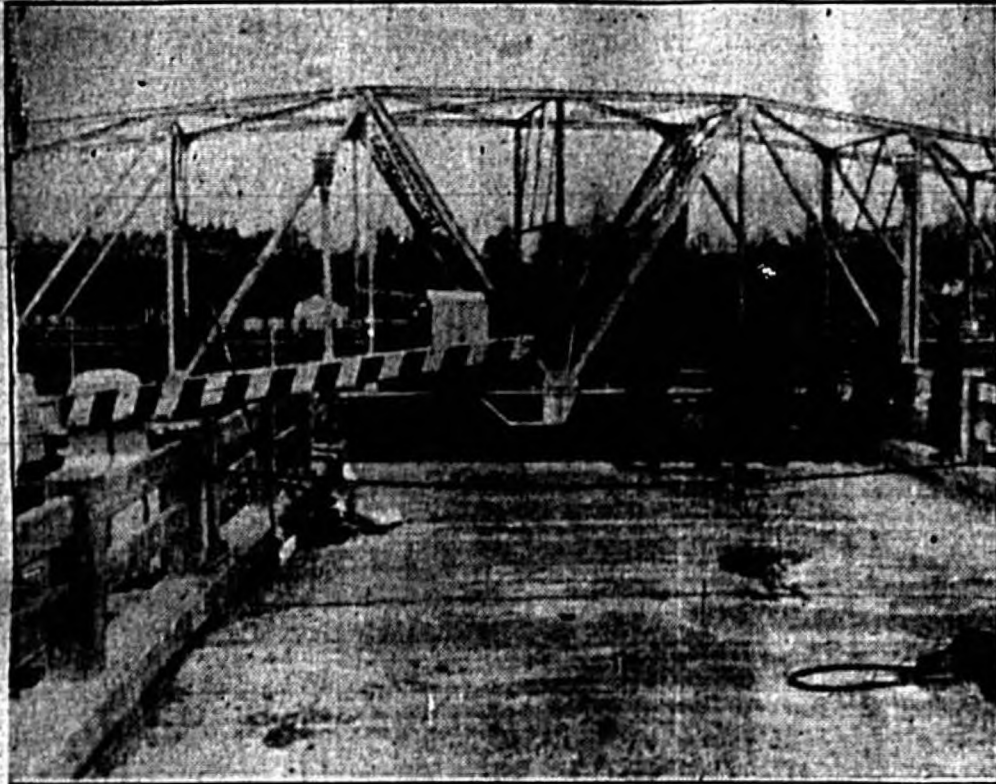

Freeze Delays at Fails To Damage Celery

Mercury Slides Down
To Lowest Levels
Of Season, Truck
Crops Wiped Out

To Be Cold Again Tonight

Growers Are Warned
Temperatures May
Drop To 27 Or 28

Celery will be delayed by unusually low temperatures which prevailed last night, but no lasting damage is done to the crops in the Sanford and Oviedo sections, according to reports received today.

In the opinion of P. N. Whitehurst of the Standard Growers there will be little shipping of celery out of this section before Jan. 20, the "big movement" of the crop not to begin before Feb. 1. H. J. Lehman, grower of celery in some sections, said it will all come out in a few days. He said in previous years he had celery laid flat on the ground by the cold, but in a few days it all straightened up, and he would know that anything that happened to it.

C. E. Dawson, county agent, received few reports this morning, but those that had come from the office indicated that the celery crop several miles from Sanford was about 27 degrees. The frost was 48 degrees.

It is believed that practically all of the truck crops not destroyed by previous cold waves were wiped out by last night's freeze. Mr. Dawson stated he would not give a nickel for all the celery in the county now. He said a small patch of celery in the county had been killed last night. Mr. Dawson said that the celery in the county this year had expressed the best crop since the freeze, but that the celery which escaped the freeze was possibly some of the best ever seen.

28 States Report 200 Deaths From Latest Cold Wave

CHICAGO, Dec. 27. —(AP)—Death, resulting directly or indirectly from the widespread and record cold wave, struck down residents of 28 states which contributed to the total of approximately 200. Traffic deaths were the most numerous, 86, but 55 died from exposure.

Many sections reported the wave the coldest for many years. It being the coldest Christmas season in the history of Kentucky. Meanwhile, a new snow carpet moved out of the north-west, carrying warmer weather for frost-bitten nation. It was due to whiten the same path over which the aero chills has been hanging. All but five states—California, Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Nevada—have had freezing temperatures.

Snowdrifts and ice still isolated some communities. Great South Bay, along the southern edge of Long Island, New York, is frozen over for the third time in 15 years, and coast guardmen rigged up ice scoops to carry food to families cut off from the mainland. No bread has been brought into Centerville, Maryland, since Christmas Eve, but heavy Yule stocks continued to hold out. Buses were blocked off from the South and mails could not get through. Mails are also delayed at Easton, Maryland.

115 Varieties Of Birds Found Near Sanford

Constant Increase In
Number Is Shown
By Yearly Census
For "Bird Lore"

One hundred and fourteen different kinds of birds were counted in Seminole County recently by enumerators for "Bird Lore" magazine. The 1935 census showed 96 varieties and the 1934 census listed 77 different kinds of birds in this section.

The area covered by the census enumerators extends from Sanford to the western shore of Lake Henry, including portions of the St. Johns River and the Lake Jessup marshes, and contiguous areas not exceeding 15 miles in diameter.

The different kinds of birds seen, and the number of the various varieties are as follows: Field-billed Grebe, 3; Cormorant, 4; Water Turkey, 4; Man-of-War Bird, 1 (rare in interior counties); Ward's Heron, 18; American Egret, 16; Snowy Egret, 5; Louisiana Heron, 42; Little Blue Heron, 46; Green Heron, 5; American Bittern, 1; Red-legged Black Duck, 1; Florida Duck, 4; Gallinule, 1; Pintail, 8; Green-winged Teal, 100; Blue-winged Teal, 500; Shoveler, 20; Scaup, 2000; Ring-necked Duck, 2; Canvasback, 20; Hooded Merganser, 2; Turkey Vulture, 41; Black Vulture, 67; Sharp-shinned Hawk, 7; Cooper's Hawk, 1; Red-tailed Hawk, 2; Red-shouldered Hawk, 5; Broad-winged Hawk, 1; Bald Eagle, 7; Marsh Hawk, 29; Duck Hawk, 1; Sparrow Hawk, 48; Bobcat, 1.

Expect. H u ndreds At Commemoration Of Dade Massacre

DADE CITY, Dec. 27. —(AP)—Hundreds of persons are expected here Saturday to participate in exercises commemorating the one hundredth anniversary of the Dade Massacre.

Harold Ickes, secretary of the interior, has been invited to attend the event at Dade Memorial Park, site of the battle in which Brevet Major Francis L. Dade's troop of 110 men was killed by the Seminole Indians. Only three of the company escaped death.

Members of the American Legion will take part in the program, along with representatives of the Legion Auxiliary, the Daughters of the American Revolution and United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Fifty Seminole Indians, descendants of the tribe that wiped out Dade's soldiers in the first formal battle of the Seminole Indian War, also will participate.

The war officially ended a year ago after 99 years of "hostilities." For some 75 years, however, there had been no fighting.

TVA Extension Over Half Of Continental United States Is Plan Put Forth By Norris

Mississippi Valley Authority Act To
Be Given Congress

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27. —(AP)—Senator Geo. W. Norris of Nebraska, father of the Tennessee Valley Authority Act and other new departures in government, said today he soon will offer a Congress proposal vaster than all.

At the coming session he will introduce a bill for Mississippi Valley Authority along lines of the TVA. It would embrace considerably more than half of continental United States—from the Allegheny foothills to the western Continental Divide, and from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico.

Senator Norris said that flood control would be the chief goal, but it also would direct development of navigation, irrigation, hydroelectric power, soil conservation and reforestation.

Northern Celery Grower Pleased With Local Setup

Massachusetts Man
Plans To Engage
In Business Here

Surprised at the extent of the celery industry in Seminole County and "dumbfounded" at the results, local growers generally approve. F. Smith of Westport, Mass., who has been conducting a personal investigation in this section, plans to return next fall and engage in the business here.

Mr. Smith grows celery in Massachusetts, near the Rhode Island line, but conditions here are so much better, he said today, that he hopes to either buy or lease celery land near Sanford and thus have a year-around business. He does not intend to dispose of his business in the North, he said, but would grow celery there in the summer and in Florida in the winter. He and his son, who have been stopping at the Montezuma Hotel, expected to leave today for their northern home. They said they had no desire to go any further south.

Plan To Buy Surplus Products Is Halted

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27. —(AP)—An order by Comptroller General J. R. McCarl halted plans for the Federal Surplus Commodity Corporation to buy surplus farm products for relief distribution.

McCarl held that the Administration could not use the 30 percent of gross customs receipts set aside for the AAA to buy farm products to be given to relief clients.

Wilcox Hopes To Get Funds For Air Forts

'Absolutely Pitable'
Is Position Now Of
Nation, Says Dis-
trict Representative

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27. —(AP)—Representative J. Mark Wilcox of Florida, author of the Air Base Act, plans an effort to obtain funds to start building the chain of giant defensive air bases around the nation's borders. Congressman Wilcox also said today he hopes Congress will provide more money, too, for army fighting planes and air corps personnel.

"I hope to see Congress at the coming session recognize the absolute necessity of providing funds for bringing GHQ air force up to the minimum of 980 planes recommended by the Newton D. Baker investigating board, for building two air bases, and for adding enough fliers and ground crew to man the planes and bases," Wilcox said.

He estimates \$75,000,000 would be needed to build the half dozen air centers contemplated in the Air Base Act passed at the last session and "make needed improvements to existing fields."

Huge Fund For Defense May Be Voted By Japan

ROBBERS ADVERTISE
To Get Combination
To Safe They Stole

BUFFALO, Dec. 27. —(AP)—Newspaper advertisements instead of explosives are being used to open stolen safes in western New York.

For the second time within a week safe robbers have asked owners to furnish combinations to stolen safes through advertisements in the "Buffalo Courier-Express." The combination will be published tomorrow morning by the Grange League Federation, from whose offices in Ellicottville the safe was stolen Sunday. The robbers promised not to damage the safe, which contained \$475 in cash and checks, if given the combination.

CHICAGO, Dec. 27. —(AP)—The criminal who "could have given Dillinger lessons" barely netted burial expenses from his ten years of gang leadership. This final note was entered today on the record of Henry "Midget" Farnese, who killed himself when caught.

Completing two months of investigation into Farnese's profits, Jack Ruben, public administrator, announced: "This miracle man's estate won't amount to \$2,000. Most of that is a piece of property he inherited."

France Prepares Another Plan For Fleet Limitation

PARIS, Dec. 27. —(AP)—Navy Minister Francois Pietri said today that France may propose a fleet limitation plan acceptable to all five nations when the London Naval Conference reconvenes next month. France feels as strongly as Japan against any attempt of "American and British navies to cause their pre-eminence to become permanent," he said.

Pietri said French and Japanese are not satisfied with the British proposals made just before the present conference recessed. He said that French delegates and experts are working on a new plan during the recess.

Myron Wellington Lovell, 79, died last night in his home at 615 Palmetto Avenue. Burial will be in the family plot in Lakeview Cemetery. The pall bearers will be the following past masters of the local Masonic lodge—C. J. Rumph, L. B. Hodgkins, John D. Gore, G. E. McKay, M. Y. Bledsoe and F. L. Miller.

Mr. Lovell was born in Moultrie, Mich., on May 9, 1856, and was a pioneer of Sanford, coming here more than 30 years ago. He was a former Sanford City clerk, and belonged to the Baptist Church. Mrs. Lovell died on Dec. 17.

growing anti-Japanese sentiment.

It was reliably reported from Rome last night that Mussolini had recalled approximately 13,000 naval specialists to the colors, and that the tension in Europe, has caused southeastern nations to speed military precautions.

Italian Navy Getting Ready LONDON, Dec. 27. —(AP)—Premier Mussolini's navy was reported in reliable Rome quarters last night to be preparing for action while Great Britain's army navy and air force are on the alert from Gibraltar in the Western Mediterranean to Aden in the Red Sea.

Approximately 13,000 naval specialists, most of whom formerly served in British powder rooms, were reported recalled for duty, said dispatches from the Italian capital.

Informed sources there believed the navy was preparing for possible "events" in case Anthony Eden, the new British foreign secretary, persuades the League of Nations to impose all sanctions on Italy.

The tension in Europe caused southeastern nations to speed up military precautions of their own, to tighten their alliances and to examine the possibilities of new agreements.

CCC Enrollments In State To Be Reduced

Director Redkey stated that Florida had been greatly benefited by the CCC program, not only from the many thousands of dollars spent in the management and operation of the CCC camps in the state but also from the improved morals of the young men who took advantage of the opportunity to lead clean and wholesome lives as members of the CCC.

Greyhound racing enthusiasts will recognize in this list the names of dogs that can be counted upon to provide the top thrills during the evening.

One of America's champion hound dogs, Backfielder, is an entrant as is Wild Penny, who established a five-thirtieths mile record at Memphis last season. Raymond Warren, rangy hound that can stop the three-sixteenths in 1.84 seconds, almost any night, also is a certain starter. This dog won the inaugural race at West Palm Beach last season, and his record during the 90-day race meeting which opens tomorrow night will be closely watched by those wise in racing circles.

Owner Of Oldest Chevrolet To Get New 1936 Model

Chevrolet's one millionth car of 1936 production is to be presented to the owner of the oldest Chevrolet licensed and in regular use in the United States, C. F. Proctor, local Chevrolet dealer. Proctor, local Chevrolet dealer, reports that he and other dealers in this locality have been asked to discover whether the oldest Chevrolet is in this territory. The one millionth Chevrolet built within the current year came off the assembly line at Flint, Mich., on Dec. 15. Just eight days after Chevrolet produced its eleven millionth car since the beginning of the company.

Presentation of the millionth car of the year—a 1936 Standard coach—will be made to the owner whose Chevrolet is discovered between Dec. 16, 1936 and midnight Jan. 15, 1937, to be the oldest model licensed and in regular service.

It is specified that to win, the old-timer Chevrolet must have been regularly licensed for operation during the current year, possessing its own 1935 license, tags issued before Dec. 1. In addition, it must be licensed as a passenger car, and be equipped with a complete passenger car body. It must bear the original engine and chassis numbers, legible and unaltered.

To enter a Chevrolet for con-

struction, the owner need only drive to any Chevrolet dealer, fill out a form and submit it for examination, receiving a blank book which he will report the engine and chassis numbers of the car to the Chevrolet Motor Company at Detroit, where the company's records will determine which is the very oldest in service.

COLD PREVENTION!!!

As we said in our previous article, cold prevention involves two principal factors: the specific infectious agent and our general resistance.

The respiratory tract contains a vast area.

Over this surface, as long as there is life, there flows a constant stream of air. We know the air carries dust, bacteria, and many foreign particles. Little of this, however, normally gets into the lungs proper.

Nature has provided us with filtering mechanisms. Thus, at the nostrils there are coarse hairs.

Just as we meet with the mucous membrane of the nose and throat, which is covered with a sticky substance, mucus, secreted by the cells. The mucous membrane also has cells with fine, whip-like projections which by their upward motion continue to sweep the respiratory tract clear of the secreted mucus, with its

entangled bacteria and foreign substances.

The mucous membrane extends down the trachea to the finest points of the bronchial system.

It is important that this protective mechanism, that is, the mucous membrane of the upper respiratory tract, should not be injured. It can be injured by excessive smoking, by the introduction into the nose of different kinds of sprays and drops, and by the unassisted inhalation of vaporized and other forms of medications.

It is especially worth noting that wet feet tend to lower resistance.

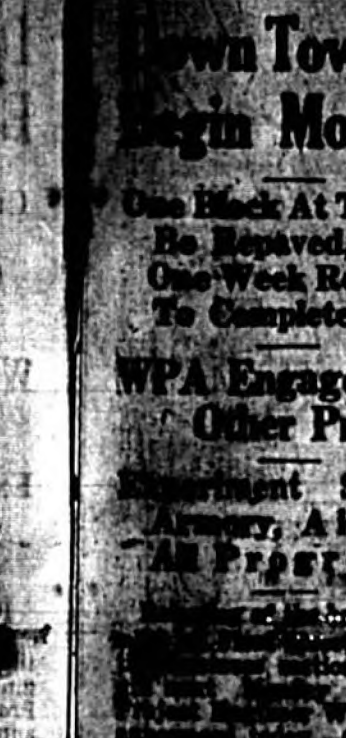

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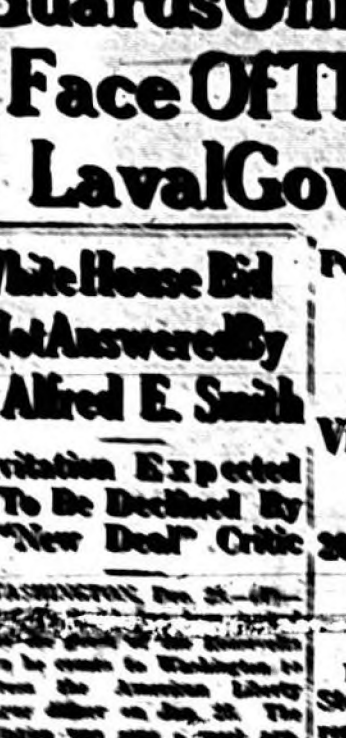


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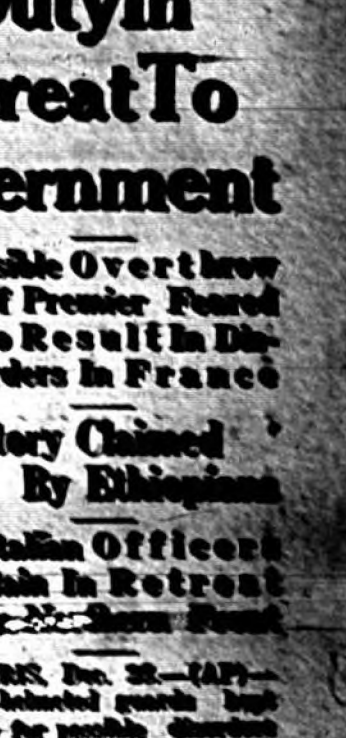
