but of verbal abuse from Longwood officials and threats were made against her life by vested interests.

In December she was elected to the Longwood city council by a near 3-1 margin. A major plank in her election platform was her lawsuit "to require city officials to abide by the law."

Coincidentally, former State Sen. Cleveland was Mrs. Lormann's lawyer in the winning court action.

Name Mystery Covers Kidnap

NEW YORK (INEA) — One of the many mysteries connected with the Patricia Hearst kidnapping is the checkered name "Cinque" by the spokesman and "General Field Marshal" of the Symbiouse Liberation Army, Miss Hearst's presumed abductor.

This name has surely been checked in all available listings throughout the nation, and probably not found except as a variant of "Cinque" (French) for Cinque is the Anglicized form of the African name Simgu-pieh.

Cinque should present no problem to history buffs. It was the name of the African slave who, in 1839, led the only successful slave revolt on the high seas and who was later captured with his companions at Montauk Point, Long Island. His subsequent incarceration and trials involved, among others, the Spanish government, the U.S. State Department, the Supreme Court, two U.S. presidents, Yale University and Ralph Waldo Emerson. Cinque's exploit caused such an uproar among New England abolitionists and Southern slaveholders that it may be said that it considerably contributed to the coming of Civil War.

What happened would make a good movie scenario. Cinque, along with numerous other Mende tribal members, including children, had been "acquired" in Sierra Leone, Africa, and shipped to Cuba amid the usual deplorable conditions of the Middle Passage. They were intercepted en route by a British man of war and escorted back to Africa.

Subsequently, the Portuguese shipped them out on still another slaver to Havana, where they were sold and then shipped on board the Spanish bark Amistad to Puerto Principe, Cuba.

Convinced by a Mende-speaking cook that all were going to be killed, Cinque opened the slaves shackles with a nail, found some machetes in the hold and took over the Amistad, killing two of the slavers and saving the others to pilot the vessel back to Africa.

The Spanish Cuban pilot, however, sailed slowly east by day, while the ex-slaves on the high seas and who were sailing west every night, but going to get back to Cuba or one of the slave-holding American states. This erratic course ended on the north side of Montauk Point, on an August morning of 1839 when Cinque's land-forging parties ran into bird hunters and a U.S. Coast Guard patrol.

During the capture of the Amistad, Cinque, before he was apprehended, jumped overboard and attempted escape by swimming underwater. While in the process he abandoned a necklace composed of hundreds of gold coins a treasure still awaiting retrieval by Long Island scuba divers.

During the New Haven trials, the jail officials charged admission for the public to observe the prisoners and Cinque was singled out as "possessing the true elements of heroism."

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Pizarro's Greed Led To New World Trips

Although Francisco Pizarro never entered that part of the new world now known as the United States, his influence did. For sheer cruelty and duplicity he has probably never been surpassed, but black as most of his deeds were, they led to exploration of a great part of the new world.

Pizarro was born in Spain about 1471 and little is known of his early life, but he apparently led a life of neglect with little or no education.

It was about 1510 that he came to the Americas where he settled in Panama and it was from there that his more famous exploits originated.

He and another army officer, Diego de Almagro and a priest, Fernando de Luque became partners and eventually they heard tales of the powerful Inca empire to the south in what is now Peru.

All of the stories stressed the riches of the Incas and Pizarro and his allies determined to secure this vast treasure. They interested the Panama government in their plans and obtained permission to conquer the Inca empire. Between the years 1524 and 1528 Pizarro's expedition made two voyages to the south, but only as far as the coast of Ecuador.

But although they had not reached the Inca empire itself, they had gathered enough information so that they were more than ever determined to conquer it. However, by this time, with two failures to Pizarro's credit the Panama government lost interest and declined to finance any further expeditions.

But Pizarro, whatever his other faults, was not the man to give up any project which he had started and he promptly sailed for Spain to obtain permission from Charles V for further exploration. Charles generously granted the permission and made Pizarro governor of Peru, but there is generosity stopped. He was not at all interested in supplying any financial aid.

Again Pizarro returned to Panama and after a great deal of difficulty finally obtained enough men and equipment so that late in 1530 he set sail for Peru with about 180 men and 27 horses.

This third expedition also landed on the coast of Ecuador, but pushed into the jungle toward the Inca settlements. After capturing one Inca for they were joined by reinforcements led by Hernando de Soto, who later discovered the Mississippi River.

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A Deadly Killer Confronts Its Match

Countless thousands of fire victims have died not because of burns but through failure to receive treatment for carbon-monoxide poisoning. Such deaths obviously can become fewer when more firemen and ambulance drivers are alerted to HBO potential.

FIFTEEN hundred people die of carbon-monoxide poisoning annually in the United States, and 10,000 suffer chronic effects from exposure to the poison. One expert hazards a guess that 800 to 900 of these fatalities could be prevented by prompt hyperbaric oxygenation, "drenching" the body in a pressurized tank with oxygen, forcing more oxygen into the blood stream. If more firemen, ambulance drivers, rescue squads, policemen, and doctors in emergency rooms knew the location of the nearest hyperbaric chamber, many carbon-monoxide victims would have a better chance. It has been proved in Milwaukee that a 48-year-old man who was

decrebrate — a condition roughly equivalent to a chicken with its head cut off. Shoveling snow, he had stepped into the garage where the car was running. Now he was deeply unconscious from carbon monoxide, his arms and legs twitching. The carbon monoxide is eliminated from his blood. Meanwhile he may die or suffer permanent brain damage. If the ambulance driver or internist were to understand the answers are affirmative. They fear that verbalizing such sensational findings prior to the firmest kind of scientific proof might expose them to ridicule in the medical profession, and that the uncertain course of HBO toward becoming an important tool of healing might be wrecked if the fickle public succumbed to unwarranted excitement of Fountain of Youth hoopla.

Because so much is unknown in the whole physiological field, hyperbarists have been not surprised by the exotic side effects. The manifestations have surfaced more or less by accident. Certainly in the beginning there was no organized attempt to demonstrate such a range of youthifying phenomena. But in day-by-day clinical work, hyperbarists began independently stumbling onto unexpected and unexplained changes in their patients' sex

life, looks or brain power. These developments so strained credulity that most doctors for a considerable time kept their findings quiet, or ventured guarded, disclosure only to close colleagues. (Pulitzer Prize-winner Vance H. Trimble is editor of the Kentucky Post and Times-Star.)

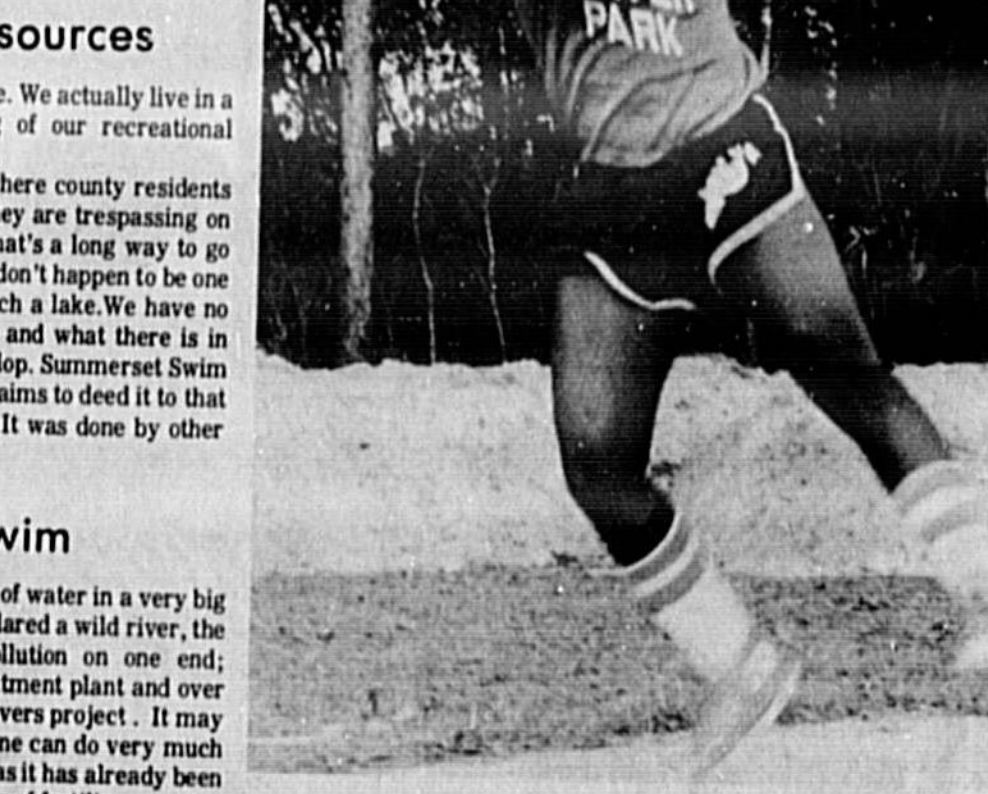

Diet Needs Have Changed

WASHINGTON — Eighty years ago the "sedentary" person was typified by the clerk who, six days a week, got up at 5:30 a.m., split wood for an hour, walked three miles to work, stood on his job for 10 hours, walked home and then chopped more wood.

That definition from Dr. Jean Mayer, one of the country's best-known nutritionists. The "moderately active" person was typified by the factory worker, nonmechanized of course. The "very active" person worked 70 hours a week as a lumberjack or with a pick-and-shovel in the mines.

"Compare that to today's definition of 'sedentary' to 'very active.' There has been a tremendous change in our way of life and people are not aware of it," Mayer told a meeting of the Washington Press Club.

The change has taken its toll as with increased coronaries — a disease of the 20th Century, said Mayer. There were more than 3 million coronary cases last year with 800,000 of them ending in fatalities, he said.

The big factors in causing coronaries are diet and mode of life, he said. Your grandfathers may have eaten foods high in cholesterol, said Mayer, but he probably didn't have automobile, an automobile or a sedentary life.

"Today an active person is the one who thinks he will play golf next Saturday. The athletic person is the one who actually played last Saturday," Mayer joked.

But there have been some positive changes, too, mainly a slowly growing understanding today of how-we-live versus how-we-die.

Mayer will be documenting these changes when he becomes coordinator of the National Nutrition Policy Conference, sponsored by the Senate Select Committee on Nutrition and Human Needs. The conference will be held in June.

Mayer, a professor of nutrition at Harvard University and a syndicated columnist, chaired the 1969 White House Conference on Food, Nutrition and Health.

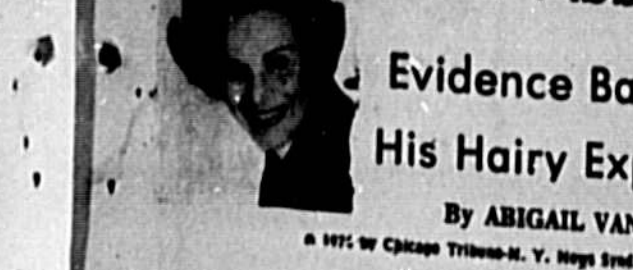

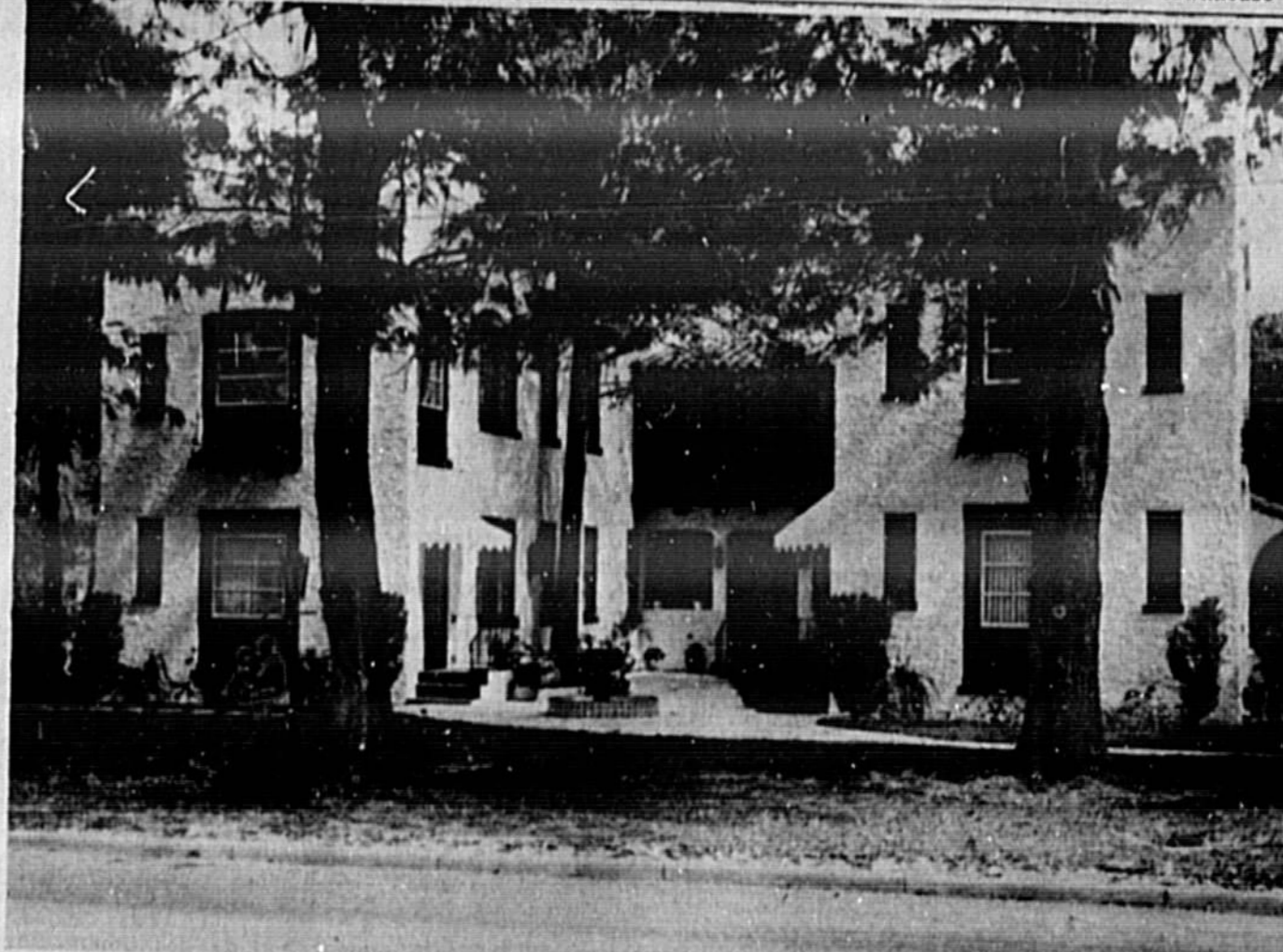

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Consumers planning to buy a subdivision home should avoid developing a false sense of security regarding possible challenges to their ownership, the president of the American Land Title Association advised. How does one get in touch with the Seminole County Board of Realtors?

Dear LWS: You may telephone the Board of Realtors' office by calling 334-3222. The Board's address is 458 Highway 17-92, Longwood, Fla. 32750. The office is open each morning, it is not open during the afternoons.

Friends of mine recently purchased a home. They were showing us some of their closing papers and we came across an item charged to the buyers called "MIP." This item was explained to them but they could not recall what it meant. Could you explain it for us?

Dear Mrs. FLJ: Yes, we can explain it. Apparently your friends purchased a home and financed it with a new mortgage. In order to purchase the home with a down payment smaller than that required on a conventional mortgage, your friends agreed to allow their mortgage company to have the loan to them insured by a private mortgage insurance company. Consequently, the MIP means mortgage insurance premium. The initial year's premium is payable at closing. Subsequently MIP payments are paid into the buyer's escrow account each month when the monthly payment is made. Usually, when the mortgage balance is reduced to an amount equivalent to a conventional mortgage the MIP is dropped. This procedure is true with conventional financing. It is not true with FHA insured mortgages. The MIP is payable throughout the life of the mortgage.

Recently purchased a home and were provided with a survey of the property we bought. However, to our knowledge no one came out and staked out the property. Are we entitled to have the property staked?

Dear Mrs. WLG: Only if the contract you signed to purchase the property provided for a survey to be staked. What you were provided is commonly known as a survey, plot plan or plat site plan. The sheet you have, I'm sure, shows the outline of the lot upon which your home is situated plus an outline of the house and its position on that lot. You should be able to notice figures indicating footages from various corners of the house to nearest lot lines. Now, the chances are that if you will measure from corners of your house to certain positions you should be able to locate where the corners of your lot should be. A little probing with a spade or rod, or perhaps sliding a shovel into the ground at an angle will help you locate stakes which were installed to mark the corners when the house was constructed. If all of this fails chances are you'll have to have a surveyor come out and find your corners. If you do this, be sure you have him put in markers which can easily be found later on.

Rumor has it that a new restaurant is supposed to be constructed on 17-92. Could you tell me what it is and where it will be located?

I think it is a bit more than a rumor. And, it is not one but a good possibility of four new eating establishments located on 17-92 within the next few months. I think I could identify all four of them for you. But, we've had enough guessing in Sanford. Let's wait for the official announcements. One thing is pretty certain. You won't recognize 17-92 from 27th Street to Airport Boulevard in the near future.

Is the mortgage money market loosening up?

Dear Mrs. CRB: Yes, the mortgage money market has loosened quite a bit and mortgage money is available. Interest rates have decreased slightly and the indication is that they will decrease a bit more. Just how much is anybody's guess right now. Remember one thing, however, interest rates fluctuate in accordance with the supply and demand of available mortgage money. If there is an abundance of mortgage money and the demand decreases interest rates will drop. However, if there is a heavy demand for mortgage money and the supply decreases interest rates will go up. It's as simple as that.

Land Of Free: A Profiteer's Paradise

In response to such unblushing representations, hundreds of thousands of Americans are paying some \$6 billion a year for homesites in far-off land subdivisions with seductive names: Palm Coast, Rio Rancho Estates, Paradise Hills, Sunshine Valley Ranchettes. The strength of slippery promises and false premises, many unscrupulous buyers are sold - for residential use or investment - land that seems inappropriate for either purpose. This deception is the work of bold promoters, including some of the biggest corporations in the country, but their victims are as much deluded by their own naive belief in the American dream of easy money and easy living as they are by the artful subdividers.

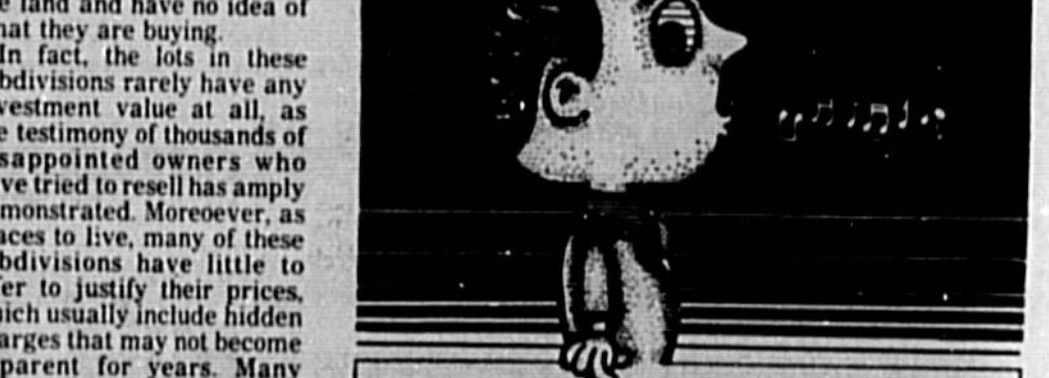


Land hustling pretends to be part of the legitimate land development industry, which it superficially resembles. But the entrepreneur who carves up remote land for sale sight-unseen on the installment plan is in a different business from the local subdivider who markets suburban lots in the path of urban growth, or the developer who undertakes the creation of a complete "new town" such as Reston, Virginia, or Columbia, Maryland. The entrepreneur is more closely akin to the carnival con-artist, the door-to-door salesman of bibles, and the used-car salesman who, at the time-tested, hard-sell technique he has adapted. The promotional subdivision business varies from place to place. Some operations sell desert, others swamps and still others mountain slopes. Some emphasize the land's supposed recreational and second-home potential, others advertise year-round residential use. Investment value is as much deluded by their own naive belief in the American dream of easy money and easy living as they are by the artful subdividers.

Land like this can be found all over the map, despite the promoters' standard warnings that the nation is fast running out of space. Certain states are particularly favorites of the subdividers. More than 500 subdivisions are registered with the state of Florida, adding some 200,000 square miles in a clutch of subdivisions south of Albany every year. In California between 1960 and 1970, subdivisions registered 250,000 acres to be carved up and sold. In the Northeast, southwest of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, there are five large subdivisions in Florida, totaling more than 200,000 acres. While GAC operates several subdivisions in Florida and the 55,000-acre Rio Rico project in Arizona. Others, less visible nationally, are so numerous that they represent a far greater acreage total than the larger, more flamboyant operations. There are no precise acreage estimates of the entire industry, but \$6 billion buys a lot of lots. The vast majority are bought for speculative investments, or at best with some vague idea of possible future use. Many of the buyers have never seen the land and have no idea of what they are buying. In fact, the lots in these subdivisions rarely have any investment value at all, as the testimony of thousands of disappointed owners who have tried to resell has amply demonstrated. Moreover, even a scoring few of these subdivisions have little to offer to justify their prices, which usually include hidden charges that may not become apparent for years. Many services are unable or unwilling to supply even basic services to individual lots, as places to live, many of these subdivisions are in many cases, the resources of the land itself and of nearby

Here's the Answer

Q - I am having a house built under an arrangement whereby certain parts of the interior will be left unfinished. I can do them myself and save part of the cost. Under the agreement, the inside walls of the basement are to be left in their natural masonry state. The builder suggests that they be covered with Portland cement paint. Can I use any other brand of cement paint? And is there anything special I should know about the application of the paint?

A - Yes, especially if you get the kind which has plastic foam insulation on the underside of the siding. Portland cement is not a brand name, but a type of cement. For your purpose, use that type, as recommended by the builder. It is ready for use by adding water and mixing according to the manufacturer's directions. It should not be applied with an ordinary paint brush, but with a scrub brush or special brush made for the purpose. The first coat should be scrubbed on the walls to fill the pores and completely seal the surface. The second coat provides extra sealing and can be in a decorative color. Do not paint the walls for at least a month or two after the house is built.

Q - How long does it take alkyd resin paint to dry before a second coat can be applied? A - About 24 hours. But you may not read the label instructions, which nearly always give you that information.

Q - I painted a room a few weeks ago. Now there are small marks at certain places on the walls. My neighbor says this condition is known as checking and that it comes from putting on a second coat before the first one is dry. Is this correct? A - That's the most common cause. If you decide to repaint, be sure to sandpaper the affected areas first.

Arab Oil Embargo Meet Boycotted

President Anwar Sadat failed to get all the Arab oil ministers to a meeting in Cairo to consider his proposal to end their oil embargo against the United States.

Instead, Algeria and Libya, who want to continue the embargo, forced a delay in the meeting until Wednesday and insisted it be held in the Libyan capital of Tripoli. Sadat's failure Sunday was considered a blow to his chances of getting the embargo lifted. The Cairo newspaper Al Akhbar said the holdouts had agreed to discuss Sadat's proposal in Tripoli. But some observers doubted the oil ministers would raise the issue unless it had been resolved at a higher level.

After a week of conflicting announcements about the place and time for the meeting, six oil ministers — from Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Abu Dhabi, Bahrain, Qatar and Egypt — were in Cairo Sunday. Algeria, Libya and Syria stayed away. The six who came met for 90 minutes and announced they would go to Tripoli. An Egyptian spokesman said there had been no talk of the oil embargo.

A communiqué said Egypt had offered to host the meeting because of a shortage of accommodations in Tripoli due to an international fair. But it said Libya had managed to provide facilities for the meeting. Sadat has championed an end to the ban in exchange for Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's assistance in getting Israeli troops to withdraw from the Suez Canal. But Algeria, Libya and Syria are holding out for the pullback of Israeli troops facing the Syrians on the Golan Heights. Tension remains high on that front.

Seminole voters will have the opportunity Tuesday to approve or reject bond issues totaling \$6,860,800 for four proposed new county facilities. Polling places will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

On the bond referendum ballot are a central county security complex (jail) near Five Points for \$3,853,000, a third floor addition to the Sanford courthouse judicial wing for \$1,800,000, a branch courthouse building in south Seminole for \$906,300 and a new agriculture center to replace an aging structure near Five Points for \$901,500.

The bond issues would be for up to 25 years. Fiscal agents say, based on estimated non-exempt taxable property valuation of \$25,000,000 in the county for 1974 and six per cent interest on the bonds, that total tax millage the first year for debt service on the four bond issues would be .722 mills or just over 72 cents per \$1,000 of non-exempt taxable property valuation.

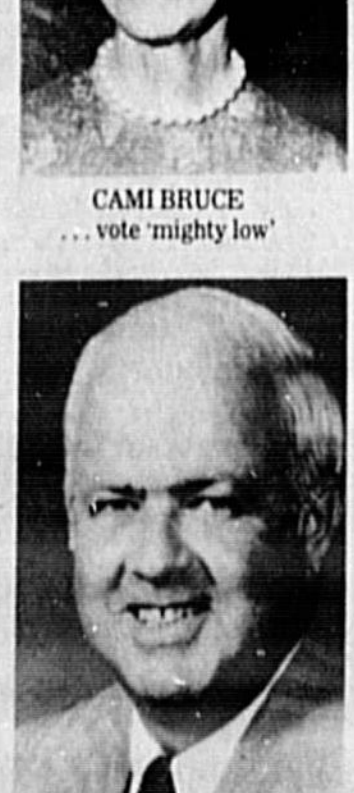

The Florida Highway Patrol in Lakeland said visibility of the highway was reduced by heavy fog and smoke from a muck fire at the time of the crash.

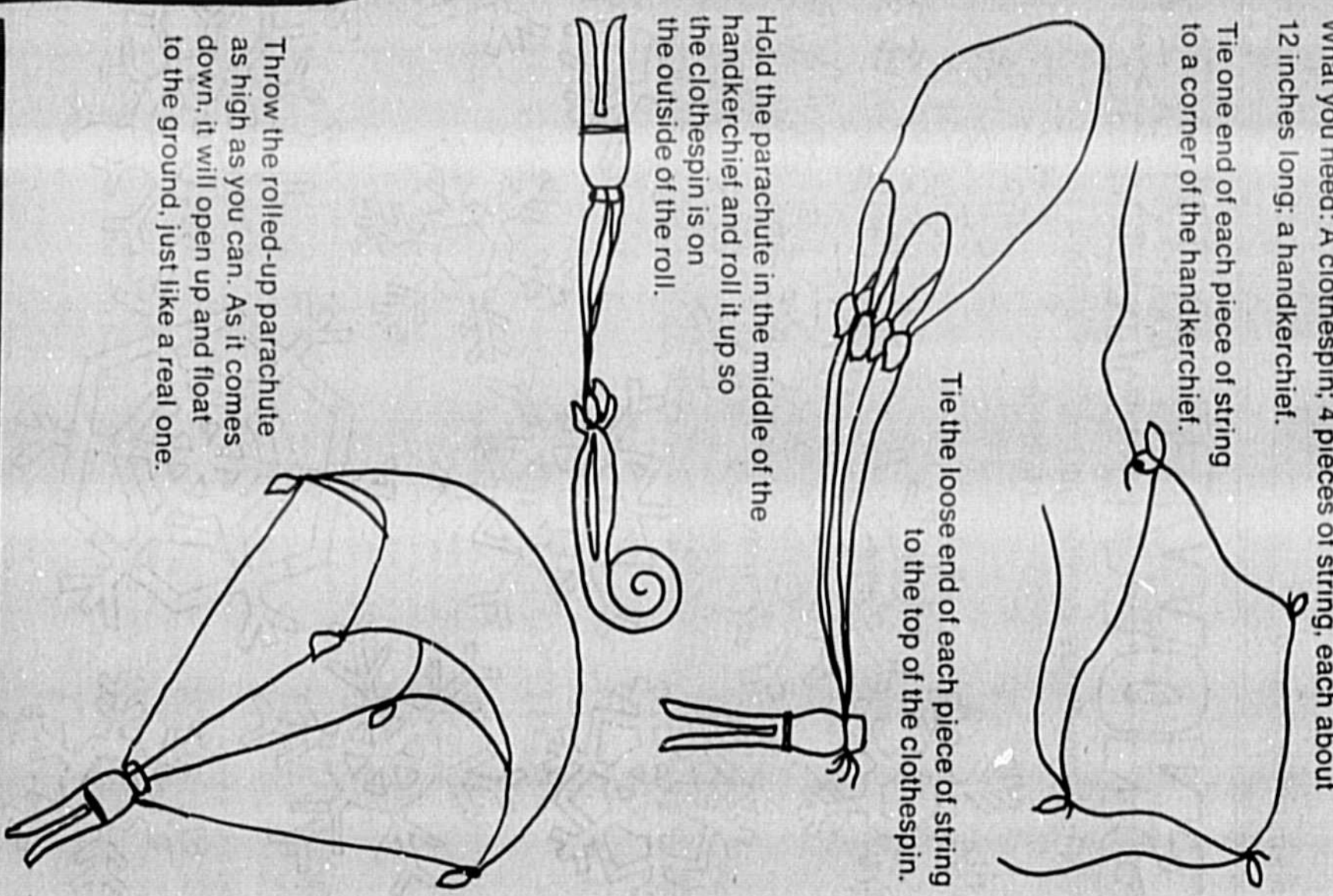
