

Guerrillas Storm U. S. Special Forces Camp; Repulsed

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese troops stormed a U. S. Special Forces camp near the Cambodian border today, inflicting moderate casualties on the 500 South Vietnamese irregulars and their families. The Communists left the bodies of 10 of their men when they were driven off after "many hours" of fierce fighting, the Vietnamese army reported.

In the air war, bad weather around Hanoi limited U. S. warplanes to strikes in the southern part of North Vietnam, with 134 missions flown against truck parks and storage areas. But Air Force pilots reported setting off 70 secondary explosions at one truck park just north of the demilitarized zone and believed they hit either surface-to-air missiles or artillery pieces.

The United States lost three more planes: an F4 Phantom shot down in the north with two crewmen missing, and a F100 Super Sabre shot down just south of Saigon, and a small observation plane shot down on a reconnaissance mission just below the demilitarized zone.

A total of 637 U. S. combat planes now have been reported over North Vietnam and 197 over South Vietnam. The attack on the Special Forces camp at Tong Le Chan, 54 miles northwest of Saigon, began with a rain of mortar shells. Then the Red soldiers,

believed to be the 165th North Vietnamese regiment, stormed the camp. Otherwise only small scattered actions were reported in the 34 allied ground operations that have been announced. While the weather was bad over Hanoi, it was clear over North Vietnam's southern panhandle, and Navy pilots from the carriers Oriskany and Constellation said they blasted two enemy torpedo boats out of the water, damaged another and

damaged 40 boats of other types. The U. S. cruiser St. Paul and the Australian destroyer Hobart shelled a North Vietnamese radar station on Hon Mat Island, 20 miles north of Vinh, and reported they set the area in flames.

In Kontum Province, 278 miles northeast of Saigon, a U. S. Command attributed the high number of missions to good weather over North Vietnam. Navy fliers raked the Ben Hai thermal power plant near

Vinh, which had been destroyed before but rebuilt. Other U. S. fliers hit a military headquarters 44 miles south of Hanoi, storage areas, truck parks, convoys and barges. The big B-52 struck twice Sunday in the northwest corner of South Vietnam near the Lao-tian border. The bombers hammered suspected enemy troop concentrations, bunkers, automatic weapons positions and infiltration routes northwest of the Marine base at Khe Sanh.

Medical Examiner Nears Reality Here

Implementation of a bill creating the office of a medical examiner for Seminole County can be expected before the budget for the new fiscal year is finalized, John Fitzpatrick, County Commissioner, vice chairman told The Herald today.

Duties normally handled by a medical examiner have been and are being taken care of by the three peace justices of the county currently except when the court appoints a special doctor as medical examiner.

Fitzpatrick stated possible legislation which is being considered for implementing the bill is contracting with the two local doctors already on the county payroll to do duties of the office on a fee per case basis.

Plans for the position are not included in the tentative budget approved by the Commission, but various funds are being set up for contingencies.

Two Sanford doctors are employed by the county to work with the Health Department and at the county jail. Salaries for the position occupied by Dr. Oville Barks and Dr. Wade Garner are set at \$3,000 annually.

Neither doctor was available for comment today on possible acceptance of the position.

Legislation authorizing appointment of a medical examiner was only one of a number of local bills submitted by the Legislature. Permissive legislation was also passed calling for creation of a jury commission with members to be appointed by the governor. As yet Gov. Claude Kirk has not announced appointments to the Commission. San has continued selecting jurors under court order.

756 Ready For Parochial Schools

Opening day of school, Sept. 5, at the two Catholic schools in Seminole County will see a minimum of 756 students. School officials of All Souls and St. Mary-Magalen Parochial Schools report today.

Rev. William Keane, pastor of All Souls, reports 302 students, five less than when school closed last year, have registered for school and 20 additional applications are being considered. "A few more students can be accepted for all classes except sixth grade," Father Keane said.

Average size of classrooms at All Souls in the new school year will be 36 and the maximum number in one of the grades is 45 students.

Oviedo To Vote Sept. 12

Councilman R. L. Ward called upon FCC officials to have its legal counsel send the city a letter giving its interpretation of the section in question and requested City Attorney G. Algeron Spicer to look into the matter.

Under the new proposed agreement the city will receive a one per cent bonus in franchise tax on the gross receipts of FCC within the city limits. It was estimated the

No Wiretapping Here--Salfi

Court rulings prohibiting use of wiretap evidence in courts of law were defended by State Attorney Dominick Salfi today.

Salfi in a statement to The Herald today declared, "I am a strong believer in individual rights and as such I feel personal rulings on wiretap evidence are correct and I will follow these rulings."

"However, I can understand the position of people in law enforcement. It is a tremendous problem to obtain evidence against organized crime under interpretations of laws on personal rights. I do not believe the public understands the war on crime we are involved with is a real war and not just a Perry Mason type drama," Salfi said.

"We can make law enforcement more intelligent, more diversified, more educated and a more respected group of people," Salfi remarked.

"The public can help law enforcement by being more aware of criminal elements, by watching out for and being more sophisticated as to how criminals operate. This alone will retard crime."

"The public has to be willing to sacrifice and cooperate with law enforcement to stop organized crime. If the public doesn't make the effort there is danger our society will turn into a Big Brother Society," the state attorney warned.

Allies Repel Red Attack On Special Forces Camp

SANFORD (AP) — American Green Berets and South Vietnamese irregulars believed outnumbered 4 to 1 repelled a North Vietnamese mortar and rocket attack on a U.S. Special Forces camp near the Cambodian border.

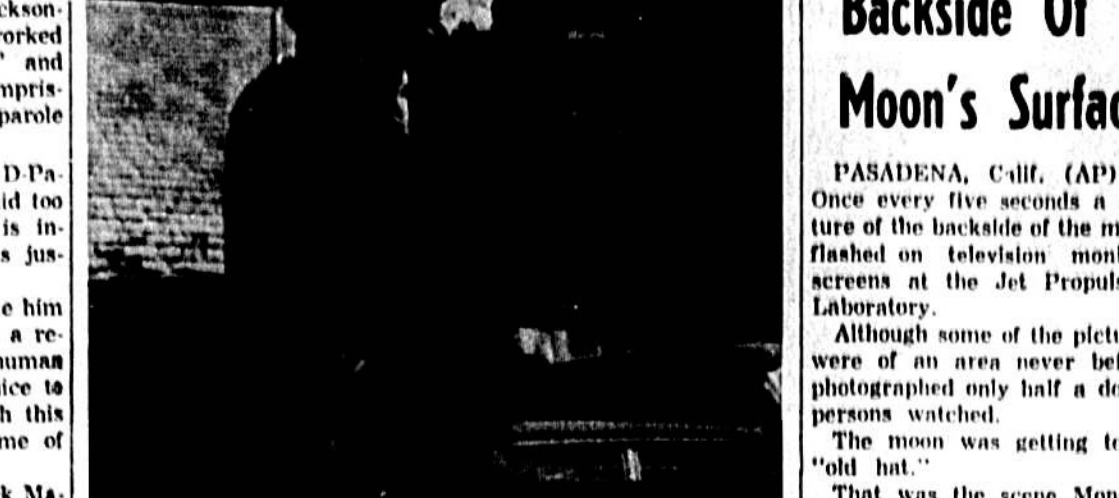

A member of the district who declined to be quoted directly reported, "Abell and Walker have been taking it off these commissioners for a long time and they have been threatening to quit for a long time."

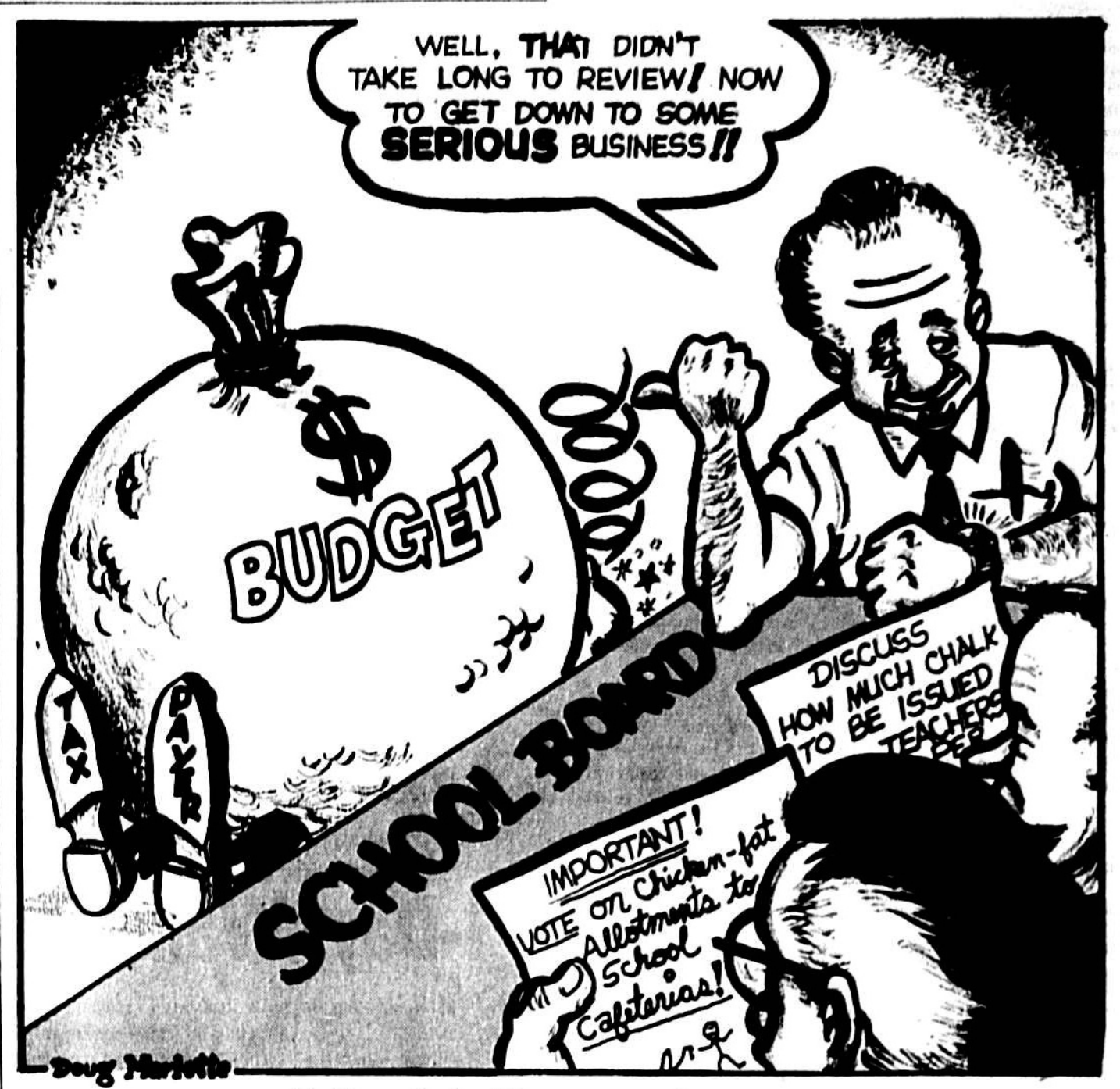
John Fitzpatrick, county commission vice chairman, in explaining the issue said today, "The problem occurred when the fire department purchased \$1,500 worth of new equipment without placing it out for bids."

"State statute requires expenditures of more than \$1,000 to be placed out for bid. The district's charter permits expenditure up to \$1,500 before bids are required, but the district must be governed by county requirements. It's all a misunderstanding," Fitzpatrick said.

Arab Refugees Under Pressure

The Jordanian government is putting pressure on Arab refugees to return to their homes in Israeli-occupied territory so Jordan's shaky economy won't be burdened with them.

King Hussein's government declared it was the "national and sacred duty" of refugees from the June war to return "to prevent the enemy from settling on our land and bringing in immigrants."

The Jordanian refugee committee warned that it would cut off aid to any refugee who returned home but refused to return to their homes in Israeli-occupied territory.

An estimated 200,000 Arabs fled to eastern Jordan, posing a serious threat to the Jordanian economy. Many have been reported unwilling to return while their homeland is occupied by the Israelis.

Life meanwhile returned to normal in the Arab sector of Jerusalem after a one-day bus, trolley and transportation strike protesting Israel's unification of the Arab and Israeli sectors of Jerusalem. The strike was completely effective, but shops and stores reopened today and buses and taxis began running again.
