Spending Plan Up By 8.6 Percent

# Sanford Scheduled To Adopt Budget, Lower Tax Rate

The Sanford City Commission is slated tonight to adopt a proposed \$8.5 million budget for fiscal year 1982-83.

And if the commission follows the advice of City Manager W.E. "Pete" Knowles and City Clerk and Treasurer Henry Tamm, a proposed tax rate of \$4.369 per \$1,000 assessed property value will also be adopted.

The \$4.369 rate represents a reduction of 26.6 percent over the current year's \$5.952 tax rate.

The commission is also expected to set a public hearing on the tentative budget for Sept. 13 at 7 p.m.

The proposed tax rate means a person owning a home with an assessed value of \$60,000, who has filed for the \$25,000 homestead exemption will pay city property taxes of \$152.92 and opposed to \$208.32 a year ago for a savings of \$55.40.

There are two reasons for the proposed reduction in the tax rate for the new year in Sanford, according to Knowles.

First, the city is to receive more than \$500,000 in revenues from the one-cent increase in the state sales taxes. Secondly, Sanford's taxable property value has risen from \$203.7 million to \$250.6 million in the past year.

Included in the \$46.9 million increase in the city's tax base was \$15 million worth of new construction.

Knowles said the new value of the tax roll is much higher than expected.

Forty-four percent of the real property in the city is tax exempt, the highest percentage among the county's seven

But, the 44 percent total is 3 percent less than a year ago. Tax exempt status is given to government, church-and fraternal-owned buildings. In addition, homeowners have homestead exemptions from taxes ranging from \$5,000 to

The city's tentative budget for 1982-83 is \$8.5 million, up from the current year's \$7.8 million, an increase of 8.6 percent. The total budget includes: general government, \$5.5 million, up from \$4.9 million; refuse department, \$660,716, up from \$651,999; and utilities, \$2.4 million, up from \$2.23 million.

The city will receive \$566,985 in the new year in revenues from the one-cent sales tax increase. Forty percent of those

revenues must, by law, be used to reduce property taxes. The budget also includes some \$384,654 from federal revenue

During the 1982-83 fiscal year, the city will spend some

\$132,252 for a capital improvements program. The commission will meet at 7 p.m. at City Hall, 300 N. Park

### School Board **Eyes Union** Demands, New Budget

The Seminole County School Board will begin its review of the proposed \$111.7 million budget for fiscal 1982-83 tonight at

The meeting will be held in the School Board office, 1211 Mellonville Ave., Sanford.

School hoard negotiators will also be meeting this week at Lake Mary High. School with union representatives to work out wage and benefit levels for the coming year. The Seminole Education Clerical Association will meet with board negotiators today.

On Tuesday, the teachers union, the Seminole Education Association, will be at the bargaining table. Sessions with the Seminole County School Bus Drivers Association and the Non-Instructional Personnel of Seminole County Board of Public Instruction Association Inc. are scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday respectively.

The tentative budget - up from the current \$97.7 million spending plan which is expected to approve it for advertising purposes only. The first public hearing on the budget is slated for July 21. A second public hearing is planned for September and ratification should come later that month.


Included in the budget is a reduction in the tax rate from \$8.27 per \$1.000 at assessed property value to \$6.82 per \$1,000 value. The amount and value of taxable property is up to \$3,425,525,759, an increase of \$797.5 million over fiscal

Also included in the budget is a special levy for \$4.5 million which will be used to build a new elementary school in Sanford and for additional construction at Lawton Elementary School in Oviedo.

School Superintendent Robert Hughes has recommended additional personnel in several areas. Two half-time counselors and a media specialist have been made full-time to work in the grade schools, and 19 instructional aides and 22 clinical aides have been added. Additionally, more personnel have been recommended for maintenance, operations, transportation and computer services.

In the negotiations, the only remaining items left between the board and the clerical association are wages and benefits. The clerical union is seeking a 15 percent hike in the base salary from \$6,282 to \$7,228 annually.

The teachers' union has also asked for a 15 percent raise in the base yearly salary from \$11,500 to \$13,225.

## Teen-Ager Killed While **Trying To Help Friends**

An Altamonte Springs youth, described by his father as "a very popular boy who was always doing something for someone," was killed Sunday while trying to help a stranded motorist.

Danny Ray Cook, 18, of 1220 E. Notre Dame Drive, was killed at about 2:45 a.m. when he was struck by a hit-and-run motorist along State Road 436 near Apopka.

Meanwhile Eliezer Mattei, 27, of Zellwood, is free on \$1,000 bond from the Orange County jail today following his arrest on charges of leaving the scene of an accident resulting in death or injury in connection with Cook's death.

Troopers said Cook was struck by a car while walking eastbound in the outside traffic lane of State Road 436 near Lake Pleasant Road. The motorist fled the accident scene, but was apprehended a short time later near Casselberry,

"Danny Ray and his friend, Chris Thompson, had gone in their two trucks to help a couple of girls they knew who had gotten their car stuck along the highway," Cook said.

"Anyway, Danny Ray was walking to the car when a car hit him, then took off. Chris jumped back into his truck and went after the car, ended up wrecking his truck and didn't catch the guy."

Cook said Thompson was not seriously injured.

"Danny Ray had many friends and was very popular around here," said Cook about his youngest of five children.

"He went to Lake Brantley High School, but has been working for me at my business, Cook's Hauling company, (in Altamonte Springs)," Cook said. "He's lived here about all of his life. We moved here from Florence, S.C., where Danny Ray was born, when he was about 11 months old."

## Casselberry To Place Iron Bridge On Hold

Casselberry Mayor Owen Sheppard and Utilities Director Ed Kueling will recommend the City Council table any action on the city's participation in the Iron Bridge Sewage Treatment Expansion Project at tonight's 7:30 council meeting at City Hall, 95 Lake Triplet Drive.

Sheppard said today the recommendation is a matter of dollars and cents and that participation in an engineering study on proposed expansion of the Iron Bridge Plant just doesn't add up for Casselberry.

The sewage treatment plant, located near Oviedo, currently handles about 28,000 gallons of sewage per day. Plans to increase the capacity by 16,000 gallons currently are being considered by Seminole County, Orange County, Orlando, Casselberry, Maitland, Winter Park and Winter Springs, which all hold current sewage capacity shares in the plant.

Sheppard said original estimates for Casselberry's participation in an engineering study on the proposed expansion was \$25,000. But Sheppard said increasing costs for the study and increased costs of eventual expansion are too heavy a burden for Casselberry.

"The point is the cost factor is getting out of hand," Sheppard said.

"The costs might be alright for a big entity to handle, but as this thing progresses our pro-rata share of the engineering study and the expansion could run between \$2 and \$4 million."

Sheppard said he felt the costs were just too heavy for Casselberry to handle.

"What throws a cloud over the whole Iron Bridge project is that there's no federal participation in it. That means the entities involved have to carry the full debt load.

"That might be possible for Orange County and Orlando to handle; they can unload the debt load on big developers but we can't," said Sheppard.

Last week, Kucling began negotiations with the city of Maitland to purchase that city's sewage plant and Sheppard added the city may consider spending money to upgrade its own sewage plant for more sophisticated and higher grades of sewage treatment and increased capacity.

# Sanford Chamber Committee Backs Effort To Buy Marshlands

The only way to save the St. Johns River from a lingering death is to provide natural storage of river water in marshlands along its winding route.

That is the belief of the St. Johns Task Force of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce which went on record this morning endorsing the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) plan to purchase \$9 million to \$10 million worth of marshlands in the next year.

And the committee, led by former state senator Douglas Stenstrom will take its recommendation to the Chamber's Board of Directors for its approval at a special 8 a.m. meeting

If the Chamber board backs its committee's stand, the message will be passed along to the SJRWMD board of directors which meets Wednesday to consider next year's hudget.

At that time, the district will decide whether to increase property taxes to raise some \$5 million in the new year to acquire the marshlands.

The board is also slated to receive some \$4.3 million in state money from the "Save Our Rivers" Act to buy wetlands.

The board is currently levying a tax of 12.1 cents per \$1,000 assessed value of property in 19 counties bordering or near the river. It can levy a maximum tax of 37.5 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

Mike Gray, Seminole County's representative on the SJR-WMD board, said earlier that the board instructed the district staff to hold the line on the numbers of employees and operating expenditures to the same level as the current year.

Thus, Gray said, the district's proposed tax rate will not be known until after the staff report is presented Wednesday. Stenstrom told the committee today that the University of Florida has confirmed what SJRWMD engineers already knew, that the "single biggest influence on the flow of the river will be the acquisition of marshlands."

Fran Pignone of Orlando, chairman of the district board, told the task force that some board members prefer "lowballing" the budget - including only \$1 million annually to be used for purchasing the wetlands.

She said that property owners of wetlands have offered the district some \$10 million to \$12 million worth of property at reasonable prices and this land should be purchased.

Mrs. Pignone said Seminole County, through its Chamber task force over the two years of its existence, has led the river restoration effort. Stenstrom also noted that the use of the river for commercial

and sport fishing and boating is important to the county's and

state's economy. J.T. Turnipseed, president of the Friends of the St. Johns, which has acted as a watch dog over the river for several years, said fresh water sport fishing is a \$1 billion a year in--By DONNA ESTES dustry in Florida.

### Senate Is Tackling New Balanced Budget Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) - With the federal deficit steadily climbing, interest is mounting on Capitol Hill for a proposed constitutional amendment that would require a balanced budget. Passage remains uncertain, however.

The Senate planned to open debate on the measure today, while President Reagan - one of its supporters - planned to host a White House luncheon for key congressional backers.

Reagan "wants to get a feeling from the leadership" about the status of the proposal, which has 61 sponsors in the Senate and 218 in the House, said White House spokesman Larry Speakes.

### Cool Dip In Baptistery

DETROIT (UPI) - Police plan to file breaking-andentering charges against a 24-year-old man found skinny-dipping in a church baptistery.

The Rev. Tony Kinsler, assistant pastor at the Apostolic Church, said he found the nude man immersed in the baptismal font when he arrived to prepare for evening services Friday.

Kinsler, noticing the church had been stripped of expensive sound equipment and musical instruments, slipped out and called police.

Police said they expect to charge the 24-year-old intruder with breaking and entering.

### Japan Speeds Up Auto Work

DETROIT (UPI) - Assembly line speedups at Nissan Motor Co, in Japan reportedly force workers to cut short coffee breaks and work past the end of their shifts to maintain high productivity levels.

An article released Sunday in the August editions Mother Jones, a San Francisco-based publication, claims most Nissan workers are afraid of speaking out against working conditions for fear of endangering job promotions.

Unlike the picture of dedicated workers often presented by the Japanese auto industry, the article maintained there is a "dark side to the Japanese industrial miracle."

A Sanford police officer, injured Sunday while responding to an emergency call, was listed in satisfactory condition today at the Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford.

Patrolman Gregory Harrell, 27, received "a bump on the head and some bruises," after his police cruiser was hit in the side as he drove through the intersection of U.S. Highway 17-92 and Airport Boulevard at about 2 p.m., the Florida Highway

Police said Harrell, who has worked with the police department since Oct. 21, 1981, was responding to a call concerning an injured woman at the Cavalier Motor Inn, at 3200 S. Orlando Drive. As he proceeded through the intersection with emergency lights flashing and siren on, his car was struck by another vehicle reportedly driven by Angel M. Pouguez, 36, of 7737 Lady Frances Way, Orlando, troopers said.

Troopers said Pouguez apparently did not see or hear the emergency vehicle when she drove her 1978 Buick into the intersection, injuring Harrell and causing about \$1,800 in damages to her vehicle and about \$1,400 in damages to the police car, troopers said.

Troopers said no charges have been filed pending further investigation of the accident.

### **IN BRIEF** Florida To Spray Paraquat On Profitable Pot Fields

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Clandestine fields of marijuana, reported to be Florida's second largest cash crop, will be attacked with poisonous, plantkilling paraguat, state officials say.

Tanker trucks and agents back-packing spray tanks may begin spraying fields in the Panhandle or northcentral Florida this week. It will be the first large-scale use of the deadly weed-killer to destroy marijuana fields in the United States.

The use of paraquat by federal Drug Enforcement Administration agents on Mexican marijuana fields in the 1970s caused a panic among American pot smokers fearful of contracting fibrosis. But Florida officials said last week they are deadset on their plan to use the

### Crib Death To Blame?

BLOUNTSTOWN (UPI) - The fifth child to die in two years while in the care of a 19-year-old babysitter may have died from Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), a medical examiner says.

Like the deaths of four other infants, plus three who became seriously ill, all of them cared for by babysitter Christine Falling, the death last month of 2month-old Travis DeWayne Coleman has puzzled authorities.

Experts have been unable to come up with any connection between the deaths of the five infants since 1980 and the young woman who was the babysitter in all the cases. No charges have been filed against her. However, a Florida Department of Law Enforcement homicide specialist in Tallahassee was named late last week to a task force investigating the deaths.

### Sinkhole Plug May Not Hold

GAINESVILLE (UPI) - It took 10 tons of reinforced concrete and 100 tons of dirt to fill the 50-foot-deep sinkhole in an apartment house parking lot and geologists say the \$20,000 job may not work.

The fill-up job was completed Saturday and today a Lakeland contractor specializing in such repair jobs begins drilling 40-foot-deep holes alongside the Maracaibo Apartments. Concrete then will be poured into the holes to make a 2-to-4-feet underground "concrete curtain" to protect the apartment building from caving in.

The sinkhole opened last Monday night. Within minutes it swallowed a 1982, \$11,000, fully-insured Oldsmobile. Within days, the crater had grown to 25feet in diameter and 50-feet in depth and had come to

within five feet of a building in the complex. Dr. Daniel Spangler, a University of Florida geologist, said filling the hole could prove as effective as "putting a Bandaid on it" because the ground in the area may be riddled with caverns like the one that developed into the Maracaibo sinkhole.

### Cease-Fire In Beirut Holding, **But Israel Impatient**

Israeli and Palestinian guns were silent today after the heaviest shelling of the 36-day war in Lebanon took at least 75 lives and buried scores of civilians under rubble in both east and west Beirut.

The sixth cease-fire of the war appeared to be holding but Israeli officials expressed impatience and doubt about the possibility of a diplomatic solution.

Israel Television said ministers believe the Palestine Liberation Organization, with its 6,000 guerrillas trapped in west Beirut, is stalling and has deceived the United States and Lebanon into believing it intends to evacuate the city.

### **OPEC Countries Are Split**

VIENNA, Austria (UPI) - An emergency meeting of OPEC broke up in discord, failing to solve production disputes and raising fears among oil ministers that Saudi Arabia - the biggest U.S. supplier - might force down prices by raising production. The two-day meeting to review the cartel's 17.5

million barrel per day production ceiling, individual national quotas and prices for different grades of oll was suspended "until further notice" late Saturday. As the 13 delegations to the Organization of

Petroleum Exporting Countries left Vienna Sunday, several ministers said the current production ceiling will remain, as will the base price of \$34 a barrel.

### Intruder Talks To Queen

LONDON (UPI) - An intruder evaded Buckingham Place security, entered Queen Elizabeth's bedroom and chatted with the unruffled monarch for 10 minutes — the fifth known breach of security in 12 months, a London newspaper reported today.

The Daily Express, identifying neither the date nor the intruder, said the breakdown in protection was certain to be attacked in Parliament this week and could cause heads to roll in the government and Scotland Yard.

The newspaper did not make a connection to a 31year-old man twice found in Buckingham Palace. Michael Fagan was caught in the palate Friday and Saturday. He was ordered held until July 19 when he appeared for the June 7 theft of half a bottle of wine from the royal residence.

# Reagan Seeks Support To End

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan. following an 11-day California vacation, is back at the White House today seeking support from world leaders in resolving the crisis in

Reagan said Sunday there were "reasons for some optimism" for an early settlement to end the fighting in Lebanon between Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization, but said the United States has set no deadline for an agreement.

The president also revealed that he sent messages to leaders in the Middle East and western Europe, asking them to lend their efforts to bring about a permanent cease-fire.

Reagan said he sent one letter to Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak, but refused to identify who else he contacted or say exactly what he requested any of them to do.

"We have been in communications on this; it is still too touchy to talk about," Reagan told reporters while en route from his California ranch to the White House aboard Air Force

In a brief question and answer session, Reagan said while there is some optimism about ending the fighting, "We've been disappointed before."

He also said he is standing by his conditional offer to send U.S. Marines into Israeli-encircled Beirut to help escort out members of the

Asked if the American people are wary of sending troops into a war zone, Reagan said, "I would expect them to be. I'm wary myself. That's why we want to impose certain conditions."

Conditions include a number of safety precautions, having the U.S. troops as part of a multinational force and agreement by all parties to a peace package.

Time magazine reported Sunday that Reagan warned Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin to stop interfering with U.S. peace efforts in Lebanon or the United States might negotiate directly with the PLO.

In another report, Newsweek magazine said Reagan has insisted that if he sends U.S. peacekeeping forces to Lebanon, Begin must take immediate steps to grant autonomy to Palestinians in Israeli-occupied territories.

A White House spokesman said, "no conment" on both reports, but a source with knowledge of Reagan's communication with Begin said it was his understanding that the president issued no warning about dealing with the PLO.

Reagan Tuesday plans to brief Republican and Democratic congressional leaders about the Middle East crisis, particularly his proposal to send in U.S. troops.

# Longwood Eyes Child Care Center

For the second straight week, facilities dealing with children will be one of the main agenda items when the Longwood City Commission gathers for its regular meeting at City Hall, 301 West Warren Avenue, tonight at 7:30.

The commission will consider a Conditional Use Permit request for the operation of a child care center. Last week, the commission denied by a vote of 4-1 a Conditional Use Permit request for the operation of a video game parlor in the 434 Center.

Several commissioners cited increased parking problems in the shopping center and a growing problem of teenage hangouts in the area as the basis for their denial.

The commission is expected, however, to approve Karen A. Cook's Conditional Use Permit request to open a child care center on property located on the Southwest corner of Bay and Wayman Streets next to the ComBank Branch Office on State Road 434. The property is currently zoned Commercial-2 and houses an adjacent insurance office. Under Commercial-2 zoning, a facility, such as a child care center, would be permitted, pending approval by the city commission.

Two other zoning matters also highlight tonight's agenda. Alfons and Emma Jung are seeking the commission's adoption of Ordinance 553, amending Ordinance 495, which would change the current zoning of their property located south of Wildmere Avenue off of State Highway 17-92 from R1-A Residential-single family housing, to R3 Residential-multi

The commission also will hold a public hearing to consider Ordinance 554, amending Ordinance 548, which would change the zoning of the property owned by the Jungs to coincide with Longwood's Comprehensive Land Use Map.

Other commission business tonight will include a status report on the function of City Attorney Marvin Rooks in relation to the City's Codes Enforcement Board. Commission

members have been concerned in recent weeks that Brooks was being placed in a compromising position by acting as both prosecutor and legal advisor for the board. The city is considering hiring a part-time prosecutor to enforce city codes.

At last week's regular meeting the commission instructed Rooks to obtain an opinion from the Florida Attorney General's Office if his dual role could be considered a conflictof interest.

The commission also will hear a report from City; Administrator David Chacey on the status of a traffic signal at: the intersection of County Road 427 and Church Avenue.

### Two Down, One To Go

Better late than never. The patient taxpayer will finally see the effect of Step Two of the 25 percent tax cut pushed through Congress last year by President Reagan.

The 5 percent reduction in tax rates that took effect last Oct. 1 is followed today by a 10 percent reduction, and if Mr. Reagan can keep Congress from doing even more harm to his economic program, there will be another 10 percent reduction a year from now.

The current tax cut could not come at a better time, even if the reason was not foreseen by the supply-side economists who argued successfully for the tax-cut program in the first place. Taxpayers will be able to keep \$39 billion which otherwise would have been siphoned off to Washington during the coming year.

Coupled with the \$11.5 billion in Social Security benefit increases, there is bound to be a favorable effect on the gloomy business statistics of a recession that has been deeper and longer than most economists anticipated when the tightmoney policies of the Federal Reserve began dampening economic growth. A spurt in consumer spending will not in itself turn the economy around, but the tax cut is another major step in bringing the private sector of the economy into better balance with the tax-hungry public sector.

It is disappointing to the Reagan administration, and politically alarming, that Reaganomics at this point is resembling a car with a dead battery. The design did not call for an unemployment rate nudging 10 percent in mid-1982, or interest rates still not low enough to regenerate such hard-hit sections of the economy as housing.

But what drained the power out of the battery? The president, we must recall, asked originally for a 10 percent tax cut that would have taken effect on Jan. 1, 1981, with succeeding cuts adding up to a 30 percent reduction. He had to settle for a delayed and watered-down tax cut program, and for less dramatic cuts in federal spending to go with them. It is hard to say where the economy might be today if the original blueprint had been


Only with staunch White House resistance was today's tax-cut not modified or delayed for the sake of giving Congress more leeway in approaching its next budget. As it is, the budget resolution finally adopted June 23 carries a projected deficit of \$104 billion. Congressional leaders say they expect an "uphill battle" on the spending side to keep the deficit within those bounds when the actual budget is adopted in the

Mr. Reagan had to compromise on the size and timing of his tax cut. He has had to compromise on some of his more ambitious hopes for paring back spending programs. When even a \$104 billion deficit is said to rest on optimistic economic assumptions, he cannot afford to compromise if appropriation bills reaching his desk threaten the budget ceilings now adopted.

There was mostly rhetoric and round figures in the debate on the budget resolution which occupied Congress until now. Congressional committees writing appropriation bills must now get down to specifics. So must the President, even if it means a season of veto confrontations between the White House and Capitol Hill.

# Spindle City Is Revived

COHOES, N.Y. - The problem of distinctive old American cities adapting to radically changed economic conditions has been solved very successfully in this fascinating community overlooking the final stretch of the Mohawk River,

Cohoes holds an important place in the history of America's industrial revolution. On this site, where the Mohawk ends its journey to the Hudson River, the spectacular falls provided abundant water power for the first phase of America's industrialization. By 1825, the historic Erie Canal was completed and a network of power canals built. In the mid-1830's came the first textile mill, utilizing water turbines. They drove machinery by means of a system of gears, shafts and pulleys.

Enormous mills were built before, during and after the Civil War, handsome, industrial structures which still exist and, in many cases, found adaptive uses in the late 20th century. The 19th century mills made Cohoe the principle cotton knitting center in the nation and earned the city the title of "Spindle City."

The textile mills required a large labor force, and the city became the New World home of immigrant workers from many European countries. The mills provided these workers with housing, splendid brick buildings which continue to serve as housing and which are appreciated by a new generation for their handsome design and JEFFREY HART durability.

The centerpiece of the Harmony Mills district, the so-called mastadon mill, is a giant, Victorian structure, once the largest cotton mill in the country. The prevailing mansard roof is the most significant feature of the Harmony Mills. The mills are eminently deserving of preservation and are still in use by a variety of textile concerns.


With the coming of electric power early in the 20th century, the mills and the town went into decline. The mills were liquidated in the great depression of the 1930's.

For many years, Cahoes slumbered amid its former glories. Hard times preserved the town's superb architectural heritage,

In recent years Cohoes has come alive with much of its former glory refurbished. The city has a commercial rehabilitation program which has worked wonders. A store owner in Cohoes or a prospective commercial property owner can obtain up to \$5,000 from the city to restore the exterior of an old business structure. The result is a downtown that is attractive, unusual, and very much alive and well. Cohoes is an illustration of what can be done by way of reviving a moribund old business district. In time one can be sure, Cohoes will be a magnet for Americans who appreciate distinctive communities.

The rehabilitation of old cities has great importance for the nation. The country's stock of quality residential and commercial buildings is depleted. The high cost of new construction, in a time of souring interest rates, makes it all the more important to restore and renovate older buildings, which often are of a quality superior to what can be constructed today.

Rehabilitation, such as Cohoes has carried out, serves the commercial needs of the country and the need for preserving the American heritage.

### Politics Of Tl The Freeze

White House political strategists are gleeful over the results of the Democrats' recent mini-convention in Philadelphia. The Democrats emerged with tired candidates and a major political blunder.

Two all-too-familiar figures ended up as front-runners for the 1984 nomination: Ted Kennedy and Walter Mondale. Glenn, Cranston, Hart and the rest utterly failed to emerge as heavyweight contenders. But Kennedy and Mondale are known quantities, shop-worn, tled to a dated liberal rhetoric.

Even more delightful from a Republican perspective was the major error the Democrats made in tying themselves officially to the nuclear-freeze idea.

Superficially, this looks like good politics, but when you read past the first line on the polis the freeze is a loser, and doubly so when you consider the special problems of the Democratic Party.

What tempted the Democrats is that top line on the polls: some 72 percent favor a nuclear freeze. That, obviously, was the political attraction for the hungry Democrats

But this huge majority melts like snow in the spring when the poll asks whether the freeze should be unilateral, whether it should be verifiable, and whether those being polled would still support it if the freeze resulted in Soviet nuclear superiority.

On the last point, "What if a nuclear freeze would result in the Soviet Union having somewhat greater nuclear strength?" here, that 72 percent shrinks to 30 percent, while 60 percent say that they would oppose a nuclear freeze under those circumstances.

On the verification issue, the shrinkage is even more dramatic. "What if either the

United States or the Soviet Union could cheat without being detected?"

Only 18 percent, the hard-core disarmers, favor a freeze in that case, while 71 percent

Now the Democrats worded their freeze plank carefully, calling for a "mutual and verifiable" freeze, but the dynamics of the anti-nuclear movement almost certainly will carry it beyond that sort of prudent position.

The recent demonstrations in New York City attracted some 500,000 people, described correctly as coming from all walks of life and representing a variety of political viewpoints - but the auspices of the demonstration and its principal orators were leftist. Ramsey Clark and Bella Abzug were all over the place, as were a conglomeration of the leftist

groups. There was no conservative or even moderate representation among the

organizers or among the platform speakers. The central thrust of the anti-nuclear movement, beyond that unilateral disarmament. And that is a political loser. The American people aren't about to go in for suicide.

Now, politically speaking, this is just the kind of poisoned plant the Democrats do not need. For electoral success, the Democrats need to move toward the center, toward practical lunch-bucket issues. For electoral

success they also need to stress patriotism. But the nuclear-freeze issue and especially the cast of characters now associated with is is all too reminiscent of McGovernism.

In order to achieve such a consummation, all they have to do is make the nuclear freeze their political centerplece.

### Starch Blocker Dispute

NEW YORK (UPI) - Uncle Sam's watchdogs in the Food and Drug Administration are waiting to hear from about 125 manufacturers and distributors of starch blockers — the latest substance overweight people reach for in their endless search for a silver bullet against obesity.

On July 1, the FDA sent a letter to powers in the starch blocker industry asking that shelves be cleared of the pills made from raw kidney and raw northern beans.

Bruce Brown, FDA spokesman, said once manufacturers provide information on the safety and efficacy of starch blockers, it will be decided, on a case-by-case basis, which starch blockers can be offered for sale.

The deadline for clearing the shelves is 10 days after receipt of the letter. Sometime early this week for most. "If the shelves aren't cleared," Brown said,

"we will resort to seizures and court injunctions. "Our number one purpose with that letter is to clear the shelves. Before the product goes

back on the shelves, safety and efficacy must be proved." So what's wrong with starch blockers? And

what are they anyway and how do they work? Here's the backdrop:

-Starch blockers haven't killed anyone. But the FDA claims it has received reports of

bad cramps, diarrhea and vomiting. -The FDA is also concerned over starch blockers being bad for diabetics, perhaps leading them to miscalculate caloric intake

and upsetting metabolism. -The FDA is worried about anyone on any medication taking starch blockers. The medicine was meant to be taken by people getting sufficient nutrition, including carbohydrates, such as the starch in bread or

pasta or potatoes or rice or pies. -No one knows how blocking starch metabolism will cause medicine to become stronger, weaker or impotent.

-Starch blockers contain a substance extracted from raw beans. They slow down or block an enzyme that digests starch. This results in a lot of undigested starch going to the large intestine. Bacteria feed on it and gas is generated in the process.

Brown confirmed that some manufacturers claim starch blockers are a food and therefore do not fall under the FDA's jurisdiction the way drugs do.

"Under the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act," he said, "a substance that is offered for a nonfood purpose and alters a function of the body is classified as a drug rather than food even if derived from vegetable products.

"We are concerned with the long term use ... because the claimed effect, weight control or reducing, is by blocking or interferring with digestion."

Said another way, the body's normal metabolism is altered. The absorption of carbohydrate is slowed down considerably.

The FDA, said Brown, wants warnings on starch blocker labels for diabetics and

possibly for everyone who is taking any kind

Brown said FDA has been told some companies have scientific information about the efficacy and safety of specific starch blockers marketed by them.

# Pressure Mounts On Hill Cocaine Ring



"Well, one good thing, gold prices rise whenever trouble in the Mideast mounts!"

WASHINGTON-More than 15 members of Congress were customers of a cocaine ring that operated on Capital Hill, the ringleaders have told narcotics agents. Nine of the accused legislators have been identified by at least three drug peddlers.

Witnesses have given testimony before a federal grand jury, but the prosecutors are under political pressure to drop the investigation. Their excuse is that the Justice Department has a policy of prosecuting pushers but not users.

Informants told my staff of the illegal drug operation 15 months ago. They said it was run by congressional aides under the noses of the men and women who had passed the drug laws. Narcotics had been delivered directly to congressional offices, they alleged.

But proof was needed. My staff put the informants together with undercover investigators. Then we arranged with Rep. Robert Dornan, R-Calif., a member of the House Narcotics Committee, to provide a

cover for the agents. They succeeded in penetrating the

congressional narcotics ring. A year later, they raided the home of a Washington attorney and arrested three ringleaders. They also seized a stash of cocaine worth at least \$250,000.

Under intensive interrogation, the pushers (one a former page) began spilling names. Their information has been scrutinized and presented to a federal grand jury.

Meanwhile, a preliminary report on the investigation, stamped "Personal and Confidential," has been submitted by Dornan to the Narcotics Committee. "I was originally approached to participate in this investigation," the letter states, "by two staff reporters, Mr. Jack Mitchell and Mr. Indy Badhwar from the office of syndicated columnist Jack Anderson in March of 1961. They had access to informants and in-

vestigators involved in this inquiry. "To stress the far-reaching consequences of

this investigation," Dornan's letter continues, "I would like to summarize the progress of the probe to this point. I was asked to cooperate with an investigation into the alleged use of cocaine by a number of congressional employees. I agreed, and on April 19, 1962, after a 12-month investigation, Washington residents Douglas Marshall, Troy Todd and Robert Finkel were arrested, and a large quantity of high-quality cocaine was seized by the police.

From a series of interviews following this arrest, it became apparent that Hill employees and possibly Members of Congress were involved in the illegal distribution and use of narcotics. I feel there is every reason to continue this investigation regardless of the fact that Members of Congress might be

"It would be the height of hypocrisy," declares Dornan, "if we were to stand back from this volatile issue because of the potential political overtones. However, the prosecutors from the Major Crimes Branch, U.S. District Court of the Department of Justice, apparently feel otherwise, according to the briefing given to me. They have indicated that it is their policy not to prosecute users. This baffles me ..."

The confidential letter lists nine members of Congress-"each named by at least three sources"-and reports "at least half a dozen others have surfaced." Of the nine, three are from California, one from New York, one from Massachusetts, and one from Maryland. Two are former congressmen; only one is a

Two of the congressmen identified as cocaine customers, Dornan reports, are also implicated in "an FBI investigation concerning alleged homosexual activities with .congressional pages."

The letter calls for congressional hearings, with use of subpoenas to get any "evidentiary material" that might be held back.

### **Pete Rose:** Real All Star

MONTREAL (UPI) - Eall-players like to blow smoke sometimes. They'll make the most garish statements. Don't believe them all, says Pete Rose. Especially when they talk about how they'd much rather stay home for three days than be a part of the All-Star

They're not telling it like it is, Rose contends.

"There isn't a player in baseball who doesn't wish he was picked to play in the All-Star Game and I don't care what he tells you otherwise," says the 41year-old first baseman for the Philadelphia Phillies, who'll be starting at that position for the National League All-Stars at Olympic Stadium Tuesday

This is Rose's 15th All-Star game and he has played in 14 of those, the only time he missed being in 1968 when the contest was held in Houston and he had to sit it out with a broken thumb. The players made the selections that year and they knew Rose couldn't compete because of his injury, but chose him, anyway, as a measure of their regard for his ability.

"I'll tell you honestly, I would've been very disappointed if I hadn't made the team this time and until this past week I wasn't really sure I would be selected," Rose offers. "We've got a lot of first basemen in our league having good years. Guys like Jason Thompson, Al Oliver, Keith Hernandez and Bill Buckner, I didn't think I was a cinch."

Rose is old-fashioned enough so that he wanted to be named to the All-Star. team entirely on merit and not on sentiment, as some other players have been in the past.

course, in Italy itself, where an estimated 40 million of the nation's 57 million residents watched the game from

Cities were silent when the game began in the early evening, then erupted as the final whistle blew.

In Rome, soccer fans shouted themselves hoarse, torch-lit parades began spontaneously and converged on the central Piazza del Popolo, where more

than 300,000 people waved national flags. Church bells rang in celebration.


Horn-honking autos jammed neighborhoods just outside the closed-off center of the city. Many of the cars had mock coffins tied to the roofs, covered with West German flags.



The AL learned Sunday that Rod Carew of the California Angels, elected by the fans to start at first base, will not play in the game because of tendinitis in his right hand.







# Scholarship Winner Sees It All Differently Now

Karen Leslie Stevenson achieved most people's idea of success three years ago when she graduated from the University of North Carolina with a 3.8 grade point average, school track honors and a Rhodes Scholarship.

Today, separating milk on a farm in rural New Hampshire, Ms. Stevenson says she is closer to a different kind of success.

"Before I went to Oxford, my motivation was very self-centered, very much in terms of what I could gather in the world for myself," she said recently. "The time I had in England, the time I had with so many people, so many expressions, just allowed me to see that there is so much more available than just what we can get for ourselves.

"Rather than saying, 'What can I do for myself?' I found myself saying, 'What is required in the world and what can I provide to fill the space?"

Ms. Stevenson, a Washington, D.C., native, was the first American black woman to win the prestigious award established by diamond merchant Cecil J. Rhodes. The honor capped a stellar career at North Carolina, where she went to school on a Morehead Scholarship and captained the woman's track team her senior year.

She studied ecclesiastical art in Europe before beginning her studies in modern history at Oxford and continued to cover a lot of ground - academically, emotionally and physically.

Among other things, she stayed in a kibbutz for six weeks and took a solo bicycle tour of Wales and Ireland during one Christmas vacation. She met people from white and black South Africa, India, Germany and other countries.

"I found it a very powerful time where my vision of the world really shifted," she said. "All that experience really allowed me to come to an awareness of myself that was independent of being a black or being a woman or an American - to let go of the categories and just see the humanness of everyone."

The change in "vision" brought a change in goals for Ms. Stevenson, who had planned to attend law school after leaving Oxford. Mebane Pritchett, executive director of the Morehead Scholarship program in Chapel Hill, said Ms. Stevenson has been offered a threeyear law school scholarship at UNC and a \$4 000 stinend

But Ms. Stevenson said she's not going to law school, at least not now.

"Sometimes one finds oneself in a very pointed position when you're very successful and your vision and your material circumstances reflect an accepted and expected form of success," she said. "It's very comfortable to move along a comfortable path that has agreement from the outside world.

"But when that path no longer coincides with your own sense of integrity, you have to do what you have to do."

Ms. Stevenson, 25, worked in education in Chapel Hill after returning to the United States last summer, then went. back to England for six months. She said she is considering education as a possible

"There's such an opportunity in an educational setting to give them (students) a chance to see their own brilliance, their own magnificence, and see how much they have to give the world," said Ms. Stevenson, who attended Taft School in Connecticut before entering North Carolina.

Ms. Stevenson, also the first black and the first woman from the University of North Carolina to be awarded the Rhodes Scholarship, said she isn't bothered by those who acclaim her accomplishments as representative of groups.

"It was often pointed out in the press that I was the first black woman to win the Rhodes," she said. "You can't judge it. I know that it wasn't important, yet in terms of what it provides for other people, then it is important to them."

Ms. Stevenson's athletic activities expanded in England, where she rowed with the Worcester College boat team last year and took up longdistance running. The running included the Paris Marathon and, later, the New York Marathon.

"The marathon really says a lot about my experience at Oxford," she said. "Oxford is organized so you work on your own, so it required a lot of self-discipline, independence and initiative to get the job

"It's the same thing with long-distance running - you get out and do the job," she said. "There's no one else there."

Ms. Stevenson, who lives on a farm in Epping, N.H., said she doesn't have any solid long-term goals. She hasn't ruled out law school.

But she said whatever she does will be influenced by one basic bellef about her life - that anything worthwhile if its motivation is beyond ego-boosting.



### Starving Not Safe; You Have To Eat

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am writing to ask you about the Cambridge Plan diet. It is really popular in our area. It is a powder you mix in water and is supposed to have 100 percent of the vitamins and minerals you need each day. You drink this three times a day and do not eat anything. It has more than 300 calories for the whole day. The amazing thing is that those taking it feel so well.

I know from reading your column that you advise everyone to simply cut down, but I am interested to know if this particular diet is any good. They even advocate your taking it when you are eating regularly. It is hard to ignore the evidence all around you. A lot of doctors here are recommending it also to those who need to lose weight, but I would like your opinion.

DEAR READER - My professional opinion is that NO diet is safe that is a starvation or semi-starvation diet. I was reading your letter just after finishing reading a report of two women who were on the Cambridge Plan who landed in the hospital with serious problems. By the time my column appears there may be others. Despite the "all the vitamins and minerals you need" in the powder, one woman had nearfatal low levels of potassium.

Both of these two women were taking other medicines. One was taking a diuretic which meant her potassium requirements were increased. Certainly anyone taking medicines should not be on such diets.

There is no such thing as a balanced starvation diet. The first requirement of a balanced diet is that it provide enough calories for your body's needs. Serious calorie depletion results in bodily changes of starvation.

The National Society of Bariatricians, those physicians who specialize in weight reduction, has already made public criticisms of the Cambridge Plan.


