Farmers Buy Pigs Instead Of Raising Them, Says Official

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11—(P)

The idea of buying little pigs, like you buy baby chicks from hatcheries, is spreading, a governnent hog expert said today. More and more farmers are ing them from their own sows, said Dr. Herbert Hetzer. There is an increase, he said, of farm operators who concentrate on pig production and sell to farmers.

The Agriculture Department official said this buying from producers may continue to spread age. buying their pigs instead of rais-

But he doesn't expect it ever to mushroom into a business the size of the chicken hatchery industry. "Many farmers wouldn't be in position to raise as many pigs as a producer," he said. "And super-ior breeding would be put to better use than otherwise possible."

Farmers now lose about onc-third of their pigs before they are eight weeks old. Properly equipped producers would save a large number, Hetzer said, just as some superior hog




